

WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Current Supplies Latest available estimates indicate that supplies of wheat remaining on or about April 1, 1961 in the four major exporting countries for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,470.3 million bushels, 5 per cent above the 2,348.3 million available a year ago. Supplies at April 1, 1961, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,578.0 (1,470.9); Canada, 673.4 (624.0); Argentina, 31.6 (114.7); and Australia, 187.3 (138.7). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

Exports

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat, from the four major exporting countries during the first eight months

(August-March) of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 804.7 million bushels, some 29 per cent greater than the 622.2 million exported during the same months of 1959-60. According to the April 28 issue of the "Wheat Situation" published by the United States Department of Agriculture, world wheat exports, including products in grain equivalent, in 1960-61 are expected to reach 1,450 million bushels. This would be about 9 per cent above the previous record of 1,328 million bushels exported in 1956-57. Revised data for 1959-60 indicate exports were 1,327 million bushels, almost at the 1956-57 level.

The greatest single factor underlying the increase in the total world movement of wheat is the large shipments out of the United States, facilitated by various government programmes of that country. In the July-June, 1959-60 crop year approximately three quarters of the United States exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat were reported shipped under government programmes, such as for foreign currency, with about one-quarter(or some 132 million bushels) exported for dollars. Regarding the commercial market for wheat, Canada's share has increased from a long-term average of about 30 per cent to some 35 per cent in recent years. Of Canada's wheat and flour exports for the August-July, 1959-60 crop year more than 95 per cent (or some 264 million bushels) was sold on normal commercial terms. While similar data for United States and Canada are not at present available for the current crop year it is known that approximately the same relationships exist.

Wheat and flour exports, including those under government programmes, from each of the four countries, United States, Canada, Argentina and Australia were at higher levels this year than last. Shipments from these countries during August-March of the current and ten preceding crop years (Canadian) are shown in the table below.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Announcement of Grain Sale to China

The Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Agriculture, speaking in the House of Commons on May 2, 1961 stated in part that the house will recall that on February 2 I informed hon. members that a sale of 40 million bushels of wheat and barley, valued at approximately \$60 million, had been contracted between the Canadian wheat board

and the China Resources Company.

I now inform the house that there was an additional sale to China of 2.2 million bushels of wheat, valued at \$3.7 million, for shipment during March to May, 1961. Those connected with shipping grain through the west coast ports have made a fine effort to meet these commitments. As a result, the grain sold to China for delivery between March and August is being loaded ahead of schedule.

Simultaneously with the fulfilling of the first order there have been discussions and finally negotiations between the Canadian wheat board and the China Resources Company concerning further amounts of grain that could be made avail-Because of the quantities of grain involved and other factors, the Canadian government felt there should be an over-all agreement to facilitate orderly marketing.

I am now pleased to report that a long term agreement has been This long term agreement covers the period June 1, 1961 to December, 1963. Under this agreement we have committed ourselves to provide up to six million tons of barley, wheat and flour. Of this amount approximately one million tons will be barley. To put this into approximate bushels and value, it would provisionally be 186.7 million bushels of wheat and 46.7 million bushels of barley, worth approximately \$362 million.

If one adds the previous order for 28 million bushels of wheat and 12 million bushels of barley, valued at \$60 million, then the total transaction that could provisionally be expected for the three calendar years 1961, 1962 and 1963 will be 217 million bushels of wheat and 58.8 million bushels of barley, with a total approximate value of \$425.6 million.

I mentioned earlier that the first order of 40 million bushels was being moved satisfactorily. As an extension to the order now being filled, a contract to provide additional grain from June 1 to November 30 of this year has been signed. It is the first contract under the long term agreement. The amounts are 750,000 long tons of wheat, 360,000 long tons of barley and 32,500 tons of flour, to be shipped mainly from west coast ports. The equivalent in bushels is 28 million bushels of wheat, 17 million bushels of barley and 1.5 million of flour. The estimated value of this order is \$66 million. The terms of payment under the long term agreement are 25 per cent cash and the balance in 270 days.

