WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending November 5, 1937 decreased 239,521 bushels compared with the previous week and decreased 73,981,634 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1936. The amount in store was reported as 74,244,392 bushels compared with 74,483,913 bushels for the previous week and 148,226,026 bushels for the week ending November 6, 1936. The stocks of 74,244,392 bushels include 17,269,689 bushels of Durum wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 2,487,902 bushels, a decrease of 46,000 bushels from the previous week when 2,533,902 bushels were reported. Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Buffalo 1,625,000; Erie Canal 271,000; New York 582,000 and Duluth 9,902 bushels. Increases are shown at Buffalo of 12,000 and Erie Canal of 151,000 bushels while decreases were noted at New York of 186,000 bushels and Baltimore of 23,000 bushels. The stocks at Duluth were unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 22,579,157 bushels distributed as follows: Duluth 5,543,022; Buffalo 9,332,000; Erie 2,214,000; New York 2,363,135; Albany 3,048,000; Philadelphia 1,000; and Chicago 78,000 bushels.

United States wheat in Canada amounted to 2,322,820 bushels for the above week. Last year for the same week no United States wheat in Canada was reported.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in the elevators in Canada for the week ending November 5, 1937 were 71,756,490 bushels compared with 71,950,011 bushels for the previous week and 125,646,869 bushels for the corresponding week last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Western Country Elevators 19,900,000; Interior Terminals 6,086,483; Vancouver-New Westminster 2,425,374; Prince Rupert 911,340; Churchill 11,820; Fort William and Port Arthur 19,667,807; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 9,402,333 and 4,937,033 bushels respectively.

Increases over the previous week were shown in the following elevators: Western Country Elevators 255,000; Interior Elevators 29,277; Fort William and Port Arthur 119,065; Eastern Elevators, Lake and Seaboard Ports 249,039 and 141,339 bushels respectively, while a decrease was noted at Vancouver-New Westminster of 171,774 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 4,948,719 bushels for the week ending November 5, 1937 compared with 7,708,887 bushels for the same period last year. The In Transit on the Lakes amounted to 3,465,581 bushels against 6,753,667 bushels last year.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending October 29, 1937 amounted to 4,930,385 bushels, an increase of 1,080,199 bushels over the previous week when 3,850,186 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 3,413,006 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending October 29, 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 466,858 (359,041); Saskatchowan 938,840 (1,576,141); Alberta 3,524,687 (1,477,824) bushels.

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending November 5, 1937 amounted to 4,331,575 bushels a decrease of 598,810 bushels from the previous week when 4,930,385 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 2,923,530 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending November 5, 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 747,113 (251,777); Saskatchewan 714,248 (1,358,388); Alberta 2,870,214 (1,313,365) bushels. Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the fourteen weeks from August 1, 1937 to November 5, 1937 as compared with the same period in 1936 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1936: Manitoba 30,706,133 (17,369,658); Saskatchewan 18,222,093 (71,865,127); Alberta 36,885,218 (34,282,494) bushels. For the fourteen weeks ending November 5, 1937 and November 6, 1936, 85,813,444 and 123,517,279 bushels were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending November 5, 1937, the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 1,848,320 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 39,000 bushels. The total is 1,887,320 bushels as compared with 2,808,257 bushels for the previous week, a decrease of 920,937 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1936, a decrease of 4,470,219 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending November 6, 1937 amounted to 11,840,000 bushels as compared with shipments of 11,888,000 bushels for the previous week and 12,480,000 bushels for the corresponding week a year ago. Shipments from Argentina showed a slight decrease, while shipments from North America and Australia showed increases of 381,000 and 61,000 bushels respectively, as compared with the previous week. Russian shipments are still high amounting to 3,600,000 bushels.

During the first fourteen weeks of the present corop year world shipments amounted to 125.0 million bushels as compared with 154.2 million bushels for the corresponding weeks last year. North American shipments amounted to 47.3 million bushels this year, as compared with 79.0 million bushels in 1936. Australian shipments are 17.2 million bushels this year as compared with 20.0 for the same period last year. Russian shipments amounted to 20.8 million bushels while last year for the same period they were only 88,000 bushels.

According to the above table weekly average shipments of wheat and wheat flour amounted to 9.0 million bushels per week compared with 11.0 million bushels for the same period last year. North American weekly average shipments amounted to only 3.4 million bushels per week as compared with 5.7 million bushels per week for the same period last year. Russian shipments averaged 1.5 million bushels per week this year.

Grain stocks were as follows: - wheat 74,244,392, oats 10,965,886, barley 12,972,952, flaxseed 690,220 and rye 1,285,732 bushels. Increases were noted in oats of 1,787,034, barley 246,738 and flaxseed 12,014 bushels, while decreases were shown in wheat of 239,521 and rye 2,419 bushels. At a comparable date last year stocks of grain were as follows:- wheat 148,226,026, oats 17,531,392, barley 17,327,302, flaxseed 1,048,042 and rye 2,704,749 bushels. WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS: - Grain stocks show an increase of 1,502,000 bushels, composed of wheat 255,000, oats 1,005,000, barley 230,000, flaxseed 5,000 and rye 7,000 bushels. 




