

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#### WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Current Supplies Latest available estimates indicate that supplies of wheat remaining on or about May 1, 1961 in the four major exporting countries for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,362.0 million bushels, 5 per cent above the 2,245.6 million available a year ago. Supplies at May 1, 1961, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,529.0 (1,408.3); Canada, 636.8 (604.5); Argentina, 29.5 (102.6); and Australia, 166.7 (130.2). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

Exports Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat, from the four major exporting countries during the first nine months (August-April) of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 923.9 million bushels, some 27 per cent greater than the 725.6 million exported during the same months of 1959-60.

Total world wheat exports, including products in grain equivalent are expected to reach an all-time record of some 1,450 million bushels in the 1960-61 July-June crop year. This quantity is more than 9 per cent greater than the total 1959-60 world wheat shipments of 1,327 million bushels. These estimates of total world wheat trade include large volumes exported under various government-assisted programmes, with a substantial proportion of wheat shipments from the United States moving under such arrangements. The pace of Canadian wheat and flour exports has stepped up rapidly since January, ranging from 21.0 million bushels in that month to 34.9 million in April. Reflecting recently announced sales it is anticipated that exports of wheat and flour from Canada in the current crop year will exceed the 300 million mark by a substantial margin.

Shipments from the other major exporters, particularly the United States, are also above last year's levels. While Canada stands second to the United States in terms of total wheat and flour exports, she is by far the largest seller in the world commercial market. In 1959-60, more than 95 per cent, or some 264 million bushels, of Canada's wheat exports were sold on normal commercial terms. Only half this quantity, or 132 million bushels, were sold by the U.S. for dollars.

Wheat and flour exports, including those under government programmes, from each of the four countries, United States, Canada, Argentina and Australia were at higher levels this year than last. Shipments from these countries during August-April of the current and ten preceding crop years (Canadian) are shown in the table below.

#### CANADIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1960-61 crop year are placed at 1,027.2 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 537.6 million and the 1960 production of 489.6 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 7 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 962.5 million bushels. After deducting an estimated 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 would amount to 877.2 million bushels, 8 per cent above the 814.9 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-April period of the current crop year amounted to 240.4 million bushels 14 per cent above the 210.4 million exported during the same months of the preceding crop year. The balance remaining on May 1, 1961 for export and for carryover, amounted to 636.8 million bushels, 5 per cent more than the May 1, 1960 total of 604.5 million.

NOTE :

Due to the introduction of a new commodity classification, effective January 1, 1961, official wheat flour export data for April were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The flour export figure for April included in this report represents an unofficial estimate. No allowance has been made for April exports of bagged seed wheat.

Canadian Wheat Supplies

Deliveries of wheat from farms (both east and west) up to May 17 of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 255.1 million bushels and registered an increase of 6 per cent over last year's corresponding total of 241.0 million. Some 22.7 million bushels of the current total was accounted for by deliveries of durum wheat in contrast to only 12.0 million of this type marketed during the comparable period a year ago. However, farm stocks of durum wheat are now largely depleted. During the four weeks April 20 to May 17 total deliveries of wheat (both east and west) amounted to 37.9 million bushels while disappearance through licensed elevator channels (overseas clearances, plus imports into the United States, plus Canadian domestic use and including grain milled for subsequent export) during the same four weeks totalled some 42.5 million. With export and domestic requirements exceeding marketings, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat declined from 403.7 million bushels at the week ending April 19 to a level of 399.1 million at May 17, 1961.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at May 17, 1961 was 5 per cent greater than the comparable 1960 total of 379.5 million bushels and 8 per cent more than the 1959 figure of 368.7 million. Stocks in country elevators, at 248.4 million bushels, accounted for 62 per cent of the current total and surpassed by wide margins both the 223.3 million of a year ago and 228.1 million of two years ago. Interior terminal stocks at May 17, 1961 amounted to 9.4 million bushels and registered declines from both the 1960 total of 11.6 million and the 1959 figure of 13.3 million bushels. Some 16.6 million bushels were in "transit rail" (Western Division), compared with 15.4 million a year ago and 13.9 million of two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead at May 17, 1961 totalled 41.2 million bushels below both the 1960 and 1959 totals of 46.9 and 44.9 million bushels, respectively. Some 10.8 million bushels were in "transit lake" at May 17 well above the 1960 total of 4.6 million and the 1959 figure of 5.4 million bushels. The 24.4 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were below the 33.8 million of a year ago, but considerably above the 18.6 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports amounted to 24.7 million bushels and represented relatively substantial increases over both the 1960 and 1959 totals of 17.7 million and 18.3 million bushels, respectively. Supplies in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria) totalled 11.2 million bushels, below the 13.0 million in 1960 and the 12.5 million in 1959.

