According to Elevator reports for the week ended October 31st, 1930, from Montreal, Quebec and Vancouver, B.C., 3,819,144 bushels of Canadian Wheat were shipped by vessel overseas. This makes a total movement from Canadian Seaboard ports for the first five weeks of 16,132,942 bushels. The movement to Buffalo and other United States Lake ports for the same period was 18,721,182 bushels, making total vessel shipments of 34,854,124 bushels.

Wheat stocks show an increase from the previous week ended October 24th, The quantity in store on October 31st, 1930, was 183,134,899 bushels compared with 177,199,311 bushels last week and 216,953,316 bushels for the same week last year.

Of the total quantity of wheat in store for the week, 21,366,732 bushels are in elevators at United States Lakes and Atlantic Seaboard Ports.

The Western Country Elevators shipments for October 24th show a decrease from the previous week, being 6,336,321 bushels against 8,909,009 bushels. For the period from August 1st to October 31st, 1930, the deliveries at country points amounted to 179,654,000 bushels compared with 173,891,000 bushels in the same period last year. During the ten-day period ended October 31st, 5,943 cars were inspected compared with 9,963 cars for the same period in 1929. 62% of the former was placed in the contract grades being the lowest proportion of the year because of damp and tough grain being delivered in northern Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Fair weather has again prevailed in western Canada, so that threshing has proceeded satisfactorily and with lowering proportions of damp and tough grain. Daily deliveries of wheat have exceeded receipts of the same date last year since October 25th.

### FOREIGN WHEAT SITUATION

The important developments in the foreign situation during the past week have been:

- l. Australia.—The Hon. F.M. Forde, Assistant Minister in the Scullin Government has stated that the wheat crop will amount to 210,000,000 bushels, an increase of 87,000,000 bushels over the previous year's Crop. The recent official estimate announced a crop of 200,000,000 bushels while last year's figure was 123,000,000 bushels. The visible supply of wheat in Australia is placed at 7,760,000 bushels, compared with 8,730,000 bushels last week and 2,750,000 bushels for the same week last year.
- 2. Argentine. The condition of the wheat crop shows that early sown wheat is doing splendidly. The crop in the north has partly passed through the milk stage without any damage and a general absence of late frosts.

Rust reports are contradictory especially in the Cordoba district, while satisfactory progress has been made in the Entre Rios and the Buenos Aires sections. Heavy rains have fallen lately, and if it continues will encourage the extension of the rust menace. However the present condition is not alarming. It might be noted that it was in the third week of November last year that rust became serious in the Argentine.

- 3. India.- Good rains are required as complaints show that rainfall is insufficient.
- 4. Soviet Russia.— Black sea shipments for the week ended October 30 amounted to 3,648,000 bushels, 2,740,000 bushels being destined to the United Kingdom and 904,000 bushels to the continent. Since August 1 the shipments from these ports were 43,232,000 bushels, of which 36,264,000 bushels were of Russian origin. Fall seeding in Russia is reported to be 84% completed.

