


# THE WHEAT REVIEW

FEBRUARY, 1953

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#### WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Current Supplies

Latest available estimates indicate that supplies of wheat remaining on or about February 1, 1953 in the four major exporting countries for export and carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,480.1 million bushels, some 54 per cent greater than the 959.4 million available a year ago. Supplies at February 1, 1953 (in millions of bushels) were held as follows, with last year's figures in brackets: United States, 684.4 (455.9); Canada, 550.2 (413.9); Argentina, 147.2 (2.8), and Australia, 98.3 (86.8). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

World Breadgrain
Production

According to a report on the 'World Food Situation, 1953' issued by the Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations of the United States Department of Agriculture, "World breadgrain (wheat and rye) production in 1952-53 is now estimated at 262 million short tons. The current estimate compares with the previous record crop of 248 million tons in 1938-39, with last season's production of 241 million tons, and with the prewar (1935-1939) average of 229 million tons. Wheat always represents around 80 per cent of the world's breadgrain crop. While rye accounts for only about 20 per cent of the total, it is, nevertheless, of considerable importance in the food supply of many countries in Northern and Eastern Europe where, for various reasons, sufficient supplies of wheat cannot be produced domestically or made available from outside areas to meet the total breadgrain requirements at prices people are willing and able to pay."

#### CANADIAN SITUATION

Increase in Initial
Payment on Western
Canadian Wheat

In the course of a statement to the House of Commons on February 18 on the marketing of western wheat, oats and barley, the Right Hoh. C.D. Howe, Minister of Trade and Commerce, announced increases in the initial payments for

wheat and barley. Those parts of the Minister's statement concerning the increases in initial payments for wheat were as follows:

"... Having regard to the present sales position, the Government has approved an increase in the initial price of all grades of wheat, excepting Durums, from \$1.40 per bushel to \$1.60 per bushel basis No. 1 Northern in store Fort William-Port Arthur or Vancouver. The increase will become effective on March 2nd, 1953. This means that an adjustment payment of 20 cents per bushel will be made to producers covering their deliveries of all grades of wheat other than Durums to the Board between August 1st, 1952 and February 28th, 1953.

In the case of Durum wheat, there has been an exceptionally strong demand during the present crop year and actually the production of Durum wheat is not now sufficient to meet the demand for this type of grain. Therefore, the initial prices of all grades of Durum wheat will be increased by 25 cents per bushel and an adjustment payment in this amount will be made to all producers delivering Durum wheat to the Board between August 1st, 1952 and February 28th, 1953. This will bring the initial prices of Durum grades from their present level of \$1.40 per bushel for No. 1 Amber Durum in store Fort William-Port Arthur or Vancouver to \$1.65 per bushel effective on March 2nd, 1953. There appears to be a growing market for Durum varieties of wheat and it is my hope that this increase in the initial payment for this variety of wheat will serve to encourage additional Durum production in 1953. ....

The adjustment payments which I have mentioned are, of course, subject to the one per cent levy under the Prairie Farm Assistance Act.

The wheat adjustment payment will commence on April 1st and will be followed immediately by the barley adjustment payment. If the present rate of producers' deliveries continue until the end of February, the adjustment payments on wheat and barley will amount to about \$80,000,000."

Deliveries of wheat by Western Canadian farmers have continued in relatively heavy volume throughout the winter, with weekly marketings averaging 8.7 million bushels in the ten-week period ending February 12, 1953. Marketings from the beginning of the current crop year to February 12 amounted to 301.7 million bushels, an increase of 16 per cent over the 259.2 million marketed during the comparable period of 1951-52. Saskatchewan farmers marketed 185.4 million bushels of the current crop-year total to date while those in Alberta and Manitoba delivered 85.1 million and 31.1 million bushels, respectively.

