


WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporting Countries Decline by 20 Per Cent

Reflecting reduced supplies in each of the four major exporting countries, latest available estimates indicate that total supplies of wheat remaining on or about July 1, 1962 in these same countries for export and for carryover at

the end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,718.9 million bushels, 20 per cent below the 2,139.0 million available a year ago and the lowest level at this date since 1958. Supplies at July 1, 1962, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,345.0 (1,412.2); Canada, 302.0 (555.7); Argentina, 9.6 (45.1); and Australia, 62.3 (126.0). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

Shipments from Four Major Exporters 117 Million

Largely reflecting reduced crops in Western Europe and North Africa as well as the continued high level of import Bushels Ahead of Last Year requirements in Asia, world wheat exports in the first eleven months of the 1961-62 crop year have moved in record

volume. Present indications are that the all-time high of 1.5 billion bushels exported in 1960-61 will be surpassed.

Exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat from the four major exporters for the eleven month, August-June period of the current crop year already exceed the shipments from these same countries for the complete 1960-61 crop year. During the August-June period exports of these commodities were 1,290.4 million bushels, some 10 per cent more than the 1,173.7 million exported during the same months of 1960-61 and 62 per cent greater than the ten-year 1950-51-1959-60 August-June average of 798.5 million. Each of the four countries, United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina shared in the increase. Canadian wheat and flour exports during August 1961-June 1962, based on preliminary data, amounted to some 336.5 million bushels, 4 per cent above those for the same months last year and the second largest total on record for the first eleven months of the crop year. Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August 1961-June 1962 and 11 preceding years (Canadian) are shown in the table below.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1961-62 (August-July) crop year, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 526.8 million and the 1961 production of 261.7 million, are placed at 788.5 million bushels, representing a decrease of 23 per cent from the 1960-61 total of 1,027.2 million. After deducting 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1961-62 would amount to 638.5 million bushels, 27 per cent below the 880.1 million in 1960-61.

Exports of wheat as grain during the August-June period of the current crop year amounted to 307.0 million bushels, 5 per cent greater than the 291.3 million exported during the same months a year ago. Exports of wheat flour, in terms of wheat, during August-June this year were estimated at 29.6 million bushels, bringing total exports of wheat and flour during the same eleven months, to some 336.5 million bushels and representing an increase of 4 per cent over the 324.4 million a year ago. In addition this year's August-June total is the largest since 1928-29 and the second highest on record. The balance remaining on July 1, 1962 for export and for carryover, amounted to 302.0 million bushels, 45 per cent less than the July 1, 1961 total of 555.7 million.

Deliveries of Canadian wheat from farms (both east and west) up to July 18 of the current crop year amounted to 268.5 million bushels compared with last year's corresponding total of 360.8 million. Quality of this year's deliveries continues to be unusually high. Wheat inspected by the Board of Grain Commissioners during the eleven months of the 1961-62 crop year indicates that about 93 per cent of inspected deliveries were recorded in the grades No. 4 Northern and higher as against the comparable 1960-61 figure of 75 per cent. Deliveries of wheat during the four weeks June 21 to July 18 amounted to some 34.0 million bushels while disappearance into domestic and export channels during the same four weeks totalled 24.6 million. With primary marketings exceeding domestic and export requirements by small amounts, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased steadily from 294.8 million bushels at the week ending June 20 to a level of 304.2 million at July 18, 1962.

