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

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WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Current Supplies Latest available estimates indicate that supplies of wheat remaining on or about July 1, 1961 in the four major exporting countries for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,118.8 million bushels, 2 per cent above the 2,081.6 million available a year ago. Supplies at July 1, 1961, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,406.6 (1,313.5); Canada, 553.2 (555.2); Argentina, 34.5 (98.3); and Australia, 124.5 (114.6). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

Exports

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat, from the four major exporting countries during the first eleven months (August-June) of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 1,173.4 million bushels, some 30 per cent greater than the 901.2 million exported during the same months of 1959-60.

When final tabulations are completed for the 1960-61 July-June crop year, it is expected that total world wheat exports, including products in wheat equivalent, will have established an all-time record of some 1,500 million bushels. Exports of this volume would represent an increase of 13 per cent over the total 1959-60 world wheat shipments of 1,328 million bushels. These estimates of total world wheat trade include large volumes exported under various government-assisted programmes, with a substantial proportion of wheat shipments from the United States moving under such arrangements. Canadian wheat and flour exports have proceeded at a brisk pace in recent months and, as a result, the August 1960-June 1961 total of 324 million bushels surpasses by 25 per cent the 1959-60 comparable total of 260 million. Based on preliminary data available at this time, it is conceivable that the 1960-61 crop year total exports of wheat and flour from Canada will approximate 355 million bushels, very close to the third highest level on record.

While Canada stands second to the United States in terms of total wheat and flour exports, she is by far the largest seller in the world commercial market. In 1959-60, more than 95 per cent, or some 264 million bushels, of Canada's wheat exports were sold on normal commercial terms. Little more than half this quantity, or 135 million bushels, were sold by the U.S. for dollars. Wheat and flour exports, including those under government programmes, from the United States, Canada and Australia were at higher levels in 1960-61 than the previous year while those from Argentina were lower. Shipments from these countries during August-June of the 1960-61 and ten preceding crop years (Canadian) are shown in the table below.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1960-61 crop year are placed at 1,027.2 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 537.6 million and the 1960 production of 489.6 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 7 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 962.5 million bushels. After deducting an estimated 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 would amount to 877.2 million bushels, 8 per cent above the 814.9 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-June period of the current crop year amounted to 324.0 million bushels 25 per cent above the 259.7 million exported during the same months of the preceding crop year. The balance remaining on July 1, 1961 for export and for carryover, amounted to 553.2 million bushels, slightly below the July 1, 1960 total of 555.2 million.

NOTE:

Due to the introduction of a new commodity classification, effective January 1, 1961, official wheat flour export data for June were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The flour export figure for June included in this report represents an unofficial estimate. No allowance has been made for June exports of bagged seed wheat.

Deliveries of wheat from farms (both east and west) up to July 19 of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 360.8 million bushels and represented an increase of 4 per cent over last year's corresponding total of 345.4 million. Of the current total, some 22.9 million bushels was accounted for by deliveries of durum wheat compared with 18.1 million of this type marketed during the same period of the preceding year. During the four weeks June 22 to July 19 total deliveries of wheat (both east and west) amounted to 44.6 million bushels while disappearance through licensed elevator channels (overseas clearances, plus imports into the United States, plus Canadian domestic use and including grain milled for subsequent export) during the same four weeks totalled some 31.6 million. With primary marketings exceeding domestic and export requirements, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased from 402.8 million bushels at the week ending June 21 to a level of 416.0 million at July 19, 1961.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at July 19, 1961 was 3 per cent less than the comparable 1960 total of 427.8 million bushels, but 8 per cent greater than the 1959 figure of 385.3 million. Stocks in country elevators, at 234.6 million bushels, accounted for 57 per cent of the current total and although 3 per cent less than the 241.6 million of a year ago were slightly above the 233.1 million of two years ago. Interior terminal stocks at July 19, 1961 amounted to 10.6 million bushels and represented declines from both the 1960 total of 11.8 million and the 1959 figure of 13.3 million bushels. Some 19.6 million bushels were "in transit rail" (Western Division), compared with 19.5 million a year ago and 13.9 million two years ago. Supplies at Fort William-Port Arthur at July 19, 1961 totalled 50.3 million bushels, 13 per cent below the 1960 total of 57.8 million, but 9 per cent above the 1959 figure of 45.9 million. Some 7.3 million bushels were "in transit lake" at July 19, 1961 and exceeded both the 5.1 million bushels of a year ago and 6.6 million of two years ago. The 39.1 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were considerably below the 1960 total of 43.0 million but well above the 33.5 million in 1959. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports amounted to 30.2 million bushels, above last year's comparable total of 28.2 million and exceeding by a substantial margin the 17.0 million of two years ago. Supplies in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria) totalled 12.8 million bushels and surpassed both the 8.9 million in 1960 and the 8.8 million in 1959.