Reflecting the steady movement of wheat from farms, stocks in country elevators on February 12 had increased to 141.0 million bushels, the highest since December 23, 1952. This year's country elevator stocks on February 12 were well above the 107.4 million and 127.9 million in store in these positions on approximately the same date in 1952 and 1951, respectively, and accounted for 53 per cent of the current year's total visible supply of 266.4 million bushels. Although

most of the increase in this year's February 12 visible supply over the 1952 level of 220.0 million bushels was accounted for by larger stocks in country elevators, sizable increases were also registered in stocks at Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports and in rail transit in the Western Division. The greater activity in rail movement this year is indicated by the fact that some 19.2 million bushels of wheat were in rail transit in the Western Division on February 12 this year, compared with 9.5 million and 4.5 million at the same time in 1952 and 1951, respectively. Lakehead stocks, at 34.0 million bushels, were somewhat below the comparable totals of 36.6 million and 36.1 million in the preceding two years.

Following the usual seasonal pattern, exports of wheat as grain during January 1953 declined to 18.7 million bushels, a decrease of 5.9 million from the December total. This year's January wheat exports, however, were above those for the same month in 1952 and 1951 when the totals were 16.0 million and 11.8 million bushels, respectively. Preliminary data indicate that the equivalent of an additional 3.7 million bushels was exported in the form of wheat flour during January 1953 as against adjusted totals of 3.4 million in January 1952 and 5.7 million bushels in January 1951. Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month amounted to 22.4 million bushels.

Combined exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat during the first half of 1952-53 amounted to 190.7 million bushels, an increase of 23 per cent over the 154.9 million exported during the August—January period of 1951-52. Of the current crop year's total to date, exports of wheat as grain accounted for 161.6 million bushels, an increase of 20.5 per cent over the 134.2 million bushels of wheat exported during the first half of 1951-52.

The United Kingdom provided the major market for exports of Canadian wheat as grain, accounting for 39.1 million bushels or almost one-quarter of the total for the first half of the current crop year. Other principal export outlets for Canadian wheat as grain for the period under review, with quantities in millions of bushels, were as follows: the United States, 16.6 (of which 3.2 million were for milling in bond); Federal Republic of Germany, 13.7; Belgium, 13.3; Yugoslavia, 8.7; Japan, 7.5; the Netherlands, 6.9; Brazil, 6.9; and Italy, 6.1. Altogether, shipments of Canadian wheat as grain went to forty countries and colonies during the six months ending January 31, 1953. Preliminary data indicate that exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat for the same period amounted to 29.1 million bushels, compared with an adjusted total of 20.7 million for the first six months of 1951-52.

The balance remaining on February 1, 1953 for export and carryover was estimated at 550.2 million bushels, an increase of 33 per cent over the 413.9 million bushels available a year ago.

Acadia Wheat Licensed for Use in Eastern Canada\*

A new hard red spring wheat variety called Acadia, developed by the Experimental Farms System, was licensed in the spring of 1951 for use in Eastern Canada.

This is a bearded, medium length, strong strawed variety with hard red kernels and mid-season maturity. It is resistant to bunt and black chaff, moderately resistant to prevailing forms of leaf and stem rust, semi-resistant to loose smut and root rot. Over a period of years, it has been a consistently high yielder at most of the Eastern Farms and Stations and is recommended only for use in Eastern Canada. It is not equal to Marquis wheat in quality but makes satisfactory bread and will be very useful as a feed wheat.

There will be certified and commercial seed available for sowing this coming spring. Growers in the area for which the variety is recommended, who wish to purchase seed should obtain the necessary application forms from the Superintendent of the Experimental Farm in their province or enquire of the Cereal Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

Reasonable prices for certified and commercial seed have been set and not more than four bushels per person will be permitted.


Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, February 12, 1953, Compared with Approximately the same Date, 1952 and 1951



Wheat Shipments to the United States, either for re-export or retention from the beginning of the current crop year to February 12 amounted to 19.7 million bushels. Although this quantity is about 25 per cent below the 26.1 million bushels shipped during the comparable period of 1951-52, it is almost twice as great as the 1950-51 movement for the period under review.

