
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

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WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Current Supplies Latest available estimates indicate that supplies of wheat remaining on or about January 1, 1961 in the four major exporting countries for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,797.5 million bushels, exceeding by 8 per cent the 2,598.4 million available a year ago. Supplies at January 1, 1961, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,778.3 (1,611.6); Canada, 744.7 (681.4); Argentina, 52.2 (134.8); and Australia, 222.3 (170.6). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

The newly harvested 1959-60 crops in the Argentine and Australia are taken into consideration in the above estimates. It is noted that supplies available in the United States, Canada and Australia at January 1, 1961 are at higher levels this year than last, while supplies in Argentina are lower.

Exports

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the four major exporting countries during the August-December period of the current Canadian crop year, at 466.8 million bushels, were some 26 per cent above the 369.4 million exported during the same months of 1959. On a percentage basis, shipments from the four countries during August-December 1960 were shared as follows, with corresponding percentages for the same months of 1959 in brackets: United States, 52 (45); Canada, 28 (36); Argentina, 8 (6); and Australia, 12 (13). Shipments from each of the four countries during August-December of the current (Canadian) and ten preceding crop years are shown in the table below.

Near-Record 1960 World Breadgrain Crop Confirmed

According to a January report of the Foreign Agricultural Circular published by the Foreign Agricultural Service U.S.D.A. world breadgrain production in 1960 is estimated at 285 million short tons, according to the latest information available to the

Foreign Agricultural Service. This is about the same as the 1959 total and has been exceeded only once, in 1958. The current estimate is 2 per cent below the pre-

liminary September forecast mainly because estimates for the Soviet Union have been reduced to reflect losses from bad weather during the late growing and harvesting season.

Though total breadgrain production is estimated the same as last year, significant differences are noted between the 2 years. Increased wheat production is offset by a smaller world crop of rye. World wheat production in 1960 is now estimated at 8,300 million bushels and rye at 1,270 million.

On a regional basis, the most significant increase over 1959 wheat production is in North America where a 9-per cent increase is reported. Smaller increases for Asia and Australia are partly offset by reductions in Europe, the Soviet Union, and South America. Rye production is somewhat smaller than the 1959 harvest in both Europe and the Soviet Union, which together produce more than 90 per cent of the world rye crop.

In <u>North America</u>, wheat production is placed at 1,905 million bushels, compared with the small crop of 1,594 million in 1959. This is a record total for the area because of a near-record U.S. outturn and a fairly good harvest in Canada. Rye production, at 41 million bushels, is above average.

The wheat crop for all <u>Europe</u> is still estimated at 1,900 million bushels, compared with the 1959 record total of 2,055 million. Reductions occurred in both Western and Eastern Europe. Lower quality wheat, as well as reduced production, is reported for a number of countries. Rye production in Europe is estimated at 690 million bushels, 7 per cent below the large 1959 crop.

Unfavourable weather in parts of the <u>Soviet Union</u> apparently reduced grain crops below their expected level, and the actual or "barn harvest" of breadgrains is now believed to be less than in 1959. Earlier prospects were for larger outturns than last year.

Asia's 1960 wheat crop is still estimated at 1,965 million bushels. This is moderately above the 1959 total of 1,905 million bushels and is 11 per cent above the 1950-54 average. A good part of the increase over 1959 is in Turkey, where a record crop is reported.

Wheat production in Africa is placed at 205 million bushels, slightly above last year's harvest. The principal increase is in Algeria where a record crop of about 55 million bushels is reported. This offsets reductions in a number of other countries.

Harvesting is now progressing in Southern Hemisphere countries. In <u>South America</u>, the forecast wheat crop of 275 million bushels is well below average. The principal factor is the outlook for a smaller crop in Argentina. The current forecast of 190 million bushels is about 25 million bushels less than last year as well as below average. (Editor's Note, the second official estimate of the 1960-61 wheat crop in Argentina places production at 147 million bushels.) In contrast with that reduction, Uruguay's crop is getting back toward normal after 2 successive crop failures. The current estimate is about three times last year's low production.