May 1961 Exports of
Wheat Flour and Bagged
Seed Wheat Total 2.9
Million Bushels

Customs exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during May 1961 amounted to 2.8 million bushels, 15 per cent less than the April total of 3.3 million and 19 per cent below the adjusted May 1960 figure of 3.5 million bushels. Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first ten months

of the 1960-61 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the quivalent of 30.6 million bushels and represented a slight decrease from the adjusted August 1959-May 1960 total of 30.7 million bushels.

Exports of bagged seed wheat during May 1961, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 107 thousand bushels, compared with the April total of 938 thousand and the May 1960 adjusted figure of 224 thousand bushels. Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during the August-May period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 6.6 million bushels, 19 per cent more than the comparable 1959-60 adjusted total of 5.5 million.

June 1961 Exports of Wheat
Total 35.5 Million Bushels

Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of
Grain Commissioners) during June 1961 amounted to 35.5
million bushels, 16 per cent less than the May total of
42.2 million, but sharply above both the 21.0 million exported during June a year
ago and the ten-year (1950-59) average for the month of June of 28.4 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-June period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 284.7 million bushels, surpassing by 29 per cent both the comparable 1959-60 total of 220.1 million and the ten-year (1949-50--1958-59) August-June average of 220.6 million. The United Kingdom remaining in its position as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 72.8 million bushels and representing 26 per cent of the eleven-month total. During the August-June period of the 1959-60 crop year, shipments of wheat to the United Kingdom amounted to 76.4 million bushels and accounted for 35 per cent of the total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first eleven-months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 50.1 (40.8); Federal Republic of Germany, 31.1 (23.9); Communist China, 28.7 (nil); Italy, 14.9 (2.2); Czechoslovakia, 12.1 (nil); Belgium-Luxembourg, 11.7 (10.2); France, 9.3 (4.9); U.S.S.R. Russia, 7.5 (nil); Switzerland, 6.3 (7.6); Netherlands, 5.8 (7.9); and India, 4.0 (4.8).

Delivery Quota
Policy 1961-62

(General) No. 1 under date of July 27, 1961 announced in part that the Board wish to advise that all delivery quotas in effect in the 1960-61 crop year including specified acreage quotas, open quotas on oats and flax-seed, and all special permit authorizations, will automatically expire as at the close of business July 31, 1961.

Effective on and after August 1, 1961, the quota policy of the Board for 1961-62 crop year will be as follows:-

<u>Durum Wheat</u> Durum wheat is deliverable, until September 15, 1961, on an open quota basis, deliveries to be made to the delivery point indicated in the producer's 1961-62 delivery permit book.

Flaxseed is deliverable on an open quota basis for the crop year 1961-62. The Board, however, reserves the right to cancel this quota at any time.

All deliveries of flaxseed made during the crop year must be entered in the producer's permit book at the time of delivery and as in the previous year producers may deliver flaxseed within the quota authorized at their regular delivery point, to any delivery point selected by them at which space for flaxseed is available.

Malting, Pot and Pearling Barley The Board will again consider applications on behalf of producers of malting, pot and/or pearling barley, for permission to deliver, in excess of the established quotas, one carlot of such barley provided:-

- (a) A representative sample of such carlot has been submitted to and accepted by a maltster or shipper as suitable for malting, pot and/or pearling; and
- (b) A premium is to be paid to the producer for the carlot of barley so accepted.

Full details under the foregoing provisions have been announced in Instructions to the Trade re Quotas (General) No. 2 of July 27, 1961.

Initial Delivery Quota 1961-62 Crop Year - Wheat (excluding Durum), Oats, Barley and Rye Effective at all delivery points on and after August 1, 1961,

the following initial quota is hereby authorized in respect of the above grains:

An initial delivery quota applicable to all permit holders regardless of the acreage shown on their 1961 permit books of the equivalent of one hundred (100) units. Each such unit shall be the equivalent of three (3) bushels of Wheat or ten (10) bushels of Oats or five (5) bushels of Barley or five (5) bushels of Rye.