In keeping with the usual seasonal pattern, rail shipments of wheat from the Lakehead during January, the first full month following the close of lake navigation, were up sharply over those of the preceding months. The January 1953 shipments amounted to 6.6 million bushels, the highest monthly total in recent years. Comparable figures for the same month in the preceding three crop years were 5.8 million, 4.4 million, and 0.3 million bushels, respectively. Total rail shipments of wheat from the Lakehead for the six months ending January 31, 1953 amounted to 10.0 million bushels as against 8.6 million and 6.4 million, respectively, for the first half of the 1951-52 and 1950-51 crop years.

Distribution of the January 1953 wheat shipments by grade and destination is shown in the table below. Some 5.7 million bushels, the bulk of which was No. 2 Northern, went to seaboard destinations in the Maritime Provinces.

Claims filed for payment up to January 31, 1953 reflect the movement of some 6.4 million bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance plan during the first five months of the current crop year. The comparable preliminary figure for last season was 6.5 million bushels indicating that current shipments may be running slightly below last year's levels. Preliminary data on millfeeds moving under the freight assistance plan represent shipments of 197,641 tons during the August-December period of the current crop year. This total, based on claims filed up to January 31, 1953, is slightly above the preliminary total for the comparable period of 1951-52. As with wheat, data on freight assisted millfeed shipments are subject to upward revision as additional claims are filed for payment.

#### CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production reported by Canadian mills for January 1953 amounted to some 1,772,000 barrels, the lowest monthly output for the current crop year to date. Production in January this year was about three per cent below the January 1952 total of 1,836,000 barrels and about nine per cent below the ten-year (1943—1952) average of 1,956,000. However, the total output for the first six months of the current crop year, at 12,156,000 barrels, was well above the comparable total of 10,969,000 barrels for the first half of 1951-52. Mills reporting operations during January 1953 had a total rated capacity of 97,195 barrels and, on the basis of a 26-day working period, 70.1 per cent of the rated capacity was effective.

Exports Preliminary Customs returns indicate that exports of Canadian wheat flour during January 1953 amounted to 826,274 barrels (3,718,000 bushels of wheat equivalent). Flour shipments during the month were reported to forty-nine countries and colonies, with the United Kingdom again taking the largest amount, some 1.4 million bushels of wheat equivalent. Other major shipments, in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent, went to the Philippine Islands (446), Lebanon (325), Trinidad and Tobago (260), Venezuela (175), Japan (158), and Brazil (135).

#### UNITED STATES SITUATION

As a result of a slight downward revision in the July 1 carryover stocks, total domestic supplies of wheat in the United
States for 1952-53 are now estimated at 1,547.0 million bushels, an increase of
170 million over the 1951-52 level. Domestic supplies are again being supplemented by imports of Canadian wheat, most of which is of feeding quality. Imports
of wheat for all purposes from Canada during the first seven months of 1952-53
amounted to 16.7 million bushels, somewhat below the 19.6 million imported during
the July-January period of 1951-52. Although domestic requirements, currently
placed at 690 million bushels, are slightly higher than in 1951-52, it is evident
that greater supplies and reduced exports will result in a substantial increase
in carryover stocks at July 1, 1953.

Exports of wheat as grain during the July—January period of 1952-53 amounted to 164.1 million bushels, a decrease of 31 per cent from the 237.4 million exported during the first seven months of 1951-52. However, exports of wheat flour and macaroni in terms of wheat, at 25.2 million bushels, were practically unchanged from last crop year's comparable total of 25.6 million. Total exports of wheat, wheat flour and macaroni during the seven months ending January 31, 1953 amounted to 189.3 million bushels, 73.7 million less than in the corresponding period of 1951-52. The balance remaining on February 1, 1953 for export and carryover was estimated at 684.4 million bushels as against 455.9 million a year ago.

#### ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position

The first official estimate places the current Argentine crop at 271.4 million bushels in sharp contrast to the 75.3 million bushel crop of 1951-52. A late estimate places the carryover of old wheat at some 1.8 million bushels which, with the current crop, makes available total supplies for 1952-53 of 273.2 million bushels.

