

#### WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Less than a Year Ago With the exception of Canada, wheat supplies in each of the four major exporting countries are reduced from a year ago and, as a result, latest available estimates indicate that total supplies of wheat remaining on or about October 1, 1962

in these same countries, for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years, amounted to 2,453.9 million bushels, 7 per cent below the 2,632.1 million available a year ago. Supplies at October 1, 1962, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,660.7 (1,851.0); Canada, 744.1 (682.7); Argentina, 13.1 (40.6); and Australia, 36.0 (57.8). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

August-September Exports Register Decline With decreased shipments from United States, Canada and Australia more than offsetting larger exports from Argentina total exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat from the four major exporting countries during the first two months of

the 1962-63 crop year amounted to 173.2 million bushels, some 21 per cent less than last year's record August-September level of 219.7 million but 19 per cent more than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the same period of 145.9 million. Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August-September 1962 with comparisons appear in the accompanying table.

World Durum Supplies Large Total supplies of durum wheat available for world trade, in marked contrast to 1961-62 will be in the vicinity of 125 million bushels, or more than twice the quantity normally

entering the international trade each year. Mid-September indications were that the Canadian crop would amount to an all-time record high of 61 million bushels compared with last year's harvest of 14.5 million. Other countries have also harvested bumper crops of durum wheat. The United States crop increased from 19 million bushels in 1961 to 67 million in 1962. Argentina, Spain, Syria, Morocco and Tunisia will all have exportable supplies this year. The total world trade in durum wheat in recent years has been about 55 million bushels per year.

#### CANADIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1962-63 crop year are presently placed at 947.1 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 395.7 million and the 1962 crop, forecast on the basis of conditions at September 15, at 551.4 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated, reflecting a substantial increase in production which more than offset a sharp decline in carryover stocks, represent an increase of 6 per cent over the 1961-62 total of 891.2 million bushels. Assuming realization of the September forecast of production and after making an allowance of 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1962-63 would amount to 797.1 million bushels, 6 per cent above the 753.6 million in 1961-62.

Exports of wheat as grain during the August-September period of the current crop year amounted to 47.4 million bushels, compared with 64.9 million exported during the same months a year ago. Exports of wheat flour, in terms of wheat, during August-September this year were estimated at 5.6 million bushels, bringing total exports of wheat and flour during the same two months, to some 53.0 million bushels, as against the 70.8 million exported during the comparable period a year ago. Subject to realization of current production and utilization estimates, the balance remaining on October 1, 1962 for export and for carryover, amounted to 744.1 million bushels, 9 per cent larger than the October 1, 1961 total of 682.7 million.

Farmers' marketings of wheat, (both east and west) up to October 17 of the 1962-63 crop year amounted to 102.6 million bushels and exceeded by 43 per cent last year's corresponding total of 71.7 million. Some 68.5 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the four weeks September 20 to October 17. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to about 39.1 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased steadily from 321.9 million bushels at September 19 to a level of 352.1 million at October 17, 1962.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at October 17 this year represented declines of 14 per cent from the 1961 comparable total of 408.8 million and 18 per cent less than the 1960 figure of 427.5 million. Most of the decrease was accounted for by substantially smaller totals in country elevators, with stocks in this position, at 186.7 million bushels sharply lower than both the 1961 and 1960 comparable figures of 237.7 million and 247.6 million bushels, respectively. Stocks of wheat at interior terminals at October 17, 1962 were recorded at 6.9 million bushels in contrast to 10.4 million a year ago and 11.2 million two years ago. The 16.8 million bushels "in transit rail" (Western Division) represented relatively sharp increases over both the 1961 total of 13.5 million and the 1960 figure of 8.1 million. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead at October 17 this year, amounted to 51.3 million bushels, surpassing by 9 per cent last year's comparable total of 47.1 million and 2 per cent greater than the 50.2 million bushels in this position two years ago. Stocks in transit lake amounted to 9.5 million bushels compared with 8.7 million in 1961 and 10.1 million in 1960. The 28.0 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, at 28.0 million bushels, were substantially lower than the 39.7 million of a year ago and the 45.4 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports at October 17, 1962 amounted to 31.0 million bushels and also recorded declines from the 1961 and 1960 levels of 34.0 million and 36.1 million bushels, respectively. On the west coast, however, total supplies in Vancouver-New Westminster and Victoria were recorded at 12.3 million bushels as against 8.3 million a year ago and 8.6 million two years ago. At the port of Churchill wheat supplies totalled 1.1 million bushels compared with 2.4 million in each of the two preceding years.