The total visible supply at July 18, 1962 was 27 per cent less than the comparable 1961 figure of 416.0 million and 29 per cent below the 1960 total of 427.8 million bushels. Compared with a year ago, the largest single decrease occurred in country elevator stocks, with supplies in this position recorded at 141.6 million bushels in contrast to 234.6 million a year ago and 241.6 million two years ago. Wheat stocks at interior terminals, at 8.3 million bushels, registered declines from both the 1961 total of 10.6 million and the 11.8 million in 1960. The 12.5 million bushels "in transit rail" were sharply reduced from last year's level of 19.6 million and the 19.5 million of two years ago. Lakehead stocks at July 18, 1962, at 58.5 million bushels, exceeded by 17 per cent the 1961 total of 50.3 million and also surpassed the 1960 figure of 57.8 million bushels by one per cent. The 6.6 million bushels "in transit lake" represented a 9 per cent decline from the 7.3 million of a year ago but showed a 30 per cent increase over the 5.1 million of two years ago. The total of 26.1 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, at July 18 this year, was considerably less than the comparable total of 39.1 million in 1961 and was sharply below the 1960 figure of 43.0 million. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at 25.6 million bushels, were 15 per cent less than last year's total of 30.2 million and 9 per cent lower than the 28.2 million of two years ago. On the west coast, the 13.8 million bushels in Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria exceeded both the 12.8 million in 1961 and the 8.9 million in 1960.

Preliminary Figures Indicate
May 1962 Exports of Wheat
Flour and Bagged Seed Wheat
Total 3.3 Million Bushels

Based on preliminary data exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during May 1962 amounted to 3.2 million bushels, compared with the April total of 2.4 million and the adjusted May 1961 figure of 3.2 million bushels. Exports of bagged seed wheat

during May 1962, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 147,000 bushels, as against the April total of 576,000 and the May 1961 adjusted figure of 135,000 bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first ten months of the 1961-62 crop year, based on preliminary Customs returns, were the equivalent of 27.1 million bushels of wheat, 11 per cent less than the adjusted 1960-61 August-May total of 30.6 million. As with wheat as grain, Britain was the major market for Canadian wheat flour. Shipments of flour to that country during the period under review amounted to the equivalent of 10.2 million bushels and accounted for 38 per cent of the ten-month total. During the August-May period of 1960-61 shipments of wheat flour to Britain amounted to the equivalent of 11.4 million bushels and represented 37 per cent of the total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, with revised data for the August-May period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Ghana, 1,879 (1,661); Nigeria, 1,389 (726); Jamaica, 1,236 (1,210); United States, 1,131 (1,132); Trinidad and Tobago, 1,126 (1,195); Philippines, 1,120 (2,299); Leeward and Windward Islands,

841 (873); Japan, 810 (1,320); Hong Kong, 738 (635); Costa Rica, 701 (655); Lebanon, 544 (951); and Malaya and Singapore, 544 (467).

Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-May of the current crop year amounted to 3,227 thousand bushels compared with the adjusted total of 6,599 thousand bushels exported during the same months of the preceding crop year.

June 1962 Wheat Exports
Total 23.6 Million Bushels

Exports of wheat in bulk, as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners, during June 1962 amounted to 23.6 million bushels, below both the May level

of 35.1 million and the June 1961 figure of 35.5 million. This year's June total was also less than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the month of 28.6 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-June period of the 1961-62 crop year amounted to 303.7 million bushels and registered increases of 7 per cent over the comparable 1960-61 total of 284.7 million and 34 per cent above the ten-year (1950-51-1959-60) August-June average of 226.0 million bushels. Britain, as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 68.6 million bushels and representing 23 per cent of the eleven-month total. During the August-June period of the 1960-61 crop year shipments of wheat to this destination amounted to 72.8 million bushels and accounted for 26 per cent of the total. The bulk of the remainder was accounted for by shipments to Communist China, 66.3 million, Japan, 43.9 million and the Federal Republic of Germany, 43.0 million bushels. Exports of Canadian wheat to these countries during the first eleven months of the preceding crop year were to Communist China, 28.7 million, Japan, 50.1 million and the Federal Republic of Germany, 31.2 million bushels. Other relatively large markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first eleven months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Poland, 12.3 (2.3); Belgium and Luxembourg, 11.0 (11.6); East Germany, 8.0 (nil); Switzerland, 6.8 (6.4); Netherlands, 4.3 (5.8); Italy, 3.9 (14.9); Venezuela, 3.9 (2.7); India, 3.5 (4.0); and Philippines, 3.4 (0.9).

Delivery Quota
Policy 1962-63

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade re Quotas
(General) No. 2 under date of July 26, 1962 announced in part that
the Board wish to advise that all delivery quotas in effect in the
1961-62 crop year, including open quotas, all special permit authorizations and Order
No. 500 on Selected Barley, will automatically expire as at the close of business
July 31, 1962.

