## WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Wheat Supplies Register Decline in Each of Four Major Exporting Countries Reflecting reduced supplies in each of the four major exporting countries, latest available estimates indicate that total supplies of wheat remaining on or about May 1, 1962 in these same countries for export and for carryover at the

end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,967.4 million bushels, 17 per cent below the 2,378.2 million available a year ago and the lowest level at this date since 1958. Supplies at May 1, 1962, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,466.0 (1,523.3); Canada, 366.4 (639.2); Argentina, 26.8 (48.3); and Australia, 108.2 (167.4). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

Shipments from Four Major Exporters 112 Million Bushels Ahead of Last Year Largely reflecting reduced crops in Western Europe and North Africa as well as the continued high level of import requirements in Asia, world wheat exports in the first three quarters of the 1961-62 crop year have moved in record

volume. Present indications are that the all-time high of 1.5 billion bushels exported in 1960-61 will be surpassed.

During the August-April period of the current crop year total exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat from the four major exporting countries were at the exceptionally high level of 1,044.0 million bushels, some 12 per cent more than the 932.3 million exported during the same months of 1960-61 and 67 per cent greater than the ten-year 1950-51--1959-60 August-April average of 627.0 million. Each of the four countries, United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina shared in the increase. Canadian wheat and flour exports during August 1961-April 1962, based on preliminary data, amounted to some 272.1 million bushels, 13 per cent above those for the same months last year and the third largest total on record for the first nine months of the crop year. Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August 1961-April 1962 and 11 preceding years (Canadian) are show in the table below.

### CANADIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1961-62 (August-July) crop year, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 526.8 million and the 1961 production of 261.7 million, are placed at 788.5 million bushels, representing a decrease of 23 per cent from the 1960-61 total of 1,027.2 million. After deducting 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1961-62 would amount to 638.5 million bushels, 27 per cent below the 880.1 million in 1960-61.

Exports of wheat as grain during the August-April period of the current crop year amounted to 247.5 million bushels, 16 per cent greater than the 213.9 million exported during the same months a year ago. Exports of wheat flour, in terms of wheat, during August-April this year were estimated at 24.5 million bushels, bringing total exports of wheat and flour during the same nine months, to some 272.1 million bushels and representing an increase of 13 per cent over the 240.8 million of a year ago. In addition this year's August-April total is the largest since 1945-46 and the third highest on record. The balance remaining on May 1, 1962 for export and for carryover, amounted to 366.4 million bushels, 43 per cent less than the May 1, 1961 total of 639.2 million.

Total primary deliveries of Canadian wheat, both East and West, up to May 16 of the current crop year amounted to 211.7 million bushels as against 255.1 million marketed during the comparable period of last year. However, the quality of this year's marketings has been unusually high. Wheat inspected by the Board of Grain Commissioners during the first nine months of the current crop year indicates that some 92 per cent of inspected deliveries were recorded in the grades No. 4 Northern and higher in contrast to the 1960-61 corresponding figure of 66 per cent.

Deliveries of wheat during the four weeks April 19 to May 16 totalled 19.2 million bushels while at the same time some 37.7 million were absorbed by domestic and export channels. With disappearance almost double marketings, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat declined from 334.4 million bushels at April 18 to a level of 315.9 million at May 16, 1962. The bulk of the decline during this period occurred in stocks in country elevators, in transit rail (Western Division) and at the Canadian Lakehead.

The total visible supply at May 16, 1962 was 21 per cent less than the comparable 1961 figure of 399.1 million and 17 per cent lower than the 1960 total of 379.5 million bushels. Compared with a year ago the heaviest single decrease occurred in country elevator stocks, with supplies in this position recorded at 153.4 million bushels in contrast to 248.4 million a year ago and 223.3 million two years ago. Wheat stocks at interior terminals at 9.1 million bushels, were only slightly below the 1961 total of 9.4 million but considerably less than the 11.6 million in 1960. The 14.6 million bushels "in transit rail" (Western Division), represented moderate declines from both the 16.6 million of a year ago and 15.4 million of two years ago, Lakehead stocks, however, amounting to 51.9 million bushels at May 16, 1962 were quite sharply higher than the 1961 and 1960 comparable totals of 41.2 million and 46.9 million bushels, respectively. Some 8.2 million bushels were "in transit lake" compared with 10.8 million a year ago but in contrast to 4.6 million two years ago. The 28.2 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were above the 24.4 million in 1961 but considerably below the 33.8 million in 1960. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at May 16, 1962, amounted to 24.9 million bushels, slightly more than the 24.7 million of a year ago and sharply above the 17.7 million of two years ago. On the west coast, the total of 12.4 million bushels in Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria represented only moderate changes from the 11.2 million in 1961 and 13.0 million in 1960.

