WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store for the week ending July 28, 1939 decreased 3,791,459 bushels as compared with the previous week and increased 76,138,619 bushels when compared with the corresponding week in 1938. The amount in store was reported as 95,847,938 bushels compared with 99,639,397 bushels for the previous week and 19,709,319 bushels for the week of July 29, 1938. The stocks of 86,483,045 bushels include 9,364,893 bushels of Durum wheat.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN CANADA

The wheat stocks in elevators in Canada for the week ending July 28, 1939 were 89,280,938 bushels compared with 92,431,397 bushels for the previous week and 18,726,319 bushels for the corresponding week last year.

Stocks of wheat in Canadian elevators were located as follows: Western Country Elevators 8,685,000; Interior Terminals 9,054,704; Vancouver-New Westminster 6,684,351; Victoria 310,681; Churchill 2,332,571; Fort William and Port Arthur 14,210,530; Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 27,629,962 and 10,154,519 bushels respectively.

Decreases were indicated at Western Country Elevators of 1,805,000; Interior Elevators 696,324; Vancouver-New Westminster 492,918; and Fort William and Port Arthur 1,016,897 bushels, while increases were noted at Victoria of 23,521; Churchill 119,191 and Eastern Elevators Lake and Seaboard Ports 1,199,319 and 1,079,450 bushels respectively.

Wheat in rail transit amounted to 5,819,530 bushels and the amount in transit on the lakes was 4,399,090 bushels for the week ending July 28, 1939 compared with 1,635,832 and 1,136,358 bushels for the same period last year.

CANADIAN WHEAT IN THE UNITED STATES

Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 6,567,000 bushels, a decrease of 641,000 bushels over the previous week when 7,208,000 bushels were reported. This Canadian wheat was located at the following ports: Buffalo 1,340,000; Buffalo Afloat 60,000; Erie 720,000; Erie Canal 334,000; New York 167,000; New York Afloat 86,000 and Albany 3,860,000 bushels. Increases were noted at New York Afloat of 46,000 bushels; while decreases were shown at Buffalo of 47,000; Buffalo Afloat 201,000; Erie Canal 201,000; New York 100,000 and Albany 138,000 bushels, Erie remain unchanged.

For the same week a year ago, the Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 983,000 bushels, distributed as follows: Buffalo 607,000; Erie 16,000; Erie Canal 203,000; New York 112,000 and Albany 45,000 bushels.

PRIMARY MOVEMENT

Wheat receipts in the Prairie Provinces for the week ending July 28, 1939 amounted to 1,103,152 bushels, a decrease of 878,154 bushels from the previous week when 1,981,306 bushels were marketed. During the corresponding week a year ago the receipts were 580,336 bushels. By provinces the receipts for the week ending July 28, 1939 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 145,781 (186,418); Saskatchewan 388,970 (174,708); Alberta 568,401 (219,210) bushels.

Marketings in the three Prairie Provinces for the fifty-two weeks from August 1, 1938 to July 28, 1939 as compared with the same period in 1938 were as follows, figures within brackets being those for 1938: Manitoba 44,252,236 (38,315,314); Saskatchewan 117,567,813 (27,788,346); Alberta 128,446,400 (59,297,512) bushels. For the fifty-two weeks ending July 28, 1939 and the same period in 1938, 290,266,449 and 125,401,172 bushels respectively were received from the farms.

OVERSEAS EXPORT CLEARANCES AND IMPORTS OF WHEAT INTO THE UNITED STATES

During the week ending July 28, 1939 the overseas export clearances of wheat amounted to 1,696,389 bushels while imports into the United States for consumption and milling in bond were 241,000 bushels. The total is 1,937,389 bushels compared with 1,936,930 bushels for the previous week, an increase of 459 bushels and when compared with the same period in 1938 an increase of 540,502 bushels.
