WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending March 3, 1939 decreased 2,092,757 bushels compared with the previous week and increased 99,333,278 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1938. The amount in store was reported as 146,694,963 bushels compared with 148,787,720 bushels for the previous week and 47,361,685 bushels for the week ending March 4, 1938. The stocks of 146,694,963 bushels include 12,472,447 bushels of Durum wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in elevators in Canada for the week ending March 3, 1939 were 143,044,963 bushels compared with 144,816,720 bushels for the previous week and 45,415,685 bushels for the corresponding week last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators were located as follows: Western Country Elevators 48,000,000; Interior Terminals 16,848,421; Vancouver-New Westminster 8,014,031; Victoria 659,877; Churchill 2,213,380; Fort William and Port Arthur 40,327,585; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 15,772,601 and 9,740,983 bushels respectively.

Decreases were noted at Victoria of 232,493; Vancouver-New Westminster 1,190,379; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 635,009 and 125,345 bushels respectively. Increases were indicated at the Western Country Elevators of 305,000; Interior Elevators 100,335 and Fort William and Port Arthur 176,006 bushels.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 1,468,085 bushels compared with 1,448,745 bushels for the same week a year ago.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 3,650,000 bushels, a decrease of 321,000 bushels from the previous week when 3,971,000 bushels were reported. This Canadian wheat was located at the following ports: Buffalo 295,000; Buffalo Afloat 1,388,000; Erie 605,000; New York 406,000; New York Afloat 18,000; Albany 851,000; Philadelphia 48,000; Boston 15,000 and Baltimore 24,000 bushels. Decreases in stocks were shown at the following: Buffalo 364,000; Buffalo Afloat 190,000; Erie 72,000; and Philadelphia 44,000 bushels while increases were noted at New York of 343,000 and Baltimore 6,000 bushels. Stocks at New York Afloat, Albany and Boston remained unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 1,946,000 bushels distributed as follows: Buffalo 27,000; Erie 731,000; New York 892,000; Albany 276,000 and Boston 20,000 bushels.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat receipts in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending March 3, 1939 amounted to 1,174,637 bushels, an increase of 593,390 bushels from the previous week when 581,247 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 1,398,779 bushels. By provinces the receipts for the week ending March 3, 1939 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 79,646 (299,876); Saskatchewan 413,784 (337,792); Alberta 681,207 (761,111) bushels.

Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the thirty-one weeks from August 1, 1938 to March 3, 1939 as compared with the same period in 1938 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 40,840,938 (33,818,380); Saskatchewan 104,439,981 (22,791,852); Alberta 117,033,934 (51,043,225) bushels. For the thirty-one weeks ending March 3, 1939 and the same period in 1938, 262,314,853 and 107,653,457 bushels respectively were received from the farms.

When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

Resolved, therefore, that the United Colonies by these presents, do declare themselves free and independent States, sovereign, equal, and at liberty to do all the acts and things which independent States may of right do.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

And for the support of this Declaration, we the Representatives of the United Colonies by these presents, do hereby severally engage our souls and our bodies, our lives and our fortunes, and all the possessions and dominions, and all the powers and authorities which we have or shall lawfully possess or exercise, to the support of this Declaration.

In witness whereof, we the Representatives of the United Colonies, have hereunto set our hands and seals, at the City of Philadelphia, the fourth day of July, in the second year of the said Declaration of Independence.

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OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending March 3, 1939 the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 2,285,941 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 242,000 bushels. The total is 2,527,941 bushels compared with 1,651,417 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 876,524 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1938 an increase of 1,711,176 bushels.

World shipments for the week ending March 4, 1939 amounted to 13,000,000 bushels as compared with shipments of 10,006,000 bushels for the previous week and 10,480,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. North American and Australian shipments showed increases of 1,721,000 bushels and 1,195,000 bushels respectively. Argentine shipments were also higher, as compared with the previous week.

During the first thirty-one weeks of the present crop year world shipments amounted to 343,871,000 bushels as compared with only 302,832,000 bushels for the corresponding weeks last year. North American shipments amounted to 150,236,000 bushels as compared with 119,112,000 bushels for the same period in 1937-38. Shipments from Argentina were 1.6 million bushels higher for the first thirty-one weeks of the present crop year as compared with the same period last year.