In <u>Australia</u>, a record wheat crop is forecast. Current forecasts range from 225 to 250 million bushels. Last year's outturn was 198 million and the 1950-54 average was 181 million.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Supply Position

Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1960-61 crop year are placed at 1,027.2 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 537.6 million and the 1960 production of 489.6 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 7 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 962.5 million bushels. After deducting an estimated 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 would amount to 877.2 million bushels, 8 per cent above the 814.9 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-December period of the current crop year amounted to 132.5 million bushels compared with 133.5 million exported during the same months of the preceding crop year. The balance remaining on January 1, 1961 for export and for carryover, amounted to 744.7 million bushels, 9 per cent more than the January 1, 1960 total of 681.4 million.

Farmers' deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to January 18 of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 156.0 million bushels exceeding by 11 per cent last year's corresponding total of 140.6 million. Of the current total, some 21.5

million bushels was accounted for by marketings of durum wheat in contrast to only 7.3 million bushels of this type delivered during a comparable period a year ago. During the four weeks December 22 to January 18 total marketings of wheat (both east and west) amounted to 31.5 million bushels while disappearance of Canadian wheat through licensed elevator channels (overseas clearances, plus imports into the United States, plus Canadian domestic use and including grain milled for subsequent export) during the same four weeks totalled some 20.1 million bushels. With primary deliveries exceeding export and domestic requirements, the total visable supply of Canadian wheat increased from 423.7 million bushels at the week ending December 21 to a level of 435.2 million at January 18, 1961.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at January 18, 1961 was 14 per cent greater than both the comparable 1960 total of 382.9 million bushels and the 1959 figure of 381.0 million. Stocks in country elevators, at 256.2 million bushels, represented 14 per cent of the total and surpassed by considerable margins, both the 240.7 million of a year ago and 222.6 million of two years ago. Interior terminal stocks at January 18, 1961 amounted to 11.1 million bushels and represented declines from both the 1960 and 1959 comparable totals of 12.1 million and 13.2 million bushels, respectively. "In transit rail" (Western Division) accounted for 15.3 million bushels as against 9.1 million a year ago and 13.1 million two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead at January 18, 1961 totalled 51.0 million bushels, 47 per cent greater than the comparable 1960 total of 34.8 million and 18 per cent more than the 1959 figure of 43.2 million. The 37.5 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports exceeded both the 33.7 million of a year ago and 27.5 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports amounted to 25.9 million bushels, 59 per cent greater than the 1960 total of 16.3 million and 35 per cent more than the 19.2 million in 1959. Some 14.9 million bushels were in "Storage Afloat" at January 18, 1961, above the 13.7 million of a year ago but below the 17.6 million of two years ago. Supplies in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria) totalled 6.7 million bushels, representing declines from both the 1960 and 1959 totals of 6.9 million and 7.4 million bushels, respectively.

December 1960 Exports of Wheat and Flour Total 24.0 Million Bushels

Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat, and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1960 amounted to 24.0 million bushels, compared with the November total of 28.2 million and the December 1959

figure of 24.3 million bushels. The ten-year (1949-58) average exports of these commodities for the month of December was 19.9 million bushels. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during December 1960, at 20.2 million bushels, were below the 23.2 million exported during the preceding month and relatively unchanged from the December 1959 total of 20.3 million. Exports of bagged seed wheat during December 1960, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 657 thousand bushels, 32 per cent above the November figure of 497 thousand but below the December 1959 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 881 thousand bushels. Customs returns also indicate that the equivalent of 3.1 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during December 1960, representing decreases from both the November total of 4.4 million and the adjusted December 1959 exports of 3.2 million.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-December period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 115.3 million bushels, almost the same as the comparable 1959 total of 115.8 million. The United Kingdom, remaining in its position as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 37.4 million bushels and representing 32 per cent of the five-month total. During the August-December period of the 1959-60 crop year shipments of wheat to the United Kingdom amounted to 39.0 million bushels and accounted for 34 per cent of the total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first five months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year