Effective on and after August 1, 1962, the quota policy of the Board for the 1962-63 crop year will be as follows: -

Durum Wheat Pending information on the outcome of the crop, a delivery quota of five (5) bushels per seeded acre of Durum Wheat, as shown in the individual producer's delivery permit book or 200 bushels whichever quantity is the larger, is hereby authorized effective on or after August 1, 1962.

All deliveries made under the foregoing, whether for storage or for sale, must be recorded in the producer's 1962-63 delivery permit book at the time of delivery and must be confined to the delivery point indicated therein unless written permission has been given.

Flaxseed is deliverable on an open quota basis for the crop year 1962-63. The Board, however, reserves the right to cancel this quota at any time.

All deliveries of flaxseed made during the crop year must be entered in the producer's permit book at the time of delivery and as in the previous year producers may deliver flaxseed to any delivery point selected by them at which space for flaxseed is available.

Rapeseed is deliverable on an open quota basis for the crop year 1962-63. The Board, however, reserves the right to cancel this quota at any time.

All deliveries of rapeseed made during the crop year must be entered in the producer's permit book at the time of delivery and may be delivered to any delivery point selected by them at which space for rapeseed is available.

Malting, Pot and Pearling Barley The Board will again consider applications on behalf of producers of malting, pot and/or pearling barley, for permission to deliver, in excess of the established quotas, one carlot of such barley provided:-

- (a) A representative sample of such carlot has been submitted to and accepted by a maltster or shipper as suitable for malting, pot and/or pearling; and
- (b) A premium is to be paid to the producer for the carlot of barley so accepted.

Full details under the foregoing provisions have been announced in Instructions to the Trade re Quotas (General) No. 1 of July 26, 1962.

Initial Delivery Quota 1962-63 Crop Year - Wheat, (excluding Durum), Oats, Barley and Rye Effective at all delivery points on and after August 1, 1962, the following initial quota is hereby authorized in respect of the above grains:

An initial delivery quota applicable to all permit holders regardless of the acreage shown on their 1962 permit books of the equivalent of one hundred (100) units. Each such unit shall be the equivalent of three (3) bushels of Wheat or ten (10) bushels of Oats or five (5) bushels of Barley or five (5) bushels of Rye.

As space becomes available each permit holder will be entitled to deliver at his option any of the above grains or any combination of the above grains calculated on the unit basis, but his total deliveries under the initial quota must not exceed the equivalent of one hundred (100) units.

Under the above policy a permit holder will be entitled to deliver a maximum of 300 bushels of Wheat or 1,000 bushels of Oats or 500 bushels of Barley or 500 bushels of Rye, or any combination of these grains which, when calculated on the unit basis outlined above, does not exceed one hundred (100) units.

All deliveries to be made under the initial quota must be entered in the producer's delivery permit book at the time of delivery. Such entries are to be made commencing on Page 1, with the quantity being entered in the appropriate column for the kind of grain delivered. The unit value of the delivery is to be determined by dividing the bushel quantity by three (3) in the case of Wheat, or ten (10) in the case of Oats, or five (5) in the case of Barley and Rye, calculating same to one decimal point. The total units delivered, as determined above, should then be entered in the "Total Delivery" column. For example, a load of 151.4 bushels would be entered as 50.4 units in the case of Wheat, 15.1 units in the case of Oats or 30.2 units if it consisted of Barley or Rye.

General Delivery Quotas 1962-63 Crop Year Following the initial quota, the Board will again establish general quotas at individual delivery points, based upon bushels per "specified" acre. The "specified" acreage upon which general delivery quotas will be based will consist of the total of each permit holder's acreage seeded to wheat (excluding Durum), oats, barley and rye, summerfallow, and the eligible acreage seeded to cultivated grasses and forage crops.

Comment

The Canadian Wheat Board Act provides that:-

- (a) the person delivering the grain is the actual producer or is entitled as a producer to the grain.
- (b) the grain was produced on the lands described in the permit book.

