WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending February 19, 1937, decreased 2,468,241 bushels compared with the previous week and 135,863,457 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1936. The amount in store including 2,546,478 bushels in rail transit was reported as 92,441,575 bushels compared with the revised figure of 94,909,816 bushels for the previous week and 228,305,032 bushels for the week ending February 21, 1936. This last amount does not include rail in transit wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 20,161,458 bushels, a decrease of 1,304,999 bushels from the previous week when 21,466,457 bushels were reported. The Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Duluth 2,509,909; Erie 2,123,201; Buffalo 5,253,000; Chicago 232,000; Cleveland 200,000; Detroit 120,000; Toledo 110,648; New York 6,837,000; Albany 2,770,700; Philadelphia 5,000 bushels. Decreases were shown in the stocks at Duluth of 195,999; Buffalo 600,000 and New York 509,000 bushels. The stocks at Erie, Detroit, Toledo, Philadelphia, Chicago, Cleveland and Albany remained unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 24,686,385 bushels distributed as follows: Duluth 702,432; Buffalo 14,775,000; Erie 739,000; Chicago 204,000; New York 2,333,188; Albany 4,715,000; Norfolk 149,000; Galveston 40,000; Boston 578,765; Philadelphia 419,000 and Baltimore 31,000 bushels.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in the elevators in Canada for the week ending February 19, 1937, amounted to 72,280,117 bushels compared with 73,443,359 bushels for the previous week and 203,618,647 bushels for the corresponding date last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Country Elevators 28,345,000; Interior Terminals 5,042,336; Vancouver-New Westminster 6,821,795; Prince Rupert 910,994; Churchill 614,569; Head of the Lakes 9,481,873; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 13,773,003 and 4,744,069 bushels respectively.

A net decrease is shown in the wheat stocks in Canadian elevators of 1,163,242 bushels. The decreases were as follows: Country Elevators 99,452; Interior Terminal Elevators 180,352; Vancouver-New Westminster 281,486; Eastern elevators, Lake and Seaboard Ports 859,456 and 103,528 bushels respectively. Increases are noted at the Head of the Lakes of 25,318 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 2,546,478 bushels on February 19, but no comparative figures for 1936 were secured.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending February 12, 1937 amounted to 470,904 bushels, an increase of 22,780 bushels over the previous week when 448,124 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago, the receipts were 335,264 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending February 12, 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 27,469 (11,677); Saskatchewan 163,326 (160,550); Alberta 280,109 (163,037) bushels. Marketings of wheat in the three Prairie Provinces for the twenty-eight weeks from August 1 to February 12, 1937 as compared with the same period in 1936 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 18,577,700 (15,423,594); Saskatchewan 78,329,595 (99,592,995) and Alberta 44,415,026 (70,025,206) bushels. For the twenty-eight weeks ending February 12, 1937 and February 14, 1936, 141,322,321 and 185,395,438 bushels were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending February 19, 1937, the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 1,555,639 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 850,000 bushels. The total is 2,405,639 bushels as compared with 2,140,724 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 264,915 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1936, a decrease of 3,111,036 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending February 20, 1937, amounted to 13,390,000 bushels as compared with shipments of 13,867,000 bushels for the previous week and 12,528,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. Shipments from North America and Australia showed decreases of 768,000 bushels and 215,000 bushels respectively as compared with the previous week while Argentine shipments were higher showing an increase of 874,000 bushels.

During the first twenty-nine weeks of the present crop year world shipments amounted to 338 million bushels as compared with 281 million bushels for the corresponding weeks last year. North American shipments amounted to 142 million bushels this year as compared with only 117 million bushels in 1935-36. Shipments from the Argentine amounted to 77 million bushels as compared with only 47 million bushels for the same period last year.

Weekly Average Shipments

The following table shows the weekly average shipments of wheat and wheat flour for the first twenty-nine weeks of the present crop year along with comparative figures for 1935-36.

As shown by the above table, world shipments have averaged 11.7 million bushels per week during the first twenty-nine weeks of the present crop year as compared with 9.7 million bushels per week during the corresponding period in 1935-36. North American shipments have averaged 4.9 million bushels per week compared with 4.0 million bushels per week during the first twenty-nine weeks of 1935-36. Argentine shipments averaged 2.7 million bushels per week compared with 1.6 million bushels per week last year.





CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 19, 1937

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending February 19, 1937 show a decrease of 3,044,262 bushels, compared with the revised figures of the previous week. Stocks in store were as follows: wheat 92,441,575, oats 12,283,182, barley 13,762,316, flaxseed 677,028 and rye 1,991,791 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 2,468,241, oats 342,286, barley 213,842, flaxseed 16,145 and rye 3,748 bushels. At a comparable date last year stocks in store were as follows: wheat 228,305,032, oats 11,241,392, barley 8,511,260, flaxseed 420,683 and rye 4,677,100 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:- Grain stocks this week show a net decrease of 166,918 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 99,452, oats 43,168, barley 17,665 and flaxseed 6,633 bushels while rye increased 4,760 bushels.

INTERIOR PUBLIC AND SEMI-PUBLIC TERMINALS.- Stocks for the week show a net increase of 7,640 bushels. Oats increased 9,963 bushels while decreases were noted in wheat of 1,058 and barley 1,265 bushels.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show a net decrease of 280,574 bushels. Wheat and barley decreased 281,486 and 110 bushels respectively, while oats increased 1,022 bushels.

PRINCE RUPERT AND CHURCHILL ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks remain unchanged.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE (FORT WILLIAM AND PORT ARTHUR).- Grain in store shows a net increase of 109,985 bushels. Increases were noted in wheat of 25,318, barley 111,039, and rye 7,903 bushels, while oats and flaxseed increased 26,261 and 8,014 bushels respectively.