September 1962 Exports of Wheat and Flour Total 28.2 Million Bushels Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during September 1962 amounted to 28.2 million bushels, 14 per cent greater than the August total of 24.8 million and 12 per

cent more than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the month of September of 25.1 million, but 12 per cent below the September 1961 total of 32.0 million bushels. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during September 1962, at 25.0 million bushels, were 14 per cent above the 21.9 million exported during the preceding month and 15 per cent more than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the month of September of 21.7 million. Exports of bagged seed wheat during September 1962, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 228 thousand bushels compared with the August figure of 160 thousand and the September 1961 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 242 thousand bushels. Customs returns also indicate that the equivalent of 2.9 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during September 1962, 10 per cent above the August total of 2.7 million and 5 per cent more than the adjusted September 1961 total of 2.8 million.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-September 1962 period amounted to 47.0 million bushels, representing a decrease of 27 per cent from the comparable 1961 total of 64.6 million. Britain, remaining in its position as Canada's leading market for wheat, received shipments amounting to 13.0 million bushels and representing 28 per cent of the two-month total. During August-

September 1961 shipments of wheat to Britain amounted to 14.9 million bushels and accounted for 23 per cent of the total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first two months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 7.8 (9.1); Poland, 5.4 (1.4); China, Communist, 4.9 (13.5); Federal Republic of Germany, 3.2 (7.2); Belgium and Luxembourg, 2.3 (2.8); Netherlands, 2.0 (0.9); Philippines, 1.6 (0.4); Norway, 1.6 (1.0); and Italy, 1.5 (0.5). Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-September of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 388 thousand bushels compared with last year's comparable total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 331 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first two months of the 1962-63 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 5.6 million bushels, 5 per cent less than the adjusted August-September 1961 total of 5.9 million bushels. As with bulk wheat, Britain was also the major market for Canadian wheat flour. Shipments of wheat flour to that country during the period under review amounted to the equivalent of 2,352 thousand bushels and accounted for 42 per cent of the August-September 1962 total. During the same months of the 1961-62 crop year shipments of wheat flour to Britain amounted to the equivalent of 1,942 thousand bushels and represented 33 per cent of the total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-September period of the 1962-63 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Nigeria, 522 (265); Trinidad and Tobago, 306 (219); Ghana, 287 (470); Jamaica, 262 (228); Costa Rica, 209 (115); Leeward and Windward Islands, 209 (192); United States, 201 (168); Lebanon, 160 (499); Sierra Leone, 152 (168); and Hong Kong, 147 (150).

Rye Quota Declared
Open in Prairie Provinces

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade
re Quotas (General) No. 12 under date of October 19,
1962 stated in part that effective immediately the
delivery quota on rye is declared open for the balance of the crop year 1962-63 at
all delivery points in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Quality of 1962 Western Canadian Wheat The following information relative to the quality of this year's wheat crop in the Prairie Provinces is taken from a press release issued on October 24 by the Grain Research Laboratory of the Board of Grain Commissioners.