It will be noted that the initial quota and later general quotas as provided in 1961-62 will be again effective in 1962-63. It is expected that the past experience of producers and elevator agents, especially in regard to the initial quota, will be helpful in the administration of delivery quotas during the present crop year and that the available storage space will be handled this Fall and throughout the crop year in the best interests of all concerned.

Local Sales of Wheat

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade No.

6 under date of July 25, 1962 stated in part that all domestic sales of Board wheat ex country elevators, whether for feed or seed, will be made on the basis of the Board's domestic selling prices in store Fort William-Port Arthur as announced daily.

In the case of local sales of wheat for seed or feed purposes ex country elevators at delivery points with a freight differential in favour of Vancouver, the Vancouver freight rate will be allowed. At other delivery points, the Fort William-Port Arthur freight will be allowed.

Companies are requested to advise their agents that, until further notice, local sales ex country elevators of wheat for seed or feed purposes in quantities not exceeding five hundred (500) bushels per elevator per day may be made on the basis of these prices, to which may be added the regular diversion charge.

Local sales of wheat in excess of five hundred (500) bushels per day should not be made without first obtaining the approval of the Board's Winnipeg or Calgary Offices.

In all cases a delivery report must be made up and submitted to the Board within one week of the date of sale, the delivery report to show the Board's sales contract number, date of sale, quantity and grade of grain and date of delivery.

Crop Conditions in the Prairie Provinces bave benefited by fair to good rains during the last half of July according to a telegraphic crop report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on July 25. Rain came too late to materially benefit cereal crops in large areas of southeastern Alberta and some sections of southwestern Saskatchewan, but they will improve pastures and the winter fodder supply. In the remainder of the Prairie Provinces crop prospects in general vary from fair to excellent. Further general rains will be needed in many areas to maintain the heavy growth. Fall rye harvesting is commencing in southern districts and

haying is nearing completion. Grasshoppers are widespread but little damage has been reported to date.

Rust Development in
Western Canada in 1962

Station, Winnipeg, issued July 26, 1962 stated in part that the small amount of stem rust observed in commercial wheat fields probably results from the resistance of the predominant varieties to race 56 which preliminary race identifications and field observations indicate is predominant.

Weather conditions have favoured rust development in Manitoba and southeastern Saskatchewan. There has been abundant moisture for infection and lush crop growth. Northerly air movements deposited an abundance of inoculum (mostly wheat stem rust) over southern Manitoba and smaller amounts were carried into Saskatchewan. The lateness of the crop, especially in eastern Manitoba, also favours rust development.

There has been little change in the possibilities of future rust development since Report No. 4 was issued. In the rust area of Manitoba and eastern Saskatchewan the predominant wheat and barley varieties, excepting Montcalm barley, are only lightly infected. There is still time for rare virulent races to increase and cause damage but there are no signs that this may happen, except for durum wheat. Barley often ripens before rust damage becomes severe but this year late fields of the susceptible variety Montcalm may be damaged. Farther west, in Saskatchewan, there is still a possibility that leaf rust can develop on the susceptible variety Thatcher, but crops are earlier and the weather has been drier than in the rust area.

Ontario Winter Wheat

Support Price

June 30, 1963, will be supported at \$1.39 per bushel on track,
for No. 2 Canada Eastern Grade, or better quality. This

continues price support at the same level as last crop year and amounts to 86 per cent
of the base price or ten-year average of \$1.62 per bushel.

A deficiency payment will be made if the average price received by producers is less than \$1.39 per bushel.





Freight Assistance Shipments Claims filed for payment up to June 30, 1962 represent the movement of some 10.7 million bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-May period of the current crop year. During the corresponding period in 1960-61 claims had been filed for a total of 15.2

million bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1961-62 August-May shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 30 per cent below those of 1960-61. Revised data on the 1960-61 August-May shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to June 30, 1962 place the ten-month total at 15.7 million bushels. About 70 per cent of the shipments during the current period under review went to destinations in Ontario and Quebec.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 429,323 tons during the August-May period of the current crop year. During the same ten months of 1960-61 claims had been filed for a total of 485,742 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the 1961-62 August-May shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 12 per cent below those of 1960-61. Revised data on the 1960-61 August-May shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to June 30, 1962 place the ten-month total at 503,149 tons. Shipments amounting to 211,201 tons and 115,572 tons to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, respectively, accounted for a combined 76 per cent of the August-May 1961-62 total.






FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT AND WHEAT FLOUR**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*



FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**





CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during June 1962 amounted to 3,631,000 hundred-weight, representing increases of 8 per cent over the May output of 3,360,000 hundred-weight, 15 per cent greater than the June 1961 total of 3,149,000 hundredweight and 6 per cent above the ten-year (1952-61) average production for the month of June of 3,427,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during June 1962 had a total rated capacity of 163,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 85.6 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during June 1962 amounted to 8,051,000 bushels, 8 per cent above the 7,473,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 14 per cent greater than the 7,056,000 bushels milled during June 1961. Of the wheat milled for flour during June 1962, some 7,283,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (586,000 bushels); Durum (100,000 bushels); and all other (82,000) bushels.

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during May 1962 amounted to 1,375,000 hundredweight (some 3,162,000 bushels of wheat equivalent); representing an increase of 33 per cent over the 2,381,000 bushels exported during the previous month, but relatively unchanged from the adjusted May 1961 total of 3,166,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty-two countries with exports to Britain amounting to 1,299,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 41 per cent of the May 1962 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent were as follows: Nigeria, 341; Ghana, 273; Trinidad and Tobago, 230; United States, 158; Jamaica, 122; and Dominican Republic, 115.

NOTE: Official wheat flour export data for June were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The figure for June included in this report represents an unofficial estimate.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Disappearance of United States Wheat Increased 3 Per Cent from Preceding Year Total disappearance (exports plus domestic use) of United States wheat during the crop year (July-June) 1961-62 amounted to 1,307 million bushels and exceeded by 3 per cent the 1960-61 comparable total of 1,267 million. The increase in total disappearance from the 1960-61 level was due to a record

export movement which more than offset a small decrease in domestic requirements. Preliminary data indicate that the record 1961-62 exports of wheat, wheat flour and products in terms of grain equivalent amounted to 713.5 million bushels, representing an increase of 8 per cent over the next-to-record 1960-61 total of 661.5 million. In addition, the 1961-62 exports of United States wheat exceeded domestic requirements for the second consecutive year. Exports of wheat as grain increased from 561.2 million in 1960-61 to 606.3 million in 1961-62 while exports of wheat flour and other wheat products were equivalent to 107.2 million bushels compared with 100.3 million in the preceding year. Domestic requirements in the crop year recently completed declined from an estimated 605.9 million bushels in 1960-61 to 594.0 million in 1961-62. Combined domestic and export disappearance was larger than 1961 production, however, and as a result carryover stocks at July 1, 1962 declined to 1,345.0 million bushels from the 1,412.2 million bushel level of the previous year.

In a report released on July 10, the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated in part that production of all wheat is forecast at 1,050 million bushels, 15 per cent below last year and 7 per cent below average. The indicated yield at 23.8 bushels per harvested acre is nearly the same as the 23.9 bushels for the 1961 crop. Lower yields for winter wheat this year were nearly compensated for by sharply higher spring wheat yields.

Total acreage of all wheat harvested for grain is expected to be 44.1 million acres, 15 per cent under last year and 20 per cent below average. The all-wheat national allotment is 55 million acres for the 1962 crop with a mandatory 10 per cent cut (if the grower is to be in compliance). In addition the 1962 program permits growers to divert more than the mandatory 10 per cent -- up to as much as 40 per cent of the farm wheat allotment. Offsetting these acreage reductions, to a degree, are allowable increases in durum wheat acreage under the 1962 program.

The winter wheat harvest moved rapidly northward during June and by July 1 was active as far north as southeastern Nebraska and Central Illinois. Smaller than expected harvest returns in southwestern areas and the impact of rust damage in Nebraska overweighted higher production estimates for Kansas, the Eastern Corn Belt and the Northwest.