Preliminary Figures Indicate March 1962 Exports of Wheat Flour and Bagged Seed Wheat Total 3.2 Million Bushels Based on preliminary data exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during March 1962 amounted to 2.6 million bushels, compared with the February total of 2.3 million and the adjusted March 1961 figure of 3.1 million bushels. Exports of bagged seed wheat

during March 1962, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 590,000 bushels, as against the February total of 440,000 and the March 1961 adjusted figure of 1,934,000 bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first eight months of the 1961-62 crop year, based on preliminary Customs returns, were the equivalent of 21.5 million bushels of wheat, 12 per cent less than the adjusted 1960-61 August-March total of 24.4 million. As with wheat as grain, Britain was the major market for Canadian wheat flour. Shipments of flour to that country during the period under review amounted to the equivalent of 7.9 million bushels and accounted for 37 per cent of the eight-month total. During the August-March period of 1960-61 shipments of wheat flour to Britain amounted to the equivalent of 9.2 million bushels and represented 38 per cent of the total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, with revised data for the August-March period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Ghana, 1,341 (1,255); Philippines, 1,114 (1,586); Jamaica, 1,007 (1,023); Nigeria, 947 (577); United States, 871 (836); Trinidad and Tobago, 847 (970); Japan, 732 (1,059); Leeward and Windward Islands, 670 (725); and Hong Kong, 605 (521).

Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-March of the current crop year amounted to 2,495 thousand bushels compared with the adjusted total of 5,866 thousand bushels exported during the same months of the preceding crop year.

April 1962 Wheat Exports Total 25.0 Million Bushels Exports of wheat in bulk, as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners, during April 1962 amounted to 25.0 million bushels, 22 per cent above the March

level of 20.5 million but 20 per cent less than the April 1961 figure of 31.4 million. This year's April total was 41 per cent greater than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the month of 17.7 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-April period of the 1961-62 crop year amounted to 245.0 million bushels and registered increases of 18 per cent over the comparable 1960-61 total of 207.0 million and 44 per cent above the ten-year (1950-51--1959-60) August-April average of 169.8 million bushels. Britain, as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 55.9 million bushels and representing 23 per cent of the nine-month total. During the August-April period of the 1960-61 crop year shipments of wheat to this destination amounted to 58.7 million bushels and accounted for 28 per cent of the total. The bulk of the remainder was accounted for by shipments to Communist China, 49.2 million, Japan, 36.9 million and the Federal Republic of Germany, 35.8 million bushels. Exports of Canadian wheat to these countries during the first nine months of the preceding crop year were to Communist China, 6.0 million, Japan, 41.5 million and the Federal Republic of Germany, 24.6 million bushels. Other relatively large markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first nine months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Poland, 12.3 (nil); Belgium and Luxembourg, 9.3 (9.7); East Germany, 8.0 (nil); Switzerland, 3.7 (4.3); India, 3.5 (4.0); Italy, 3.3 (14.5); and Venezuela, 3.0 (2.7).

Wheat Price<br/>IncreaseOn May 3, 1962 Agriculture Minister Alvin Hamilton announced that<br/>consequent on the announcement of a fixed rate for the Canadian dollar<br/>at 92 1/2 cents in terms of the United States dollar, the Canadian<br/>Wheat Board has increased the price for all grades of wheat by six cents a bushel.

The new rate will also affect the minimum and maximum prices to be paid for wheat under the International Wheat Agreement in terms of the Canadian dollar.

The price range of the new International Wheat Agreement, which is effective August 1, 1962, is \$1.62 1/2 minimum and \$2.02 1/2 maximum, in U.S. dollars, for No. 1 Northern Wheat in store Fort William-Port Arthur. At the new fixed rate for the Canadian dollar, the price range in Canadian dollars would be approximately \$1.75 5/8 minimum and \$2.19 maximum.

It should be noted that selling prices for the next three years are to be within the price range, and that actual prices will depend on market conditions and other factors.

Mr. Hamilton emphasized that the increase in wheat prices should not result in any increase in the price of bread to Canadians. A rise in the cost of wheat of six cents per bushelcould not be held responsible for an increase of more than 1/10 of a cent in the production costs of a loaf of bread.