# Announcement of WheatThe Hon. Alvin HaSale to Polandin the House of C

The Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Agriculture, speaking in the House of Commons on June 6 stated in part that I should like to inform the house that the Canadian wheat board

has concluded an agreement with the Polish national trade organization, Rolimpex, for the sale and purchase of approximately 100,000 tons of wheat, equivalent to 3.7 million bushels, for shipment this crop year.

The wheat has been purchased on a credit basis, and the Canadian government has authorized export credits insurance in order to facilitate this sale. The terms or repayment include 10 per cent cash and the balance as follows: one third payable two years from the date of shipment; one third payable two and one half years from date of shipment; one third payable three years from date of shipment.

March 1961 Exports of Wheat Flour and Bagged Seed Wheat Total 4.5 Million Bushels Customs exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during March 1961 amounted to 2.7 million bushels, 2 per cent above the February total of 2.6 million but 3 per cent below the March 1960 (adjusted for time lag) of 2.7 million bushels. Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first

eight months of the 1960-61 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 24.4 million bushels and represented an increase of 2 per cent over the adjusted August 1959-March 1960 total of 23.9 million bushels.

Exports of bagged seed wheat during March 1961, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 1,804 <u>thousand</u> bushels, compared with the February total of 984 <u>thousand</u> and the March 1960 adjusted figure of 991 <u>thousand</u> bushels. Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during the August-March period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 5.5 million bushels, 25 per cent more than the comparable 1959-60 adjusted total of 4.4 million.

April 1961 Exports of Wheat Total 31.4 Million Bushels Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during April 1961 amounted to 31.4 million bushels, 34 per cent greater than the March total of 23.4 million, more than double the 15.4 million of a year ago

and 84 per cent above the ten-year (1950-59) average for the month of April of 17.1 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-April period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 207.0 million bushels, surpassing by 16 per cent the comparable 1959-60 total of 177.9 million and 26 per cent above the ten-year (1949-50--1958-59) August-April average of 164.6 million. The United Kingdom remaining in its position as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 58.7 million bushels and representing 28 per cent of the nine-month total. During the August-April period of the 1959-60 crop year, shipments of wheat to the United Kingdom amounted to 63.1 million bushels and accounted for 35 per cent of the total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first nine months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 41.5 (30.7); Federal Republic of Germany, 24.6 (19.3); Italy, 14.5 (2.1); Belgium-Luxembourg, 9.7 (8.8); Czechoslovakia, 6.1 (nil); France, 6.1 (3.6); China, Communist, 6.0 (nil); Netherlands, 5.4 (5.6); U.S.S.R. Russia, 4.6 (nil); Switzerland, 4.3 (5.7); and India, 4.0 (4.1).

Crop and Weather Conditions The telegraphic crop report, published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on June 7, 1961 summarized crop conditions in each of the Prairie Provinces as follows:

Most parts of Manitoba are in need of rain although recent showers have benefitted local points. The areas suffering the most from drought include the southwest corner and the western side of the province up to and including the Swan River Valley. Pastures are deteriorating rapidly and wild hay is a near failure in some districts. Tame hay is likely to yield poorly, but with immediate rains would provide a fair return. Most dugouts and sloughs are dry and this poses an immediate shortage of water for livestock. Seeding of grains and special crops is virtually completed and sugar beet thinning has commenced. The dry, hot weather is favouring grasshopper hatching and damage to margins of fields of pasture and forage crop land is occurring in the Red River Valley. Spraying for grasshoppers is in progress at Melita and weed spraying has commenced at many points. Infestation of cutworms, sunflower beetles, sweet clover weevils and flea beetles are reported.

