

#### WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Wheat Supplies of
Four Major Exporters
Decline but World
Supplies Remain Large

Reflecting reduced supplies in United States and Argentina, which more than offset larger totals in Canada and Australia, supplies in these four traditional major exporters, for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years, totalled 2,451.3

million bushels at January 1, 1963 some 3 per cent less than the 2,518.2 million available at the same time a year ago. Supplies at January 1, 1963, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,520.1 (1,649.9); Canada, 659.4 (580.0); Argentina, 48.3 (112.4); and Australia, 223.5 (175.9).

The newly harvested 1961-62 crops in the Argentine and Australia are taken into consideration in the above estimates.

August-December
Exports Below Last
Year but Well
Above Average

Reduced shipments from United States, Canada and Australia have more than offset larger exports from Argentina and as a result, total exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat from the four major exporters during the first five months of the 1962-63 crop year,

at 433.4 million bushels, are some 26 per cent less than last year's record August-December level of 587.8 million, but 20 per cent more than the ten-year (1951-60) average of 360.5 million for the same period. Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August-December 1962, with comparisons appear in the accompanying table.

#### CANADIAN SITUATION

Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1962-63 (August-July) Supply Position crop year are placed at 953.2 million bushels, 7 per cent greater than the 1961-62 total of 891.2 million, with a substantial decline in carryover stocks more than offset by a sharp increase in production. After deducting 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1962-63 amount to 803.2 million bushels, 7 per cent above the 753.6 million in 1961-62.

Exports of wheat as grain during the August-December period of the current crop year amounted to 131.8 million bushels, compared with 159.4 million exported during the same months a year ago. Exports of wheat flour, in terms of wheat, Juring August-December this year were estimated at 12.0 million bushels, bringing total exports of wheat and flour during the same five months, to some 143.8 million bushels, as against 173.5 million exported during the comparable period a year ago. The balance remaining on January 1, 1963 for export and for carryover amounted to 659.4 million bushels, 14 per cent more than the January 1, 1962 total of 580.0 million.

Farmers' marketings of wheat, (both east and west) up to January 23 of the 1962-63 crop year amounted to 241.9 million bushels and exceeded by 60 per cent last year's corresponding total of 151.5 million. Some 41.2 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the five weeks December 20, 1962 to January 23, 1963. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to about 28.4 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat recorded an increase from 378.8 million bushels at December 19 to a level of 391.5 million at January 23, 1963.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at January 23 this year represented an increase of 5 per cent over the 1962 comparable total of 374.6 million but 10 per cent less than the 1961 figure of 437.1 million. Stocks in country elevators amounted to 209.7 million bushels compared with 204.3 million in this position a year ago and 260.4 million two years ago. This year's supplies in country elevators at January 23 accounted for 54 per cent of the total visible wheat supply compared with the 1962 and 1961 corresponding percentages of 55 per cent and 60 per cent, respectively. Interior terminal stocks, at 5.5 million bushels were sharply below both the 1962 figure of 10.7 million and the 1961 total of 11.2 million. The 19.1 million bushels "in transit rail" (Western Division) represented increases over both the 1962 total of 16.7 million and the 1961 figure of 14.0 million. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead, at January 23 this year, amounted to 45.9 million bushels, 38 per cent above last year's comparable total of 33.3 million but 13 per cent lower than the 52.9 million bushels in this position two years ago. Supplies in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, at 32.9 million bushels, were below both the 33.7 million at January 24, 1962 and the 35.8 million at January 25, 1961. The 27.0 million bushels in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports were slightly less than the 27.4 million of a year ago but greater than the 24.6 million of two years ago. On the west coast, total supplies in Vancouver-New Westminster, Victoria and Prince Rupert at January 23, 1963, at 9.8 million bushels, were reduced from the previous year's corresponding total of 11.0 million but exceeded the 7.3 million bushels in 1961.

December 1962 Exports of Wheat and Flour Total 23.1 Million Bushels Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1962 amounted to 23.1 million bushels, 5 per cent more than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the month of