The 1962 Canadian Hard Red Spring wheat crop maintains the high levels of milling quality and baking strength shown by crops of the past five years, according to studies made by the Board of Grain Commissioners' Laboratory. Consequently domestic millers should have no difficulty in changing over to new wheat and overseas millers can be assured of a continuation of high quality shipments. Red spring wheat production is estimated at 471 million bushels, and it is expected that 67 per cent of the crop will grade No. 3 Northern and higher. Average bushel weights for the new crop No. 1 to No. 4 Northern are 65.0,63.4, 62.5 and 62.8 lbs., and corresponding protein levels are 14.3, 14.0, 13.8 and 13.4 per cent. Compared with last year's crop, the new crop is somewhat higher in flour yield, while flour ash and flour color are at much the same level. Although protein content is a little lower, baking strength and supporting value are higher.

By October 22, 1962, out of a total of 1,942 shipping points in the

Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 686 points on
a quota of three bushels per specified acre, 672 points on a 2-bushel

quota and 512 points on a 1-bushel quota. Only 64 points remained on the Initial Unit

Quota while 8 points were recorded as "closed". In addition, rye, flaxseed and

rapeseed were on an open quota basis while durum wheat was on a quota of 8 bushels per

seeded acre (minimum delivery 350 bushels) and soft white spring wheat was on a quota

of 5 bushels per seeded acre.

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, October 17, 1962 Compared with Approximately the Same Date, 1960 and 1961





Lake Shipments

Total shipments of the five major grains out of Lakehead terminals
from the opening of navigation to October 17 this year amounted to
147.6 million bushels, as against the 233.0 million shipped during the comparable
period of 1961. In 1962 the season of navigation opened on April 22 while the 1961
season opened on April 9. Shipments of wheat, although sharply below last year's total,
accounted for about 72 per cent of the current total. Rye was the only one of the
five grains moving in greater volume this year than last.

Wheat Shipments to the United States by Destination

Total shipments of wheat to the United States, either for reexport or retention for domestic use, from the beginning of the current crop year to October 17, 1962 amounted to only 17 thousand bushels, with all of this quantity moved by rail. During

the comparable periods of 1961 and 1960 combined rail and vessel shipments amounted to 352 thousand and 500 thousand bushels, respectively.

Claims filed for payment up to September 30, 1962 represent the movement of only 739 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during August 1962. During the same month last year claims had been filed for a total of 1,059 thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both months, that August shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 30 per cent below those of August 1961. Revised data on August shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to September 30, 1962 place the one-month total at 1,414 thousand bushels. The bulk of the shipments during the month under review went to destinations in Ontario and Quebec, with these two provinces accounting for 41 per cent and 46 per cent of the total, respectively.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 24,456 tons during the first month of the current crop year. During August 1961 claims had been filed for a total of 35,148 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during August 1962 and August 1961, that this year's shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 30 per cent below those of 1961. Revised data on August 1961 shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to September 30, 1962 place the one-month total at 50,234 tons. Shipments of 12,362 tons to Quebec and 7,703 tons to Ontario, accounted for a combined 82 per cent of the August movement of freight assisted millfeeds.






# FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT\* AND WHEAT FLOUR\*\*




# FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS\*






# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS\* AND OAT PRODUCTS\*\*

#### CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during September 1962 amounted to 2,863,000 hundredweight, and represented decreases of 3 per cent below the August output of 2,953,000 hundredweight, 8 per cent less than the September 1961 figure of 3,124,000 hundredweight, and 18 per cent lower than the ten-year (1952-61) average production for the month of September of 3,476,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during September 1962 had a total rated capacity of 165,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 24-day working period 72.5 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during September 1962 amounted to 6,346,000 bushels, 4 per cent less than the 6,577,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 10 per cent lower than the 7,037,000 bushels milled during September 1961. Of the wheat milled for flour during September 1962, some 5,490,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (631,000 bushels); Durum (159,000 bushels); and all other (67,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during September 1962 amounted to 1,278,000 hundredweight (some 2,939,000 bushels of wheat equivalent), and represented an increase of 10 per cent over the 2,670,000 bushels exported during the previous month, and 5 per cent more than the adjusted September 1961 exports of 2,786,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty-four countries with exports to Britain amounting to 1,229,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 42 per cent of the September 1962 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent, were as follows: Nigeria, 272; Lebanon, 159; Ghana, 142; Jamaica, 140; Trinidad and Tobago, 137; Hong Kong, 101 and Leeward and Windward Islands, 100.

#### UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Position

Domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1962-63 crop year are estimated at 2,399.5 million bushels, consisting of the July 1, 1962 carryover of 1,304.3 million and the 1962 crop, estimated as of October 1, at 1,095.2 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated would be 9 per cent less than last year's total of 2,645.9 million and 10 per cent smaller than the record 1960-61 figure of 2,670.8 million bushels. Imports of wheat from Canada during July-September of the current United States crop year amounted to 0.7 million bushels. Domestic disappearance during 1962-63 is estimated at about 605.0 million bushels, 4 per cent less than the 630.5 million last year. Use for food, the principal domestic use, is expected to be about 502 million bushels, while use for feed is estimated to be about 40 million bushels. Seed use in 1962-63 is estimated at about 63 million bushels. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,795.2 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 11 per cent from the 2,016.2 million in 1961-62.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during July-September 1962 amounted to 145.5 million bushels, 12 per cent below the 165.2 million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on October 1, 1962 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,649.7 million bushels compared with 1,851.0 million on the same date a year ago.

The Voluntary 1963 Wheat Program According to the October 24, 1962 issue of the Wheat Situation published by Economic Research Service, United States Department of Agriculture farmers already have approved marketing quotas

for the 1963 crop of wheat, and the seeding of winter wheat was largely guided by the program on which farmers voted last August. The 1962 Farm Bill does not require farmers to change their plans and they continue to be eligible for price support at \$1.82 per bushel (minimum national average support), if they do not exceed their farm acreage allotment based upon the 55-million-acre national allotment. The Bill does provide, however, a voluntary diversion program for the 1963 crop of wheat similar to that for the 1962 crop. To participate in this program, producers must divert to conservation use at least 20 per cent of (1) their wheat acreage allotment or (2), in the case of small farms with allotments of less than 15 acres, their allotment or their average 1959, 1960 and 1961 plantings of wheat, whichever is larger. They then would be eligible for diversion payments equal to 50 per cent of the value of normal production on the diverted acreage, based on the support rate, and for payment at a rate of 18 cents per bushel on the normal production of the acreage devoted to wheat. The 1959 and 1960 average yield is used in deriving normal production. The maximum acreage diversion on any farm would be the larger of 50 per cent of the allotment or 10 acres.

Any grower who signs to divert acreage in 1963 must reduce his acreage by the amount of the signup or he will lose price support eligibility, as well as all payments under the voluntary portion of the program.

The price support payment of 18 cents per bushelwill be made in payment-in-kind certificates and CCC will assist farmers in marketing the certificates. CCC will be permitted to sell wheat from its stocks at not less than the \$1.82 price support level to cover the cost of those certificates that it redeems for farmers.

The diversion payment may be made in either cash or certificates. This same provision was included in the 1962 Wheat Stabilization Program and all payments were made in cash.

The signup period for the special voluntary 1963 wheat program will run from October 15 to December 14 for winter wheat. The signup period for spring wheat will be after the first of the year.

The Wheat Outlook for 1963

The "Wheat Situation" stated further that the 1963 diversion program, which came into effect after much of the winter wheat crop was seeded differs from the voluntary diversion portion of

the 1962 program in several ways. One of the most important differences is the provision requiring compliance with 1963 signup intentions as a condition of price support eligibility. In 1962, farmers were required to reduce their acreage allotment by 10 per cent while as much as an additional 30 per cent could be diverted on a voluntary basis and price support eligibility was not affected by any change in farmers' plans to divert acreage on the voluntary portion.

Because of the differences in the 1962 and 1963 diversion programs and the timing element, it is difficult to draw a comparison between the voluntary participation in the 1962 program and expected voluntary participation in the 1963 program. However, assuming that the voluntary diversion in 1963 is about 7 million acres, the harvested acreage might be about 47 million. This would be 3 million more than was harvested in 1962. With a continuation of the upward trend in yields, a yield of 26 bushels per harvested acre might prevail. This would be slightly more than 1 bushel above that in 1962.