Temperatures in Saskatchewan have continued above normal

and this has resulted in rapid germination, emergence and crop growth. However, because of the hot weather, crops are drawing heavily on the limited moisture reserves and grasshoppers are hatching in large numbers. Wild oats are prevalent in many fields and weed spraying is underway in most areas. Heavy insect infestations are being experienced south and west of a line from Estevan to North Battleford. There has been severe cutworm damage in some southern and south-central districts with considerable re-seeding necessary. In the west-central part, heavy grasshopper outbreaks are causing concern as well as in other regions south of the line mentioned earlier.

#### Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain

Total shipments of the five major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to May 17 this year amounted to 68.1 million bushels, 20 per cent greater than

the 56.9 million shipped during the comparable period of 1960. In 1961 the season of navigation opened on April 9 while the 1960 season opened on April 10. Shipments of whe<sup>a</sup>t, at 52.9 million bushels, were 24 per cent above the 1960 comparable figure and accounted for 78 per cent of the current tot<sup>a</sup>l. Shipments of oats, rye and flaxseed were also above last year's corresponding levels, with barley the only one of the five grains shipped in smaller volume this year than last.



Freight Assistance Shipments Claims filed for payment up to April 30, 1961 represent the movement of some 12.4 million bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-March period of the current crop year. During the corresponding period in 1959-60 claims had been filed

for a total of 13.7 million bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1960-61 August-March shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 9 per cent below those of 1959-60. Revised data on last years August-March shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to April 30, 1961 place the eight-month total at 13.8 million bushels. About 73 per cent of the shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Ontario and Quebec.

Provincial Distribution of Wheat Shipments under the Freight Assistance Policy August-March 1960-61 and 1959-60

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate the movement of 391,570 tons during the first eight months of the 1960-61 crop year, only 1 per cent below the comparable 1959-60 figure of 396,999 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the current crop year total is based on claims submitted up to April 30, 1961 and may be subject to considerable upward revision with the filing of additional claims. Shipments amounting to 187,635 tons and 115,381 tons to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, respectively, accounted for a combined 77 per cent of the August-March total.

#### CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during April 1961 amounted to 3,066,000 hundredweight, representing a decrease of 9 per cent from the March output of 3,386,000 hundredweight, 2 per cent below the April 1960 total of 3,142,000 hundredweight and 11 per cent less than the ten-year (1951-60) average production for the month of April of 3,455,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during April 1961 had a total rated capacity of 155,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 25-day working period 79.0 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during April 1961 amounted to 6,863,000 bushels compared with 7,582,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 7,073,000 bushels milled during April 1960. Of the wheat milled for flour during April 1961, some 6,053,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (477,000 bushels); Durum (279,000 bushels); and all other (54,000 bushels).

Exports According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during March, 1961 amounted to 1,153,000 hundredweight (some 2,651,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) representing an increase of 2 per cent over the 2,600,000 bushels exported in February 1961, but 3 per cent below the March 1960 adjusted total of 2,737,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to 56 countries with exports to the United Kingdom amounting to 829 thousand bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 31 per cent of the March 1961 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent, were as follows: Philippines, 321; Japan, 203; United States, 152; Jamaica, 135; Ghana, 130; and Nigeria, 117.

Official wheat flour export data for April were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The figure for April included in this report represents an unofficial estimate.

#### UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Position Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1960-61 crop year are estimated at 2,678.3 million bushels, consisting of the July 1 carryover of 1,314.9 million and the 1960 crop, placed at 1,363.4 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of about 11 per cent over the previous peak of 2,421.8 million bushels a year ago. Imports of wheat from Canada during the July-April period of the current United States crop year amounted to 6.3 million bushels, compared with 6.0 million during the same months of the preceding crop year. After deducting an estimated 609 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, some 2,075.6 million remain available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 compared with 1,820.6 million in 1959-60.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during the first ten months (July-April) of the 1960-61 United States crop year amounted to 546.5 million bushels, 33 per cent greater than the 412.2 million exported during the same months in 1959-60. The balance remaining on May 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,529.0 million bushels compared with 1,408.3 million on the same date a year ago.

Winter Wheat Crop Estimated at 1,096 Million Bushels In a report released on May 10, 1961 the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated in part that Winter wheat production, forecast at 1,096 million bushels, is 2 per cent below last year but 30 per cent above

average. The forecast represents practically no change from the forecast a month ago as the earlier favorable weather conditions have continued to date. Production prospects showed improvement in Montana with recent improved soil moisture but declined sharply in South Dakota. Other major producing States show little change.

In the last 10 years, the average change in the United States production estimate from May 1 to harvest has been 81 million bushels, ranging from a maximum of 170 million bushels to a minimum of 8 million.

The indicated yield, at 26.5 bushels per harvested acre, is the third highest of record--1 bushel below last year but 5.6 bushels above average. The acreage for harvest is indicated at 41.3 million acres, about 2 per cent above last year and average. The portion of the seeded acreage for grain harvest, at 94 per cent, is at last year's high level and far above average.

Marketing Quotas and Acreage Allotments Proclaimed for 1962 Wheat Crop On May 12, 1961 Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman proclaimed marketing quotas and a national acreage allotment of 55 million acres for the 1962 wheat crop in line with current legislation. State acreage allotments and a 39-State commercial and ll-State noncommercial wheat-producing

area were also announced. Existing law sets a May 15 deadlime by which the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the next year's crop of wheat.

Secretary Freeman said: "The action taken today does not by any means preclude the possibility of an improved program for wheat growers this next year. In view of this, we are not now announcing a date for the referendum in which farmers would vote on marketing quotas under the present law.

"We are hopeful that we'll have a more effective method of dealing with the serious problem of wheat supplies and wheat producers' incomes. The great interest of all concerned in fashioning a better program gives much encouragement toward this end. Of course, the decision on the level of support for the 1962 crop also awaits future developments".

Wheat marketing quotas to be effective must be approved by two-thirds of the wheat producers voting in a referendum. When quotas are in effect, producers who stay within their acreage allotments may market all the wheat they produce. Producers who plant more than their acreage allotments call for are subject to marketing quota penalties on their "excess" production if they have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest.

<u>1962 Acreage Allotments</u> The 1962 national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres is the minimum fixed by law and is the same as for the 1961 crop. Legislation provides for establishing a national wheat acreage allotment each year except in the event of a national emergency. The supply formula used to determine the national allotment indicates an acreage at the minimum level.

<u>1962 Marketing Quotas</u> The Secretary of Agriculture is required by legislation to proclaim wheat marketing quotas not later than May 15 of the preceding year when the available supply is more than 20 per cent above the normal supply. The estimated supply for the 1961-62 marketing year is actually 92.2 per cent above the normal supply. This requires a marketing quota proclamation for the 1962-63 marketing year. For marketing quota purposes, the total supply of wheat is estimated at 2,789,000,000 bushels, consisting of a 1961 crop now estimated at 1,327,000,000 bushels, a carryover on July 1, 1961 estimated at 1,455,000,000 bushels, and imports of 7 million bushels.

#### The normal supply of wheat is 1,451,000,000 bushels, based on an estimated domestic consumption of 609,000,000 bushels during the 1960-61 marketing year, and exports of 600 million bushels during the 1961-62 marketing year, plus a 20-per cent carryover allowance of 242 million bushels. The marketing quota level (120 per cent of the normal supply) is 1,741,000,000 bushels. The estimated total supply of 2,789,000,000 bushels is 192.2 per cent of the normal supply.