December of 21.9 million, practically unchanged from the December 1961 level of 23.0 million but considerably below the November 1962 total of 35.6 million. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during December 1962, at 20.9 million bushels, were 5 per cent above the 20.0 million exported during the same month last year, 16 per cent more than the ten-year (1951-60) average for the month of December of 18.0 million but sharply below last month's total of 33.3 million. Exports of bagged seed wheat during December 1962, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 340 thousand bushels compared with the November figure of 103 thousand and the December 1961 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 392 thousand bushels. Customs returns also indicate that the equivalent of 1.8 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during December 1962, 18 per cent below the November total of 2.2 million and 33 per cent lower than the adjusted December 1961 total of 2.6 million.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-December 1962 period amounted to 130.9 million bushels. Although this quantity is 17 per cent less than the comparable 1961 total of 158.3 million it also represents an increase of 19 per cent over the ten-year (1951-60) average for the period of 110.0 million bushels. Britain, remaining in its position as Canada's leading market

for wheat, received shipments amounting to 33.1 million bushels and representing 25 per cent of the five-month total. During August-December 1961 shipments of wheat to Britain amounted to 36.0 million bushels and accounted for 23 per cent of the total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first five months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: China, Communist, 18.9 (19.3); Federal Republic of Germany, 17.8 (28.4); Japan, 16.3 (20.6); Poland, 14.2 (12.3); Belgium and Luxembourg, 4.2 (6.1); Netherlands, 3.7 (1.5); France, 3.7 (0.7); Italy, 3.5 (2.2); Philippines, 3.0 (1.0); and Venezuela, 2.8 (0.7). Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-December of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 852 thousand bushels compared with last year's comparable total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 1,142 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first five months of the 1962-63 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 12.0 million bushels of wheat, 15 per cent less than the adjusted August-December 1961 total of 14.1 million bushels. As with bulk wheat, Britain was also the major market for Canadian wheat flour. Shipments of wheat flour to that country during the period under review amounted to the equivalent of 5.4 million bushels and accounted for 45 per cent of the August-December 1962 total. During the same months of 1961 shipments of wheat flour to Britain amounted to the equivalent of 5.2 million bushels and represented 37 per cent of the total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-December period of the 1962-63 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Ghana, 782 (667); Nigeria, 632 (567); Jamaica, 605 (683); United States, 533 (486); Trinidad and Tobago, 510 (576); Hong Kong, 413 (384); Leeward and Windward Islands, 379 (456); and Costa Rica, 358 (297).

General Quota

Position

By January 28, 1963 out of a total of 1,942 shipping points in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 498 points on a delivery quota of 7 bushels per specified acre, 279 on a 6-bushel quota and 455 on a 5-bushel quota. Of the remainder 622 points were on a 4-bushel quota and 75 on a 3-bushel quota. Thirteen stations were reported as "closed".





Wheat Shipments to the United States by Destination

Total rail and vessel shipments of wheat to the United States, either for re-export or retention for domestic use, from the beginning of the current crop year to January 23, 1963 amounted to 259 thousand bushels. During the comparable periods of

Claims filed for payment up to December 31, 1962 represent the movement of some 3,085 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-November period of the 1962-63 crop year. During the same months of the 1961-62 crop year claims had

been filed for a total of 4,655 thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 34 per cent below those of 1961. Revised data on the 1961 August-November shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1962 place the four-month total at 5,098 thousand bushels. The bulk of the shipments during the current four-month period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, with these two provinces accounting for 43 per cent and 34 per cent of the total, respectively.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 142,341 tons during the August-November period of the current crop year. During the same four months of 1961 claims had been filed for a total of 174,727 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 19 per cent below those of 1961. Revised data on the 1961 August-November shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1962 place the four-month total at 198,643 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario.






# FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT\* AND WHEAT FLOUR\*\*




# FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS\*




# FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




# EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS\* AND OAT PRODUCTS\*\*

#### CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during December 1962 amounted to 2,499,000 hundredweight, representing a decrease of 18 per cent from the November 1962 output of 3,064,000 hundredweight, 19 per cent less than the December 1961 figure of 3,088,000 hundredweight and 24 per cent below the ten-year (1952-61) average production for the month of December of 3,282,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during December 1962 had a total rated capacity of 166,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 25-day working period 60.2 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during December 1962 amounted to 5,547,000 bushels 19 per cent less than the 6,816,000 bushels milled during the preceding month, and 20 per cent lower than the 6,896,000 bushels milled during December 1961. Of the wheat milled for flour during December 1962 some 4,964,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (439,000 bushels); Durum (102,000 bushels); and all other (42,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during December 1962 amounted to 770,000 hundredweight (some 1,771,000 bushels of wheat equivalent), representing a decrease of 18 per cent from the 2,158,000 bushels exported during the previous month and 33 per cent below the adjusted December 1961 exports of 2,643,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-nine countries, with exports to Britain amounting to 961,000 bushels of wheat equivalent, and accounting for 54 per cent of the December 1962 total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent were as follows: United States, 112; Jamaica, 104; Hong Kong, 93; Malaya and Singapore, 57; Leeward and Windward Islands, 57; and Trinidad and Tobago, 54.

#### UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Position

Domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1962-63 crop year (July-June) are estimated at 2,396.1 million bushels, consisting of the July 1, 1962 carryover of 1,304.3 million and the 1962 crop, placed at 1,091.8 million bushels. Domestic supplies of the size indicated would be 9 per cent less than last year's total of 2,645.9 million and 10 per cent smaller than the record 1960-61 figure of 2,670.8 million bushels. Imports of wheat from Canada during July-December of the current United States crop year amounted to 1.7 million bushels. Domestic disappearance during 1962-63 is estimated at about 605.0 million bushels, 4 per cent less than the 630.5 million last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,792.7 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 11 per cent from the 2,017.5 million in 1961-62.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during July-December 1962 amounted to 272.6 million bushels, 26 per cent below the 367.6 million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on January 1, 1963 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,520.1 million bushels compared with 1,649.9 million on the same date a year ago.

Crop and Weather Conditions

to be high on winter wheat acreages.

The following extract has been taken from the Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin published jointly by the United States Department of Commerce and the United States Department of Agriculture for the week ending January 28, 1963. Cold, Arctic air pushed down into the Great Plains and northern Interior for the third consecutive week and brought additional snowfall to the more northern sections of the Nation. Most winter grain acreages now have adequate snow cover to withstand the surges of sub-freezing air throughout the northern and central Great Plains, Great Lakes region, Corn Belt, and the Northeast. Strong winds accompanying the cold fronts caused additional drifting and soil blowing in some sections of the northern and central Great Plains, but damage to fall-seeded grains so far this season has been generally light. Continued cold weather tended to keep most small grains dormant throughout the southern Great Plains.

Lack of snow cover and alternate freezing and thawing resulted in additional damage to winter grains in the Far Northwest. Some freeze damage was also reported in the Southwest, where cold, dry weather again held growth of fallplanted grains to a minimum. Winter grains and cover crops were reported completely dormant as far south as the upper Mississippi Valley. Severe damage was caused by sustained low temperatures in most Gulf States, and small grains in the lower portion of the south Atlantic region were also beginning to show adverse effects from the cold weather.

Prolonged zero temperatures appeared to have caused additional freeze damage to winter barley and oat crops in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, but plant kill is not expected

Stocks of Wheat On January 24, 1963 the United States Department of Agriculture in All Positions reported that all wheat stocks of 1,813 million bushels stored in January 1, 1963 all positions were 9 per cent below a year earlier but 5 per cent above average. The stocks total was two-thirds larger than the 1962 production of wheat. More than two-thirds of the total stocks were either owned by the Government or were under Government loan. Durum wheat stocks were estimated at 64.9 million bushels compared with 18.2 million a year earlier. Off-farm stocks of durum wheat were 16 million bushels.

# ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supply Position (December-November) crop year amount to 184.9 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1962 carryover of 8.6 million and the new crop, placed at 176.4 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting decreases in both carryover stocks and production, are about 22 per cent less than the 1961-62 total of 237.4 million bushels. After making an allowance of 128.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 56.3 million are available for export and for carryover in 1962-63, in contrast to 116.7 million the previous year.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1962 amounted to 8.0 million bushels, sharply above the 4.3 million exported during the same month in 1961. The balance remaining on January 1, 1963 for export and for carryover was estimated at 48.3 million bushels, considerably less than half the January 1, 1962 total of 112.4 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.O.R. Rousseau, Commercial Counsellor, Buenos Aires, under date of January 18, 1963 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions from Argentine to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of 132 pesos per U.S. dollar and £1 equals \$3.0256 (Canadian) the quotation in effect on January 14, 1963.

The general outlook for Argentine grains and oilseeds has taken a and Crops turn for the worse since our last review. Not only has there been little, if any, improvement in the dry areas of southern Buenos Aires and eastern parts of La Pampa provinces, but also long spells of very hot weather, coupled with strong dry winds, have created drought conditions in the central and northern sections of the provinces of Santa Fe and Cordoba. These latter areas - which border on the main corn belt - are noted particularly for sorghum and millet and it is feared that poor yields of these grains can now be expected.

The present drought is following a strange pattern. For instance, in the Bahia Blanca area, the situation has reached disaster proportions while at Necochea, just 200 kilometers (125 miles) away, wheat stands are in excellent shape and yields of up to 1,800 kilos (27 bushels per acre) have been reported. It has now been estimated officially that losses from drought this year in the provinces of Buenos Aires and La Pampa, will be in the neighbourhood of 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 metric tons of wheat and coarse grains with a value of approximately 7.5 billion Argentine pesos (\$56 million).

Fortunately, the main corn belt has not been much affected by the current drought and a good crop is still expected. The same is true of flax although a rather poor crop of sunflowerseed is foreseen. At time of writing, rain was falling in Bahia Blanca but it has come too late to help the wheat crop.