As space becomes available each permit holder will be entitled to deliver at his option any of the above grains or any combination of the above grains calculated on the unit basis, but his total deliveries under the initial quota must not exceed the equivalent of one hundred (100) units.

Under the above policy a permit holder will be entitled to deliver a maximum of 300 bushels of Wheat or 1,000 bushels of Oats or 500 bushels of Barley or 500 bushels of Rye, or any combination of these grains which, when calculated on the unit basis outlined above, does not exceed one hundred (100) units.

General Delivery Quotas 1961-62 Crop Year Following the initial quota, the Board will again establish general quotas at individual delivery points, based upon bushels per "specified" acre. The "specified" acreage upon which general delivery quotas will be based will consist of the total of each permit holder's acreage seeded to wheat (excluding Durum), oats, barley and rye, summerfallow, and the eligible acreage seeded to cultivated grasses and forage crops.

Crop Conditions in the Prairie Provinces

According to a telegraphic crop report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics under date of August 9, 1961, the weather has been hot and dry in Manitoba and Saskatchewan during the past week or so whereas in Alberta fair to good rains were received over

the past two weeks. Harvesting is well underway in southern and central districts of Saskatchewan, southeastern Alberta and southern Manitoba. Despite the adverse growing conditions wheat crops in particular have been filling remarkably well. Pastures and feed prospects have improved markedly in Alberta, to some extent in Manitoba and to a lesser degree over wide areas of Saskatchewan.

Rust Development in Western Canada, 1961 A release by the Canada Department of Agriculture Research Station, Winnipeg, under date of August 11, 1961 stated in part that the very dry weather that has prevailed during the

growing season of 1961 has resulted in a poor, early crop and has delayed rust development. There is little or no chance that the cereal rusts will cause damage in the rust area of Western Canada this year with the possible exception of a few late fields sown to susceptible varieties.

PFAA Payments Western grain growers who have been hard hit by drought can look forward to receiving financial aid under the Prairie Farm Assistance Act about Christmas or early in the new year. On August 1, 1961 Agriculture Minister Alvin Hamilton announced that PFAA plans to start issuing cheques in December and expects to have more than half of them in the mails by Christmas. Payments for this year will amount to upwards of \$60,000,000 -- highest since the program went into effect in 1939. Previous record was in 1954, when \$33,013,726 was paid out to farmers for crop losses. Payments under PFAA are based on half the cultivated acreage on a farm, to a maximum of 200 acres. The rate depends on the acreage yield in the township. If it is between five and eight bushels of wheat per acre, the rate is \$2.00 per cultivated acre; between three and five bushels, \$3.00; and three bushels or less \$4.00. Farmers contribute to the PFAA fund by a one per cent levy on grain which they market. The annual collections average about \$6 1/2 million a year. Because of the heavy payments which will be required this year, probably over \$50 million will have to be provided from public funds.

Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain

Total shipments of the five major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to July 19 this year amounted to 160.5 million bushels, some 26 per cent greater

than the 127.8 million shipped during the comparable period of 1960. The 1961 season of navigation opened on April 9 while the 1960 season opened on April 10. Shipments of wheat, at 123.8 million bushels, were 36 per cent above the 1960 comparable figure of 90.8 million and accounted for 77 per cent of the current total. Shipments of oats were also above last year's comparable level, while those of barley, rye and flaxseed moved in smaller volume this year than last.

General Quota Position The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade re Quotas (General) No. 32 under date of June 29, 1961 had announced that the maximum quota for the 1960-61 crop year

would be 7 bushels per specified acre. The first authorizations for this quota at points where sufficient space was available to warrant the increase were also announced June 29 and by the close of the crop year all stations were on the 7-bushel quota per specified acre.

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, July 19, 1961 Compared with Approximately the Same Date 1959 and 1960





Freight Assistance Shipments Claims filed for payment up to June 30, 1961 represent the movement of some 15.2 million bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-May period of the current crop year. During the corresponding period in 1959-60 claims had been filed

for a total of 16.4 million bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1960-61 August-May shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 7 per cent below those of 1959-60. Revised data on last year's August-May shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to June 30, 1961 place the ten-month total at 17.0 million bushels. About 73 per cent of the shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Ontario and Quebec.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate the movement of 485,742 tons during the first ten months of the 1960-61 crop year, three per cent above the comparable 1959-60 figure of 473,717 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the current crop year total is based on claims submitted up to June 30, 1961 and may be subject to considerable upward revision with the filing of additional claims. Shipments amounting to 235,829 tons and 142,275 tons to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, respectively, accounted for a combined 78 per cent of the August-May total.