State Acreage Allotments The minimum national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres (less 30,000 acres held as a national reserve) has been apportioned among all the States on the basis of acreage seeded for the production of wheat during the 10 years 1951-60, with adjustments for abnormal weather and for trends in planting. County allotments will be determined essentially on the same basis as the State allotments. The county allotments will be apportioned among individual farms according to past acreage of wheat, tillable acres, crop rotation practices, type of soil, and topography. Wheat producers will be informed of the acreage allotments for their farms in advance of a wheat quota referendum.

Commercial and Noncommercial Wheat Areas As authorized by legislation, 11 States which have wheat allotments of 25,000 acres or less have been designated as noncommercial wheat States for 1962. Farm wheat allotments and marketing quotas would not apply in these States. The noncommercial wheat area is unchanged from that for the 1961 wheat crop. The 11 noncommercial wheat States and the allotments that -- except for the 25,000-acre provision -- would have been the basis for 1962 county and farm allotments in each State follow: Alaska, 40 acres; Connecticut, 496 acres; Florida, 4,896 acres; Hawaii, zero acres; Louisiana, 21,663 acres; Maine, 1,082 acres; Massachusetts, 614 acres; Nevada, 12,488 acres, New Hampshire, 54 acres; Rhode Island, 408 acres; and Vermont, 562 acres. In the noncommercial States under present legislation, price support will be at 75 per cent of what the rate would be if the State were in the commercial area.

Marketing Quota Penalty<br/>Rate Set at \$1.08 perOn May 23 the United States Department of Agriculture<br/>announced a marketing quota penalty rate of \$1.08 per<br/>bushel on "excess" wheat of the 1961 crop, the same as<br/>for the 1960 crop.

As directed by law, the rate of the marketing quota penalty is 45 per cent of the parity price per bushel of wheat as of May 1 of the calendar year in which the crop is harvested. The current parity price for wheat is \$2.39 per bushel.

Growers approved marketing quotas for the 1961 wheat crop, as announced August 16, 1960. When wheat marketing quotas are in effect, a farmer who does not comply with the wheat acreage allotment established for his farm is subject to a penalty on his farm marketing excess, unless he harvests 15 acres or less or has signed an agreement permitting him to produce up to 30 acres of wheat for feed use on the farm.

Wheat produced on a farm on which the wheat acreage is in excess of the allotment is not eligible for price support. The national average minimum support price for 1961-crop wheat is \$1.79 per bushel. The final average support price for the 1961 crop will be 75 per cent of the effective parity as of July 1, 1961, if this is higher.

#### ARGENTINE SITUATION

Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the 1960-61 Supply Position (December-November) crop year amount to 195.7 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 48.7 million and the new crop, placed at 147.0 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a sharp decline in production and a decrease of 17 per cent in carryover stocks, are about 28 per cent less than the 1959-60 total of 273.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 139.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 56.1 million are available for export and for carryover in contrast to 137.2 million in 1959-60.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1960-April 1961 amounted to 26.6 million bushels, compared with 34.6 million exported during the same months in 1959-60. The balance remaining on May 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 29.5 million bushels, substantially below the May 1, 1960 total of 102.6 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.S. Bissett, Commercial Counsellor, Buenos Aires, under date of May 19, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioners Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 83 pesos per U.S. dollar less 20 per cent retention.

