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WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending February 24, 1939 decreased 2,844,991 bushels compared with the previous week and increased 101,240,216 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1938. The amount in store was reported as 148,787,720 bushels compared with 151,632,711 bushels for the previous week and 47,547,504 bushels for the week ending February 25, 1938. The stocks of 148,787,720 bushels include 12,505,139 bushels of Durum wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in elevators in Canada for the week ending February 24, 1939 were 144,816,720 bushels compared with 146,938,711 bushels for the previous week and 45,527,504 bushels for the corresponding week last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators were located as follows: Western Country Elevators 47,695,000; Interior Terminals 16,748,086; Vancouver-New Westminster 9,204,410; Victoria 892,370; Churchill 2,213,380; Fort William and Port Arthur 40,151,579; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 16,407,610 and 9,866,328 bushels respectively.

Decreases were noted at the Western Country Elevators of 765,000; Interior Elevators 18,300; Vancouver-New Westminster 558,652; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 572,201 and 87,652 bushels respectively. Increases were indicated at Victoria of 40,218 and Fort William and Port Arthur 106,203 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 1,637,957 bushels compared with 1,904,564 bushels for the same week a year ago.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 3,971,000 bushels, a decrease of 723,000 bushels from the previous week when 4,694,000 bushels were reported. This Canadian wheat was located at the following ports: Buffalo 659,000; Buffalo Afloat 1,578,000; Erie 677,000; New York 63,000; New York Afloat 18,000; Albany 851,000; Philadelphia 92,000; Boston 15,000 and Baltimore 18,000 bushels. Decreases in stocks were shown at the following: Buffalo Afloat 367,000; Erie 94,000; New York 308,000; Boston 193,000 and Baltimore 38,000 bushels while an increase of 277,000 bushels was noted at Buffalo. Stocks at New York Afloat, Albany and Philadelphia remained unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 2,020,000 bushels distributed as follows: Buffalo 29,000; Erie 731,000; New York 984,000 and Albany 276,000 bushels.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat receipts in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending February 24, 1939 amounted to 547,987 bushels, an increase of 234,935 bushels from the previous week when 313,052 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 713,604 bushels. By provinces the receipts for the week ending February 24, 1939 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 43,005 (151,480); Saskatchewan 165,958 (131,429); Alberta 339,024 (430,695) bushels.

Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the thirty weeks from August 1, 1938 to February 24, 1939 as compared with the same period in 1938 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 40,757,735 (33,518,504); Saskatchewan 104,016,878 (22,454,060); Alberta 116,332,343 (50,282,114) bushels. For the thirty weeks ending February 24, 1939 and the same period in 1938, 261,106,956 and 106,254,678 bushels respectively were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending February 24, 1939 the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 1,505,417 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 146,000 bushels. The total is 1,651,417 bushels compared with 1,630,154 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 21,263 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1938 an increase of 325,894 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending February 25, 1939 amounted to 10,006,000 bushels as compared with shipments of 11,609,000 bushels for the previous week and 12,544,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. North American shipments showed an increase of 1,007,000 bushels while Argentina and Australia showed decreases of 2,107,000 bushels and 543,000 bushels as compared with the previous week.

During the first thirty weeks of the present crop year world shipments amounted to 330,871,000 bushels as compared with only 292,352,000 bushels for the corresponding weeks last year. North American shipments amounted to 143,629,000 bushels as compared with 115,792,000 bushels for the same period in 1937-38. Shipments from Argentina were 2.6 million bushels higher for the first thirty weeks of the present crop year as compared with the same period last year.

North American weekly average shipments amounted to 4.8 million bushels as compared with 3.8 million bushels in the same weeks last year.
