WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending May 14, 1937, decreased 4,175,208 bushels compared with the previous week and 120,255,964 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1936. The amount in store was reported as 64,150,238 bushels compared with 68,325,446 bushels for the previous week and 184,406,202 bushels for the week ending May 15, 1936.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 8,439,052 bushels, a decrease of 1,216,282 bushels from the previous week when 9,655,334 bushels were reported. Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Duluth 1,078,052; Erie 100,000; Erie Canal 20,000; Buffalo 2,179,000; Chicago 51,000; New York 3,896,000 and Albany 1,115,000 bushels. Decreases are shown in the stocks at the following ports: Duluth 170,282; Albany 631,000 and New York 436,000 bushels. An increase is noted in the stocks at Buffalo of 21,000 bushels.

For the same week a year ago, Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 11,790,898 bushels, distributed as follows: Duluth 333,876; Erie 86,000; Chicago 74,000; New York 237,651; Albany 3,967,000; Buffalo 7,051,000; Boston 41,371 bushels.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in the elevators in Canada for the week ending May 14, 1937, amounted to 55,711,186 bushels compared with 58,670,112 bushels for the previous week and 172,615,304 bushels for the corresponding date last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Country Elevators 9,525,000; Interior Terminals 4,281,217; Vancouver-New Westminster 5,590,652; Prince Rupert 910,994; Churchill 614,569; Head of the Lakes 13,852,653; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 8,430,092 and 5,997,160 bushels respectively.

The decreases were as follows: Country Elevators 1,756,000; Vancouver-New Westminster 427,817; Eastern Elevators 1,008,125. Increases are shown at Fort William and Port Arthur of 910,705; Seaboard Ports 715,762 and Interior Private and Mill 289,000 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 3,789,239 bushels compared with 8,529,165 bushels at a comparable date last year. The In Transit on the Lakes amounted to 2,719,610 bushels against 7,966,413 bushels last year.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending May 7, 1937, amounted to 757,888 bushels, an increase of 166,216 bushels from the previous week when 591,672 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago, the receipts were 1,040,371 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending May 7, 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 70,862 (81,673); Saskatchewan 378,623 (585,466); Alberta 308,403 (373,232) bushels. Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the forty weeks from August 1, to May 7, 1937, as compared with the same period in 1936 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 19,583,669 (16,609,343); Saskatchewan 85,532,702 (107,197,510); Alberta 50,151,498 (75,425,792) bushels. For the forty weeks ending May 7, 1937 and May 8, 1936, 155,267,869 and 199,232,645 bushels were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending May 14, 1937, the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 4,176,349 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 571,338 bushels. The total is 4,747,687 bushels as compared with 2,545,324 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 2,202,363 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1936, a decrease of 85,418 bushels.

Clearances by ports for the weeks ending May 14, 1937 and May 15, 1936 and imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were as follows (in bushels):

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING MAY 14, 1937

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending May 14, 1937 show a decrease of 6,107,046 bushels compared with the previous week. Stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 64,150,238, oats 5,743,347, barley 7,453,312, flaxseed 526,441 and rye 1,454,973 bushels. Decreases were shown in wheat of 4,175,208, oats 866,209, barley 703,449, flaxseed 88,575 and rye 273,605 bushels. At a comparable date last year grain stocks were as follows:- wheat 184,406,202, oats 10,532,297, barley 8,695,087, flaxseed 398,050 and rye 4,313,817 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:- Grain stocks show a decrease of 2,800,000 bushels, composed of wheat 1,756,000, oats 747,000, barley 208,000, flaxseed 41,000 and rye 48,000 bushels.

INTERIOR PUBLIC AND SEMI-PUBLIC TERMINALS.- Stocks for the week show a decrease of 7,522 bushels composed of oats 6,761 and barley 761 bushels.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show a net decrease of 427,073 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 427,817, barley 260 and rye 585 bushels while oats increased 1,589 bushels.

