According to Elevator reports for the week ended October 17th, 1930, from Montreal, Quebec and Vancouver, B. C., 1,988,998 bushels of Canadian Wheat were shipped by vessel overseas. This makes a total movement for the first three weeks of the month of 8,670,920 bushels. The shipments to Buffalo and other United States ports for the week ended October 21st were 1,753,565 bushels, and for the three-week period, 12,383,334 bushels, making a total water movement of 21,054,254 bushels.

Wheat stocks show an increase from the previous week ended October 10th. The quantity in store on October 17th, 1930, was 175,200,602 bushels compared with 162,012,923 bushels last week and 203,588,590 bushels for the same week last year.

Of the total quantity of wheat in store for the week, 20,251,918 bushels are in elevators at United States Lakes and Atlantic Seaboard Ports.

The Western Country Elevators shipments for October 10th show a small increase over the previous week, being 11,094,996 bushels against 9,614,118 bushels. For the period from August 1st to October 17th, 1930, the deliveries at country points amounted to 161,606,000 bushels compared with 157,031,000 bushels. During the week ended October 14th, 8,088 cars were loaded compared with 6,361 cars for the same week in 1929. 84% of the former was placed in the Contract grades.

#### FOREIGN SITUATION

The Bureau is in receipt of the following cablegram from Rome, through the Department of Agriculture:- "France wheat provisional estimates yield current season 231,481,530 bushels."

The following communication, dated September 30th, has been received from the Trade Commissioner in Italy with regard to wheat situation in Spain: "The wheat crop for Spain during 1929 was 153,953,589 bushels, while the requirements as bread amounted to 132,275,160 bushels and seed 14,697,240 bushels. The 1930 crop amounts to 143,665,521 bushels.

It is stated, that the Spanish Government will very shortly permit the importation of wheat. This year's crop with carry-over from 1929 would be sufficient in quantity, but the quality is so low that importation is necessary. At least 7,348,620 bushels should be required. This importation will not be made at once, but will be made in a series of 'calls,' the first one coming during November and should be a large one. Canada should get a fair share of this business.

The Bureau is in receipt of the following communication, dated October 9th, the import of which is as follows:- "Rainy weather continues in France and the wheat crop is seriously damaged both in quantity and quality. This has been proven by threshing returns."

Private estimates places the wheat crop between 246,178,770 bushels and 249,853,080 bushels, but considering the poor quality obtained so far by threshing, it is calculated, that only 183,715,500 bushels to 191,064,120 bushels will be good enough to make flour.

The average consumption of France is estimated as 319,664,970 bushels (including seed), therefore, about 110,229,300 bushels to 123,600,850 bushels will have to be imported. Figures for stocks are not easily obtained, but at the beginning of August, there existed as stock about 73,486,200 bushels.

For the first seven months of 1930, government returns show that 3,433,205 bushels of wheat were imported from Canada out of a total import of 13,390,383 bushels.

The dumping of Russian wheat, with offers from countries which have a surplus for export, has caused a weak market, with prices declining. It is also learned now that Argentine and Australia will have good crops and this news has prevented millers and importers from buying large quantities. Only sufficient quantities for immediate requirements are being purchased, and these moderate on account of the Native wheat available.

Russian wheat was bought last week, for delivery in Marseilles in November, while a few orders for Manitoba for delivery at LaHavre this month have been consummated. Sales of Native wheat have been small, mostly made to small millers, who only buy for actual requirements.

Importers are feeding the market and they will only buy when they believe that wheat from either Russia or other countries has reached the lowest price.

On October 3rd, a decree was promulgated placing some Russian Soviet products under the regime of import licenses. The commodities affected were cereals, meats, eggs, sugar, wood, linseed and gelatine. This decree will have to be ratified by the Chamber of Deputies in the coming session.

This has been highly commented by the French press, and it should help Canada to dispose of part of this year's wheat crop.

The "Moniteur de Bordeaux," considered one of the best sources of information in France, published an estimate that 253,219,567 bushels of wheat were harvested, but the quality being poor, it is thought only 234,972,125 bushels were available for wheat-flour. This is the latest estimate, and it is considered accurate.

The Canadian Government Trade Commissioner at Rotterdam has sent as the report of the Netherlands Department of Agriculture, dated September 22nd: "Heavy rainfall has unfavourably affected the yield of wheat, which will be considerably below average. Stocks of wheat in Rotterdam at October 11th amounted to 3,500,870 bushels, of which 1,245,627 bushels were of Russian origin, considerably more than the holdings of Canadian grain. Stocks of wheat have been increasing rather rapidly since September 15th when they amounted to 2,697,328 bushels. During 1930 to date, the bulk of the wheat imported into Holland has originated in Argentina, United States, France and Canada in the order named.

