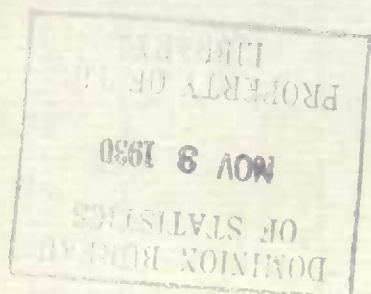

According to Elevator reports for the week ended October 24th, 1930, from Montreal, Quebec and Vancouver, B.C., 3,642,873 bushels of Canadian Wheat were shipped by vessel overseas. This makes a total movement from the Canadian Seaboard ports for the first four weeks of the month of 12,313,798 bushels.

Wheat stocks show an increase from the previous week ended October 17th. The quantity in store on October 24th, 1930, was 177,199,311 bushels compared with 175,200,602 bushels last week and 214,012,020 bushels for the same week last year.

Of the total quantity of wheat in store for the week, 19,135,322 bushels are in elevators at United States Lakes and Atlantic Seaboard Ports.

The Western Country Elevators shipments for October 17th show a small decrease from the previous week, being 8,909,009 bushels against 11,094,996 bushels. For the period from August 1st to October 24th, 1930, the deliveries at country points amounted to 169,934,000 bushels compared with 167,380,000 bushels. During the week ended October 21st, 4,418 cars were inspected compared with 6,649 cars for the same week in 1929. 79% of the former was placed in the Contract grades.

The weather in the West has been fairly warm and clear, so that threshing has resumed in the late districts of northern and central Saskatchewan and Alberta. Much of the grain will grade tough. Deliveries are again running higher than last year as they did earlier in the season.

FOREIGN WHEAT SITUATION

The important developments in the foreign situation during the past week have been:

1. Soviet Russia.- Black Sea ports contributed 6,144,000 bushels of the world total of 13,565,000 bushels in the week ending October 24th. North America shipped 7,516,000 bushels, Argentina 1,393,000 bushels and Australia 1,754,000 bushels. European buyers are still cautious, with 3,000,000 bushels of Soviet wheat reported by Broomhall's as on passage for orders, mostly unsold. The president of the Corn Trade Association in a public letter estimates the exportable surplus in Russia as 80 million bushels, the bulk of which is at interior points. It is considered likely that the wheat movement from seaboard ports may not be resumed until spring.

2. Germany.- On October 27th. the German government again increased the duty on bread wheat from \$1.20 to \$1.62 per bushel and lowered the duty on durums from \$1.20 to 73 cents per bushel. Milling regulations compelling the use of 80 p.c. of home-grown wheat are still being enforced, with the farmers asking for higher proportions of German wheat even to the exclusion of foreign supplies. The plan to mix rye with German wheat flour has been delayed until December. The present supplies of wheat, although of inferior quality, are apparently sufficient for requirements and only small imports will be necessary. The reduction in the duty on durum wheat should help the demand for Canadian durums.

3. Argentina.- The first rust report was issued from Cordoba in the Argentine. General rains and high temperatures made favourable conditions for the spread of rust, but later reports stated that it was not of appreciable severity. The weather has now cleared and the crop is progressing normally with indications that the first new wheat will be in the market by the end of November. Indications point to a surplus of old and new wheat of about 239,000,000 bushels compared with 148,000,000 bushels last year, later reduced to 100,000,000 bushels, because of large amounts of unmerchantable grades. On October 28th. Liverpool reported that, owing to reports of rust damage, new crop offers of Plate wheat had been withdrawn, and this transferred demand to Canadian wheat.

4. United Kingdom.- A Liverpool report of October 29th construes the action of the British Government in deciding not to tax wheat in any way as bullish, since cheaper wheat should be a stimulating influence on consumption. Offers of German and Polish wheat were made in Liverpool at 77½ to 79 cents per bushel. The offers of English-grown wheat in country markets are small.

5. France.- France is reported a good buyer of wheat while awaiting modification of the milling regulations. Weather has been unfavourable for farm work. Wheat prices advanced 5 francs per 100 Kilos, owing to scanty offerings and good buying on account of Paris mills.