Hon, members will appreciate that it is beyond the resources of the Canadian wheat board to extend credit facilities for the quantities involved in these transactions. Accordingly the government, reflecting its intensive efforts to sell grain in volume to new markets, is prepared to guarantee to a maximum of \$50 million the credit necessary for the Canadian wheat board to conclude these transactions on a short term credit basis. I have made it clear that there is a long term agreement. Under that agreement one contract has been signed. Each future contract will be negotiated in respect to price and quantity.

Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1960-61 crop year are Supply Position placed at 1,027.2 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 537.6 million and the 1960 production of 489.6 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 7 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 962.5 million bushels. After deducting an estimated 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 would amount to 877.2 million bushels, 8 per cent above the 814.9 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-March period of the current crop year amounted to 203.8 million bushels 7 per cent above the 190.9 million exported during the same months of the preceding crop year. The balance remaining on April 1, 1961 for export and for carryover, amounted to 673.4 million bushels, 8 per cent more than the April 1, 1960 total of 624.0 million.

NOTE:

Due to the introduction of a new commodity classification, effective January 1, 1961, official wheat flour export data for March were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The flour export figure for March included in this report represents an unofficial estimate. No allowance has been made for March exports of bagged seed wheat.

February 1961 Exports of Wheat Flour and Bagged Seed Wheat Total 3.6 Million Bushels Customs exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during February 1961 amounted to 2.6 million bushels, below both the January total of 3.6 million and the February 1960 figure

(adjusted for time lag) of 2.7 million bushels. Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first seven months of the 1960-61 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 21.7 million bushels and represented an increase of 3 per cent over the adjusted August 1959-February 1960 total of 21.2 million bushels.

Exports of bagged seed wheat during February 1961, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 984 thousand bushels, compared with the January total of 1,519 thousand and the February 1960 adjusted figure of 788 thousand bushels. Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during the August-February period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 3.7 million bushels, 8 per cent more than the comparable 1959-60 adjusted total of 3.4 million.

March 1961 Exports of Wheat Total 23.4 Million Bushels Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during March 1961 amounted to 23.4 million bushels, 14 per cent greater than the February total of 20.5 million,

37 per cent above the March 1960 figure of 17.1 million and 53 per cent more than the ten-year (1950-59) average for the month of March of 15.2 million bushels. In addition, this year's March clearances were the largest on record for that month.

August-March period of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 175.6 million bushels, surpassing by 8 per cent the comparable 1959-60 total of 162.5 million and 19 per cent above the ten-year (1949-50—1958-59) August-March average of 147.4 million. The United Kingdom remaining in its position as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 52.8 million bushels and representing 30 per cent of the eight-month total. During the August-March period of the 1959-60 crop year, shipments of wheat to the United Kingdom amounted to 55.5 million bushels and accounted for 34 per cent of the total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first eight months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 37.0 (29.3); Federal Republic of Germany, 23.3 (18.6); Italy, 14.4 (2.1); Belgium-Luxembourg, 7.5 (8.0); Netherlands, 5.3 (5.5); France, 4.9 (2.9); Switzerland, 4.2 (5.1); and India, 4.0 (4.1).

Delivery Policy

Shipment of Durum Wheat to the Lakehead The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the

Trade, re Quotas (General) No. 27, under date of May 4, 1961, announced in part that the Board is anxious to move to the Lakehead all Durum Wheat held in store in country elevators or which may be accumulated in the near future.

In an effort to build up stocks to carlot quantities, it will be appreciated if elevator agents will contact all Durum producers in their district and request them to make delivery, as soon as possible, of any Durum Wheat which they intend to deliver during the present crop season. To enable such deliveries to be made, the producers concerned are hereby granted an advance quota up to the difference between a quota of six bushels per specified acre and the quota in effect at their delivery point at the time of the Durum Wheat delivery. It is to be understood that deliveries under such advance quota must be entered in the delivery permit book and will apply against the subsequent quotas as and when they are authorized.

