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WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending May 28, 1937, decreased 2,600,778 bushels compared with the previous week and 110,479,137 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1936. The amount in store was reported as 58,088,044 bushels compared with 60,688,822 bushels for the previous week and 168,567,181 bushels for the week ending May 29, 1936.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 7,267,368 bushels, a decrease of 594,158 bushels from the previous week when 7,861,513 bushels were reported. Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Duluth 819,355; Erie 100,000; Erie Canal 113,000; Buffalo 1,887,000; Chicago 43,000; New York 3,190,000 and Albany 1,115,000 bushels. Decreases are shown in the stocks at the following ports: Duluth 90,158; Buffalo 96,000; Chicago 4,000; New York 204,000 and Erie 200,000 bushels.

For the same week a year ago, Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 13,286,506 bushels, distributed as follows: Duluth 332,677; Erie 86,000; Chicago 74,000; New York 361,458; Albany 4,027,000; Buffalo 8,364,000 and Boston 41,371 bushels.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in the elevators in Canada for the week ending May 29, 1937, amounted to 50,820,689 bushels compared with 52,827,309 bushels for the previous week and 155,280,675 bushels for the corresponding date last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Country Elevators 8,510,000; Interior Terminals 5,085,217; Vancouver-New Westminster 4,798,841; Prince Rupert 910,994; Churchill 614,569; Head of the Lakes 12,303,219; Eastern Elevators, Lake and Seaboard Ports 8,120,170 and 5,299,517 bushels respectively.

Decreases were as follows: Country Elevators 483,000; Vancouver-New Westminster 261,110; Fort William and Port Arthur 1,518,917; and Eastern Elevators, Lake Ports 672,199 bushels, while increases are noted at Interior Private and Mill Elevators of 486,000 and Eastern Elevators Seaboard Ports 530,897 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 2,115,174 bushels compared with 6,745,132 bushels at a comparable date last year. The In Transit on the Lakes amounted to 3,062,988 bushels against 3,654,847 bushels last year.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending May 21, 1937, amounted to 893,005 bushels, a decrease of 3,994 bushels from the previous week when 896,999 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago, the receipts were 1,230,150 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending May 21, 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 64,225 (127,421); Saskatchewan 514,606 (646,617); Alberta 314,174 (456,112) bushels. Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the forty-two weeks from August 1, to May 21, 1937, as compared with the same period in 1936 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 19,709,241 (16,805,128); Saskatchewan 86,595,631 (108,189,426); Alberta 50,753,001 (76,170,417) bushels. For the forty-two weeks ending May 21, 1937 and May 22, 1936, 157,057,873 and 201,164,971 bushels were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending May 28, 1937, the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 2,655,549 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 298,000 bushels. The total is 2,953,549 bushels as compared with 3,955,283 bushels for the previous week, a decrease of 1,001,734 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1936, a decrease of 2,825,585 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending May 29, 1937 amounted to 11,863,000 bushels as compared with shipments of 12,890,000 bushels for the previous week and 8,728,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. Shipments from North America and Argentina showed decreases of 1,888,000 and 987,000 bushels respectively, while Australian shipments were higher by 1,088,000 bushels compared with the previous week.

During the first forty-three weeks of the present crop year world shipments amounted to 519 million bushels compared with 413 million bushels for the same period last year. North American shipments amounted to 181 million bushels this year compared with 182 million bushels in 1935-36. Argentine shipments amounted to 152 million bushels compared with only 62 million bushels for the same period last year.

During the first forty-three weeks of the present crop year world shipments averaged 12.1 million bushels per week as compared with 9.6 million bushels per week during the corresponding period in 1935-36. Argentine shipments averaged 3.5 million bushels per week compared with 1.4 million bushels per week last year.

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING MAY 28, 1937

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending May 28, 1937 show a net decrease of 3,524,261 bushels compared with the previous week. Stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 58,088,044, oats 5,004,416, barley 6,675,405, flaxseed 544,887 and rye 749,048 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 2,600,778, oats 148,798, barley 423,046 and rye 354,417 bushels, while flaxseed increased 2,778 bushels. At a comparable date last year stocks in store were as follows:- wheat 168,567,181, oats 9,115,802, barley 7,311,121, flaxseed 376,156 and rye 4,060,630 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:- Grain in store shows a net decrease of 742,000 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 483,000, oats 193,000, barley 69,000 and rye 6,000 bushels while flaxseed increased 9,000 bushels.

INTERIOR PUBLIC AND SEMI-PUBLIC TERMINALS.- Stocks for the week show a decrease of 10,933 bushels, composed of oats 10,903, and barley 30 bushels.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS.- Grain stocks at these elevators show a decrease of 300,580 bushels, composed of wheat 261,110, oats 37,604, barley 1,386 and rye 480 bushels.

PRINCE RUPERT AND CHURCHILL ELEVATORS.- Wheat in store remains unchanged.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE (FORT WILLIAM AND PORT ARTHUR).- Grain stocks show a net decrease of 1,596,235 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 1,518,917, oats 112,541, and rye 22,778 bushels while barley and flaxseed increased 55,310 and 2,691 bushels respectively.