in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 21.1 (16.5); Federal Republic of Germany, 15.4 (14.7); Italy, 10.9 (2.1); Belgium-Luxembourg, 5.1 (6.2); Netherlands, 4.2 (5.1); Switzerland, 4.2 (3.5); and France, 3.6 (2.3). Customs exports of bagged seed wheat during August-December of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 1.7 million bushels compared with the adjusted total of 1.8 million exported during the same months of the preceding year.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first five months of the 1960-61 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 15.5 million bushels and represented only a slight decrease from the adjusted August-December 1959 total of 15.9 million bushels. As with bulk wheat, the United Kingdom was also the major market for Canadian wheat flour. Shipments of wheat flour to that country during the period under review amounted to the equivalent of 5.3 million bushels and accounted for 34 per cent of the August-December 1960 total. During the same months of the 1959-60 crop year shipments of wheat flour to the United Kingdom amounted to the equivalent of 6.1 million bushels and represented 38 per cent of the total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-December period of the 1960-61 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Lebanon, 1,287 (19); Philippines, 1,142 (2,278); Ghana, 729 (784); Trinidad, 630 (999); Jamaica, 615 (716); Norway, 570 (nil); Japan, 566 (466); United States, 473 (592); Leeward-Windward Islands, 472 (451); Cuba, 423 (13); and Hong Kong, 353 (346).

Announcement of Sale of Wheat to Russia

The Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Agriculture, speaking in the House of Commons on January 30, 1961, stated in part that "I should like to confirm to the house and

announce that negotiations have been completed and 200,000 tons or approximately 7.3 million bushels of wheat have been sold to Russia".

Announcement of Grain Sale to China

Speaking in the House of Commons on February 2, 1961, the Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Agriculture, stated in part that "I am pleased to announce that the efforts of

the government to sell grain to new markets have resulted in one of the largest single sales ever consummated in the commercial field. Agreement with the China Resources Company of Hong Kong has been reached for the sale and shipment to China during the next few months of 40 million bushels of grain. The breakdown is as follows: 750,000 long tons of wheat, equivalent to 28 million bushels; 260,000 long tons of barley, representing 12,133,000 bushels.

The grade of wheat will be mostly No. 2 Manitoba northern, which is the predominant grade available in Canada. There will be a limited quantity of No. 3 Manitoba northern. The barley will be No. 1 feed.

The total value of this sale is approximately \$60 million. The wheat and barley will be shipped from the Pacific coast ports of Vancouver, New Westminster, Victoria and Prince Rupert.

The Canadian wheat board negotiated the agreement for the Canadian government. The Canadian grain trade, acting as agents of the Canadian wheat board, will be completing delivery and shipment of the individual cargoes, and will undertake the necessary arrangements in connection therewith.

I know that all Canadians will be pleased at the size of the sale. I would like at this time to pay tribute to my predecessor who was in charge of the wheat board before he became Minister of Veterans Affairs (Mr. Churchill). He made the decision for representatives of the Canadian wheat board to go to China

Farmers' Marketings by Crop Districts 1959-60

British Columbia marketed 378.5 million bushels of wheat during the 1959-60 crop year according to revised figures compiled by the Statistics Branch of the Board of Grain Commissioners.

In the following tables, farmers' deliveries are shown by the marketing channel employed, i.e., through country elevators, directly to interior private and mill elevators, etc. Deliveries to country elevators are, in turn, broken down by provinces and crop districts.





Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 189,071 tons during the August-November period of the current crop year. During the same four months of 1959 claims had been filed for a total of 190,328 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about one per cent below those of 1959. Revised data on the 1959 August-November shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1960 place the four-month total at 211,531 tons. CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during December 1960 amounted to 3,145,000 hundredweight, representing a decrease of 18 per cent from the November 1960 output of 3,835,000 hundredweight, 3 per cent less than the December 1959 figure of 3,238,000 hundredweight and 7 per cent lower than the ten-year (1950-59) average production for the month of December of 3,388,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during December 1960 had a total rated capacity of 151,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 80.0 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during December 1960 amounted to 7.1 million bushels compared with 8.6 million bushels milled during the previous month and 7.4 million bushels milled during December 1959. Of the wheat milled for flour during December 1960, some 6,322,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (438,000 bushels); Durum (250,000 bushels); and all other (56,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during
December 1960 amounted to 1,358,000 hundredweight (some 3,124,000 bushels of wheat
equivalent), compared with 4,441,000 bushels exported during the preceding month and the adjusted
December 1959 total of 3,168,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty-six countries
with exports to the United Kingdom amounting to 1,211,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting
for 39 per cent of the December total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour during the
month with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent were as follows: Philippines, 266;
Japan, 196; Ghana, 165; Jamaica, 157; Trinidad, 141; Leeward and Windward Islands, 138; Nigeria, 110;
and Norway, 109.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Position

Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1960-61 crop year are estimated at 2,678.3 million bushels, consisting of the July 1 carryover of 1,314.9 million and the 1960 crop, now placed at 1,363.4 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of about 11 per cent over the previous peak of 2,421.8 million bushels a year ago. Imports of wheat from Canada during the July-December period of the current United States crop year amounted to 3.0 million bushels, compared with 2.7 million during the same months of the preceding crop year. After deducting an estimated 609 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, some 2,072.3 million remain available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 compared with 1,817.3 million in 1959-60.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during the first six months (July-December) of the 1960-61 United States crop year amounted to 294.0 million bushels, 43 per cent greater than the 205.7 million exported during the same months in 1959. The balance remaining on January 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,778.3 million bushels compared with 1,611.6 million on the same date a year ago.

Stocks of Wheat in All Positions January 1, 1961 On January 24, 1961 the United States Department of Agriculture reported that wheat stocks at 2,066 million bushels in all storage positions were a January 1 record for the third successive year — 10 per cent above a year earlier and 60 per cent

above average. The large stocks result from carryover of old crops nearly equalling the large 1960 production. Disappearance of wheat from all storage positions during the October-December quarter was 279 million bushels, about 9 per cent greater than the same quarter a year earlier.

Stocks showed an increase over a year earlier in farm storage, commercial storage, and in Government owned or controlled storage. In Kansas, holdings were well over one-fourth the United States total and also increased about one-tenth from a year earlier. Nearly three-fourths of the United States stocks were either Government owned or under price support.

The Crop Reporting Board, U.S.D.A. in its Crop Production report under date of January 10, 1961 stated in part that January 1 stocks of wheat on farms, at 421 million bushels, were 28 per cent above a year earlier and 20 per cent above average. The January 1 stocks were equivalent to about 31 per cent of the 1960 production compared with 29 per cent held a year earlier and the average 32 per cent. About 35 per cent of the wheat on farms January 1 was from the 1960 and earlier crops under Government farm-stored loan—a little lower percentage but a greater volume than a year earlier.

Crop and Weather Conditions

The following extract has been taken from the Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin published by the United States Department of Commerce for the week ending January 30, 1961. Scattered, light snows in most major-producing areas during the week were encouraging, but

the snow cover is still considerably below normal. Low temperatures in the northern Great Plains are expected to cause some freezeout of winter wheat. Soil surfaces continued dry throughout much of the central Great Plains, and minor soil blowing has occurred. Winter wheat remained dormant under a cover of snow and ice in the southern Great Plains area. Drought conditions continued in the Great Basin.

Continued mild temperatures and adequate moisture in the Far Northwest were ideal for growth of fall-seeded grains. The recent addition to the snow cover in the Great Lakes and northeastern area is believed sufficient to help legumes and fall-sown grains withstand the sharp decline in temperatures.

Light to heavy rains and warmer temperatures greatly improved the prospects for small grain crops in California and Arizona. In Texas, however, small grain growth was at a standstill for the fourth consecutive week. Wheat, oats, and barley were in fair to poor condition in the Gulf and southeastern parts of the country. Cold, wet weather retarded growth of small grains in these areas for the second consecutive week.

in 1958 and again in the fall of 1960. I have carried on with his plans for the expansion of wheat and flour sales to all parts of the world, but I feel that credit should go where credit is due.

The Canadian wheat board, and all others who helped, deserve our appreciation. The government's policy of accelerated wheat sales is illustrated by the fact that Canada's share of the commercial wheat markets of the world has increased from 30 per cent to 35 per cent.

I am informed that when all commitments are considered the Pacific coast ports will be utilized to full grain capacity until next August, and the heavy movement of western grain during the next few months should have a beneficial result on the Canadian economy generally and more particularly to the workers handling grain, and to the farmers".