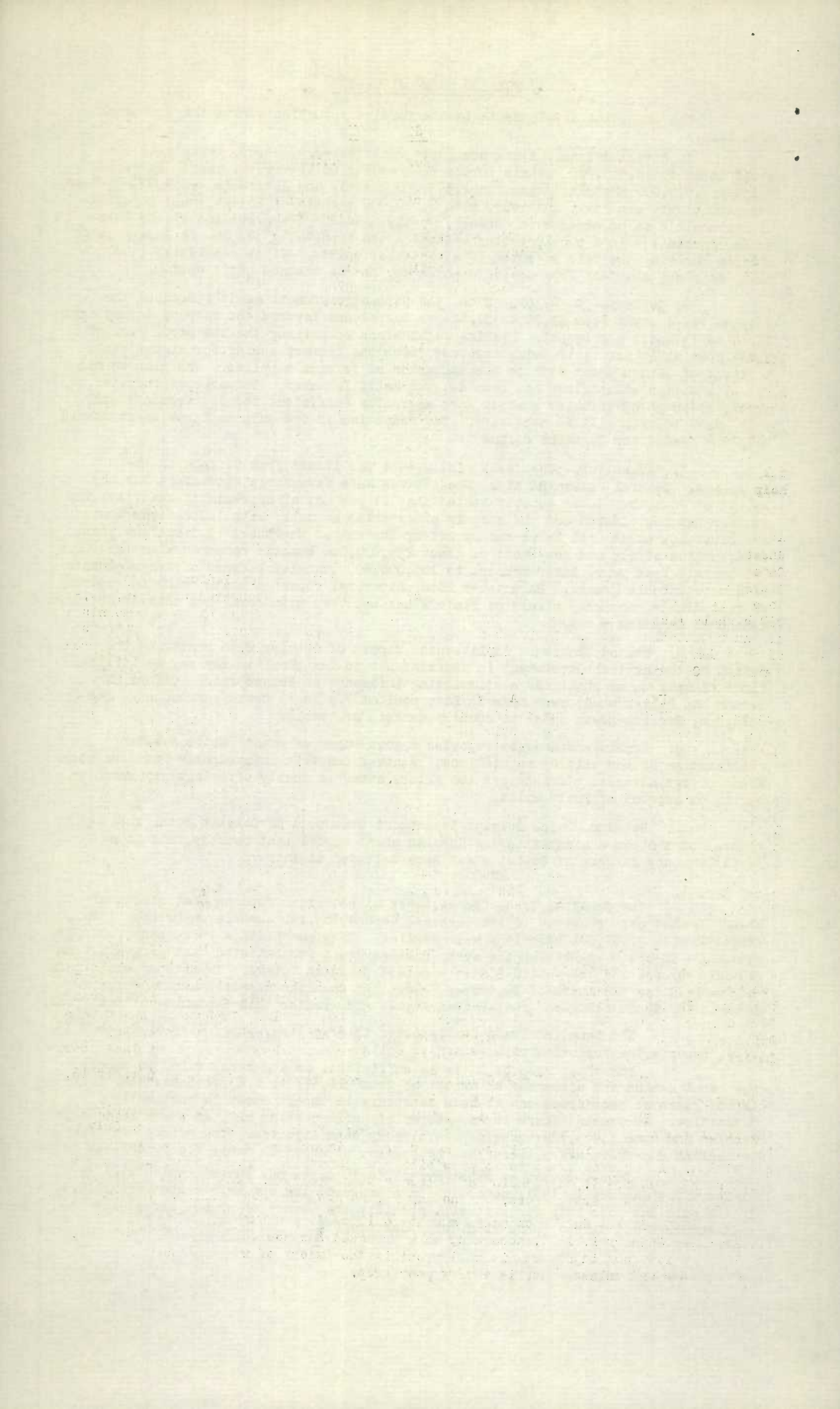
6. Belgium.- The Belgian Government announced on October 29th. the removal of the ban against shipping Russian wheat across that country, and as a result, twenty cargoes of Soviet wheat were unloaded at Antwerp.

The Canadian Trade Commissioner at Rotterdam reports that stocks of wheat in that port continue to increase and were 4,763,191 bushels on October 18th., compared with 3,501,801 bushels a week earlier. Russian holdings increased 1,102,293 bushels. In the arrivals for the week, Russian grain predominated, and arrivals from Germany, Greece and the United States exceeded Canadian totals. Imports of wheat into Switzerland for the month of September, show that Canadian supplies are favoured. Imports for September were greater than August and greater than September of last year.

The Canadian Trade Commissioner in Argentina, under date of October 13, 1930, reports the following with regard to Chile:-

The wheat crop of Chile is sufficient, as a general rule, to supply the local demand and allow for an export of from 918,577 to 1,837,155 bushels. Only in the years of poor crops has it been necessary to import wheat in worthwhile quantities. At present there is no possibility of importing any, as there is a large surplus and some 1,469,724 bushels have already been exported. The prices continue to decline and there are sellers, but no buyers, at about 86 cents f.o.b. Chilean ports.

Import duties on wheat amount to 10 cents per bushel, which will go higher after January 1, 1931, according to a proposed law now before the legislature. If the said law goes into force it will prohibit the import of wheat, except for seed purposes and unless there is a very poor crop.

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 24, 1930.