The resulting 1963 crop of 1,225 million bushels, along with the expected July 1, 1963 carryover of 1,200 million and imports of about 5 million, would provide a total supply of 2,430 million bushels. A beginning supply of this size would be somewhat larger than the currently indicated 1962-63 wheat supply. Domestic disappearance in 1963-64 might be about 5 million bushels smaller than that estimated for 1962-63, although exports might be about 25 million larger. As a result, the carryover on July 1, 1964 might show little change from the 1,200 million bushels currently estimated for the end of 1962-63. Without the voluntary diversion program, stocks would increase.

1962 Wheat Crop Forecast at 1,095 Million Bushels In a report released on October 10, the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated that production of all wheat is estimated at 1,095 million bushels, practically the same as the September 1 estimate, but 3 per cent

below average and 11 per cent smaller than last year. Spring wheats constituted 26 per cent of the total wheat this year compared with 13 per cent last year and the average of 22 per cent.

Production of <u>durum wheat</u> is estimated at 67 million bushels. Last year's drought-shrunken production was 19 million and the average for the 1951-60 period is 25 million bushels. The yield of 28.6 bushels per acre is an all-time record and nearly double the average.

On October 1 some durum wheat was still unharvested along the Canadian border areas of northeastern North Dakota and northwestern Minnesota. Cool weather and heavy dew hindered the drying of durum wheat lying in swaths and restricted combining to only a few hours each day. Quality of the crop shows wide variation due to some stem rust damage on susceptible varieties and the prolonged harvesting period.

Other spring wheat production, estimated at 213 million bushels, was down slightly from the September 1 forecast. The present estimate is 53 per cent above last year's small production, but 6 per cent below average. The yield of 27.0 bushels per harvested acre is a record high compared with last year's 15.0 bushel average and the ten-year average of 17.3 bushels.

Production prospects were maintained during September in all States except Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Idaho. Cool weather and severe frosts slowed maturity and caused some shriveled grain in late areas of Minnesota and Wisconsin. Stripe rust in eastern Idaho caused yields in that State to drop below earlier expectations.

By October 1, the harvest of other spring wheat was nearing completion. In northeastern North Dakota and northwestern Minnesota, most wheat fields were cut, but a considerable acreage was still in the swath. Cool weather and heavy dews slowed drying of the grain and restricted combining activity. Only occasional fields were still unharvested at higher elevations of the Northwest.

Stocks of Wheat in All Positions October 1, 1962 United States wheat stocks of 2,069 million bushels stored in all positions at October 1, 1962 were a sharp 11 per cent below a year earlier and the smallest October 1 holdings since 1957. Wheat held in storage on farms and in Government-owned bin sites

were both smaller than a year earlier but the bulk of the decline in total stocks occurred in elevators and warehouses. Durum wheat stocks were estimated at 69.5 million bushels on October 1, somewhat more than the 1962 production and indicating

a disappearance of about 3 million bushels during the July-September period.

The Crop Reporting Board, United States Department of Agriculture, in its Crop Production report under date of October 10 stated in part that stocks of all wheat on farms October 1 totaled 414 million bushels, 11 per cent below October 1, 1961 and 15 per cent below the 1951-60 average. Disappearance from farms during the July-September quarter totaled 783 million bushels, compared with 906 million bushels for the same quarter of 1961 and 715 million bushels for the ten-year average. Wheat farm stocks in North Dakota, Kansas, and Montana (the three leading States) represented 59 per cent of the Nation's total supply on farms. The supply of wheat on farms October 1 equals 37.8 per cent of the 1962 production of all wheat.

# U.S. Wheat and Flour Exports Continue Downward

U.S. wheat and flour exports during July-August 1962 totalled 94 million bushels, compared with 114 million during the same months in 1961. Wheat exports at 79

million bushels were 19 per cent lower than July-August last season. Smaller shipments to Brazil and Yugoslavia accounted for most of the decrease. Substantially less wheat also went to Spain and North Africa where large crops were harvested earlier this year, and import requirements are smaller than a year ago.

