WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending July 24, 1936 shows a decrease of 6,849,466 bushels compared with the previous week and a decrease of 72,447,424 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1935. The visible supply was reported as 119,767,664 bushels compared with the revised figure of 126,617,130 bushels for the previous week and 192,215,088 bushels for the week ending July 26, 1935.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 17,898,544 bushels, a net increase of 278,083 bushels over the previous week when 17,620,461 bushels were reported. The Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Duluth 2,376,072; Erie 1,888,000; Buffalo 8,179,000; New York 1,045,472; Albany 4,290,000; and Chicago 120,000 bushels. The stocks at Duluth and Chicago increased 810,496 and 120,000 bushels respectively while decreases are shown at Buffalo 604,000 New York 7,042 and Boston 41,371 bushels. Stocks at Erie and Albany remain unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 8,490,796 bushels distributed as follows: Buffalo 4,644,928; Albany 2,068,000; New York 812,363; Duluth 592,505; Erie 179,000; Galveston 168,000 and New Orleans 26,000 bushels.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

Wheat stocks in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Country elevators 30,750,000; Interior elevators, Western division 6,742,234; Pacific Coast elevators 9,472,610; Churchill 2,434,202; Head of the Lakes 27,648,165; Eastern elevators lake and seaboard ports 11,785,318 and 12,093,778 bushels respectively while 942,813 bushels were in transit on the lakes.

Decreases are shown in all the stocks in the western division with the exception of the Churchill elevator which increased 82,446 bushels. The decreases were as follows: Western country elevators 2,889,761; Interior elevators 134,134; Vancouver-New Westminster 1,068,646; Head of the Lakes 2,086,029 and eastern elevators 1,198,003 bushels. Wheat in transit on the lakes increased 166,578 bushels from that of a week ago.

Wheat in transit on the lakes amounted to 942,813 bushels compared with 776,235 bushels for the previous week and 4,982,140 bushels for the same week in 1935. There were also 4,879,597 bushels of wheat in rail transit at July 24, 1936 not included in the visible because no comparable figures for 1935 were secured.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending July 17, amounted to 849,032 bushels, a decrease of 25,098 bushels from the previous week when 874,130 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 3,499,160 bushels. By provinces the receipts for the week ending July 17 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1935: Manitoba 49,029 (-8,050); Saskatchewan 465,235 (2,588,083); Alberta 334,768 (919,127) bushels. Marketings of wheat in the three Prairie Provinces from August 1, to July 17, 1936 as compared with the same period in 1935 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1935: Manitoba 17,269,129 (31,190,052); Saskatchewan 116,975,565 (100,977,206); Alberta 80,644,493 (93,023,494) bushels. For the fifty weeks ending July 17, 1936 and July 19, 1935, 214,889,187 and 225,190,752 bushels were received from the farms.

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OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending July 24, 1936, the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 3,253,640 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 1,202,000 bushels. The total is 4,455,640 bushels as compared with 4,576,973 bushels for the previous week, a decrease of 121,333 bushels, and when compared with the same week in 1935, an increase of 2,430,409 bushels.

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING JULY 24, 1936.

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending July 24, 1936 show a net decrease of 7,099,295 bushels compared with the revised figure of the previous week. Stocks in store were as follows: wheat 119,767,664; oats 7,448,414; barley 5,292,946 flaxseed 290,464 and rye 3,558,263 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 6,849,466, oats 190,434 and barley 89,090 bushels while flaxseed and rye increased 8,173 and 21,522 bushels respectively. At a comparable date last year stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 192,215,088; oats 4,930,961; barley 3,963,743; flaxseed 278,531 and rye 3,123,626 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:- Grain stocks show a net decrease of 2,991,825 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 2,889,761; oats 66,125; and barley 41,693 bushels while flaxseed and rye increased 387 and 5,367 bushels respectively.

INTERIOR PUBLIC AND SEMI-PUBLIC TERMINALS.- Stocks for the week show a decrease of 87,315 bushels, composed of wheat 44,385, oats 36,273 and barley 6,657 bushels.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show a net decrease of 1,096,418 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 1,068,646 and oats 33,660 bushels while increases were shown in barley and rye of 3,505 and 2,383 bushels respectively.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE (FORT WILLIAM AND PORT ARTHUR).- Grain in store shows a net decrease of 2,189,460 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 2,086,029; oats 39,437 and rye 132,199 bushels while barley and flaxseed increased 50,516 and 17,689 bushels respectively.

CHROMIUM CHLORIDE - 100% ANHYDROUS

Chromium chloride is a white crystalline solid, soluble in water and many organic solvents. It is used in the production of pigments, dyes, and as a catalyst in various chemical reactions. The compound is highly hygroscopic and should be stored in a dry environment.