By January 30, 1961 out of a total of 1,997 shipping points in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 547 points on a quota of 3 bushels per specified acre. The largest number, 1,081 points, were on a 2-bushel quota, while only 369 points were on a 1-bushel quota.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position

Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1960-61 (December-November) crop year amount to some 310.6 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 60.6 million and the current crop estimated at a record 250.0 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated, reflecting a substantially larger production which more than offset a decline in carryover, represent an increase of 18 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 263.2 million bushels. After deducting 74.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 236.6 million are available for export and for carryover during 1960-61, 28 per cent above the 184.4 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent up to January 7 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 14.3 million bushels compared with 13.8 million exported during the corresponding period of 1959-60. The balance remaining on January 8, 1961 for export and for carryover, at 222.3 million bushels, exceeded by 30 per cent the comparable 1960 total of 170.6 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, under date of January 17, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Crop Situation

The Australian Wheat Board has raised its estimate of the volume of wheat to be received from the 1960-61 harvest from 225 million bushels to 236 million bushels. Receipts from this all time record harvest are expected to exceed the previous year's deliveries to the Board by 58 million bushels.

This total of 236 million bushels compares with 178 million bushels received last year. The increase is attributed to an increase of 1 million acres of land sown to wheat and a better growing season in all States except for Queensland that suffered drought conditions.

Generally, the grain has been harvested under good weather conditions, although storms did occur in some States, during harvest, which affected the moisture content in a few isolated areas. Overall, however, the quality of the grain is good. Delivery of wheat is almost concluded in every State except Victoria where it will be another month before all the wheat has been received by the Board.

Sir John Teasdale, Chairman of the Board, in making the announcement regarding the latest estimate of receipts from the 1960-61 harvest, issued a word of warning to Australian wheat growers. He told them that though more favourable market reports are evident in Europe and the opening out of trade in the Orient has resulted in substantial sales, both of these are the result of scasonal conditions. His announcement underlined the fact that the long-term problem of over production still remains to confront wheat growers in America, Canada and Australia. That being true, the Board can see no justification for a swing away from wool production to wheat.

Marketing

Position

Though there have been, and continue to be, increased sales to

Europe and to the Orient and forecasts of record exports have
been made, everything points to the fact that Australia will

join the ranks of those wheat growing countries of the world faced with embarrassing surpluses.

The Wheat Board's vigorous selling policy and search for new markets produced near record sales last season. This policy is to be continued this season.

A sale of 20,000 tons (1,030,000 bushels) of flour was announced in Melbourne on the week of January 9, by the president of the Australian Flour Mill Owners' Council. This is in addition to an earlier sale of 300,000 tons (11,200,000 bushels) of wheat, the largest made to China in the past 20 years. The flour sale is the first to have been made to the Chinese mainland since 1939. Though the Wheat Board handled this sale, a private Australian trading company negotiated the details with the Chinese Government which apparently wanted the flour because of the partial failure of China's wheat crop. According to trade reports there are good prospects for further sales.

FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Miss V.F. Wightman, Agricultural Attache, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of January 19, 1961, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from French to Canadian measures have been made and rounded for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of one new franc equals .20 Canadian dollars.

Weather

and Crops

winter grains in France remain well below normal. At the beginning of December the area seeded to winter wheat was only half of average. Short periods of dry weather since then have permitted some progress but by the beginning of January wheat sowings were still 36 per cent below the same period last year. The delay in seeding to winter barley is less marked, at 13.2 per cent, and for oats 25.4 per cent. However, feed grains are sown mainly in the spring, and the delay in winter wheat is the more serious.

The degree of sowingscompared with last year varies by region. The West and Southwest of the country has been the most severely affected. In the Loire Valley sowings are only 39 per cent of last year's level. In the important grain districts of northern France, the percentage ranges from 68 to 76 per cent of last year. Field work continues wherever possible and there have not to date (mid-January) been heavy frosts. The condition of sowings is poor in many areas due to the excessive soil moisture, which has in places led to flooding.

Farmers' Deliveries from farms to country elevators by December 1 are given below. Wheat deliveries remained below the previous year, but registered an improvement over previous months. Barley marketings continued a third above the 1959 crop. Corn showed the same level as the previous crop, but this reflected the late harvest and true availabilities (estimated at somewhat over a million tons) will show over the next few months.

