CANADIAN GRAIN STATISTICS - WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 2nd, 1925.

Returns received as to the stocks of grain in store for the week ending October 2nd, 1925, show an increase of 13,365,269 bushels over the previous week. The stocks for the week were as follows: Wheat 57,148,729 bushels; Oats 5,956,278 bushels; Barley 10,663,039 bushels; Flax 961,442 bushels; Rye 2,112,229 bushels, a total of 76,841,717 bushels. Increases are shown in all the grains made up as follows: Wheat 14,538,972 bushels; Oats 1,105,184 bushels; Barley 2,277,640 bushels; Flax 155,006 bushels and Rye 288,467 bushels.

WESTERN COUNTRY ELEVATORS.- A net increase is shown in the grain stocks of 7,014,438 bushels. Increases are shown in Wheat of 6,349,204 bushels; Oats 692,660 bushels; Flax 163,386 bushels and Rye 55,138 bushels, while Barley shows a decrease of 245,902 bushels. There were 35,503,698 bushels in store compared with 28,489,212 bushels last week.

The following table shows the quantities of grain in store at the Country Elevators in each of the Prairie Provinces on September 25th, 1925, with comparison for the previous week and the same period 1924.



INTERIOR TERMINAL ELEVATORS (MOOSE JAW, SASKATOON, CALGARY, EDMONTON).- An increase is shown in the total grain in store of 21,438 bushels, made up as follows: Wheat 18,700 bushels; Oats 2,298 bushels; Barley 440 bushels.

VANCOUVER TERMINAL & PRIVATE ELEVATORS.- A net increase is shown in the total grain in store of 288,125 bushels. Increases are shown in Wheat 283,510 bushels; Oats 5,016 bushels, while Barley shows a decrease of 401 bushels.



PUBLIC AND PRIVATE TERMINAL ELEVATORS (FT. WILLIAM AND FT. ARTHUR).— The grain stocks show a net increase of 7,050,137 bushels. Wheat shows an increase of 6,244,456 bushels; Oats 343,107 bushels; Barley 255,529 bushels and Rye 226,874 bushels, while Flax shows a decrease of 9,859 bushels.

Decreases are shown in Wheat of 5,958,237 bushels; Rye 6,333,729 bushels; Corn 208,613 bushels, while Oats and Barley show increases of 2,107,427 and 2,039,869 bushels, respectively.

U.S. LAKE PORTS (BUFFALO AND DULUTH) - A net increase is shown in the total grain in store of 13,937 bushels. Increases are shown in Oats of 26,853 bushels; Barley of 895,053 bushels, while Wheat shows a decrease of 853,133 bushels and Rye 54,876 bushels.

U.S. ATLANTIC SEABOARD PORTS. - The grain stocks show a net increase of 473,635 bushels; Wheat shows an increase of 443,935 bushels; Barley 29,716 bushels, while Oats shows a decrease of 16 bushels.

DULUTH. - During the week ended October 3, 1925, the receipts of bonded grain were as follows:- Wheat 53,596 bushels; Oats 52 bushels; Barley 112,271 bushels; Rye 6,557 bushels; a total of 172,476 bushels. The shipments were by lake and amounted to Wheat 136,000 bushels, Barley 215,500 bushels and Rye 61,433 bushels.