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending October 24, show a net increase of 1,695,850 bushels. Stocks for the week were as follows, Wheat 177,199,311; Oats 10,072,796; Barley 32,172,686; Flax 1,949,577; and Rye 12,200,160, a total of 233,594,510 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 1,998,709; Barley 567,613 and Flax 29,009 bushels, while Oats and Rye show decreases of 871,125 and 28,356 bushels. For the same week last year the amount in store was 265,941,413 bushels made up as follows: Wheat 214,012,020; Oats 19,851,833; Barley 23,272,293; Flax 1,126,558 and Rye 7,612,709 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS.- Stocks in store at these elevators show a net increase of 1,233,199 bushels. Wheat shows an increase of 1,635,608 bushels, while decreases are noted in Oats of 121,912, Barley 105,771, Flax 14,355 and Rye 60,371 bushels.

INTERIOR TERMINAL (SASKATOON, MOOSE JAW, EDMONTON AND CALGARY).- Stocks for the week show a net increase of 307,811 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 291,726; Oats 19,576 and Rye 59 bushels, while Barley and Flax show decreases of 3,161 and 391 bushels respectively.

VANCOUVER PRIVATE AND TERMINAL ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show a decrease of 458,186 bushels made up as follows,- Wheat 451,375, Oats 5,383, Barley 1,321 and Rye 107 bushels.

PRINCE RUPERT ELEVATORS.- Stocks at this elevator are the same as for previous week.

VICTORIA ELEVATOR.- Wheat stocks at this elevator amount to 82,782 bushels, being the first receipt of this year.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE (FORT WILLIAM AND PORT ARTHUR).- Stocks at the Head of the Lakes show a net increase 67,358 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 296,172, Barley 88,545, Flax 187,705 and Rye 118,821 bushels, while Oats show a decrease of 623,855 bushels.