Removal of Quota on Soft White Spring Wheat The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade, re Quotas (General) No. 26, under date of April 13, 1961, announced in part that effective immediately, the delivery quota on all grades of Soft White Spring Wheat is hereby removed and such wheat may now be delivered to elevators at the designated delivery points of producers referred to in Paragraph 2 hereunder, regardless of the delivery quota in effect for other types of wheat.

Producers of this variety of wheat were previously issued special permits indicating the quantity of Soft White Spring Wheat that they were permitted to deliver on the first five (5) bushel supplementary quota. New special permits will not be issued but elevator agents are hereby authorized to accept from producers who received these special permits the additional quantity authorized under this Instruction.

By May 1, 1961, out of a total of 1,994 shipping points in the

Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 571 points
on a quota of five bushels per specified acre while 404 points
were on a four-bushel quota. Of the remainder, 614 points were on a three-bushel
quota and 405 points were on a two-bushel quota.

Crop and Weather Conditions

The telegraphic crop report, published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on May 10, summarized crop conditions in the Prairie Provinces as follows:

Below normal temperatures, coupled with generally strong winds and widespread precipitation, have retarded field operations over most parts of the Prairie Provinces. Apart from local areas in Manitoba, some districts in southwestern Saskatchewan, most of southeastern Alberta and the Peace River District, relatively little seeding has been done to date. However, given favourable conditions, it is expected that seeding may become general by mid-May. Recent precipitation has improved topsoil moisture supplies which are now sufficient for germination in most areas, but subsoil reserves are still deficient in many districts, particularly on stubble. Pasture and weed growth has been extremely slow.

Primary marketings of wheat (both east and west) up to April 19 of the 1960-61 crop year amounted to 217.2 million bushels and registered an increase of 9 per cent over last year's corresponding total of 198.9 million. Some 22.6 million bushels of the current total was accounted for by deliveries of durum wheat in contrast to only 10.3 million of this type marketed during the comparable period a year ago. However, farm stocks of durum wheat are now largely depleted. During the four weeks March 23 to April 19 total deliveries of wheat (both east and west) amounted to 22.3 million bushels while disappearance through licensed elevator channels (overseas clearances, plus imports into the United States, plus Canadian domestic use and including grain milled for subsequent export) during the same four weeks totalled some 33.0 million bushels. With export and domestic requirements exceeding marketings, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat declined steadily from 414.4 million bushels at the week ending March 22 to a level of 403.7 million at April 19, 1961.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at April 19, 1961 was 9 per cent greater than the comparable 1960 total of 369.6 million bushels and 7 per cent more than the 1959 figure of 376.1 million. Stocks in country elevators, at 255.8 million bushels, accounted for 63 per cent of the current total and surpassed by wide margins both the 223.4 million of a year ago and 237.0 million of two years ago. Interior terminal stocks at April 19, 1961 amounted to 10.4 million bushels and registered declines from both the 1960 total of 11.7 million and the 1959 figure of 13.3 million bushels. Some 17.3 million bushels were in "transit rail" (Western Division), compared with 17.5 million a year ago and 16.4 million of two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead at April 19, 1961 totalled 48.2 million bushels and exceeded both the 1960 and 1959 totals of 44.9 and 47.8 million bushels, respectively. Some 12.0 million bushels were in "transit lake" at April 19 well above the 1960 total of 7.1 million and the 1959 figure of 7.5 million bushels. The 18.4 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were below the 21.9 million of a year ago but considerably above the 14.7 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports amounted to 19.6 million bushels and represented relatively substantial increases over both the 1960 and 1959 totals of 15.8 million and 13.4 million bushels, respectively. Supplies in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria) totalled 8.7 million bushels, sharply below the 12.8 million in 1960 and the 12.2 million in 1959.

Lake Shipments of Total shipments of the five major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to April 19 this year amounted to 22.2 million bushels, some 40 per cent greater than the 15.8 million shipped during the comparable period of 1960. The 1961 season of navigation opened on April 19 while the 1960 season opened on April 10. Shipments of wheat, at 16.0 million bushels, were 21 per cent above the 1960 comparable figure of 13.3 million and accounted for 72 per cent of the current total. Lake shipments of oats, barley and flaxseed during the period under review were also above comparable 1960 levels with rye being the only one of the five grains moving in smaller volume this year than last.