Domestic requirements for the current crop year are now estimated at just under 125 million bushels, leaving some 148.3 million available for export and carryover. It is anticipated that at least 500,000 metric tons (18.4 million bushels) of this quantity will be earmarked as reserve stocks. The export movement is very slow in getting under way and for the two months, December—January, amounted to only 1.1 million bushels.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. W. B. McCullough, Agricultural Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Buenos Aires, under date of February 15, 1953, and is reproduced with the kind permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where practicable, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 5 pesos to the United States dollar.

Weather and Crops

Nearly all zones had a record fall of rain for the month of

January. The central observatory in Buenos Aires recorded

nearly fourteen inches compared with a normal rainfall for January of three and
one-half inches. The heaviest rain was about the middle of the month, after the
grain crops were harvested. It was too late for early sown corn, but very timely
for the late plantings. Soil moisture conditions are adequate and ploughing for
next season's crops is general throughout the grain and live-stock belt.

Pastures are from good to excellent in all areas, particularly for this season of the year.

Wheat - 1952-53 Crop The first official estimate of the 1952-53 wheat crop places production at 7,386,000 metric tons (271.4 million bushels), the second largest crop for Argentina, the record being 10,318,600 tons (379.1 million bushels), officially estimated for 1938-39. This estimate was based on conditions on November 30th and before the harvest commenced in the province of Buenos Aires, where 47 per cent of the acreage was sown. While the yields in this province were very good, most trade estimates are a little lower, or about 7.2 million tons (264.6 million bushels). In any event, this leaves Argentina with an exportable surplus of about 3.5 million tons (128.6 million bushels), of which to date only a fraction has actually been sold - 255,000 tons (9,370,000 bushels) to India in a barter deal for jute and about 70,000 tons (2,572,000 bushels) to Paraguay. It is understood that Brazil is interested in around one million tons (36.7 million bushels), but so far the two countries have not agreed on a price. Brazil refuses to pay the high price of 62.50 pesos per 100 kilos (\$3.40 per bushels), or U\$S 125 per ton. However, I.A.P.I. recently has been offering wheat at U\$S 86 per ton for payment in freely convertible dollars. It is reported that Italy has agreed to take 300,000 tons (11,023,000 bushels) of Argentine wheat, but the price has not been made public.

All available storage at the ports is filled with wheat and other grains and trade and shipping circles express the opinion that only a portion of this season's grain crop can be moved before the next harvest.

Official Grain Estimate

The first official estimate of the 1952-53 grain crops as at November 30, 1952 was announced on February 6th.

According to this estimate the production of wheat, oats, barley, rye and flaxseed amounted to 11,385,200 metric tons, the largest crop in the past twenty years. It is estimated that of the 11,923,900 hectares (29.5 million acres) sown, 9,452,300 (23.3 million acres) were harvested. The official figures compared to previous years are shown in the following table:

Grain Shipments

Exports of grain from Argentina during January at 131,162 metric tons were the highest since February last year and were comprised of 25,061 tons (921,000 bushels) of wheat, 85,443 tons (3,364,000 bushels) of corn and 20,658 tons (949,000 bushels) of barley. India received 21,511 tons (790,000 bushels) of wheat, against the 255,000 tons (9,370,000 bushels) contracted under the wheat-for-jute barter deal, while Paraguay received the balance of 3,550 tons (130,000 bushels). Brazil was the chief customer for corn with 43,957 tons (1,730,000 bushels), followed by France receiving 29,545 tons (1,163,000 bushels). Shipments to the United Kingdom comprised 11,741 tons (462,000 bushels) of corn and 14,658 tons (673,000 bushels) of barley.

#### AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

The statistical supply position of Australian wheat for both 1952-53 and 1951-52 remains substantially the same as indicated a month ago. Although adjustments have been made in the estimates of carryover stocks and domestic requirements for both crop years and in the size of the 1951-52 crop, all have been of a relatively minor nature. The most recent official estimate, issued January 20, placed the 1952-53 crop at 179.8 million bushels but a cable, dated February 23, from the Commercial Secretary for Canada indicated that the current crop may reach 185 or 190 million bushels.