The winter wheat crop is now forecast at 836 million bushels, 22 per cent less than last year and 5 per cent below average. The yield forecast at 24.7 bushels per harvested acre, while 1.7 bushels below last year, is the fourth highest of record, exceeded only in 1958, 1960 and 1961. Lower production from this year's crop is largely the result of less acreage for harvest.

The acreage seeded for the 1962 crop of winter wheat was 38.5 million acres. Acreage to be harvested for grain was estimated at 33.8 million acres, 17 per cent less than in 1961. Abandonment and diversion to other uses accounted for 12.2 per cent of the seeded acreage. Abandonment and diversion were sizeable in Missouri, Texas, Oklahoma, and Colorado due to spring drought. In the Northwest, considerable winter killed wheat was re-seeded to spring varieties.

Durum wheat production is forecast at 47.3 million bushels, more than double the 1961 crop and nearly double the average production. This would be the largest production since 1930. The sharp increase in production reflects a significant increase in areas for harvest as well as an extremely favourable outlook for yields. The prospective yield per harvested acre of 20.1 bushels is about 8 bushels above last year and ranks as the third highest of record.

Durum wheat was planted on 2.5 million acres in 1962, a rather sharp increase of 44 per cent over last year and a third larger than average. Most of the acreage was seeded under ample soil moisture conditions and, in sharp contrast to the previous year, the important producing Dakotas and Minnesota would welcome warm sunny weather.

Production of spring wheat other than durum is forecast at 167 million bushels, a fifth larger than the 1961 crop, but still the second smallest crop since 1939. The relatively small production reflects the small acreage devoted to other spring wheat as yields are expected to be the second highest of record. The expected yield of 21.2 bushels per harvested acre is more than 6 bushels above last year and nearly 4 bushels above average.

Planted acreage of spring wheat other than durum is estimated at 8.1 million acres, the smallest since estimates were initiated in 1926 and only slightly more than one-half the 10-year average. All producing States show moderate to sharp reductions in planted acres except Washington, Oregon and Nevada. The important producing Dakotas and Minnesota report reductions of about a fourth with Montana reduced more than a tenth. Early season moisture has been good with most of the acreage making very favourable early season growth. Eastern North Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota were plagued with excessive moisture that slowed planting and resulted in considerable late seeded acreage. Abandonment is expected to be light leaving about 7.9 million acres for harvest, the smallest since 1934 and the second smallest of record dating from 1919.

Wheat Stocks On Farms

Stocks of old-crop wheat on farms July 1 totaled 102 million bushels, 26 per cent less than a year earlier, but 36 per cent more than the 1951-60 average. The July 1 carryover amounted to slightly more than 8 per cent of the 1961 production. Wheat stocks in 5 States, North Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Montana, and Colorado, represented almost three-fourths

Disappearance during the April-June quarter amounted to 109 million bushels, 10 per cent less than the movement for the same period of 1961 and 27 per cent less than average.

U. S. Wheat and Flour
Exports Set Record

reached a new record of 714 million bushels, according to preliminary tabulations. This compares with 662 million bushels exported in fiscal 1961.

Wheat and flour exported from the United States from July 1961 through May 1962 amounted to 660 million bushels, compared with 609 million bushels for the same period of 1960-61. Exports for the 11-month period were 8 per cent higher than the previous year.

Wheat exports totaled 559 million bushels compared with 515 million a year earlier. Exports increased to certain destinations which more than offset lower exports to others. Shipments to Brazil, the Netherlands, Japan, and Yugoslavia were larger than the previous season. In contrast, exports declined to Italy, Poland, India, and Pakistan.