Canadian Wheat Stocks at March 31, 1961 Total stocks of Canadian wheat at March 31, 1961 were estimated at 749.5 million bushels compared with 685.3 million on the same date in 1960 and the record 904.4 million in 1957. The ten-year (1951-60) average was 680.3 million bushels. Data for these estimates were

obtained from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics' annual March 31 survey of grain held on farms, from mill returns, and from information supplied by the Board of Grain Commissioners for Canada relative to grain in commercial positions at the close of business on March 29. An estimated 333.9 million bushels, representing 45 per cent of the total were held on farms, 5 per cent more than last year's total of 317.9 million but 7 per cent less than the 357.2 million at March 31, 1959. All but 6.9 million bushels of the total farm stocks of wheat were held on farms in the Prairie Provinces. Farm-held stocks in Saskatchewan were placed at 228.0 million while those in Alberta and Manitoba were estimated at 55.0 million and 44.0 million bushels, respectively. Of the 415.6 million bushels held in off-farm positions, 259.3 million were in country elevators compared with 221.6 million a year ago and 236.6 million two years ago. Stocks in Lakehead positions amounted to 58.7 million bushels, and exceededby considerable margins both the 1960 total of 51.4 million and the 1959 figure of 50.1 million bushels. Supplies in Eastern elevators, at 39.5 million bushels represented an increase of 14 per cent over the 1960 comparable total of 34.8 million and 38 per cent greater than the 1959 figure of 28.6 million bushels.

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, April 19, 1961 Compared with Approximately the Same Date, 1959 and 1960





Freight Assistance Shipments Claims filed for payment up to March 31, 1961 represent the movement of some 10,908 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-February period of the current crop year. During the corresponding period in 1959-60 claims had been filed

for a total of 11,778 thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1960-61 August-February shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 7 per cent below those of 1959-60. Revised data on the 1959-60 August-February shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to March 31, 1961 place the seven-month total at 12,196 thousand bushels. About 74 per cent of the shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Ontario and Quebec.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 338,256 tons during the August-February period of the current crop year. During the same months of the 1959-60 crop year claims had been filed for a total of 335,726 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-February shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about one per cent above those of 1959-60. Revised data on the 1959-60 August-February shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to March 31, 1961 place the seven-month total at 351,112 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Ontario (30 per cent) and Quebec (48 per cent).

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during March 1961 amounted to 3,386,000 hundred-weight, exceeding by 14 per cent the February output of 2,969,000 hundredweight, but 2 per cent less than the March 1960 production of 3,462,000 hundredweight and 5 per cent below the ten-year (1951-60) average production for the month of March of 3,553,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during March 1961 had a total rated capacity of 155,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 84.0 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during March 1961 amounted to 7,582,000 bushels compared with 6,656,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 7,822,000 bushels milled during March 1960. Of the wheat milled for flour during March 1961, some 6,624,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (521,000 bushels); Durum (358,000 bushels); and all other (80,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during February 1961 amounted to 1,128,000 hundredweight (some 2,594,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) representing a decrease of 28 per cent from the January 1961 figure of 3,592,000 bushels and 5 per cent below the February 1960 adjusted total of 2,734,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty countries with exports to the United Kingdom amounting to 1,239 thousand bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 48 per cent of the February 1961 total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent, were as follows: Jamaica, 131; Norway, 121; United States, 113; Ghana, 109; and Leeward and Windward Islands, 101.