Wheat With the uncertainty over the 1961 crop, and lower deliveries off farms up to the present, the supply position of wheat is now considered tighter than was the case a few months earlier. Total wheat marketings were originally estimated close to the 1959-60 figure of 7.4 million tons (271,900,000 bushels); at present a figure of 7 or 7.1 million tons (257,203,000 or 260,877,000 bushels) is considered the maximum.

Certain measures have been taken by the French Government in view of this situation:

1.) the subsidized feeding program terminated on January 1. This consisted of sale of denatured wheat to farmers and to the feed industry; only supplies for poultry feed continue. This program involved a reported subsidy of 11.65 NF per quintal (63 cents per bushel); it is lower than the export subsidy latterly ranging 16.60 - 17.70 NF per quintal (90-96 cents per bushel) for feed wheat but has probably replaced barley which is also in surplus position. Some half million tons (18,372,000 bushels) of wheat have been placed under this program.

- 2.) a quota was established for import of seed wheat for spring sowings from the convertability area (OEEC countries, Canada and U.S.A.). This is to supplement the 50,000 tons (1,837,000 bushels) of high quality wheat blocked at country elevators for use as seed.
- 3.) the target carryover at July 31 next is increased to 1 million tons (36,743,000 bushels), compared with an actual carryover of around 650,000 tons (23,883,000 bushels) at the close of the last two crop years.

The French government also announced its intention of cancelling measures to reduce wheat sowings, i.e. exoneration from levy contributing towards export losses for growers who undertook to decrease deliveries by 15 per cent during 1959-61.

By mid January, France had contracted for the sale of some 800,000 tons (29,395,000 bushels) of wheat and flour. This figure includes sales of 125,000 tons (4,593,000 bushels) to Morocco and 35,000 tons (1,286,000 bushels) to Tunisia but excludes the remainder of the franc zone. Flour sales totalled 130,000 tons (4,777,000 bushels), wheat equivalent.

As a result of the tighter supply position, French export sales have slackened. It is expected that sales will continue for the remainder of the crop year at a slower pace. Official policy is to remain on the export market. At the same time, imports will be brought in to make up any deficit and, in particular to replace the higher quality wheat which has been reserved for seeding. It is also expected that the remaining deficit in Algeria, estimated at 100,000 tons (3,674,000 bushels), will be bought from foreign sources.

As indicated above, barley marketings have averaged a third above the past crop year. With abundant feed reserves on the domestic market, barley has presented the main marketing problem, particularly as international prices declined in the fall, and the subsidy to move exports rose accordingly. However, France has succeeded in placing nearly a half million tons (22,965,000 bushels) of barley and sales continue at a regular pace. The export subsidy, as published in the trade press, has lately ranged around 14.45-17.45 NF per quintal (63-76 cents per bushel).

Corn has not so far been available for export to the same degree due to the late harvest. However, some 400,000 tons (15,747,000 bushels) have been placed; the chief market has been Italy.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the 1960-61 (December-November) crop year amount to 195.7 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 48.7 million and the new crop, placed at 147.0 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a sharp decline in production and a decrease of 17 per cent in carryover stocks, are about 28 per cent less than the 1959-60 total of 273.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 139.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 56.1 million are available for export and for carryover in contrast to 137.2 million in 1959-60. Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1960 amounted to 3.9 million bushels, well above the 2.3 million exported during the same month in 1959. The balance remaining on January 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 52.2 million bushels, substantially below the January 1, 1960 total of 134.8 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.S. Bissett, Commercial Counsellor, Buenos Aires, under date of February 1, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 82.50 pesos per U.S. dollar less 20 per cent retention.

The second official estimate of production, released a few days ago, confirms the bleak picture for this grain this crop year. Its total of 4,000,000 metric tons (147.0 million bushels) is set 2 per cent below the first estimate of 4,100,000 metric tons (150.6 million bushels). It was officially reported at the end of December that harvesting was all but completed in the northern region including the provinces of Santa Fé, Entre Ríos, Cordoba and La Pampa, while in the southern region, the province of Buenos Aires, about 60 per cent of the wheat had already been harvested. Results in both regions confirmed former reports, i.e. almost a disastrous crop in respect to both quantity and quality in practically all of the northern and northwestern regions, but normal results down south, with some excellent yields in certain localized areas - in short, a most unfavourable year for this grain.

