## FARM CASH RECEIPTS, JANUARY - MARCH, 1970(1)

During the first three months of 1970 farmers " cash receipts from farming operations totalled $\$ 971.5$ million. This represents a slight increase of 0.9 per cent from the revised value of $\$ 962.7$ million for the first quarter of 1969. These estimates include cash receipts from the sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops, net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada and deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. No allowance was made for the cost incurred by farmers in the production of the commodities sold. Estimates of the expenses involved together with total farm income are published annually in the DBS publication "Farm Net Income" (Catalogue no. 21-202).

Compared to the first three months of 1969 fairly large increases in farm cash receipts were recorded for wheat, rapeseed, potatoes, cattle, calves, hogs and dairy products. In contrast, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' wheat crops made during the first quarter of 1970 were considerably below those received during the same quarter of 1969. Net cash advances on farmstored grains, deficiency payments and dairy supplementary payments were also below those for the first quarter of 1969.

Cash receipts were higher in all provinces except Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. A substantial increase was registered in the Maritime Provinces where cash receipts from farming operations increased by almost 60 per cent in Prince Edward Island, slightly more than 17 per cent in Nova Scotia and about 45 per cent in New Brunswick compared to the same period a year ago. In Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick these record levels are due for the most part to the high average prices received for potatoes. For Nova Scotia the increased cash receipts mainly result from greater returns from livestock and livestock products. In Quebec, the increase of 9 per cent comes mainly from the higher cash receipts from cattle, calves and hogs. In Ontario and Manitoba cash receipts from farming operations attained a level slightly above that of the first quarter of 1969. Reductions in cash receipts occurred in Saskatchewan, 10.7 per cent, Alberta, 2.9 per cent and British Columbia, 3.3 per cent. The decline in Saskatchewan during the first three months of 1970 compared to the same period of 1969 largely resulted from lower levels both of Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years" wheat crops and net cash advances on farm-stored grains. A lower income from these sources was only partially offset by increased sales of wheat, rapeseed and livestock and livestock products. The increase in returns in Alberta from rapeseed and livestock and livestock products was insufficient to compensate for the lower receipts from the major grains and the decline in net cash advances. In British Columbia, while cash receipts from livestock and livestock products remained virtually unchanged, receipts from crops, especially wheat, exhibited a decline.

In addition to the above income farmers also received supplementary payments amounting to $\$ 1.6$ million considerably below the $\$ 7.4$ million received during the same period of 1969 . These payments consist of those made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act and for 1969 those made to sugar beet growers in Ontario. When added together farmers' cash receipts from farming operations and supplementary payments total $\$ 973.1$ million, slightly above the revised estimate of $\$ 970.1$ million for the first quarter of 1969.

Field Crops. - During the January to March period of 1970 total cash returns to farmers from the sale of field crops including Canadian Wheat Board participation payments and net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada amounted to $\$ 322.4$ milifon. This total was about 12 per cent below the level for the same period in 1969 and accounted for 33.2 per cent of total cash receipts from farming operations. Returns to wheat producers at time of delivery rose by almost $\$ 15$ million with increased sales more than compensating for lower prices. Value of rapeseed sales more than doubled in rising from $\$ 10.4$ million in 1969 to $\$ 22.4$ million for the first three months of 1970 . Both prices received by farmers and marketings were considerably higher than in the earlier period. Potatoes also showed a considerable increase and rose by nearly $\$ 10$ million to a value of $\$ 23.2$ million for the January to March period of 1970 . While marketings of this crop were only slightly above those of the previous year, prices were much stronger. In contrast, marketings of oats were considerably below those of the first quarter of 1969 and receipts from this source fell from slightly more than \$ll million to just below $\$ 4$ million. A decline in the value of tobacco sales can be accounted for by lower prices received for this comodity. However, the main reason for the decline in total receipts from crops is due to the much lower level of Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops which fell from $\$ 35.5$ million for the first three months of 1969 to less than a million dollars in 1970. Similarly, net cash advances on farm-stored grains which amounted to $\$ 1.4$ million during the latest January to March period were considerably lower than the $\$ 28.3$ million obtained at the same time in 1969.

Livestock and Livestock Products. - During the first three months of 1970 farmers total returns from the sale of livestock and livestock products amounted to $\$ 635.1$ million, 10.5 per cent above the 1969 first-quarter estimate of $\$ 574.6$ million. Although marketings of cattle and calves in 1970 were lower than for the same period in 1969, this decline was more than offset by stronger prices resulting in cash receipts from this source reaching $\$ 243.3$ million compared to $\$ 225.4$ million. Returns to pig producers rose by 30.2 per cent in reaching $\$ 138,6$ million for the first quarter of 1970 . This increase of $\$ 32.1$ million over the 1969 estimate of $\$ 106.5$ million resulted from a combination of higher marketings and increased prices. Similarly, slightly larger marketings combined with higher prices to increase the returns to dairy producers from $\$ 130.5$ million in 1969 to $\$ 136.4$ million for the first quarter of 1970 . In addition to these returns dairy producers also received, during this period, supplementary payments which amounted to $\$ 10$ million compared to $\$ 13.5$ million for the same months of 1969. As a result of a larger volume of marketing the value of receipts from poultry meat slightly exceeded the level attained in 1969. While prices of eggs were similar for both the first quarter of 1969 and the same months of 1970 , in the latter period increased marketings led to the value of receipts rising from $\$ 47.9$ million to $\$ 49.9$ million.

Estimates of cash receipts from farming operations include the returns from all sales of agricultural products except those associated with direct inter-farm transfers. The prices used to value all products sold are prices to farmers at the farm level; they include any subsidies, bonuses and premiums which can be attributed to specific products, but they exclude any storage, transportation, processing and handing charges which are not actually received by farmers.

Sources of information used in the preparation of these estimates include the Censuses of Agriculture; periodic Bureau surveys of production and disposition of crops, livestock and animal products; farm product marketing agencies; processors of agricultural products; Bureau surveys of prices received by farmers in connection with agricultural activities; agricultural statistics arising out of administrative responsibilities of various government departments, both Federal and Provincial.