NOTE: Official wheat flour export data for March were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The figure for March included in this report represents an unofficial estimate.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Position

Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1960-61 crop year are estimated at 2,678.3 million bushels, consisting of the July 1 carryover of 1,314.9 million and the 1960 crop, placed at 1,363.4 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of about 11 per cent over the previous peak of 2,421.8 million bushels a year ago. Imports of wheat from Canada during the July-March period of the current United States crop year amounted to 4.6 million bushels, compared with 5.2 million during the same months of the preceding crop year. After deducting an estimated 609 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, some 2,064.7 million remain available for export and for carryover during 1960-61 compared with 1,819.8 million in 1959-60.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during the first nine months (July-March) of the 1960-61 United States crop year amounted to 486.7 million bushels, 39 per cent greater than the 349.0 million exported during the same months in 1959-60. The balance remaining on April 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,578.0 million bushels compared with 1,470.9 million on the same date a year ago.

Stocks of Wheat in All Positions April 1, 1961

On April 24, the United States Department of Agriculture reported that wheat stocks in all storage positions April 1 were a record for the third consectuive year. These holdings at 1,706 million bushels were 9 per cent above a year earlier

and 66 per cent above average. Stocks of 258 million on farms show a greater percentage increase than stocks in commercial storage. Disappearance of wheat from all positions during the January-March quarter was a record 362 million bushels, up sharply from the 314 million during the same quarter a year ago, and reflecting the heavy export movement. Stocks were above a year earlier in all major producing wheat States except the Pacific Northwest where 1960 production fell below the preceding year. Nearly eight-tenths of the United States stocks were Government owned or under price support.

Wheat Stocks on Farms

The Crop Reporting Board, United States Department of Agriculture, in its production report under date of April 10, stated in part that farm stocks of wheat on April 1 totalled 258 million bushels, 26 per cent above April 1 last year and 15 per cent greater than the 10-year average. Stocks on farms April 1 were reported at 18.9 per cent of the 1960 production. This compares with April 1, 1960 when stocks totalled 18.1 per cent of the 1959 production. Government loan or purchase agreements accounted for approximately two-thirds of the total wheat stocks on farms April 1, 1961.

Winter Wheat Crop Estimated at

In a report released on April 10, 1961 the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated 1,099 Million Bushels in part that the 1961 winter wheat crop, planted under generally favourable conditions last fall, suffered little winter

injury. With generally excellent soil moisture about April 1, the crop shows promise of an excellent yield per acre. Production is forecast at 1,099 million bushels, down 2 per cent from the huge 1960 crop but 31 per cent above the 10-year average.

The indicated yield per seeded acre at 25.0 bushels has been exceeded only by the 1958 and 1960 crops. This yield forecast is based on growing conditions about April 1 as reported by crop correspondents and taking into account such factors as soil moisture, insect activity, plant disease, and the assumption that weather conditions from now to harvest will be near normal. In the last 10 years, the average change in the United States production estimate from April 1 to harvest has been 100 million bushels, ranging from a maximum of 216 million bushels to a minimum of 24 million.

The acreage expected to be harvested for grain at 41.2 million acres represents about 94 per cent of the seeded acreage, about the same percentage as the 1960 crop but far above average.

The 1961 winter wheat crop was seeded in good time and made favourable fall growth under generally good moisture conditions except in some Northern and Northwestern areas. Low winter temperatures prevailed in Northeastern and East North Central areas but ample snow cover generally protected the plants. In the West North Central area, the winter was open but temperatures were relatively mild. With less freezing and thawing than usual in Northern areas, the crop suffered little from heaving. In the Southern Great Plains, ample moisture has been the rule to date.

In Kansas, wheat shows a uniformly high condition. Moisture supplies are on the short side only in the western third of the State. The crop has reached the jointing stage in southern sections. In Oklahoma, about one-third of the crop has jointed. Wheat has stooled well, and is growing rapidly with abundant moisture. In Texas, wheat is heading in most sections except the High Plains with excellent moisture and good prospects in all sections. Greenbug infestation is present in the High Plains of Texas and in Oklahoma with a high potential for damage if weather remains cool.

In Nebraska and South Dakota, sub-soil moisture reserves are low in most sections and generous rainfall is needed. This situation is more serious in Montana where the winter was unusually warm and dry and the moisture situation is critical.