Adjustment Payments On Wheat Agriculture Minister Alvin Hamilton announced on May 18, 1962 that cheques covering adjustment payments on western wheat delivered in 1961-62 have now been issued to producers.

He said the last cheque was mailed out by the Canadian Wheat Board on

May 15.

The adjustment was for 10 cents a bushel on wheat and 75 cents a bushel on Durum. A total of \$20,471,501 was distributed to grain growers.

Mr. Hamilton said Saskatchewan received \$12,823,573; Alberta \$5,552,021; and Manitoba \$2,095,907.

Announcement of the adjustment payments was made by Prime Minister Diefenbaker last February, when he outlined higher initial prices for wheat delivered to the 1961-62 pool account.

In Saskatchewan, the average cheque for wheat amounted to \$75 and for Durum \$346.25; in Alberta, \$89.25 for wheat and \$362.75 for Durum; and in Manitoba \$53.60 for wheat and \$216.25 for Durum.

Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain Total shipments of the five major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to May 16 this year amounted to 32.6 million bushels. Although this amount is less than half the total shipped to the corresponding date (May 17) in 1961 it must be noted that a year ago the season of navigation opened on April 9, as against April 22 this year. Shipments of wheat, at 25.5 million bushels accounted for 78 per cent of the current total.



Freight Assistance Shipments Claims filed for payment up to April 30, 1962 represent the movement of some 9.0 million bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-March period of the current crop year. During the corresponding period in 1960-61 claims had

been filed for a total of 12.4 million bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1961-62 August-March shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 27 per cent below those of 1960-61. Revised data on the 1960-61 August-March shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to April 30, 1962 place the eight-month total at 12.7 million bushels. About 69 per cent of the shipments during the current period under review went to destinations in Ontario and Quebec.

During the same eight months of 1960-61 claims had been filed for a total of 391,570 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1961-62 August-March shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 9 per cent below those of 1960-61. Revised data on the 1960-61 August-March shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to April 30, 1962 place the eight-month total at 400,594 tons. Shipments amounting to 173,341 tons and 95,553 tons to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, respectively, accounted for a combined 75 per cent of the August-March 1961-62 total.




# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT AND WHEAT FLOUR \*\*




# FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES



# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS\*






#### CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during April 1962 amounted to 2,725,000 hundredweight, representing a decrease of 22 per cent from the March output of 3,516,000 hundredweight, 11 per cent below the April 1961 total of 3,066,000 hundredweight and 19 per cent less than the ten-year (1952-61) average production for the month of April of 3,352,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during April 1962 had a total rated capacity of 164,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 24-day working period 69.1 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during April 1962 amounted to 6,057,000 bushels compared with 7,843,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 6,863,000 bushels milled during April 1961. Of the wheat milled for flour during April 1962, some 5,352,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (527,000 bushels); Durum (119,000 bushels); and all other (59,000 bushels).

**Exports** According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during March 1962 amounted to 1,128,000 hundredweight (some 2,595,000 bushels of wheat equivalent); representing an increase of 15 per cent over the 2,262,000 bushels exported in February 1962, but 16 per cent below the adjusted March 1961 total of 3,088,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty-two countries with exports to Britain amounting to 878,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 34 per cent of the March 1962 total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent were as follows: Ghana, 306; United States, 150; Nigeria, 128; Jamaica, 122; and Costs Rica, 111.

### UNITED STATES SITUATION

## Supply Position Domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1961-62 crop year (July-June) are estimated at 2,646.9 million bushels, consisting of the July 1, 1961 carryover of 1,412.2 million and the 1961 crop, placed at 1,234.7 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated would be 1 per cent less than last year's record of 2,670.8 million bushels. Preliminary figures indicate that imports of wheat and flour from Canada during the July-April period of the current United States crop year were equivalent to some 3.9 million bushels. Domestic disappearance during 1961-62 is estimated at about 590 million bushels, slightly less than the 606.3 million last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current crop year, some 2,060.8 million remain available for export and for carryover, compared with the 2,071.6 million in 1960-61.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during the first ten months (July-April) of the 1961-62 United States crop year amounted to 594.8 million bushels, 8 per cent greater than the 548.3 million exported during the same months in 1960-61. The balance remaining on May 1, 1962 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,466.0 million bushels a decrease of 4 per cent from the 1,523.3 million on the same date a year ago.