In contrast, exports to India and Egypt in July and A August were considerably larger than during the same months in 1961. Flour exports totalled 15.2 million bushels in the first 2 months of the fiscal year, compared with 17 million in July-August the previous season.

Exports to Egypt (the major market for U.S. flour) and Italy were nearly 2 million bushels below July-August in 1961. There was only a small change in quantities shipped to other destinations. Inspections of wheat for export in September indicate further reductions in shipments. Preliminary estimates indicate that exports during July-September were approximately 12 per cent below the total wheat and flour exports during the first quarter (July-September) of 1961-62.

#### AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1961-62 (December-November) crop year amount to some 270.6 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1961 carryover of 24.3 million and the current crop estimated at 246.3 million bushels. The current total, reflecting relatively sharp declines in both carryover stocks and production, represents an 18 per cent reduction from the 1960-61 total of 331.4 million. After deducting 75.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 195.6 million are available for export and for carryover during 1961-62, as against 255.7 million in 1960-61.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1-September 29 of the 1961-62 Australian crop year amounted to 159.6 million bushels, 19 per cent less than the 197.9 million exported during the corresponding period of 1960-61. The balance remaining on September 30, 1962, for export and for carryover, at 36.0 million bushels, represented a decrease of 38 per cent from the comparable 1961 figure of 57.8 million.

Crop Position

Provided the satisfactory conditions at present extending over the wheat growing areas continue, Australia seems assured of a near-record crop. The weather has been very favourable within the period under review for all States except South Australia and forecasters are optimistic regarding the chances of a crop in excess of 260 million bushels.

The Western Australia's estimate of 68.5 million bushels, if achieved, will be a record crop for that State. Good finishing rains are needed to ensure this figure but experts confidently expect the predictions of a record harvest being correct.

Crops in the main wheat growing areas of Victoria are in a much better condition than at the same time last year. Consequently, a near-record 65 million bushel harvest is anticipated unless there are adverse weather conditions before the crop is taken in. It is expected that a yield equal to the 10-year average of 21 bushels per acre should be reached. A better-than-average season could give Victoria a record harvest. The present best year was 1960-61 when 67.6 million bushels were harvested from 2.7 million acres. This year the area sown to wheat has been increased to 3.2 million acres which is the biggest acreage since 1947.

The fear of a spread of rust in Queensland and New South Wales has now been dispelled as it has been ascertained that this outbreak was confined to a small area in central Queensland.

It is anticipated that in South Australia, where conditions are least favourable for a record-breaking crop, more than 2.5 million acres have been sown to wheat this season. A very good start was reported from that State and satisfactory conditions continued until September, since then lack of rain, combined with over-average temperatures and strong winds, have dried up soil considerably. As a result many crops have headed out prematurely without much stooling. Present indications are that yields will be below average.

Marketing Position The Australian Wheat Board has announced the sale of a further 25 million bushels of wheat valued at £18 million (\$43 million) to Mainland China. Payment is to be made at regular intervals over the next twelve months on terms similar to those of previous credit sales. The sale was negotiated in Hong Kong in early October by Mr. C.J. Perrett, the Board's General Manager, together with Mr. D.W. Maisey, growers' representative from Western Australia.

The sale includes about 4.5 million bushels of present season's New South Wales' wheat and about 20 million bushels from the new season's harvest from all States. The balance will come from Queensland's lightweight wheat from the 1961-62 season.

This contract will bring the total sales to China, since December 1960, to about 140 million bushels of which about 45.5 million were sold for cash, the balance on terms. The total value of these sales amounts to over £95 million (\$229 million).

# ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the current (December-November) crop year amount to 237.4 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1961 carryover of 35.3 million and the 1961-62 crop, placed at 202.1 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a 39 per cent increase in production which more than offset a decline in carryover stocks, are about 20 per cent more than the 1960-61 total of 197.1 million bushels. After making an allowance of 128.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 108.8 million are available for export and for carryover compared with 74.8 million in 1960-61.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1961-September 1962 amounted to 95.7 million bushels,

exceeding by a wide margin the 34.2 million exported during the same months in 1960-61. The balance remaining on October 1, 1962 for export and for carryover was estimated at 13.1 million bushels, in contrast to the October 1, 1961 total of 40.6 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.O.R. Rousseau, Commercial Secretary, Buenos Aires, under date of October 19, 1962 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 139 pesos per U.S. dollar and £1 equals \$3.0153 (Canadian) the quotation in effect on September 24, 1962.

Weather and Crops
There has been continued rainfall throughout most parts of Argentina and as a consequence, conditions throughout the areas of the country which had suffered from prolonged drought are improved considerably. Crops in the northern grain belt continue to be in excellent condition.

The winter-sown crops are now in full growth although it is too early to provide any accurate production estimates. The present spring weather is characterized by sunny, warm days followed by short periods of rain and cooler weather.

Wheat There has been no further official acreage estimate and it is difficult to guess whether there will be any significant change from the first estimate of 4,200,000 hectares (10.4 million acres). Crops in northern Buenos

Aires province and southern Santa Fe and Cordoba provinces, are in excellent condition while a marked recovery has been reported from the former drought areas of southern and western Buenos Aires and La Pampa provinces.

Even if a good harvest is obtained, it is unlikely that much more than 4,500,000 metric tons (165.3 million bushels) of wheat will be obtained from the sown acreage. As there will be practically no carry over, Argentina will probably have only some 500,000 to 800,000 metric tons (18,372,000 to 29,395,000 bushels) of wheat for export during the next crop year.

Supplies of exportable wheat are very low but a small amount of export business was done for spot delivery to Necochea and Bahia Blanca at around 690 to 700 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.35 to \$1.37 per bushel). Exporters and the National Grain Board have come to another agreement that no more wheat will be sold abroad until October 31, as by that date the Grain Board will have a better idea of what the new crop might yield. Some business was also reported in Candeal-Taganrock for which some 800 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.57 per bushel) were paid for December-January delivery to southern ports. Later in the period under review, these prices dropped to around 730 per 100 kilos (\$1.43 per bushel) and c.i.f. prices in Europe fell from \$US. 85 to \$US. 77.50 per metric ton (\$2.31 to \$2.11 per bushel). The c.i.f. prices for bread wheat remained at about £ 25.10. Od (\$2.09 per bushel) for Britain and \$US. 70 for Italy (\$1.91 per bushel).

## FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistance Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of October 26, 1962, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from French to Canadian measures have been made and rounded for the convenience of our readers.

Weather
and Crops
The weather has been generally cool and cloudy with light rain reported throughout Brittany, North and in Alsace. In the central Beauce area, the corn harvest has been completed under warm, dry conditions. Corn yields are low due to insufficient moisture. In the south, excessive rains and flooding have retarded fall sowing. Regional offices of the Office National Interprofessionnel des Cereales have increased their estimate of the wheat crop to 13.9 million metric tons (510.7 million bushels) compared with 13.1 million tons (481.3 million bushels) forecast in September. This is an all time record in France. Average yields are in the order of 44 bushels per acre.

French The Grain Market Storage and marketing difficulties resulting from this bumper wheat crop have been resolved through new sales contracts with Communist countries: 330,000 tons (12,125,000 bushels), half feeding and half milling at \$53.00 and \$56.00 per ton (\$1.44 and \$1.52 per bushel) FOB, respectively to Poland with 10 per cent cash and the balance at 2 years credit; 700,000 tons (25,720,000 bushels) to Communist China at a price of \$52.00 per ton (\$1.42 per bushel) FOB, with 25 per cent cash and the balance at 18 months credit; 200,000 tons (7,349,000 bushels) to Hungary at a price of \$52.50 per ton (\$1.43 per bushel) with 2 years credit. On October 25 the French Grain Officials issued a statement indicating that no new large contracts will be negotiated with the Sino-Soviet Block if special export subsidies or extended credit terms are involved. However, a three year contract has just been concluded with Egypt for 150,000 tons (5,511,000 bushels) annually at 12 months credit and at subsidized prices.