Winter conditions were favourable for the crop in the mid-Atlantic and Southeastern areas with the crop having furnished good pasture and showing high yield prospects. In the West, moisture supplies are favourable except in Montana. The Colorado crop was favoured with good precipitation in the fall and again in the late winter. In Washington and Oregon, loss of acreage from winter-kill has been small.

Large Increase Expected in Carryover of Hard Red Winter Wheat; Decrease in White Wheat

According to the April 28, 1961 issue of the Wheat Situation, published by the U.S.D.A. the current analysis of supply and distribution by classes, which takes into account the larger exports estimated for 1960-61, indicates changes from estimates shown in the February 1961 Wheat Situation for hard red winter and white wheat.

Exports, including shipments, of hard red winter wheat are now estimated at 391 million bushels, up 24 million from the February estimate; white wheat exports are estimated at 133 million bushels, up 6 million. These two classes account for all of the increase in total exports and shipments from the earlier estimate.

Breakdown of the 1,455 million bushels of wheat expected to be carried over July 1, 1961, indicates the following increases: 151 million hard red winter, 15 million hard red spring, 3 million soft red winter and 3 million durum. These increases more than offset an indicated 31-million-bushel reduction in white wheat.

The prospective carryover stocks of the various classes July 1, 1961 as a percentage of the 1955-59 average total disappearance are as follows: Hard red winter, 240 per cent; hard red spring, 129 per cent; durum, 58 per cent; white, 19 per cent and soft red winter, 7 per cent.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position

Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the 1960-61 (December -November) crop year amount to 195.7 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 48.7 million and the new crop, placed at 147.0 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a sharp decline in production and a decrease of 17 per cent in carryover stocks, are about 28 per cent less than the 1959-60 total of 273.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 139.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 56.1 million are available for export and for carryover in contrast to 137.2 million in 1959-60.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1960-March 1961 amounted to 24.5 million bushels, compared with 22.5 million exported during the same months in 1959-60. The balance remaining on April 1, 1961 for export and for carryover was estimated at 31.6 million bushels, substantially below the April 1, 1960 total of 114.7 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.S. Bissett, Commercial Counsellor, Buenos Aires, under date of April 21, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 83 pesos per U.S. dollar less 20 per cent retention.

Weather Argentina has experienced a fairly wet autumn interspersed with spells of rather warm humid weather, although at the time of writing this report cool weather seems to be establishing itself. During late March soil conditions were most favourable throughout the grain growing

regions, enabling soil preparations for the coming autumn and winter-sown crops to be carried steadily ahead. There should be excluded from this optimistic picture certain areas in the central western and north-western parts of the Province of Buenos Aires, where there continued to be a lack of adequate moisture in the soil.

This same overall situation continues at present. However, the rains of the first half of April were still more widespread and intense and in other than the grain-growing regions extensive floods have developed. This is so, especially in the Province of Chaco, where many hundreds of hectares sown to cotton and other semi-tropical crops are under water, and in some parts of the Province of Santa Fé. These floods are the result of the swelling of the upper Parana river.

While extensive rains provide reserves of soil moisture for the autumn and winter-sown grains, they are now proving to be somewhat excessive for corn harvesting. Some lots have already had to be artificially dried upon their arrival in up-river ports. The delays and troubles that this operation entails are similar to those experienced during 1959. The inadequacy of the grain drying facilities available at that time still persists, so it is hoped that only certain scattered lots will have to be dried. Rains are also adversely affecting rural roads leading to the main highways and to the ports, and thus transport of this grain is somewhat bogged down at present. However, cool dry weather is now expected, and thus both the quality of the harvested corn and its delivery to the ports should improve.

Wheat Practically all the wheat that is being purchased from producers is ear-marked for the home market, as exporters had practically fulfilled their needs prior to the request made by the Grain Board, curtailing purchases for this purpose. Thus the market in the past month has been on the quiet side, since millers just buy for their immediate needs. Neither has there been any announcement of new outstanding export commitments.