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during June 1961 amounted to 3,150,000 hundred-weight, representing a decrease of 8 per cent from the May 1961 total of 3,425,000 hundredweight, 14 per cent below the adjusted June 1960 figure of 3,648,000 hundredweight and 10 per cent less than the ten-year (1951-60) average production for the month of June of 3,512,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during June 1961 had a total rated capacity of 155,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 78.2 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during June 1961 amounted to 7,057,000 bushels compared with 7,672,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 8,270,000 bushels milled during June 1960. Of the wheat milled for flour during June 1961, some 6,278,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the reaminder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (502,000 bushels); Durum (201,000 bushels); and all other (76,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during May 1961 amounted to 1,233,000 hundredweight (some 2,836,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) representing a decrease of 15 per cent from the 3,345,000 bushels exported in April 1961, and 19 per cent below the May 1960 adjusted total of 3,522,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to 47 countries with exports to the United Kingdom amounting to 996 thousand bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 35 per cent of the May 1961 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent, were as follows: Philippines, 397; United States, 190; Japan, 174; Ghana, 135; Trinidad, 127; and Jamaica, 108.

NOTE: Official wheat flour export data for June were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The figure for June included in this report represent an unofficial estimate.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Disappearance of United States Wheat Increased 15 per cent from Preceding Year Total disappearance (exports plus domestic use) of United States wheat during the crop year (July-June) 1960-61 amounted to 1,279.0 million bushels and exceeded by 15 per cent the 1959-60 comparable total of 1,116.0 million. The increase in total disappearance from the 1959-60 level was due

to a record export movement combined with a relatively small increase in domestic requirements. Preliminary data indicate that the 1960-61 exports of wheat, wheat flour and products in terms of grain equivalent amounted to 667.9 million bushels, representing an increase of 31 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 509.4 million and 22 per cent greater than the previous record of 549.5 million bushels exported during the crop year 1956-57. In addition, the 1960-61 exports of United States wheat exceeded domestic requirements for the first time in history. Exports of wheat as grain increased from 418.0 million in 1959-60 to 565.5 million in 1960-61 while exports of wheat flour and other wheat products were equivalent to 102.4 million bushels compared with 91.4 million in the preceding year. Domestic requirements in the crop year recently completed increased from an estimated 606.6 million bushels in 1959-60 to 611.1 million in 1960-61. Although total disappearance of United States wheat increased considerably during 1960-61, the effect of this movement was more than offset by record large carry-in stocks combined with a next-to-record production. As a result, the July 1, 1961 carryover stocks, at 1406.6 million bushels, were 7 per cent greater than the 1960 total of 1,313.5 million.

1961 Wheat Crop Forecast at 1,259 Million Bushels In a report released on July 11, the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated in part that production of all wheat is forecast at 1,259 million bushels, 7 per cent below last year but 15 per cent above

average. The indicated yield at 24.5 bushels per harvested acre is below the 26.0 bushels last year but well above the 19.7 bushel average.

Total acreage of all wheat harvested for grain is expected to be 51.4 million acres, 1 per cent below last year and 9 per cent below average. Acreage seeded last fall and this spring totalled 55.5 million acres, up 1 per cent from last year but 15 per cent below average. Abandonment and diversion is expected to be 7.3 per cent of planted acres compared with 5.5 per cent last year but well below the 13.7 per cent average.

Harvest of a bumper crop moved along rapidly during June. The winter wheat crop is forecast at 1,116 million bushels, second largest on record, - 1 per cent above the big crop last year and a third above average. The yield forecast at 27.5 bushels per acre is 0.1 bushel under the 1960 yield and 1.1 bushels below the record in 1958.

