WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending May 20, 1938 decreased 2,313,385 bushels compared with the previous week and decreased 24,669,329 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1937. The amount in store was reported as 36,019,493 bushels compared with 38,332,878 bushels for the previous week and 60,688,822 bushels for the week ending May 21, 1937. The stocks of 36,019,493 bushels include 13,222,340 bushels of Durum wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 688,000 bushels, an increase of 172,000 bushels over the previous week when 516,000 bushels were reported. Canadian wheat is located at the following ports: Buffalo 188,000; New York 62,000 and Erie 438,000 bushels. Increases are noted at Buffalo of 72,000; Erie 96,000 and New York 4,000 bushels.

For the same week a year ago, Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 7,861,513 bushels distributed as follows: Duluth 909,513; Chicago 47,000; Erie 413,000; Buffalo 1,983,000; Albany 1,115,000 and New York 3,394,000 bushels.

United States wheat in Canada amounted to 875,807 bushels for the above week. For the corresponding week last year no United States grain was in store.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in the elevators in Canada for the week ending May 20, 1938 were 35,331,493 bushels compared with 37,816,878 bushels for the previous week and 52,827,309 bushels for the corresponding week last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators are located as follows: Western Country Elevators 5,119,000; Interior Terminals 2,943,635; Vancouver-New Westminster 750,822; Prince Rupert 148,545; Churchill 11,820; Fort William and Fort Arthur 12,098,521; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 5,107,283 and 4,141,498 bushels respectively.

Decreases in stocks from those of the previous week were shown at the following elevators: Western Country Elevators 4,141,498; Interior Terminals 301,735; Vancouver-New Westminster 15,944; Head of Lakes 114,410 and Eastern Elevators Lake Ports 962,900 bushels while Eastern Elevators Seaboard Ports show an increase of 359,377 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 2,249,244 bushels and the amount in transit on the lakes was 2,761,125 bushels for the week ending May 20, 1938 compared with 2,411,271 and 2,855,182 bushels respectively for the same period last year.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat marketings in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending May 20, 1938 amounted to 605,716 bushels, an increase of 66,613 bushels over the previous week when 539,103 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago, the receipts were 893,005 bushels. By provinces, the receipts for the week ending May 20, 1938 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1937: Manitoba 220,899 (64,225); Saskatchewan 149,018 (514,606); Alberta 235,779 (314,174) bushels. Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the forty-two weeks from August 1, 1937 to May 20, 1938 as compared with the same period in 1937 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1937: Manitoba 36,669,935 (19,709,241); Saskatchewan 25,172,771 (86,595,631); Alberta 55,767,427 (50,753,001) bushels. For the forty-two weeks ending May 20, 1938 and May 21, 1937, 117,610,133 and 157,057,873 bushels respectively were received from the farms.





OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending May 20, 1938 the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 1,590,580 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 13,000 bushels. The total is 1,603,580 bushels as compared with 764,315 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 839,265 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1937, a decrease of 3,006,163 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending May 21, 1938 amounted to 8,021,000 bushels, as compared with shipments of 10,617,000 bushels for the previous week and 12,936,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. Australian shipments dropped sharply showing a decrease of 2,391,000 bushels.

During the first forty-two weeks of the present crop year world shipments amounted to 416.9 million bushels as compared with 509 million bushels for the corresponding weeks last year. North American shipments amounted to 152.1 million bushels as compared with 180 million bushels in 1936-37. Australian shipments were higher by 20.7 million bushels than for the same period last year.

CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING MAY 20, 1938

Returns received as to stocks of grain in store for the week ending May 20, 1938 show a net decrease of 3,775,388 bushels compared with the previous week. Grain in store was as follows:- wheat 36,019,493, oats 5,571,263, barley 7,243,263, flaxseed 456,428 and rye 1,280,150 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 2,313,385, oats 1,047,870, and barley 547,981 bushels, while flaxseed and rye increased 46,352 and 87,496 bushels respectively. At a comparable date last year grain stocks were as follows:- wheat 60,688,822, oats 5,153,214, barley 7,098,451, flaxseed 542,109 and rye 1,103,465 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS:-

Grain stocks show a decrease of 2,563,000 bushels composed of wheat 1,297,000, oats 845,000, barley 385,000, flaxseed 15,000 and rye 21,000 bushels.

INTERIOR PRIVATE & MILL ELEVATORS:-

Grain stocks show a net decrease of 510,000 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 263,000, oats 139,000, barley 109,000 and flaxseed 1,000 bushels, while rye increased 2,000 bushels.

INTERIOR PUBLIC AND SEMI-PUBLIC TERMINALS:-

Grain in store shows a decrease of 194,723 bushels composed of wheat 38,735, oats 72,594 and barley 83,394 bushels.

VANCOUVER-NEW WESTMINSTER ELEVATORS:-

Grain stocks show a net increase of 93,168 bushels. Increases were noted in barley of 145,396 and rye 435 bushels, while decreases were shown in wheat and oats of 15,944 and 36,719 bushels respectively.

PRINCE RUPERT & CHURCHILL ELEVATORS:-

The quantity of wheat in store remains the same as the previous week.