Grain Board sales were also very few in number during the period under review. These consisted only of 5,000 metric tons (184,000 bushels) of the 1959-60 crop sold for export from Rosario at 3,650 pesos per metric ton (\$1.20 per bushel) and 340 tons (12,500 bushels) sold for local milling at 3,350 pesos (\$1.10 per bushel). Prices paid by local millers for grain bought directly from producers, averaged 398 pesos per 100 kilos, i.e. (\$1.31 per bushel) slightly above the official minimum price of 380 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.25 per bushel). Wheat shipments during March totalled 237,883 metric tons (8,741,000 bushels). It is expected that producers will follow the urgings of the Minister of Economy and the Secretary of Agriculture and Livestock during the recent "Wheat Festival" to extend the seeded wheat area well above the 1960-61 acreage.

The official decree covering the establishment of the minimum official wheat prices for 1961-62 (and that of linseed) has now been promulgated. It confirms the announcement made on the above occasion.

The prices, and their respective bases, have been established as follows: hard wheat, grade 1, 80 kilos per hectolitre basis (64 pounds per bushel), 430 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.41 per bushel); Candeal-Taganrock ("Durum"), grade 2, 78 kilos hectolitre basis (62 pounds per bushel), 430 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.41 per bushel), both f.o.r., in bags, Port of Buenos Aires. According to a cable from Mr. Bissett the price for semi-hard wheat has been established at 420 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.38 per bushel), grade 1, 80 kilos hectolitre basis (64 pounds per bushel).

FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of April 25, 1961, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from French to Canadian measures have been made and rounded for the convenience of our readers.

Weather

and Crops

to the growth of cereals throughout most of France, except in a
few areas which have been subjected to occasional hail showers.

Late seedings have been completed, but earlier starts on wet soil in preparation
for spring seeding and followed by warm, dry weather resulted in compacted and
difficult-to-work soils in several areas. On the other hand, good weather has
assisted, at least in the Paris area, the work of applying post-emergent fertilizers.
Winter barley and some varieties of winter wheat are now on the point of heading-out
in Southern areas three weeks earlier than normal. A good yield is anticipated,
and first estimates of the wheat crop suggest a harvest of approximately 7,650,000
metric tons (281.1 million bushels). However, large quantities of barley and corn
in storage now plus future crop deliveries may result in a good deal of congestion
and complicate the problem of wheat deliveries and collections.

Drought conditions in Morocco are causing serious concern, with some sources predicting the possibility of United States gifts of wheat and barley later in the year. Reports indicate that Tunisia's crop prospects are also poor

and suggest that wheat and barley imports will likely be required. Algeria on the other hand, is expected to have an adequate crop of barley, but may import some soft wheat from France.

Seeded Acreage
In France
Increased by 157,300 hectares (389,000 acres), or 2.3 per cent compared with the same period last year. On the other hand, the total area of winter seeded cereals is 997,200 hectares (2.5 million acres) less than a year earlier. Spring seedings, however, increased by 1,154,600 hectares (2.9 million acres).

In total, the drop in wheat acreage of 519,200 hectares (1.3 million acres), 12 per cent less than last year, has been more than made up by increased sowings of barley, oats, and to some extent, of corn, although no statistics for the latter are available.

French Grain

The French market for imported grain has not been particularly active this month. Ten thousand tons (367,000 bushels) of hard wheat, possibly Manitoba No. 2 are still outstanding, which, when taken up, will bring the 1961 figures for hard wheat imports to 60,000 tons (2,205,000 bushels). This 10,000 ton (367,000 bushels) potential may be purchased shortly, and is contingent upon an equivalent amount of flour being exported from France.