Even on the basis of the lower estimate, the 1952-53 crop is some 20 million bushels greater than in 1951-52. Although the carryover at

December 1, 1952 was somewhat lower than in 1951 and current domestic requirements are expected to show an increase, the amount available for export and carryover in 1952-53 is estimated at 111.7 million bushels, an increase of 14 million over 1951-52. As a result of the improved supply position, export sales under the International Wheat Agreement have been relatively heavy. Actual export movement, however, has not yet got under way in volume. During the first two months of the current crop year exports of wheat as grain amounted to 7.3 million bushels as against 5.2 million during the December—January period of 1951-52. The equivalent of an additional 6.1 million bushels was exported in the form of wheat flour bringing total exports of wheat and wheat flour for the two months ending January 31, 1953 to 13.4 million bushels.

Subject to further revisions in production and other estimates, the balance remaining on February 1, 1953 for export and carryover was estimated at 98.3 million bushels, compared with 86.8 million on the same date in 1952.

Australian Cable The following cable, dated February 23, 1953, has been received from the Agricultural Secretary for Canada in Melbourne:


"Australian wheat stocks at February 14th totalled 169,127,000 bushels. Wheat exports from December 1st 1952 to February 14th totalled 7,928,000 bushels, with shipments during preceding six weeks mainly to the United Kingdom. Flour exports same period 157,539 long tons, with 37,832 to Ceylon, 18,241 to the United Kingdom and 18,077 to Malaya. Wheat harvest now expected to total between 185 and 190 million bushels ... ".


#### SOUTH AFRICAN SITUATION


According to 'Foreign Crops and Markets' the 1952 wheat crop in the Union of South Africa is considerably smaller than the good outturns of the past two years. The wheat harvest, normally completed in December, was estimated at about 19 million bushels, compared with about 25.5 million in 1951 and 26 million in 1950, but still above the prewar average of 16 million bushels. Imports of wheat will be needed to meet domestic requirements during the current season. It is expected that the country's quota of about 11 million bushels under the International Wheat Agreement may be sufficient to fill the gap between domestic production and consumption. Wheat prices to producers for the 1952-53 season are set at a slightly higher level than the 1951-52 rates, the increase amounting to about 15 cents per bushel in United States currency.

#### CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS, FEBRUARY, 1953

- 3 The United Kingdom Ministry of Agriculture in its final estimate of production for 1952 placed the total production of wheat at 82.8 million bushels, down slightly from the 83.5 million bushel crop of 1951. The decrease in area sown from 2,060,000 acres to 1,963,000 acres, more than offset the increased yield per acre of 42.2 bushels which not only exceeded the 1951 average yield of 40.5 bushels but was also well above the 1942-51 average of 37.0 bushels per acre.
- 12 The Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, estimated wheat flour production in December at 18,990,000 sacks, or an average of 863,000 sacks per working day, compared with 983,000 sacks per working day in November, and 919,000 per day in December 1951. Wheat flour mills in December operated at 79.3 per cent of capacity, compared with 88.9 per cent in the previous month.
- 16 A strike of elevator workers at five Vancouver and New Westminster terminals resulted in an embargo being ordered on the movement of export wheat from Alberta to these elevators. Terminal facilities at Prince Rupert, Victoria and North Vancouver, however, were still available as outlets, although these elevators normally handle only a small proportion of the trade.
- 18 The Minister of Trade and Commerce announced the following increases in the initial prices of western wheat: 25 cents per bushel for all grades of Durum wheat, and 20 cents per bushel for all grades of other Western wheat. The new initial prices for No. 1 Amber Durum and No. 1 Northern will, therefore, be \$1.65 and \$1.60 per bushel, respectively, basis in store Fort William-Port Arthur or Vancouver. The increases are effective March 2 with corresponding adjustment payments being made on all deliveries of Western wheat made between August 1, 1952 and February 28, 1953.
- 27 A report dated at Buenos Aires February 21, states that the Argentine Department of Agriculture in their second official estimate of production now places the current wheat crop in that country at 7.8 million metric tons (286.6 million bushels).









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