Winter Wheat Crop Estimated at 891 Million Bushels In a report released on May 10, 1962 the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated in part that production of winter wheat is forecast at 891 million bushels, 3 per cent below the April estimate and 17 per cent

less than last year but 2 per cent above average. Dry weather during April in Montana, Colorado, Nebraska and the High Plains of Texas, along with unexpectedly heavy winter losses centering in southern Michigan and northern areas of Ohio and Indiana, reduced crop prospects below expectations of a month earlier. In the important producing central States of Kansas, Missouri and Illinois, crop prospects were little changed from a month earlier, but Oklahoma prospects showed considerable improvement.

In the past 10 years, the average change in the United States production estimate from May 1 to harvest has been 79 million bushels, ranging from a maximum of 164 million bushels to a minimum of 9 million.

Yield per harvested acre is indicated to be 25.5 bushels, nearly a bushel below last year, but still the fourth highest of record and 3.5 bushels above average. Acreage to be harvested is indicated at 34.9 million acres, 14 per cent less than was harvested last year. It is presently anticipated that 90 per cent of the acreage seeded will be harvested.

1963 Wheat Proclamations Postponed United States Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman, announced on May 15 that the temporary postponement of proclamations relating to marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the 1963 crop of wheat, as authorized by legislation

was approved by the President.

This legislation permits the Secretary of Agriculture to defer until June 15, 1962, any proclamation as to marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the 1963 wheat crop which otherwise would have been required to be made no later than May 15.

Marketing Quota Penalty Rate for 1962 Excess Wheat Set at \$1.59 per Bushel On May 8, the United States Department of Agriculture announced a marketing quota penalty rate of \$1.59 per bushel on 1962-crop "excess" wheat production. This compares to a 1961-crop penalty rate of \$1.08 per bushel.

When wheat marketing quotas are in effect as they are for 1962-crop wheat, the law requires penalties on excess wheat production at the rate of 65 per cent of parity as of May 1 of the crop year. The rate announced today reflects 65 per cent of the May wheat parity price of \$2.44 per bushel.

The Agricultural Act of 1961 increased the rate of penalty to 65 per cent of parity. Previously, the penalty rate had been set at 45 per cent of parity by law. This rate times a farm's wheat excess, expressed in bushels, determines the actual amount of penalty.

Growers approved marketing quotas for the 1962 wheat crop, as announced October 16, 1961.

USDA officials point out that some farms with 15 acres or less of wheat may be subject to quota penalty on their production as a result of changes made in the law for 1962. Previously, producers on farms harvesting less than 15 acres of wheat were not subject to penalties. U. S. Wheat and Flour Exports Approaching Another World Record Present indications are that U.S. wheat and flour exports during July-June 1961-62 may reach 685 million bushels.

Actual shipments as reported by the Department of Commerce from July 1961 through March 1962 totalled 533.5 million bushels, or 80 per cent of the amount exported during the 12 months (July-June) of 1960-61.

Inspections of wheat for export from April 1 through May 11, 1962, show a slight decrease in shipments compared with the same period a year earlier. However, forward sales are high enough to expect the current fiscal year total to be at least 4 per cent larger than the 661 million bushels exported during the previous year.

Shipments of wheat to Brazil and Chile in the Western Hemisphere; West Germany, the Netherlands, and Yugoslavia in Europe; Turkey in Asia; and Algeria, Morocco, and Tunisia in Africa totalled 146 million bushels during July-March 1961-62, compared with 59 million in the first 9 months of 1960-61. In contrast, there were major reductions in exports to Italy, Poland, and India.

Flour exports from July 1961 through March 1962 at 81 million bushels (grain equivalent) were only 3.6 million larger than during the same months a year earlier. The overall increase was the result of larger shipments to Egypt, which has been the largest market for U.S. flour in recent months.

#### AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1961-62 (December-November) crop year amount to some 27 0.6 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1961 carryover of 24.3 million and the current crop now officially estimated at 246.3 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated, reflecting relatively sharp declines in both carryover stocks and production, represent an 18 per cent reduction from the 1960-61 total of 331.4 million. After deducting 78.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 192.6 million are available for export and for carryover during 1961-62, as against 255.7 million in 1960-61.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1-April 28 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 84.4 million bushels 4 per cent less than the 88.3 million exported during the corresponding period of 1960-61. The balance remaining on April 29, 1962 for export and for carryover, at 108.2 million bushels, represented a decrease of 35 per cent from the comparable 1961 figure of 167.4 million.