Durum wheat purchases in April totalled 40,000 tons (1,470,000 bushels), of which 30,000 tons (1,102,000 bushels) were Canadian Western Amber Durum No. 2. The balance of 10,000 tons (367,000 bushels) was purchased from the United States. A second tender for a similar quantity is expected towards the end of May.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position

Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1960-61 (December-November) crop year amount to some 332.0 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1960 carryover of 61.2 million and the current crop estimated at a record 270.8 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated, reflecting a substantially larger production which more than offset a decline in carryover, represent an increase of 26.1 per cent over the 1959-60 total of 263.2 million bushels. After deducting 77.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 255.0 million are available for export and for carryover during 1960-61, 38 per cent above the 184.4 million in 1959-60.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent up to April 1 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 67.7 million bushels compared with 45.7 million exported during the corresponding period of 1959-60. The balance remaining on April 2, 1961 for export and for carryover, at 187.3 million bushels, exceeded by 35 per cent the comparable 1960 total of 138.7 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, under date of April 14, 1961 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Crop Position

The current wheat crop has been officially announced by the Commonwealth Statistician and his final figure is rather surprising, being 6.8 million bushels more than was suggested four weeks ago. A bumper crop of 270.8 million bushels has been acknowledged officially and the Australian Wheat Board anticipate that final deliveries to the Board will reach 250 millions. Owing to the record harvests in Victoria and South Australia, fairly substantial quantities were held on farms pending availability of bulk storage space at sidings. This season's

crop exceeds the previous record year of 1947-48 by 50 million bushels.

Although it is anticipated that 255 million bushels will be available for export as wheat or flour, on present indications disposal should not be particularly difficult and, despite the increase in production, the carryover at the end of the season should not be larger than the 60 million bushels on hand at November 1960. There has been a great deal of speculation about the sale of wheat on credit to China but the Chairman of the Australian Wheat Board, Sir John Teasdale, dispelled these rumours last month, when he issued a statement denying that a contract had been drawn up to supply wheat on credit to China. The Chairman continued by saying that any specific propositions for such sales would be referred to the Federal Minister "in accordance with the usual practice".

Australian grain ports have never been so busy and every grain port, except Brisbane, is booked to capacity until June at least. As a matter of fact, it seems as if loading will continue on an "around the clock" basis, if present sales continue. Apart from the recent cash sales to China, Italy has purchased 16.8 million bushels of wheat and good sales have been made to the United Kingdom and the Western Continent.




 According to a report published by the Crop Reporting Board,
 United States Department of Agriculture, the U.S. winter wheat
 crop for harvest in 1961, based on conditions at April 1, was
 forecast at 1,099 million bushels, 2 per cent less than the
 huge 1960 crop but 31 per cent greater than the 1950-59 average.
 - According to a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, the 1960-61 wheat crop in Australia has been officially estimated at a record 270.8 million bushels.
 - The Crop Reporting Board, United States Department of Agriculture, reported that wheat stocks in all positions in the United States at April 1, 1961 were estimated at 1,706 million bushels, a record for the third consecutive year.
 - According to a report from Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, the decline of 1.3 million acres in wheat acreage in France this year has been more than made up by increased sowings of barley, oats, and to some extent, corn.
- May 2 The Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Agriculture, in announcing an additional grain sale to China, stated in part that if one adds the previous order for 28 million bushels of wheat and 12 million bushels of barley, valued at \$60 million, then the total transaction that could provisionally be expected for the three calendar years 1961, 1962 and 1963 will be 217 million bushels of wheat and 58.8 million bushels of barley, with a total approximate value of \$425.6 million.

The Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, estimated wheat flour production in the United States during March 1961 at 22,495,000 sacks, an average of 978,000 sacks per working day.

- According to Broomhall: Rainy weather has been experienced over wide areas of Europe during the past week, maintaining satisfactory moisture conditions in most countries, and growth, for the most part, has been good. The weather has been changeable in Italy, but, in general, has been favorable for growing crops. Due to the reduced acreage, however, it is still considered doubtful that the wheat crop will exceed last year's modest outturn, at least to any appreciable extent. Wheat and barley crops in Iraq show satisfactory promises and production of each is expected to be well above last year. Wheat threshing returns in India have been holding up very well and some upward revision in the official preliminary production estimate is held probable.
- United States Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman, proclaimed marketing quotas and a national acreage allotment of 55 million acres in line with current legislation. State acreage allotments and a 39-State commercial and 11-State noncommercial wheat-producing area were also announced.