The acreage seeded to winter wheat last fall, 43.3 million acres, was 1 per cent above the previous year. The change in major winter wheat States was generally small as allotments remained about the same as for 1960. However, in some northern States, acreage of winter wheat increased sharply. The acreage to be harvested for grain is estimated at 40.5 million acres, 1 per cent above last year and average. Abandonment of planted acreage, including diversion to uses other than for grain, is indicated at 6.3 per cent, about the same as last year. Drought caused some acreage losses in South Dakota and Montana.

Durum wheat production is forecast at 16.5 million bushels, less than half the 1960 crop and a third below average. This would be the smallest production since the rust epidemic of 1954 and reflects the serious moisture deficiency that grips the major durum wheat producing areas. The sharp decline in production represents a significant reduction in acres for harvest as well as a sharp drop in yield. The prospective yield per harvested acre of 10.8 bushels is only about half the previous year and 3 bushels below average. The shortage of soil moisture on July 1 placed a considerable acreage in doubt.

Durum wheat was planted on 1.7 million acres in 1961, slightly more than the acreage planted in 1960 but below average. Much of the acreage was seeded under limited soil moisture conditions, germinated slowly, and made only limited seasonal growth. Plants are heading on short straw with only poor to fair head development. Abandonment is expected to be unusually heavy in local areas and to total more than 10 per cent for the durum area. The acreage for harvest is expected to be 1.5 million acres.

Production of spring wheat other than durum is forecast at 126 million bushels, the smallest since the drought year of 1936 and only slightly more than half the 10-year average. Prolonged dry weather over much of the important producing area reduced yields sharply and resulted in significant decreases in harvested acreage. The expected yield of 13.5 bushels per harvested acre barely exceeds the yield in the disastrous rust epidemic 1954 and is more than 7 bushels below last year.

Planted acreage of spring wheat other than durum is estimated at 10.5 million acres, the second lowest of record although barely under last year. Moderate to substantial acreage increases in States having favourable early season moisture were more than offset by significant declines in North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Utah, and Colorado — areas showing a deficiency of soil moisture or limited irrigation water supplies. A majority of the seeded acreage made poor early season growth with more than 10 per cent of the acreage expected to be abandoned largely because of the drought. The 9.4 million acres expected to be harvested is the smallest since 1934 and the second smallest of record dating from 1919.

Wheat Carryover
Amounts to a Record
1,407 Million Bushels

On July 24, the United States Department of Agriculture reported that wheat stocks stored in all positions on July 1 totalled 1,407 million bushels and were a record high for the third consecutive year. These carryover stocks were 7 per cent

larger than the previous year and 81 per cent above average. Total stocks were 4 per cent larger than the 1960 production with over 90 per cent of the stocks either Government owned or under CCC loan. Off-farm wheat stocks of 1,271 million bushels were the largest of record and 4 per cent above a year earlier.

The Crop Reporting Board, U.S.D.A., in its Crop Production Report, under date of July 11 stated in part that stocks of old-crop wheat on farms on July 1 are estimated at 136 million bushels, 10 per cent of the 1960 production. These stocks were 42 per cent above stocks on farms a year ago and the largest carryover since 1943. Stocks of wheat in the Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas, Montana and Colorado amounted to 90 per cent of the Nation's total.

USDA to Relax Price-Support Requirements for Light-Weight Wheat On July 25, 1961 the U.S. Department of Agriculture relaxed 1961-crop wheat price-support requirements to include light-weight wheat that otherwise would not be eligible for support. Wheat stem rust in

Nebraska has caused considerable light-weight wheat and protracted drought in States farther North is apt to result in additional quantities as the harvest progresses. By broadening the eligibility requirements, price support will be made more generally available to farmers in these and other areas, preventing a demoralized market price for this quality of wheat and encouraging more orderly marketing.

Secretary Freeman Sets
Aug. 24 as Referendum
Date on 1962 Wheat Quotas

On July 27, 1961 Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman set August 24 as the date on which wheat producers will choose whether or not wheat marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1962 wheat crop.

"The decision that farmers make is extremely important to them and to the rest of the Nation not only for 1962 but also for many years to come," Secretary Freeman said. "The program available with quotas in effect would be far different from that which could be operated without quotas."

If farmers choose to favor quotas in the August 24 referendum, cooperators will be eligible for full 1962 wheat price support. Although the level of support has not definitely been determined, this support will be higher than the present level of \$1.79 per bushel, which is 75 per cent of June 1 parity, if proposed legislation now before the Congress becomes law. Earlier this week at a press conference Secretary Freeman said that the national average support for wheat would likely be in the neighborhood of \$2.00 per bushel.