Flour exports amounted to 101 million bushels, compared with 94 million for 1960-61. Exports increased to Egypt which continues to be the largest market for U.S. flour. Slight increases were also made in shipments to the United Kingdom and Japan.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position

Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1961-62 (December-November) crop year amount to some 270.6 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1961 carryover of 24.3 million and the current crop officially estimated at 246.3 million bushels. The current total, reflecting relatively sharp declines in both carryover stocks and production, represents an 18 per cent reduction from the 1960-61 total of 331.4 million. After deducting 76.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 194.6 million are available for export and for carryover during 1961-62, as against 255.7 million in 1960-61.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1-June 23 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 132.3 million bushels 2 per cent more than the 129.7 million exported during the corresponding period of 1960-61. The balance remaining on June 24, 1962, for export and for carryover, at 62.3 million bushels, represented a decrease of 51 per cent from the comparable 1961 figure of 126.0 million.

Crop Position

With the satisfactory prices that have prevailed there appears to be a general tendency on the part of the Australian wheatgrower to plant an expanded acreage to wheat this season. Though it is as yet early to forecast

a crop, with an estimated acreage of 15.4 million acres subject to favourable growing conditions there could be in 1962-63 a yield of 300 million bushels.

It is likely that both New South Wales and Western Australia might approach an acreage of five million. New South Wales has had an acreage of this amount on two occasions - 1930 and 1947. Estimated acreages for the various states compared with 1961-62 are as follows:

The West Australian growers representative to the Wheat Board has indicated that sales of wheat to regular markets is proceeding as anticipated by the Board and stocks held against these requirements are disappearing rapidly in all States.

Wheat Research The Commonwealth Government and the wheat industry will contribute about £436,000 (\$1,060,000) to wheat research in 1962-63.

The Minister for Primary Industry, Mr. Adermann, has announced the Commonwealth will provide £218,000 (\$530,000) of this amount to match grower contributions raised by a one farthing per bushel levy.

New research work financed by the Commonwealth and approved by the Wheat Industry Research Council would include investigations into organisms causing root rot and seeding blight, the separating mechanism of the wheat harvester and soil moisture storage in fallowed land.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position

Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the 1961-62 (December-November) crop year amount to 222.7 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1961 carryover of 35.3 million and the new crop, placed at 187.4 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a 29 per cent increase in production which more than offset a decline in carryover stocks, are about 13 per cent more than the 1960-61 total of 197.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 136.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 86.8 million are available for export and for carryover compared with 74.8 million in 1960-61.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1961-June 1962 amounted to 77.2 million bushels, exceeding by a wide margin the 29.7 million exported during the same months in 1960-61. The balance remaining on July 1, 1962 for export and for carryover was estimated at 9.6 million bushels, substantially below the July 1, 1961 total of 45.1 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.O.R. Rousseau, Commercial Secretary, Buenos Aires, under date of July 20, 1962 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 120 pesos per U.S. dollar.

Weather and Crops

During the period under review weather conditions have not been paricularly favourable. During the first week of July much-needed rainfall occurred over a considerable area of the Pampas (which includes the provinces of Buenos Aires, Entre Rios, Cordoba and Santa Fe). However, unfortunately, where rain was most needed - in the province of La Pampa and in the southern and south western portions of Buenos Aires province - hardly a drop fell and the drought situation is desperate in some areas. Drought conditions exist over a considerable part of the southern wheat growing belt which in normal years accounts for almost 50 per cent of the total Argentine wheat crop. The present outlook for production from that area is very poor as in many areas the drought has prevented seeding and it will soon be too late to seed this season. Other areas in the southern grain belt which would normally be seeded to oats, barley and rye are suffering from the same problems. It is too early to provide a forecast of acreage seeded to wheat.

Wheat

The Grain Board has sold practically all of the 800,000 metric tons (29,395,000 bushels) offered to millers at the beginning of June. Up to July 6 some 767,804 metric tons (28,212,000 bushels) had been sold at

the established price of 540 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.22 per bushel), gross weight, in bags, f.o.r. station or port nearest to the purchasing mill. It is intended that these stocks will take care of domestic requirements until the beginning of the new crop year. It is reported that apart from these stocks there is very little wheat left, probably only enough for seed requirements. Of course, in Argentina it is never possible to determine accurately the quantity of wheat being held by farmers but the figure included in the statistical table, of 200,000 metric tons (7,349,000 bushels) is believed to be a reasonable estimate.