Crop<br/>PositionThe area sown to wheat for grain in the 1961-62 season is now<br/>estimated to have been a post-war record of 14.7 million acres,<br/>exceeding the previous 1947-48 record by a million acres, and yield-<br/>ing a crop, including wheat retained on farms, of 246.3 million bushels. This outturn<br/>is about 27 million bushels less than last year's record crop which was produced on an

acreage smaller by 1.2 million acres. Based on preliminary estimates the overall Australian average yield per acre for the 1961-62 crop was 16.8 bushels compared with last year's average of 20.4 bushels. The quantities produced in New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia were at lower levels in 1961-62 compared with 1960-61, while Queensland, Western Australia and Tasmania registered small increases on the previous season.

Marketing<br/>PositionAustralian export sales of wheat and flour have continued at a high<br/>level and on present indications, shipments in 1961-62 will exceed<br/>the record 183.5 million bushels for 1960-61. The value of these<br/>exports on an f.o.b. basis is estimated to have been £149.4 million (\$363.7 million).<br/>Sales to traditional markets are expected to be maintained at high levels for the

balance of the current trade year. In addition the further sale of 24 million bushels to Mainland China is to be shipped before the end of May, 1962.

The current Wheat Stabilization Scheme ends with the marketing of the 1962-63 wheat crop. The scheme commenced with the 1958-59 crop and amongst other things guaranteed a return of 14/6d (\$1.77) per bushel to the growers on up to 100 million bushels of wheat exported. This guaranteed price is based on the cost of production of wheat and has been progressively raised each year. For the 1961-62 crop the guaranteed price to the grower has been 15/9 (\$1.92) per bushel.

## ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the 1961-62 (December-November) crop year amount to 224.5 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1961 revised carryover of 35.3 million and the new crop, placed at 189.2 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a 30 per cent increase in production which more than offset a decline in carryover stocks, are about 14 per cent more than the 1960-61 total of 197.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 136.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 88.6 million are available for export and for carryover compared with 74.8 million in 1960-61.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1961-April 1962 amounted to 61.7 million bushels, more than double the 26.6 million exported during the same months in 1960-61. The balance remaining on May 1, 1962 for export and for carryover was estimated at 26.8 million bushels, 44 per cent lower than the May 1, 1961 total of 48.3 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.O.R. Rousseau, Commercial Secretary, Buenos Aires, under date of May 24, 1962 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 100 pesos per U.S. dollar and £1 equals \$3.0431 (Canadian) the quotation in effect on May 7, 1962. Weather and Crops During late April and up until the present, weather conditions have been favourable throughout most of the Argentine grain growing regions. Earlysown, dual-purpose wheat, barley, oats and rye, are developing normally,

while harvest of the late-seeded stands of corn is virtually complete. Only a few areas in western and southwestern Buenos Aires and La Pampa Provinces are still suffering from drought.

Temperatures during April did not vary greatly from normal. There were some light frosts in parts of Buenos Aires, La Pampa, and other provinces but no appreciable damage has been reported. At time of writing this report the weather seems to be settling to clear and cold.

Wheat

Weather and soil conditions during April, and up to the present, have favoured plowing and soil preparation work. The Secretary of Agriculture and Livestock has recently urged farmers to increase the acreage sown to wheat this year by one million hectares. There have been some fears in the past that if Argentina increased her wheat production, she would eventually find herself with an unsaleable surplus. This was reflected in certain official policies of past years; for instance when the government urged a switch from wheat to livestock production. At present most people agree that this was a mistake and that there are expanding markets for Argentine wheat. With Brazil there is a firm commitment for 1,000,000 metric tons (36.7 million bushels) for the next two years and according to local experts, Mainland China, Japan, Sudan and South Africa as well as other countries could be good customers for Argentine wheat.

It now appears as if supplies of wheat for export during this season have been exhausted and on May 11 a temporary 60-day embargo on all wheat exports was imposed. This embargo was the result of a "gentlemen's agreement" between private exporters and the National Grain Board, and during this period a full assessment will be made of the present supply position in relation to domestic requirements in order to ascertain whether any more wheat could be exported prior to the harvesting of the 1962-63 crop. Up until the end of April of the present crop year 1,677,567 metric tons (61,639,000 bushels) of wheat were exported and exports during the first 18 days of May totalled 204,590 metric tons (7,517,000 bushels). It is to be noted that pending shipments to Brazil and Spain are exempt from the temporary 60-day embargo.