If farmers decide in their vote not to favor quotas, there will be no limit on marketings, price support would be at 50 per cent of parity (wheat parity is now \$2.37 per bushel) and would be available to those farmers who plant within their acreage allotments.

Before quotas can be put into effect, at least twothirds of the producers voting in the referendum must approve.

On May 12, Secretary Freeman proclaimed marketing quotas and a national acreage allotment of 55 million acres for the 1962 wheat crop on the basis of estimated supplies and utilization of wheat. At that time he deferred setting the referendum date pending action to provide an improved wheat program for next year's crop.

"Even though action has not yet been completed on a new program for wheat producers," Secretary Freeman explained, "it seems desirable to now set a date for the referendum on 1962 wheat marketing quotas in order that all producers may be apprised of the voting time. It is hoped that this will result in the widest possible participation in the referendum process through which producers make their desires known.

"Government stocks of wheat are already nearly 1 1/4 billion bushels and would probably increase by another 100 million bushels if the program for 1962 is not changed. Under legislation now being considered, stocks would probably be reduced by 100 million bushels rather than increased by 100 million. This would result in savings to the Government on this one crop of \$50 million in the first crop year, and in the period before new stocks could be disposed of at present rates the savings on this one crop would amount to \$258 million."

The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce estimated wheat flour production in the United States during June 1961 at 20,323,000 hundredweight, an average of 924,000 hundredweight per working day. This compared with an average output per working day of 943,000 hundredweight during May and 925,000 hundredweight in June 1960. Production of wheat flour during June was at 85.1 per cent of capacity compared with 87.0 per cent and 85.8 per cent, respectively, for the previous month and the same month a year ago. Flour mills during June ground 46,124,000 bushels of wheat compared with 47,116,000 bushels during the previous month. Wheat offal output during June amounted to 378,648 tons.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position (December-November) crop year amount to 203.9 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 58.4 million and the new crop, officially placed at 145.5 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a sharp decline in production and a decrease of less than 1 per cent in carryover stocks, are about 25 per cent less than the 1959-60 total of 273.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 139.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 64.2 million are available for export and for carryover in contrast to 146.8 million in 1959-60.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1960-June 1961 amounted to 29.7 million bushels, compared with 48.5 million exported during the same months in 1959-60. The balance remaining on July 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 34.5 million bushels, substantially below the July 1, 1960 total of 98.3 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.O.R. Rousseau, Commercial Secretary, Buenos Aires, under date of July 28, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioners Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 83 pesos per U.S. dollar less 20 per cent retention.

Weather and Crops The optimistic outlook prevalent at the end of last June, especially in some trade circles in the province of Santa Fé, seems now to have been somewhat exaggerated. The official monthly crop report

for June, recently published, provides a more sober outlook, as do most recent reports from reliable trade circles in this city. As reported officially, rainfall during the month of June was insufficient to counteract the extreme drought conditions prevailing in some regions of the country. Even though these rains were able to effect a recovery in some grain growing regions, in others, things took a turn for the worse, especially in central and northwestern Buenos Aires province. During June rainfall of varying intensity was registered in the provinces of Buenos Aires, Entre Rios, Corrientes, Misiones, northeastern Santa Fé, etc. There were some hail storms in southwestern Buenos Aires and in the province of Entre Rios. Temperatures ranged from subnormal to well above average. Frosts covered practically the whole of the country, and snow was prevalent in most southern regions.

During the month of July, rains became more widespread and intense, but in some areas it seems they were too late for the seeding of some grains, including wheat, and so it is expected that much land will be sown to flax. However, these rains will benefit the crops already seeded. There were heavy rain storms during the week July 16 to 22, that covered extensive areas, but the weather now seems to be clear, cold and settled in most parts of the country, with only scattered rains and frosts.

Wheat The Secretary of Agriculture and Livestock recently indicated that an increase of about 10 per cent in wheat production this year was possible. Drought conditions played havor with seeding plans in some areas of the province of Cordoba and of southwestern Buenos Aires, and seeding was not always completed in these areas. The crops already growing are in generally good shape, and the most advanced fields have already reached the clustering stage.

