WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending April 17, 1936 shows a decrease of 2,317,563 bushels compared with the previous week and a decrease of 24,365,711 bushels compared with the corresponding week in 1935. The visible supply was reported as 137,766,436 bushels compared with the revised figure of 200,538,005 bushels for the previous week and 222,134,147 bushels for the week ending April 19, 1935.

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 13,139,736 bushels, a net decrease of 554,324 bushels from the previous week when 13,694,060 bushels were reported. The Canadian wheat in the United States is located at the following ports: Duluth 551,376; Erie 86,000; Chicago 89,000; New York 867,989; Albany 4,019,000; Norfolk 62,000; Buffalo 7,324,000; Galveston 10,000; Boston 41,371 and Philadelphia 89,000 bushels. Decreases are shown from the previous week's stocks at Duluth of 13,000; Buffalo 210,000; New York 31,324; Albany 280,000; and Galveston 20,000 bushels. Stocks at Chicago, Norfolk, Erie, Boston and Philadelphia remained unchanged. For the same week a year ago Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 13,920,654 bushels distributed as follows: Duluth 1,310,429; Buffalo 7,142,674; Erie 206,000; New York 433,551; Albany 3,936,000 and New Orleans 190,000 bushels.

There is no United States wheat in store in Canada but 1,048,912 bushels were shown at the corresponding date a year ago.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending April 10, amounted to 1,297,010 bushels, an increase of 91,161 bushels over the previous week when 1,205,849 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago, the receipts were 1,756,105 bushels. By provinces the receipts for the week ending April 10, were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1935: Manitoba 79,216 (165,384); Saskatchewan 741,180 (707,965); Alberta 476,614 (882,756) bushels. Marketings of wheat in the three Prairie Provinces from August 1 to April 10, 1936 as compared with the same period in 1935 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1935; Manitoba 16,170,821 (28,495,426); Saskatchewan 104,999,234 (86,845,674); Alberta 74,097,001 (82,766,924) bushels. For the thirty-six weeks ending April 10, 1936 and April 12, 1935 195,267,056 and 196,108,024 bushels were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending April 17, 1936 the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 2,326,795 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 493,000 bushels. The total is 2,819,795 bushels as compared with 2,073,874 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 745,921 bushels, and when compared with the same week in 1935, an increase of 260,435 bushels.

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING APRIL 17, 1936

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending April 17, 1936 show a net decrease of 3,077,303 bushels compared with the revised figure of the previous week. Stocks in store were as follows: wheat 197,768,436; oats 11,931,907; barley 9,173,652; flaxseed 426,965 and rye 4,816,341, a total of 224,117,301 bushels. Decreases are noted in wheat of 2,819,569, oats 321,651 and flaxseed 7,990 bushels while barley and rye increased 59,758 and 12,149 bushels. At a comparable date last year stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 222,134,147, oats 12,046,753, barley 9,292,631, flaxseed 401,659 and rye 3,761,655 bushels a total of 247,636,845 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS.- Grain in store shows a decrease of 4,051,023 bushels, composed of wheat 3,699,475, oats 270,479, barley 68,569, flaxseed 11,309 and rye 1,191 bushels.

INTERIOR PUBLIC AND SEMI-PUBLIC TERMINALS.- Stocks for the week show a net decrease of 111,620 bushels. Decreases are noted in wheat and oats of 88,390 and 23,973 bushels respectively while barley increased 743 bushels.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show a net increase of 274,842 bushels. Increases are noted in wheat of 283,435, barley 244 and rye 1,087 bushels while oats decreased 9,924 bushels.

PRINCE RUPERT AND CHURCHILL ELEVATORS.- Wheat stocks remain unchanged.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE (FORT WILLIAM AND PORT ARTHUR).- Grain stocks show an increase of 2,249,112 bushels, composed of wheat 1,993,708, oats 101,357, barley 135,003, flaxseed 4,911 and rye 14,133 bushels.