With the revised figures of stocks now available from official sources, even though they are preliminary in nature, it is evident now that the exportable surplus will be greater than what was thought some time ago. This is the direct result of considerably diminished home consumption during 1960, and an equally diminished forecast for 1961. Thus it is now expected Argentina will be able to ship about 1,000,000 metric tons (36,743,000 bushels) during this present year, although the poor quality of much of it will make sales more difficult than is normally usual. The Grain Board denied a short time ago that any restrictions would be imposed on wheat exports, but a very recent Government decree has now in effect established that control, even though in an indirect way. All grain exporters will have to declare henceforth all their grain purchases, and their subsequent export sales. The avowed aim of this

decree is to keep a constant check of all grain that is being sold for export, and thus avoid any lack of it in the home market. This decree is of particular importance for wheat, both on account of its great importance for the Argentine economy and for its present scarcity. The other grains, with the exception of corn, do not play by any means such an important part, and there will be, it is expected, an adequate supply of corn on the market.

There have been some recent requests for an increase to 420 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.39 per bushel) of the basic official minimum price paid at present for wheat, but it is not expected this will be granted as that would price Argentine wheat entirely out of the international market. The alternative consists of further reductions of the taxes and retentions levied on this grain.

Some rather important export sales are already reportedly taking place, among them 30,000 metric tons (1,102,000 bushels) for Spain, and unknown quantities for Portugal. The National Grain Board has not published so far any data as regards the quantities purchased by it of this new crop, and no sales whatsoever have been made by it.

Prices for old wheat (1959-60) were stable on the Buenos Aires Wheat Sales and Shipments Cereal Exchange, during the whole period under review. It was mainly quoted at 395 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.30 per bushel) for hard type, grade 1, 80 kilos hectolitre (64 pounds per bushel) basis, while the semi-hard type was sold at 384 pesos (\$1.27 per bushel). In Bahia Blanca both types averaged respectively, 380 and 370 (\$1.25 and \$1.22 per bushel), and similar prices were obtained in Necochea. However, the private trade was reportedly not very brisk, and likewise the National Grain Board sold the small quantity of only 6,106 metric tons (224,000 bushels) of 1959-60 grain, mainly for local milling, with the exception of 800 tons (29,000 bushels) of Candeal-Taganrog type, sold for export at 4,610 pesos per metric ton (\$1.52 per bushel). The lots for local milling were sold at 4,000 pesos (\$1.32 per bushel). The Board also sold 383 metric tons (14,000 bushels) of fire-damaged grain of the 1958-59 crop, at 2,357 pesos (78 cents per bushel), 2,000 (73,000 bushels) of sound grain of the same crop at 3,500 pesos (\$1.15 per bushel), 400 metric tons (15,000 bushels) of 1957-58 grain at 3,400 pesos (\$1.12 per bushel), and finally 200 (7,300 bushels) of Candeal grain (1958-59) at 4,250 pesos (\$1.40 per bushel), all these lots being for local consumption.

Wheat shipments during December at 106,301 metric tons (3,906,000 bushels) were the lowest for any single month of 1960, with the exception of the previous January. Brazil bought more than half of the above, 54,416 tons (1,999,000 bushels), while the next most important buyers were Perú and Italy, with 19,345 and 10,241 tons (711,000 bushels and 376,000 bushels), respectively. Other lots were shipped to Paraguay, 8,967 (329,000 bushels); Netherlands, 5,855 (215,000 bushels); the United Kingdom, 4,827 (177,000 bushels); and Belgium, 2,650 (97,000 bushels).


Official figures covering stocks are at present being compiled by the National Grain Board. Although they are not yet available in final form, it can be reliably stated that the figure provided at the beginning of the crop year 1959-60 for home requirements needs now to be radically revised. During 1960 the local consumption of wheat and its by-products was appreciably less than originally calculated.

The new estimate is that the total home use of wheat during 1960 was not more than 3,700,000 metric tons (135,950,000 bushels), and it is expected that during 1961 home requirements will reach no more than 3,800,000 metric tons (139,625,000 bushels), as a maximum.


Argentine Wheat Exports December 1960 with Comparisons