At the end of June there was a firm home market for wheat, as millers wanted to cover their stocks up to the end of the year, and an average price of 460 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.51 per bushel) was paid in Rosario and Santa Fé. The Grain Board has not yet started to sell in quantity from its own stocks, which include some 500,000 metric tons (18,372,000 bushels) of new crop grain, and also some 250,000 to 300,000 tons (9,186,000 to 11,023,000 bushels) of the 1959-60 and earlier crops.

Prices in the Buenos Aires Cereal Exchange average at present 452 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.48 per bushel), for hard wheat grade 1, 80 kilos per hectolitre basis (64 pounds per bushel) and 442 pesos (\$1.45 per bushel) for semihard wheat of the same quality.

Wheat shipments totalled 48,043 metric tons (1,765,000 bushels) during June, which was the lowest figure since February 1958, 52,000 metric tons (1,911,000 bushels) in that month. Peru was the main customer during June, buying 20,400 tons (750,000 bushels), followed by Italy with 17,589 tons (646,000 bushels), Bolivia with 4,900 tons (180,000 bushels), Paraguay with 3,754 tons (138,000 bushels) and Belgium with 1,400 tons (51,000 bushels).

It is of interest to note from the results of a recent survey made by the National Grain Board, that the quality of Argentine wheat shipped during 1959 compared in general favourably with that shipped during 1960.

Elimination of The long awaited elimination of the "retentions" levied at present on almost all exports of agriculture, livestock and forestry products seems now to be imminent, according to an announcement just released by the Secretariat of Agriculture and Livestock. This will indeed benefit the competitive position of Argentine grains, oilseeds and byproducts, many of which are still taxed with a 10 per cent retention, calculated on the basis of the so-called "index value".

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1960-61 (December-November) crop year amount to some 331.2 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 60.3 million and the current crop estimated at a record 270.9 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated, reflecting a substantially larger production which more than offset a decline in carryover, represent an increase of 26 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 263.2 million bushels. After deducting 77.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 254.2 million are available for export and for carryover during 1960-61, 38 per cent above the 184.1 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent up to June 24 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 129.7 million bushels compared with 69.5 million exported during the corresponding period of 1959-60. The balance remaining on June 25, 1961 for export and for carryover, at 124.5 million bushels, exceeded by 9 per cent the comparable 1960 total of 114.6 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, under date of July 14, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of £1 equals \$2.3013 (Canadian) the quotation in effect on July 17, 1961.

Crop Position A general review of weather reports for the wheat growing areas of the various States of Australia would indicate that several of these areas are suffering from drought conditions and seeding has been delayed pending the arrival of much needed rain.

In Western Australia seeding has been completed in most areas and prospects look good. In the northwestern wheatbelt of New South Wales conditions are bad but the remainder of the wheat growing area of this State at this writing seems satisfactory. In Victoria rain is badly needed in the Mallee and Wimmera districts, the principal wheat regions of this State. A general rain of half to one-and-a-half inches is badly needed in South Australia to enable seeding to be continued. Follow-up rains within the next few weeks will be of great benefit to Queensland growers where wheat planting is well in progress in many areas.

In summary the size of the overall wheat planting acreage depends on weather conditions for the next fortnight. However, it is still unlikely, as reported last month, that the 15 million acre record seeding will be achieved.

Because of the low wheat stocks as a result of the huge sales early in the season, the Australian Wheat Board has refused to sell wheat on credit terms to Bulgaria. Mr. C.J. Perrett, General Manager of the Board said that Bulgaria wanted to buy between 1.5 and 1.75 million bushels on terms. The Board, however, would consider a cash sale. He said that the refusal was not meant to indicate that Bulgaria was a bad credit risk. Cash sales were the Board's policy for any other country. The Board, explained Mr. Perrett, had made an exception with Communist China because of the size of the sale - £20 million (\$46 million) - and because of the previous cash sales, worth £27 million (\$62 million), to China.

FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of August 9, 1961, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Weather weather conditions have fluctuated considerably during the last month with varying effects on the crops in different regions. Considerable rain fell during a stormy period about the middle of July, but the harvest, which in most areas is under way, should be satisfactory, with indications that the total cereal production will be just slightly above the 1956-60 average. Generally, winter cereals in terms of condition and yield are doing somewhat better than the spring-seeded crops. Crop forecasts compared with last year's estimates indicate that wheat production (not including durums) may be down about 1.4 million metric tons to 9.6 million tons (52.8 to 351.9 million bushels). Barley production may also be reduced this year.