In Switzerland, the grain crop is below average in quantity and quality and is still being sold under Government price regulation. Imports of wheat for the first eight months of 1930 show that Canada has furnished 5,371,228 bushels, compared with 1,955,615 bushels from United States, 1,591,819 from Argentina, 905,319 from France, and only 192,360 from Russia.

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 17, 1930.

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending October 17, show an increase of 17,119,102 bushels. Stocks for the week were as follows: Wheat 175,200,602, Oats 10,944,921, Barley 31,605,053, Flax 1,920,568 and Rye 12,228,516, a total of 231,899,660 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 13,187,679, Oats 1,254,954, Barley 1,475,475, Flax 620,207 and Rye 580,787 bushels. For the same week last year the amount in store was 254,872,204 bushels, made up as follows: Wheat 203,588,599, Oats 19,003,466, Barley 23,455,258, Flax 1,336,873 and Rye 7,488,008 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS.- Stocks of grain in store at these elevators show a net increase of 9,672,481 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 8,960,507, Oats 499,530, Flax 369,522 and Rye 51,112 bushels, while Barley shows a decrease of 108,190 bushels.

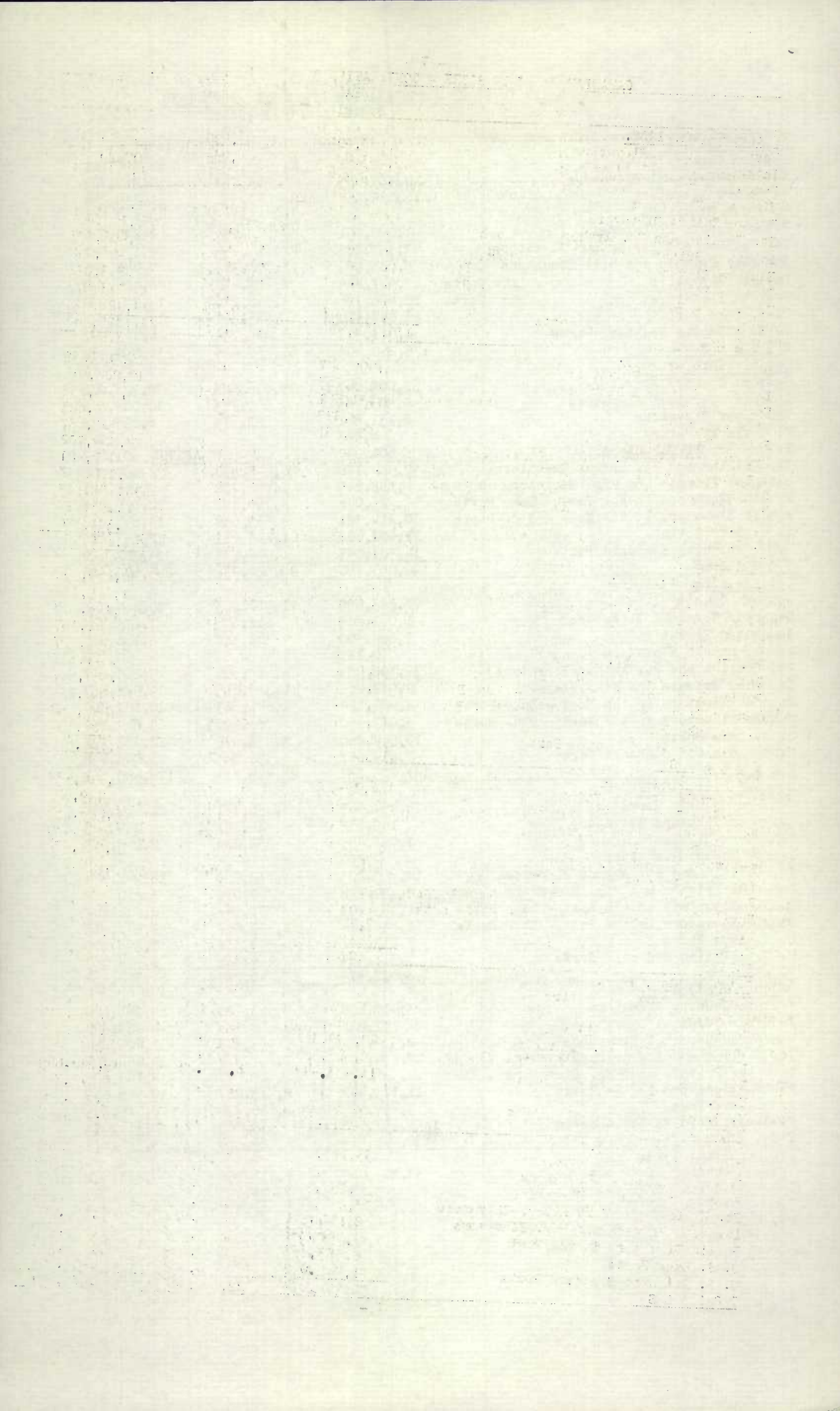

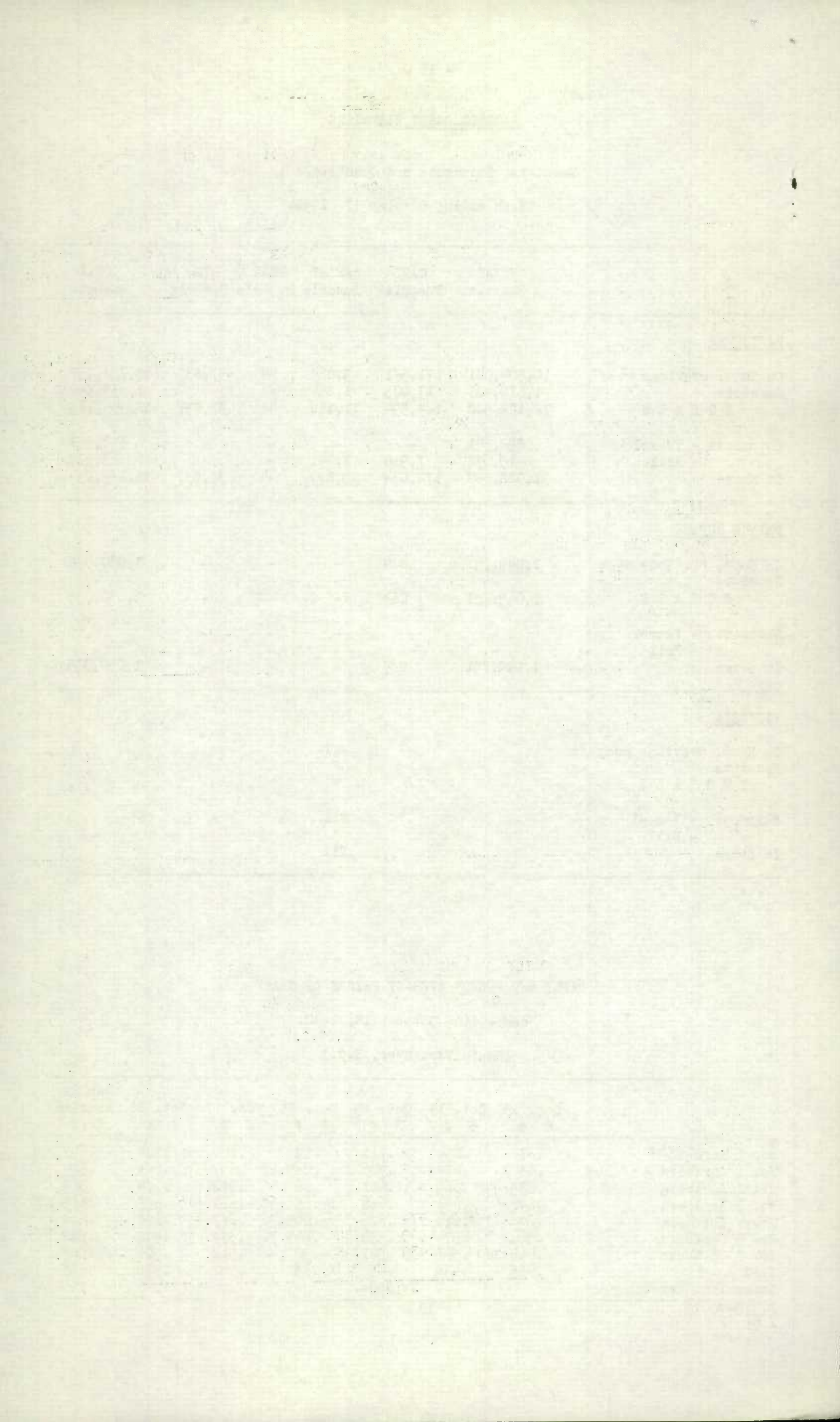