During the first six months of 1962 more than 5 million metric tons of wheat and other grains have been exported as compared with the following quantities during the like periods of previous years: 1961 - 2 million tons; 1960 -3.3 million and 1959 2.7 million. Exports of wheat during the first six months of 1962 totalled almost 2 million metric tons (73,487,000 bushels), the comparative figures for the same periods of previous years being: 1961 - 718,000 tons (26,383,000 bushels): 1960 - 1,255,000 (46,113,000 bushels) and 1959 - 1,506,000 (55,335,000 bushels). The National Grain Board believes that the present economic instability of the country and the ever-diminishing value of the Argentine peso resulted in producers and exporters wishing to sell their grain as soon as possible. As a consequence, export trade normally carried out over a period of over nine or ten months has been sandwiched into a period of about six months and serious congestion has resulted, particularly in terminal port elevators. The existing elevators system which is owned and operated by the National Grain Board - is capable of handling up to 10 million metric tons of grains and oilseeds per year, but this figure is based on a uniform movement throughout the year.

FRENCH SITUATION

Supply Position

Total estimated commercial domestic supplies of wheat in France for the crop year (August-July) 1961-62, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 67.5 million bushels and marketings of 257.2 million, amounted to some 324.7 million bushels, three per cent less than the 1960-61 total (including August-May imports of 3.2 million bushels) of 335.8 million. After deducting 211.3 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, a total of 113.4 million were available for export and for carryover during 1961-62, 11 per cent below the 1960-61 level of 127.8 million.

Combined exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the first ten months of the current crop year amounted to 52.5 million bushels relatively little changed from the comparable 1960-61 total of 50.3 million. The balance of commercial supplies remaining on June 1, 1962 amounted to 61.0 million bushels compared with the June 1, 1961 total of 77.5 million.

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. A.G. Kniewasser, Commercial Counsellor, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of July 26, 1962, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from French to Canadian measures have been made and rounded for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of one new france equals .2207 Canadian dollars the quotation in effect on June 29, 1962.

Although characterized by sudden shifts between above and below average temperatures, rainfall and sunshine, July weather has not dimmed the prospect for a good wheat harvest. The season still lags a normal year and regional reports on crop conditions indicate wide fluctuations in yield estimates for different cereals, but generally better prospects exist for winter than for spring-sown cereals. On the whole, however, yield prospects for wheat are good, average for barley,

and below average for oats and corn.

Threshing started in the southern portion of the Paris region during the first week of August and by the middle of the month the harvest should be underway in the northern areas as well. In Algeria the crop, now under harvest, is reported as being above average, and provided all the crop can be taken in properly, production should be above average. The harvest in Morocco has exceeded earlier forecasts and durum wheat production is now estimated at one million tons (36.7 million bushels) of which 150,000 to 200,000 tons (5.5 million to 7.3 million bushels) may be available for export. French production estimates as of July 1, 1961 and 1962 figures were as follows:


French officials have been investigating the possibility of contracting for the import of Moroccan durum wheat under special arrangements within the common market regulations respecting cereals. The EEC Commission however is apparently hesitant in approving a program of this type which might establish certain precedents. On July 12, 1962, French cereal prices for the 1962-63 crop year were announced as follows:

Prices for durum wheat and corn as well as threshold prices for all cereals are expected to be published shortly. During July France imported 6,000 tons (220,000 bushels) of Manitoba wheat originally intended for an Algerian port. However, this wheat was not for use in France and was subsequently re sold to another European buyer. France purchased about 15,000 tons (551,000 bushels) of durum wheat, of which 12,000 metric tons (441,000 bushels) was purchased from Syria and the balance from Israel.

CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- July 16 The United States Department of Agriculture announced that the national average support price for 1962-crop wheat will be \$2.00 per bushel, unchanged from the minimum "advance" support price used in setting country and terminal support rates announced May 25.
- August 1 The preliminary estimates of 1962 crop acreages indicate that Canadian farmers planted 26.9 million acres to all classes of wheat, including a record 3.2 million acres of Durum. Saskatchewan all wheat acreage of 17.4 million is a record for that province.



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
