### CANADIAN WHEAT MOVEMENT

During the week ended May 22, 1931, according to elevator reports from Canadian Seaboard ports, 5,055,470 bushels of Canadian wheat were shipped by vessel overseas. The 6learances of Canadian wheat from United States Atlantic Seaboard ports amounted to 1,319,000 bushels, making a total export clearance for the week of 6,374,470 bushels.

For the three weeks ended May 22, 1931, the quantity of wheat cleared from Canadian Seaboard ports, according to elevator returns were 15,436,508 bushels. The amount of Canadian wheat exported from United States Atlantic Seaboard ports is shown to be 5,380,000 bushels, making a total export clearance of 20,816,508 bushels.

Wheat stocks show a decrease compared with the previous week ended May 15, 1931. The quantity in store on May 22, 1931, was 140,895,108 bushels, compared with 146,082,871 bushels for the week ended May 15, 1931, while 195,356,813 bushels were in store for the week ended May 23rd, last year.

Of the total quantity of wheat in store on May 22nd, 6,116,792 bushels are in elevators at the United States Lake and Atlantic Seaboard ports, of which 5,166,458 bushels are stored at Buffalo, N.Y.

The shipments from the western country elevators for the week ended May 15, amounted to 3,672,298 bushels, compared with 4,019,979 bushels for the week ended May 8, 1931. For the period from August 1st, to May 15th, 1931, wheat delivered at country elevators was 290,071,610 bushels or 65,722,481 bushels more than the total of 224,349,129 bushels for the period August 1st, to May 16th, 1930.

During the week ended May 21, 2,495 cars of wheat were inspected, compared with 2,281 cars for the same week last year. Of the 2,495 cars inspected, 487 cars or 19.52 p.c. graded tough, and damp, and 1,775 cars or 71.15 p.c. were placed within the contract grades.


The quantity of wheat moved by vessel from the Head of the Lakes during the week ended May 21, 1931, amounted to 4,354,801 bushels, the distribution of which was as follows:— To Canadian Lower Lake Ports 1,151,647 bushels, to Montreal 466,816 bushels and to Buffalo 2,736,338 bushels.

Although very helpful rains have fallen in the West, especially in Manitoba and central and northern Alberta, the precipitation since April 1st, is about one third of that received in 1930 and much below normal. The region in southern and central Saskatchewan, which was very low in soil moisture during most of 1929 and 1930, is again suffering from drought, and the recurring high winds have aggravated the situation, causing patchy germination and rendering some re-seeding necessary. The weather of the past vealthes then variable and heavy rains are required to assure a good start for the new arop.

The remains and the practical completion of wheat-seeding have been accompanied by increased is iveries.

### THE TOREIGN SITUATION

The world movement of wheat has continued at record levels for the present crop sersin and Frich American shipments have accounted for the bulk of the indrease. Australian shipments fell appreciably in the past week, totalling just 2,728,000 bushels



compared with a recent average of nearly 5,000,000 bushels. The takings of the United Kingdom continue at low levels, but increased continental consumption is responsible for the greater demand. Holland, France, Italy, Belgium and Germany are importing in considerable volume. The stocks of wheat on passage, which began an upward tendency about a month ago, reached the high level of 63,704,000 bushels in the week just past.

The weather news of the past week has been generally bearish. Crop conditions in the winter wheat area of the United States and in southern Europe have been particularly favourable. Russian seeding conditions have improved although there are contradictory reports as to whether the contemplated 12 p.c. increase in spring wheat under the Five-Year Plan has been carried out. In Australia, seeding has been returned by heavy rains, but the seedbed has been greatly improved and prospects are considered excellent. Seeding is general in the Argentine under favourable conditions. In India, clear weather has prevailed to encourage threshing operations.

The United States Department of Agriculture forecasts the indicated wheat acreage in nineteen countries for the 1931-32 season as 181,865,000 acres compared with 185,278,000 acres last year. Russia, China, Argentine and Australia are not included in these compilations. World crop prospects are reported as less favourable than at this time a year ago.

The United States Department of Commerce reports the official exports for April as 7,081,000 bushels compared with 4,694,000 bushels last month and 7,407,000 bushels in April of 1930.

A cablegram received from the Indian Government on May 28, gives the second estimate of wheat acreage and production as 31,952,000 acres and 344,434,000 bushels, the average being 102 p.c. of the second acreage estimate of 1930 and the yield 90 p.c. of the second production estimate of last year. This estimate may be compared with the first (received on April 23) showing an acreage of 31,609,000 and a production of 346,827,000 bushels. The final estimates for 1930 were 386,517,000 bushels from 31,347,000 acres.

The following report on the Portuguese wheat crop (dated May 11) has been received from the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Milan:

In the North-West of Portugal, due to the rain that has fallen during the month of March, a good wheat harvest is foreseen. The North-East, although of a very fertile land, has constantly suffered the loss of wheat harvests as well as that of other cereals, due to the lack of rain. However, during March the situation changed entirely for the weather became moist and there was abundant rain. The wheat is expected.

In the Center of the country, at the beginning of the month of March it was thought that the wheat fields would be ruined on account of the dry weather. It rained later and the wheat harvest promises to be a good one. In the fields of the West-Center, also due to the rain that has fallen, and in certain districts, the wheat crops grow so rapidly that they have had to be trimmed more than once.

The wheat fields of the extreme South have shown an improvement, but the future harvest is far from being as good as that of the previous year, because those of the higher lands were already ruined by the time the rain began to fall.

According to reports received from the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Rotterdam, the stocks of Russian wheat held in that port and at Amsterdam continued to decline in early May. The arrivals of wheat in Holland are not dominated by Russian supplies as formerly but are more evenly divided between Russian, Argentine, German, United States, Canadian and Australian sorts.

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#### CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDED MAY 22, 1931.

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending May 22nd, show a decrease of 9,281,828 bushels. Stocks for the week were as follows: wheat, 140,896,108; oats, 10,969,456; barley, 17,042,963; flax, 1,354,808; and rye 13,346,293; making a total of 183,609,628 bushels. Wheat shows a decrease of 5,186,763; oats, 1,373,779; barley, 2,218,043; flax, 296,888; and rye, 206,355 bushels. For the same week last year the amount in store was 195,356,813 bushels made up as follows: wheat, 151,470,760; oats, 11,142,172; barley, 23,440,990; flax, 698,155 and rye 8,604,736 bushels

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:- Stocks of grain in store in these elevators show a decrease of 2,562 bushels made up as follows: wheat, 2,207,214; oats, 567,649; barley 127,104; flax, 20,020 and rye, 42,635 bushels.