- 2 --5. Greoce .- The reports from this country are of an unofficial nature, but they confirm that severe damage has been done to this year's crops. The crop is stated . to be 10,600,000 bushels against a previous estimate of 13,600,000 bushels. Last Year's crop finally amounted to 16,300,000 bushels, while the average for the last seven years was 12,594,000 bushels. 6. France .- Fall seeding is making favourable progress while offers of native wheat are moderate and appear sufficient for present requirements. 7. Belgium - The Belgium Government announces that, dating from October 27, Russian wheat, oats, barley, rye and their products are subject to the maximum customs tariff, which means that products from other countries will need a certificate of origin in order to secure the benefits of the minimum tariff. 8. Germany .- A small quantity of German wheat has been exported to England, through the Port of Konigsberg. This port has a special privilege in regard to exports of grain. The exact amount is not known, but it is doubtless very limited. Lately, the export privilege enjoyed by this port has been abolished. There is a good demand for native wheat. 9. United Kingdom .- It is reported from reliable sources that Great Britain is possibly prepared to offer the Dominions a wheat quota of 55%. Broomhall estimates that this would be equivalent to a 10% increase over the present practice. 10. United States .- According to a reliable authority, it is estimated that there will be 175,000,000 bushels of wheat fed on the farms during the crop year. The decrease in the United States visible last week is indicative of heavy interior wheat consumption. Private estimates of the United States winter wheat acreage average 41,611,000 as compared with 43,690,000 sown last year. The world shipments for the week ended November 3, amounted to 15,747,000 These shipments are credited to the following countries: - North America, bushels. 8,230,000 bushels; Black Sea 3,648,000 bushels; Australia 1,768,000 bushels; Argentine, 725,000 bushels; India, 40,000 bushels; and other countries, 1,336,000 bushels. The stocks of wheat in the United Kingdom on November 1, 1930, are 9,960,000 bushels, a little over one half the amount in store on the same date in 1929. Continental arrivals are reported as amounting to 8,112,000 bushels. These are credited to the following countries: - Italy, 2,592,000 bushels; Holland, 1,728,000 bushels; France, 1,256,000 bushels; Belgium, 832,000 bushels; Greece, 896,000 bushels; Germany, 536,000 bushels; and Scandinavia, 272,000 bushels. During the week ended November 3, the world shipments of wheat and wheatflour decreased 2,818,000 from the previous week. The increase over the same week last year was 6,010,000 bushels. Since July 1st, 1930, the total world shipments of wheat were 264,184,000 bushels compared with 239,736,000 bushels a year ago. The North American shipments during the above period were 37,000,000 bushels greater than a year ago. According to a report received from the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Rotterdam, the amount of wheat, received in Holland during the week ended October 25, 1930, was 2,201,618 bushels of which, Russia supplied 1,115,580 bushels, Germany 558,527 bushels, Canada 370,924 bushels, United States 156,563 bushels, and other countries 24 bushels. The stocks of wheat at Rotterdam on the above date were 4,723,593 bushels, the bulk of which, 3,064,375 bushels, were of Russian origin, with 817,535 bushels from the United States, 459,239 bushels from the Danube, 218,621 bushels from Australia, and 79,426 bushels from Canada. - 2 -

### CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 31, 1930.

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending October 31, show a net increase of 6,947,922 bushels. Stocks for the week were as follows: Wheat 183,134,399, Oats 10,921,385, Barley 31,728,276, Flax 1,955,775 and Rye 12,302,097, a total of 240,542,432 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 5,935,583, Oats 348,589, Flax 6,198 and Rye 601,937 bushels, while Barley shows a decrease of 444,390 bushels. For the same week last year the amount in store was 269,010,857 bushels, made up as follows: Wheat 216,953,315, Oats 20,205,811, Barley 23,505,765, Flax 1,230,052 and Rye 7,614,913 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS. - Stocks in store at these elevators show a net increase of 2,731,065 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 2,345,835, Oats 172,548, Barley 112,055 and Rye 118,079 bushels, while Flax shows a decrease of 17,452 bushels.



INTERIOR TERMINAL (SASKATOON, MOOSE JAW, EDMONTON AND CALGARY).- Stocks for the week show a net increase of 3,212 bushels. Wheat shows an increase of 78,572 bushels, while Oats and Barley show decreases of 71,759 and 3,601 bushels respectively.

VANCOUVER PRIVATE AND TERMINAL ELEVATORS. - Grain stocks at these elevators show a net decrease of 810,980 bushels. Decreases are noted in Wheat of 839,274 and Barley 1,286 bushels, while Oats and Flax show increases of 281,131 and 1,449 bushels respectively. VICTORIA ELEVATOR. - Stocks at this elevator show an increase of 150,084 bushels. Increases are noted in Wheat of 149,852 and Oats 232 bushels.

PRINCE RUPERT ELEVATORS. Wheat stocks at this elevator show an increase of 543 bushels.
