WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending July 7, 1939 decreased 2,474,912 bushels as compared with the previous week and increased 76,856,113 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1938. The amount in store was reported as 101,318,692 bushels compared with 103,793,604 bushels for the previous week and 24,462,579 bushels for the week ending July 8, 1938. The stocks of 101,318,692 bushels include 9,525,265 bushels of Durum wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in elevators in Canada for the week ending July 7, 1939 were 94,688,692 bushels compared with 97,835,604 bushels for the previous week and 23,896,579 bushels for the corresponding week last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators were located as follows: Western Country Elevators 11,765,000; Interior Terminals 13,081,966; Vancouver-New Westminster 7,715,979; Victoria 272,383; Churchill 2,213,380; Fort William and Port Arthur 20,529,907; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 21,071,780 and 9,483,075 bushels respectively.

Decreases were indicated at Western Country Elevators of 610,000; Interior Elevators 713,584; Vancouver-New Westminster 382,048; and Fort William and Port Arthur 5,484,782 bushels, while increases were noted at Victoria of 1,451 and Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 1,511,169 and 117,436 bushels respectively.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 3,359,445 bushels and the amount in transit on the lakes was 5,195,777 bushels for the week ending July 7, 1939 compared with 1,836,993 and 499,332 bushels for the same period last year.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 6,630,000 bushels, an increase of 672,000 bushels over the previous week when 5,958,000 bushels were reported. This Canadian wheat was located at the following ports: Buffalo 1,486,000; Buffalo Afloat 207,000; Erie 721,000; Erie Canal 294,000; New York 133,000; and Albany 3,609,000. Increases were noted at Buffalo of 271,000; Erie 327,000; New York 45,000; New York Afloat 180,000 and Albany 234,000 bushels, while decreases were shown at Buffalo Afloat of 41,000 and Erie Canal 344,000 bushels.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 566,000 bushels, distributed as follows: Buffalo 171,000; Erie 254,000; Erie Canal 20,000; New York 14,000 and Albany 107,000 bushels.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat receipts in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending July 7, 1939 amounted to 1,756,244 bushels, an increase of 620,797 bushels from the previous week when 1,137,447 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 931,830 bushels. By provinces the receipts for the week ending July 7, 1939 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 168,307 (159,555); Saskatchewan 859,940 (323,219); Alberta 729,997 (449,056) bushels.

Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the forty-nine weeks from August 1, 1938 to July 7, 1939 as compared with the same period in 1938 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 43,766,709 (37,891,224) Saskatchewan 114,480,881 (27,055,454); Alberta 126,134,609 (58,457,776) bushels. For the forty-nine weeks ending July 7, 1939 and the same period in 1938, 234,382,199 and 123,404,454 bushels respectively were received from the farms.

We will then move on to the French Romanticism, which saw the development of the philosophy of Rousseau and the rise of the novel.

The fifth part of the course will focus on the 20th century and the 21st century. We will begin with the American Pragmatism, which saw the development of the philosophy of Dewey and the rise of the novel. We will then move on to the French Existentialism, which saw the development of the philosophy of Sartre and the rise of the novel.

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OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending July 7, 1939 the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 2,393,504 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 250,000 bushels. The total is 2,643,504 bushels compared with 2,926,426 bushels for the previous week, a decrease of 282,922 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1938 an increase of 973,837 bushels.