As of October 26, the statistical summary of Frances' wheat position is as follows: harvest - 13.9 million tons (510.7 million bushels); available for sale - 10 million tons (367,433,000 bushels); domestic requirements - 5.2 million tons (191,065,000 bushels); for export - 4.8 million tons (176,368,000 bushels), of which the following are already committed: 700 thousand tons (25,720,000 bushels) to Communist China; 330 thousand tons (12,125,000 bushels) to Poland; 200 thousand tons (7,349,000 bushels) to Hungary; 60 thousand tons (2,205,000 bushels to Norway); and an estimated 2.7 million tons (99,207,000 bushels) to the United Kingdom, Algeria, Morocco and Egypt, a total of 3.99 million tons (146,606,000 bushels). The addition to stocks would be about 800 thousand tons (29,395,000 bushels).

Durums
On October 17, Morocco offered Durum in a compensation deal for soft wheat. Sixty thousand tons (2,205,000 bushels) were picked up by French firms, who in turn will move 80,000 tons (2,939,000 bushels) of French wheat to Morocco with a special export subsidy.

French Semolina millers have largely covered their requirements until the end of January. There is, however, an opportunity for two cargoes for Marseille and one for Le Havre before the close of navigation.

Tests made on 6063 samples of the statutory grades of wheat obtained from 1686 shipping points in the Prairie provinces show that average protein content is 13.9 per cent. This is 0.3 per cent lower than last year but 0.3 per cent higher than the long-term average of 13.6 per cent. Average protein levels are 13.2 per cent for Manitoba, 14.2 per cent for Saskatchewan and 13.8 per cent for Alberta. Manitoba is 0.9 per cent lower than last year while the other two provinces are only 0.2 per cent lower. In general, high protein areas (over 14.0 per cent) cover central and southern Alberta and western Saskatchewan.


This year there was a record breaking crop of 61.2 million bushels of amber durum wheat, compared to only 14.1 million last year. It is estimated that 60 per cent of the crop will grade 3 C.W. and higher. Average protein content is 13.9 per cent and bushel weight is 65.1 lb. Compared to last year's crop, the new crop is about the same in bushel weight, but higher in kernel weight and semolina yield. Although the percentage of vitreous kernels is lower, milling quality, semolina pigment, and macaroni quality are generally higher this year.

The 1962 Prairie wheat crop will assure domestic and overseas millers of a good supply and a wide selection of high quality red spring and durum wheat grades.

A crop bulletin and the final protein map will be published by the Laboratory shortly. Crop Bulletin No. 85, 1962 will deal with the milling and baking quality of red spring wheat and with the macaroni-making quality of durum wheat; the final map will show the geographic distribution of wheat of different protein levels in Western Canada.

### CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- October 15 According to a report received from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, the current estimate of the 1962-63 wheat crop in Australia is placed at 264.5 million bushels.
  - The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade declared the delivery quota on rye open for the balance of the crop year 1962-63 at all delivery points in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.
  - According to a press release issued by the Board of Grain Commissioners Research Laboratory at Winnipeg, tests made on 6,063 samples of the statutory grades of wheat obtained from 1,686 shipping points in the Prairie Provinces show that the average protein content is 13.9 per cent, 0.3 per cent lower than last year but 0.3 per cent higher than the long-term average of 13.6 per cent.
  - Wheat stocks in all positions in the United States on October 1, 1962 were estimated at 2,069 million bushels, 11 per cent below a year earlier and the smallest October 1 holdings since 1957.
  - According to a report received from the Canadian Commercial Secretary, Paris, the most recent estimate of the 1962 wheat harvest in France places the crop at some 510.7 million bushels.