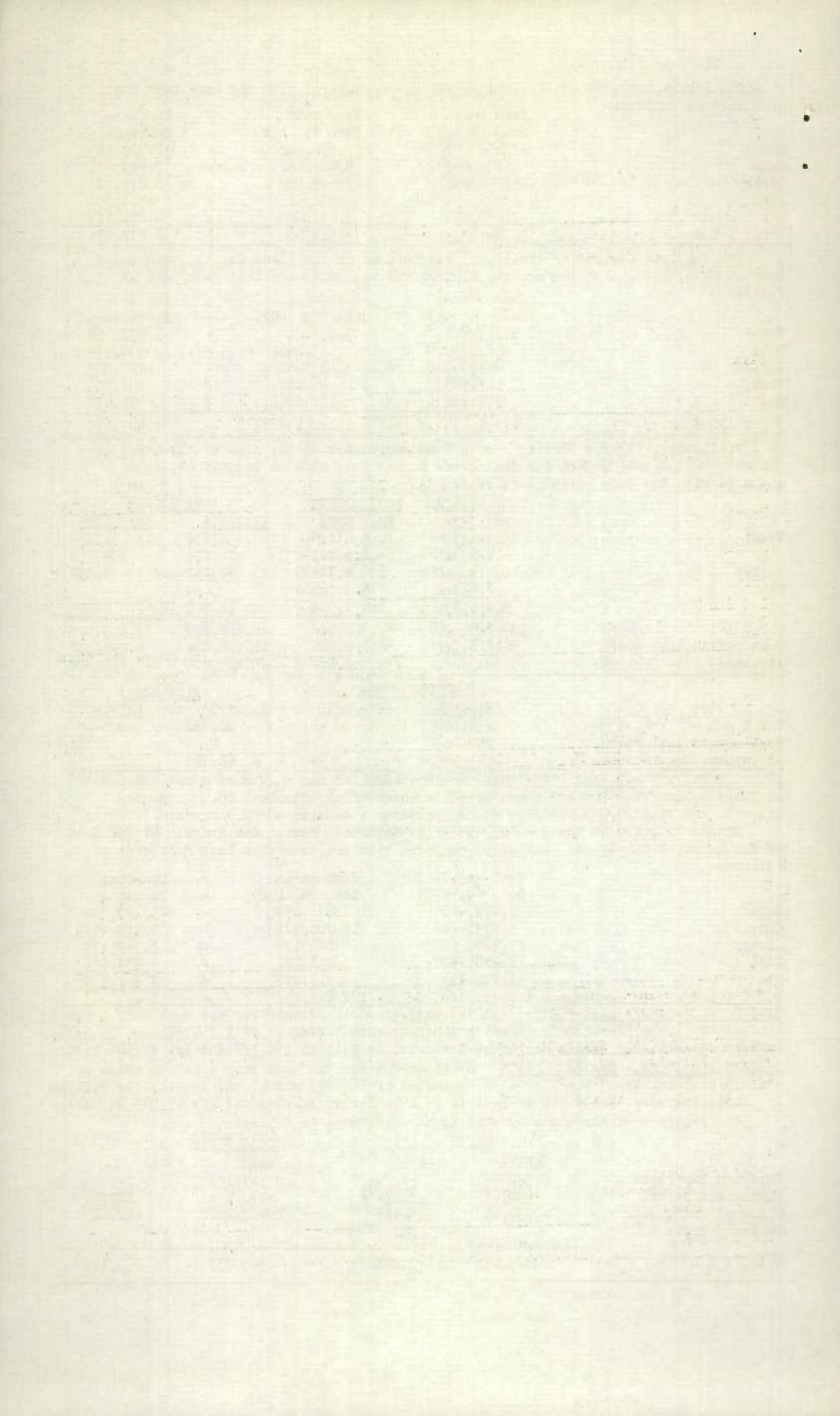

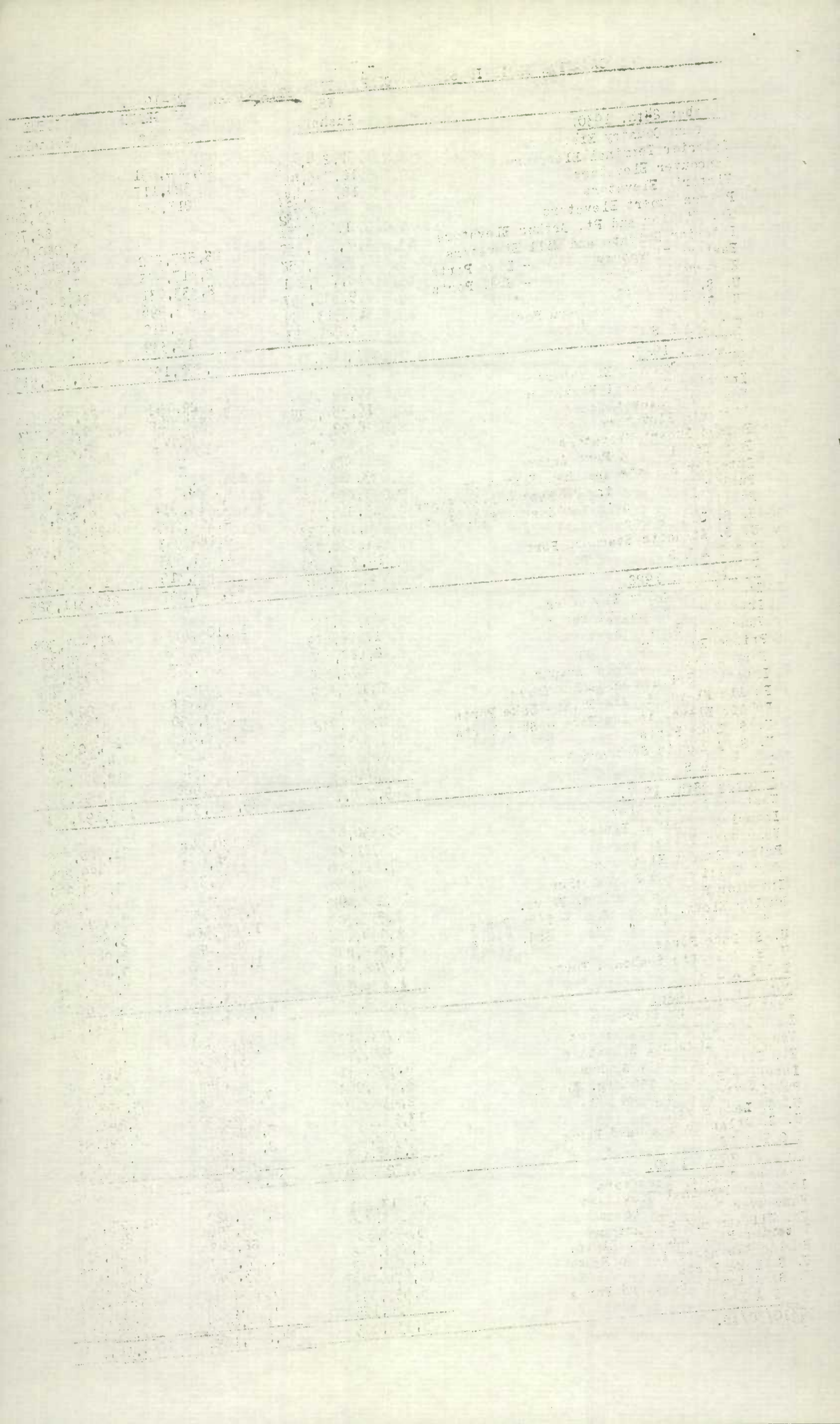