Weather and Crops During the month of April, weather conditions were in general favourable throughout the grain-growing regions, with the exception of those areas

in the central and south-western and north-eastern parts of the Province of Buenos Aires and in the Province of La Pampa, where the lack of adequate rainfall has given cause for concern. A serious drought seems to be impending, similar in severity to the one affecting the more westerly livestock areas. During the first half of May, drought became widespread in the above-mentioned parts of the Province of Buenos Aires and La Pampa, and preparation of the soil for the coming crops and actual sowings were practically paralyzed in many areas. In addition, the dry weather contributed to a heavy infestation by green aphyds, affecting especially early-sown double-purpose lots of rye, oats and barley in the Province of Buenos Aires. During the last few days, however, the situation has changed considerably for the better. On May 16 scattered rains occurred and these became widespread during the next two or three days, benefitting appreciably many of the drought-stricken areas. They were especially heavy in most of the central and northern provinces of the country. Wind and rain storms were registered in Cordoba and Santa Fé Provinces. Similar storms resulted in floods in the Province of Corrientes. The south-western regions of the Province of Buenos Aires were perhaps benefitted most by these rains. Ploughing and seeding can now be started once agin, and the infestation of green aphyds, more than ever a menace to the local grain crops, will be at least partially checked.

At the time of writing this report, even though full information is not yet available as regards the actual extent of, and the benfits resulting from these recent rains, it can be said that in general there is a promising outlook for the fall and winter-sown grains. At present the weather is generally fine and cold, following a long period of variable weather mostly damp and warm, but interspersed with cold days, during which frosts were registered in some areas of Buenos Aires and La Pampa, Mendoza and San Luis.

The National Grain Board, continuing its policy of voluntary agreement Wheat with all those concerned with the grain trade, has made it known that an understanding has been reached, whereby the total quantity of wheat to be allowed for export this year will be 920,000 metric tons (33,804,000 bushels). Grain Board officials have stated that there will be no reduction this year in the estimated home consumption tonnages. On the contrary, if wheat acreage is increased this year, seed requirements will also increase. In short, the final carry-over at the end of crop year 1960-61 (December 1, 1961) will probably amount to about 300,000 tons (11,023,000 bushels). Present Grain Board stocks amount to some 850,000 tons (31,232,000 bushels). In the meantime, the market has continued on the quiet side. At the end of April the prices paid by millers in the Province of Santa Fé, amounted to 398.00 and 404.00 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.31 and \$1.32 per bushel), f.o.r. in port. Since then no noticeable changes have taken place in these prices. In the Buenos Aires Cereal Exchange prices average at present 402.00 (\$1.32 per bushel) for hard wheat, grade 1, and 392.00 (\$1.29 per bushel) for semi-hard, also grade 1, both in pesos per 100 kilos. No data are available as regards actual tonnage dealt with by the private trade. Grain Board sales included 20,934 tons (769,000 bushels) of the 1959-60 crop, sold for export at 3,552 pesos per ton (\$1.16 per bushel) for delivery May-June from Rosario, and 800 tons (29,000 bushels) of the 1958-59 crop sold at 3.350 pesos (\$1.10 per bushel), for local milling purposes. The Grain Board has now again withdrawn from the market. The Decree covering the minimum official price for semi-hard wheat has now been published, fixing it at 420 pesos (\$1.38 per bushel) per 100 kilos f.o.r. Buenos Aires port in bags for grade 1 grain, 80 kilos hectolitre basis (64 pounds per bushel). This price now completes those previously set for the hard and "Durum" wheat types.

Policy Government interest in increased wheat acreage (1961-62) No sowings are normally allowed in Argentina of seed wheat, other than a fiscalized or certified seed. This is to insure as much as possible, a good sound crop. However, the crop year 1960-61 was an exceptionally bad one for this grain, and the top need now is to increase sowings of wheat for this year, in every conceivable way. For this purpose the following official resolutions have been announced:

- (a) Sales will be allowed of "emergency seed wheat" harvested from unfiscalized parcels originally sown with fiscalized i.e. certified seed. This emergency seed may be used only for the 1961-62 crop, and it must conform to the following specifications:
  - Minimum: hectolitric weight, 73 kilos (58 pounds per bushel) germinating power, 90 per cent varietal purity, 95 per cent physical purity, by weight, 95 per cent
  - Maximum: foreign seeds, by weight, 0.25 per cent common weeds, by weight, 0.05 per cent noxious weeds that have been declared "national pest" (i.e. those whose destruction is compulsory) none. Smutty grains, none.
- (b) On account of the renewed increased interest in "Durum" (Candeal-Taganrog) wheat, sales will be allowed, as "common seed", of parcels of the 1961-62 crop, since present production of fiscalized seed is not enough to meet the demand for this grain for seeding purposes.

