WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending February 26, 1937, decreased 1,155,921 bushels compared with the previous week and 131,447,716 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1936. The amount in store including 4,171,557 bushels in rail transit was reported as 91,245,821 bushels compared with the revised figure of 92,401,742 bushels for the previous week and 222,693,537 bushels for the week ending February 28, 1936. This last amount does not include rail in transit wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 19,064,466 bushels, a decrease of 1,096,992 bushels from the previous week when 20,161,458 bushels were reported. The Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Duluth 2,347,917; Erie 2,123,201; Buffalo 4,730,000; Chicago 232,000; Cleveland 200,000; Detroit 120,000; Toledo 110,648; New York 6,425,000; Albany 2,770,700; Philadelphia 5,000 bushels. Decreases were shown in the stocks at Duluth of 161,992; Buffalo 523,000 and New York 412,000 bushels. The stocks at Erie, Detroit, Toledo, Philadelphia, Chicago, Cleveland and Albany remained unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 23,123,430 bushels distributed as follows: Duluth 696,552; Buffalo 13,600,000; Erie 223,000; Chicago 204,000; New York 2,414,049; Albany 4,715,000; Norfolk 132,000; Galveston 17,000; Boston 671,829; Philadelphia 419,000 and Baltimore 31,000 bushels.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in the elevators in Canada for the week ending February 26, 1937, amounted to 72,181,355 bushels compared with 72,240,284 bushels for the previous week and 199,570,107 bushels for the corresponding date last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Country Elevators 27,746,000; Interior Terminals 4,942,336; Vancouver-New Westminster 7,102,797; Prince Rupert 910,994; Churchill 614,569; Head of the Lakes 9,511,334; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 13,279,473 and 3,902,295 bushels respectively.

A net decrease is shown in the wheat stocks in Canadian elevators of 58,929 bushels. The decreases were as follows: Country Elevators 613,687; Interior Terminal Elevators 45,480; Eastern elevators, Lake and Seaboard Ports 493,530 and 841,774 bushels respectively. Increases are noted at the Head of the Lakes of 29,461 and Vancouver-New Westminster of 281,002 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 4,171,557 bushels on February 26, but no comparative figures for 1936 were secured.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending February 19, 1937 amounted to 1,233,521 bushels, an increase of 762,617 bushels over the previous week when 470,904 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago, the receipts were 351,643 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending February 19, 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 66,664 (29,027); Saskatchewan 505,424 (155,512); Alberta 661,433 (167,104) bushels. Marketings of wheat in the three Prairie Provinces for the twenty-nine weeks from August 1 to February 19, 1937 as compared with the same period in 1936 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 18,644,364 (15,452,621) Saskatchewan 79,627,019 (99,748,507) and Alberta 45,076,459 (70,192,310) bushels. For the twenty-nine weeks ending February 19, 1937 and February 21, 1936, 143,347,842 and 185,395,438 bushels were received from the farms.



OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending February 26, 1937, the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 1,867,419 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 400,000 bushels. The total is 2,267,419 bushels as compared with 2,405,639 bushels for the previous week, a decrease of 138,220 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1936, a decrease of 2,462,346 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending February 27, 1937, amounted to 16,246,000 bushels as compared with shipments of 13,390,000 bushels for the previous week and 12,832,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. Shipments from North America and Australia showed increases of 1,062,000 bushels and 1,022,000 bushels respectively as compared with the previous week while Argentine shipments were showing an increase of 972,000 bushels.

During the first thirty weeks of the present crop year world shipments amounted to 355 million bushels as compared with 293 million bushels for the corresponding weeks last year. North American shipments amounted to 145 million bushels this year as compared with only 123 million bushels in 1935-36. Shipments from the Argentine amounted to 86 million bushels as compared with only 48 million bushels for the same period last year.

Weekly Average Shipments

The following table shows the weekly average shipments of wheat and wheat flour for the first thirty weeks of the present crop year along with comparative figures for 1935-36.

As shown by the above table, world shipments have averaged 11.8 million bushels per week during the first thirty weeks of the present crop year as compared with 9.8 million bushels per week during the corresponding period in 1935-36. North American shipments have averaged 4.8 million bushels per week compared with 4.1 million bushels per week during the first thirty weeks of 1935-36. Argentine shipments averaged 2.9 million bushels per week compared with 1.6 million bushels per week last year.



CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 26, 1937

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending Feb. 26, 1937 show a net decrease of 880,435 bushels compared with the revised figure of the previous week. Stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 91,245,821, oats 12,791,449, barley 13,577,682, flaxseed 670,897 and rye 1,988,535 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 1,155,921, barley 202,033, flaxseed 8,651 and rye 3,043 bushels while oats increased 489,213 bushels. At a comparable date last year stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 222,693,537, oats 10,986,078, barley 8,392,295, flaxseed 421,092, and rye 4,677,636 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:- Grain stocks show a net decrease of 469,590 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 613,687, barley 40,608 and flaxseed 13,068 bushels while oats and rye increased 188,526 and 9,247 bushels respectively.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show an increase of 335,853 bushels composed of wheat 281,002, oats 43,308, barley 5,749 and rye 5,794 bushels.

PRINCE RUPERT AND CHURCHILL ELEVATORS.- Wheat in store remains unchanged.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE (FORT WILLIAM AND PORT ARTHUR.)- Grain stocks show a net increase of 35,593 bushels. Increases were noted in wheat of 29,461, barley 102,826 and rye 7,111 bushels while oats and flaxseed decreased 99,795 and 4,010 bushels respectively.