FORT WILLIAM - PORT ARTHUR:-

Grain stocks show a net decrease of 188,954 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 114,410, barley 153,767 and flaxseed 15,237 bushels, while oats and rye increased 91,324 and 3,136 bushels respectively.

IN TRANSIT LAKES:-

Grain in transit on the lakes shows an increase of 513,300 bushels composed of wheat 403,857, oats 10,877, barley 54,230, flaxseed 28,137 and rye 16,199 bushels.

IN TRANSIT RAIL:-

Grain in rail transit shows a net decrease of 257,190 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 556,630 and rye 2,654 bushels, while increases were shown in oats of 80,565, barley 188,508 and flaxseed 33,021 bushels.

EASTERN ELEVATORS - LAKE PORTS:-

Grain stocks show a net decrease of 930,799 bushels. Decreases were noted in wheat of 962,900 and oats 12,539 bushels, while increases were shown in barley of 21,374, flaxseed 16,431 and rye 6,835 bushels.

EASTERN ELEVATORS - SEABOARD PORTS:-

Grain in store shows a net increase of 100,810 bushels. Increases were noted in wheat of 359,377 and rye 82,545 bushels, while decreases were shown in oats and barley of 124,784 and 216,323 bushels respectively.

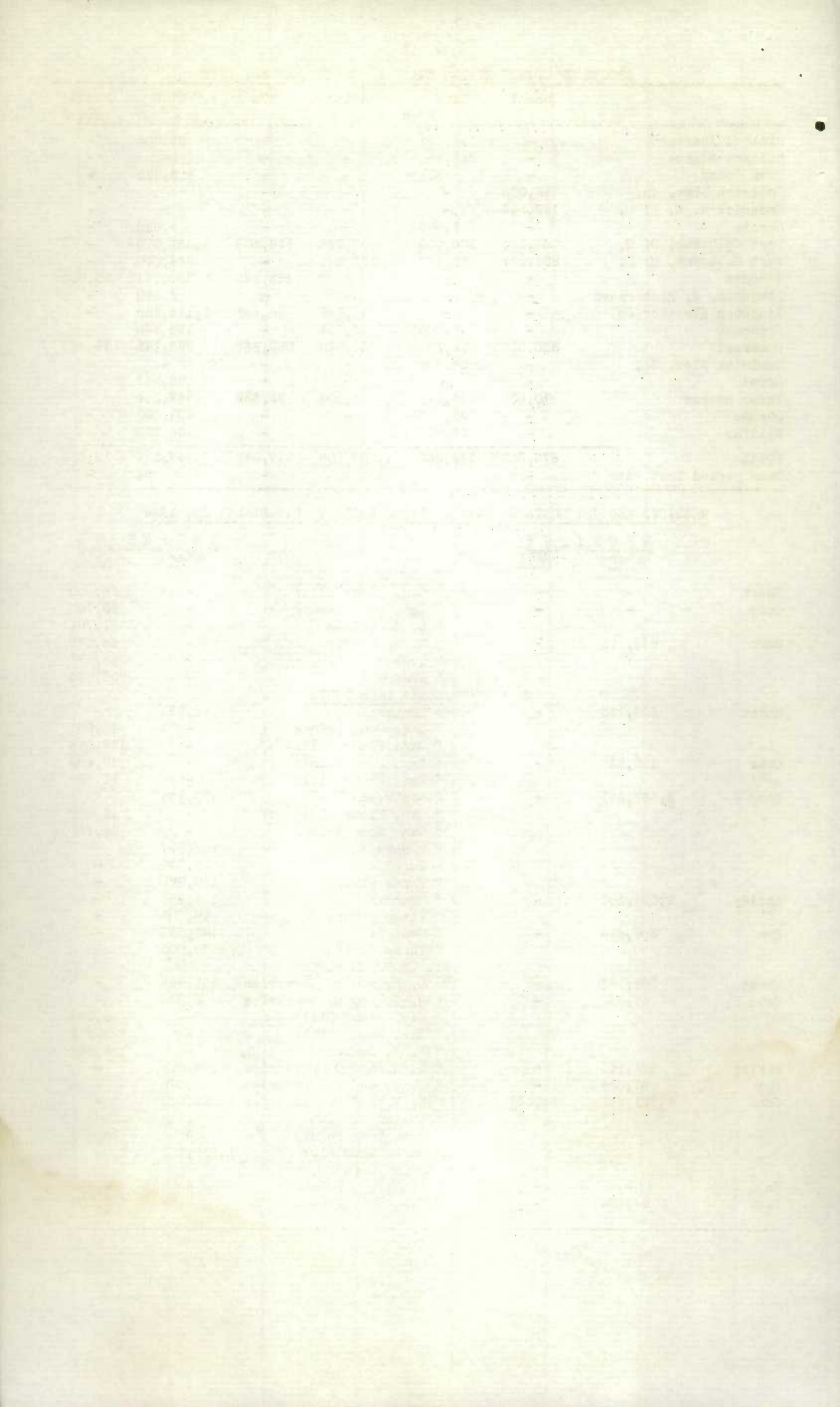