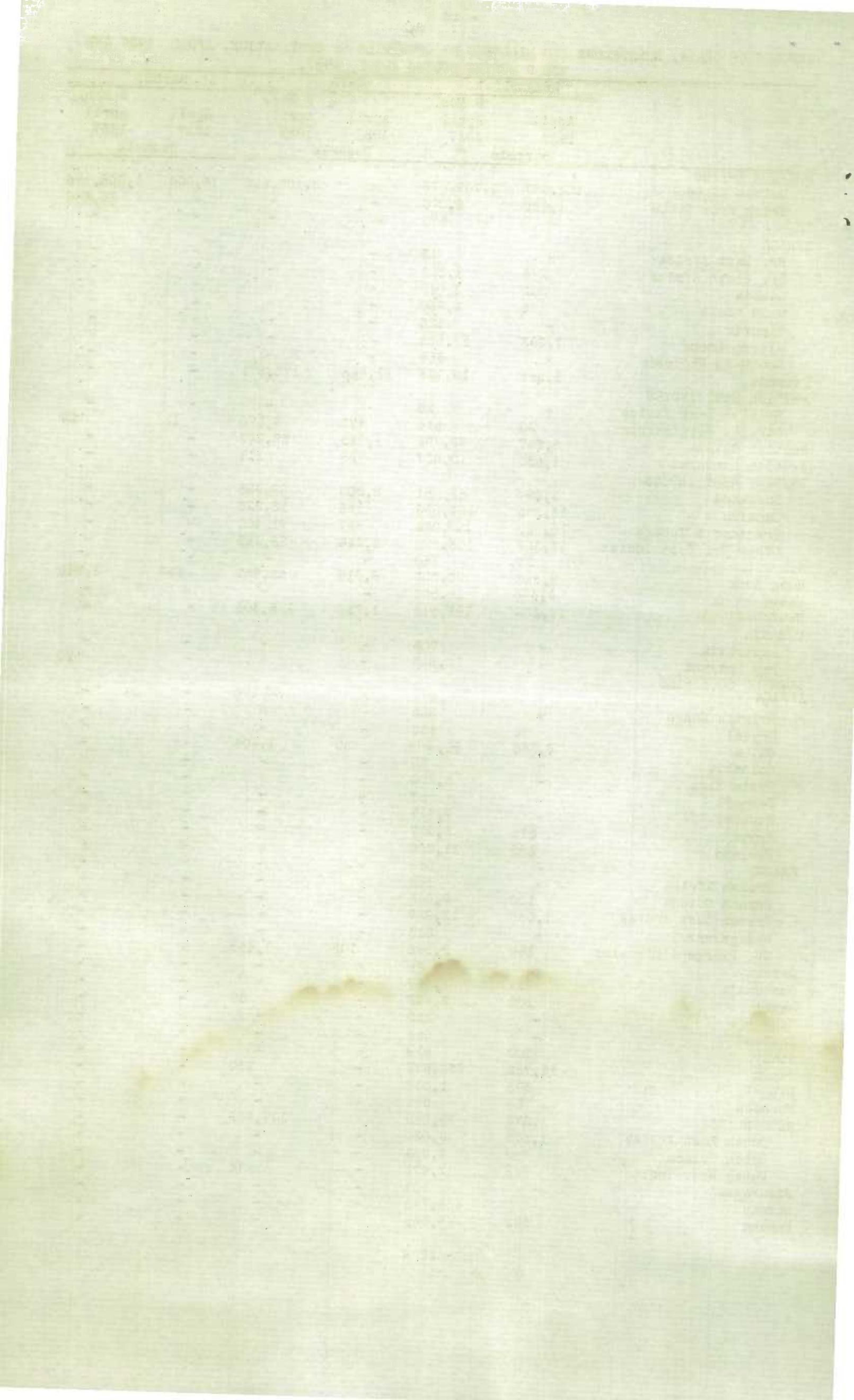