Grain Shipments Shipment's amounted to 57,844 metric tons (2,125,000 bushels) during April, a very reduced tonnage indeed, the lowest since the 62,989 tons (2,314,000 bushels) exported during December 1959.

#### AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1960-61 (December-November) crop year amount to some 332.0 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 61.2 million and the current crop estimated at a record 270.8 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated, reflecting a substantially larger production which more than offset a decline in carryover, represent an increase of 26 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 263.2 million bushels. After deducting 77.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 255.0 million are available for export and for carryover during 1960-61, 38 per cent above the 184.4 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent up to April 29 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 88.3 million bushels compared with 54.2 million exported during the corresponding period of 1959-60. The balance remaining on April 30, 1961 for export and for carryover, at 166.7 million bushels, exceeded by 28 per cent the comparable 1960 total of 130.2 million.

Australian Wheat Supplies

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, under date of May 16, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of £l equals \$2.2090 (Canadian) the quotation in effect on May 8, 1961. Crop Position During the past month, all the states have reported good rainfalls in their respective wheatbelts, which will ensure early seeding. As

it has been forecast that a record 15 million acres will be sown to wheat this season, there is a strong possibility that yet another record crop will be harvested throughout Australia if the weather remains favourable throughout the coming season. Conditions generally have continued good for land preparation and early wheat sowings but the rainfall in May will finally determine the acreage to be sown. Should the forecast of 15 million acres be achieved, this will be the highest area sown in Australia since the depression years, when 18.2 million acres were planted to wheat in 1930-31, given average yields, this could mean a crop of 243 million bushels.

Marketing Position Australia's carryover problem has been considerably lessened by the recent additional sale of 750,000 tons (25,000,000 bushels) of wheat to mainland China. This new deal, following closely on the larger cash sale of 1,050,000 tons (35,000,000 bushels), is believed to be worth £20 million (\$44.2 million) and is a credit transaction. The Chairman of the Wheat Board has stated that the tonnage would be shipped between July 1 and November 15 this year. Payment would be 10 per cent cash on shipment, 40 per cent in six months and the remaining 50 per cent, twelve months after shipment. In addition to the firm contract, the Board has agreed to provide 250,000 tons (8,333,000 bushels) for shipment between November 15 and December 31, "if mutually agreed at the time by the Chinese buyers and the Board". Recent sales of wheat, totalling £5.5 million (\$12.1 million) were made to Egypt, Japan and Malta. The contract with Egypt for 100,000 tons (3,333,000 bushels) is the first the Wheat Board has made with that country since 1952.

From published figures therefore, it would appear that the Australian Wheat Board has less than 67 million bushels of its export wheat surplus left. This is little more than the carryover of 62 million bushels from last year's harvest and there are still some months of the wheat-selling year to go. The Board has sold a record quantity - approximately 200 million bushels - out of this year's large surplus.

#### FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of May 26, 1961, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Weather<br/>and CropsWeather conditions have been generally satisfactory in most areas<br/>of France. Sufficient precipitation has helped crop growth, except<br/>in some of the South and Southwest regions where lack of rain is

reported. Generally, however, growth is from two to three weeks in advance of normal. Winter wheat is already heading out in some regions.

The total area sown to grains is now almost the same as it was last year, that is, about 8 million hectares (19.8 million acres). The acreages of wheat, wheat and rye, and rye are down 10 per cent, 15 per cent and 16 per cent, respectively, while barley, oats, and mixed cereal acreages have increased 14 per cent, 4 per cent and 18 per cent, respectively.