The keen foreign demand for Argentine wheat has had its effect on prices and by the end of April prices in up-river ports reached 500 to 550 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.36 to \$1.50 per bushel) for bread wheats and more than 1,000 pesos (\$2.72 per bushel) for durums.

During April prices c.i.f. continental ports for both up-river and southern wheat averaged US\$ 70.50 per metric ton (\$1.92 per bushel) for shipment in April and US\$ 70.00 (\$1.91 per bushel) for shipment in May. British millers were paying £25.15.0 (\$2.13 per bushel) for wheat to be shipped in May. These prices were 2 per cent to 3 per cent lower than for the previous month, probably as a result of the fall in value of the Argentine pesos, as it is reported that importing countries took advantage of these circumstances to lower their price levels.

On May 15 the Secretary of Agriculture announced minimum official producers' prices for this year. These prices which are generally considered to be satisfactory are as follows: (all prices in pesos per 100 kilos, in bags or in bulk, f.o.r. Buenos Aires port) - Wheat, hard, grade 1, 80 kilos hectolitre basis, (64 pounds per bushel), 540.00 (\$1.47 per bushel); semi-hard, grade 1, 80 kilos hectolitre basis, (64 pounds per bushel), 525.00 (\$1.43 per bushel); Durum-Candeal-Taganrog, 540.00 (\$1.47 per bushel). This new basis of equal price for grain in either bags or in bulk, is aimed at an increased usage of bulk storage and transportation. (Formerly a discount was made on grain delivered in

bulk.) It is expected that a complete change-over in storage and transporation from bags to bulk will soon be accomplished.

As indicated, these new prices should be encouraging to producers, provided there is no sharp increase in production costs before the next harvest. In any event the Secretary of Agriculture announced that if that happened, minimum prices would be adjusted accordingly.

Wheat exports during April totalled 413,183 metric tons (15,182,000 bushels) including the first Argentine shipments of wheat to Mainland China of 18,844 metric tons (692,000 bushels). Brazil bought 114,920 metric tons (4,223,000 bushels), West Germany 122,140 (4,488,000 bushels) while the next most important customers were the Netherlands, 50,801 metric tons (1,867,000 bushels), Perú, 38,744 (1,424,000 bushels) and Britain 24,370 (895,000 bushels).

## FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of May 29, 1962, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from French to Canadian measures have been made and rounded for the convenience of our readers.

Weather and Crops Cool weather and overcast skies continued into May, followed by rising temperatures and sunshine towards the end of the month. Cereals, despite the fact that growth is about two weeks behind normal, are

reported as being in very satisfactory condition. The total area sown to cereals is 3 per cent higher than last year, with more area sown to wheat and less to barley and oats. French wheat production this year has initially been forecast at 10.7 million metric tons (393.2 million bushels).

The production of cereals in Algeria is expected to approach an average year of between 1.8 and 2 million metric tons (66.1 million and 73.5 million bushels). In Morocco forecasts of cereal production are 353,000 tons (13.0 million bushels) of soft wheat, 1,055,000 tons (38.8 million bushels) of durum wheat and 1,228,000 tons (56.4 million bushels) of barley.

# French Grain Market

French and Algerian requirements of durum wheat can reportedly be met from stocks on hand at least until the end of June. In addition, France has just concluded an agreement with Tunisia for the purchase

of 25,000 metric tons (919,000 bushels) of durum wheat and 3,000 tons (110,000 bushels) of "semoule" for shipment from Tunisia before the end of June.

Official statistics reporting French wheat and flour exports for the crop year to April 1, 1962 show that total exports were 1,052,000 tons (38.7 million bushels) or about 110,000 tons (4 million bushels) less than during the same period last year. Exports of wheat to all countries declined by 216,000 tons (8 million bushels) but exports of flour in terms of wheat equivalent were about 105,000 tons (4 million bushels) greater than in 1960.

- May 3 According to the Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, wheat flour production in the United States in March 1962 amounted to 23,140,000 hundredweight, an average of 1,052,000 hundredweight per working day.
  - 10 According to a report published by the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture, the U.S. winter wheat crop for harvest in 1962, based on conditions at May 1, was forecast at 891 million bushels.

23 According to a telegraphic crop report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics good progress was made with seeding in Saskatchewan and over wide areas in Alberta during the past week. In contrast, little or no seeding or field work was accomplished in Manitoba due to wet weather. Wheat seeding is mostly completed in southern Alberta and is about 75 per cent done in Saskatchewan, while in Manitoba only in the western part of the province have significant acreages been seeded.