Collections

Collections of grains up to March 31, 1961, and compared with the same date last year are reported as follows:

In Algeria, dry weather has been the rule, although some light showers were received in April. Nevertheless, total rainfall is well below average, and above average temperatures combined with dry winds have resulted in very mediocre growth of winter grains in this country. Forecasts for the winter wheat crop in Algeria are about 13 million quintals (47.8 million bushels), down considerably from last year's 24 million quintals (88.2 million bushels).

Conditions in Morocco and Tunisia have also been considerably less than satisfactory as regards cereals. Crop forecasts for Morocco are as follows in millions of bushels: soft wheat, 5.9; durum wheat, 17.6; barley, 25.7; and corn, 7.1.

On May 5, 1961, the U.S.A., under P.L. 480, announced a credit of \$17,800,000 to Morocco for 200,000 tons (7,349,000 bushels) of Hard Winter Wheat, and 110,000 tons (5,052,000 bushels) of barley. There is some possibility that Morocco may also purchase commercially Durum and Hard Spring Wheat for delivery next spring.

It is anticipated that Tunisia will need to import about 60,000 tons (2,756,000 bushels) of barley, and 200,000 tons (7,349,000 bushels) of soft wheat this year. Tunisia recently purchased 10,000 tons (367,000 bushels) of Hard Amber Durum No. 3 for June delivery.

Seeding is practically completed in the Province of Alberta. The weather has continued hot and dry and shows no sign of breaking. Surface moisture conditions are deteriorating, but crops are not yet far enough advanced to cause a severe drain on reserves. However, crops on stubble will soon show the effect of limited moisture supplies. Moisture received two weeks ago brought pastures along rapidly but growth is slowing now. Grazing could be seriously limited if less than normal precipitation is received during the summer. A good spring nectar flow favoured brood production and bee colonies will be strong in time to take advantage of the major honey flow.

#### CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

According to a report published by the Crop Reporting Board of the May 10 United States Department of Agriculture the U.S. winter wheat crop for harvest in 1961, based on conditions at May 1, was forecast at 1,096 million bushels.

> According to a report from Mr. D.B. Laughton, Agricultural Secretary, Canadian Embassy, London, stocks of grain remaining unsold on farms continue to be high in comparison with a year ago. At the end of March 1961 stocks of wheat were 23.5 million bushels compared with 14.9 million a year earlier.

- 23 The United States Department of Agriculture announced a marketing quota penalty rate of \$1.08 per bushel on "excess" wheat of the 1961 crop.
- 30 The Canadian Wheat Board, in its Instructions to the Trade, Shippers and Exporters, No. 15 announced that effective June 1, 1961 and until further notice, the rate of interest applicable to all transactions relevant to the handling of Board Agency Wheat will be decreased from 5 1/2 per cent to 5 1/4 per cent per annum.
- June 6 The Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Agriculture, announced the sale of 100,000 tons or about 3.7 million bushels of wheat to Poland.

The Bureau of Census, United States Department of Commerce, estimated wheat flour production in the United States during April 1961 at 18,701,000 hundredweight, an average of 935,000 sacks per working day.


According to the United States Department of Commerce total commercial production of wheat flour in 1960 amounted to 255.1 million hundredweight, about 4.6 million hundredweight above the previous year's production. Production in 1960 was at 92.4 per cent of total annual capacity.

According to Broomhall: It has been warm and dry in the United Kingdom apart from a one day drizzle in southern areas which was totally inadequate. Rain is wanted generally, especially for barley and oats which have been showing effects of the deficiency. Wheat, however, has been holding up satisfactorily thus far.

Improved weather is reported in West Germany after a cold, wet spell. Crops have shown improvement and the general outlook is now considered favourable.

Northern portions of Italy have received beneficial rains. Despite recent improvement in crop conditions the wheat outturn is still expected to fall considerably short of requirements with the trade maintaining ideas of probable imports of that grain around two million tons.

A preliminary official report places wheat production in Iraq this year at 850,000 metric tons (31,232,000 bushels) in 1961 and 592,000 tons (21,752,000 bushels) in 1960.