Wheat Harvest operations are well advanced in the northern wheat belt and high yields of good quality grain are being reported. The situation in the southern grain belt varies from excellent to total loss and in some areas the effects of wind erosion are likely to be felt for several years.

In normal years the southern grain belt accounts for nearly half of the total Argentine wheat crop but this year the situation is quite different, as shown by the following table taken from the latest official production estimates.

The Government has recently taken a number of new steps aimed at encouraging wheat production. Minimum official producers prices have now been increased to the following levels:-hard type, grade 1, basis 80 kilos per hectolitre (64 pounds per bushel), 650 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.34 per bushel), semi-hard, same grade and basis, 600 pesos per 100 kilos, (\$1.24 per bushel), Durum (Candeal-Taganrock) 650 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.34 per bushel), in bulk, f.o.r. Buenos Aires port.

Export retentions have recently been lifted for wheat and other grains and just a few days ago there was an official announcement that the 5 per cent production tax established last November on sales of grains, oilseeds, wool and cattle would be waived for producers in drought stricken areas.

Due to abundant offers, wheat prices in the cereal exchange fell at one time during the period under review almost to the former minimum price of 600 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.24 per bushel). It is estimated that by the end of December, some 200,000 metric tons (7,349,000 bushels) of wheat had left the country (nearly all from the port of Rosario) which is an unusually high amount for so early in the season.

Approximately 40,000 metric tons (1,470,000 bushels) have been reported sold to Brazil at around U\$S 56.20 per ton (\$1.53 per bushel) f.o.b. Buenos Aires for shipment in January and the first half of February. At the end of December, wheat prices for Europe were around U\$S 66.00 per ton (\$1.80 per bushel) c.i.f. continental ports and £ 24.10. Od per ton (\$2.02 per bushel) c.i.f. British ports.

Prices paid for durums have averaged 790 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.63 per bushel), while durum prices c.i.f. continental ports, averaged U\$S 80.00 per ton (\$2.18 per bushel) for January-February shipments.

The official Grain Board figure for stocks at the beginning of the 1962-63 crop year (December 1) has just been announced, the total being 669,054 metric tons (24,583,000 bushels) of which 232,841 (8,555,000 bushels) is old crop grain and 436,213 (16,028,000 bushels) new crop.

At the present time, Grain Board estimates are based on grain delivered to railway stations, grain elevators, etc. As producers are going in more and more for bulk storage of grains on their own farms, it has become increasingly apparent that the Grain Board will have to devise some new system of stock taking.

# AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position

Estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1962-63 (December-November) crop year amount to some 307.5 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1962 carryover of 17.5 million and the current crop estimated at a record 290.0 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated, reflecting a substantially larger production which more than offset a decline in carryover, represent an increase of 13 per cent over the 1961-62 total of 271.8 million bushels. After deducting 73.0 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 234.5 million are available for export and for carryover during 1962-63,

20 per cent above the 195.4 million in 1961-62.

DESCRIPTION OF STREET OF STREET

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1-January 5 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 11.0 million bushels compared with 19.5 million exported during the corresponding period of 1961-62. The balance remaining on January 6, 1963 for export and for carryover, at 223.5 million bushels, exceeded by 27 per cent the comparable 1962 total of 175.9 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, under date of January 15, 1963 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Currency conversions have been made at the rate of £1 equals \$2.4205 (Canadian) the quotation in effect on January 14, 1963.

Crop Position The Australian Wheat Board has officially announced a wheat crop estimate of 290 million bushels for 1962-63.

This figure is 20 million bushels better than the record set two years ago and is an increase of 43 million bushels, or nearly 20 per cent over last season's harvest.

Although harvesting is still in progress in many regions, it seems clear that heavy plantings and good October rains assured the record harvest. In New South Wales and Western Australia deliveries to the Board were far in excess of those at this time last year and reports indicate that the quality of the wheat is generally excellent.

Victoria suffered a setback in the harvesting within the past week when heavy rain, following hot and humid conditions, caused crop damage and prevented farmers from continuing with the stripping operation.

Estimates of the New South Wales' total crop remain unchanged at a record 101 million bushels from which a further record quantity of 90 million bushels is expected to be delivered to the Wheat Board. Close to 60 million bushels have been delivered in Western Australia where the total harvest is anticipated to reach 70 million bushels.

Ten million bushels of the near-record 60 million bushels crop in Victoria have still to be brought in. The recent high humidity, plus the unexpected rains, have set up a reaction which could damage the unharvested crop. Reports indicate that the area affected by the adverse conditions is the largest in danger for over 20 years.

Marketing Position Another sale of wheat on terms to Mainland China has been announced by the Australian Wheat Board. The latest contract calls for the sale of 50 million bushels valued at approximately £35 million (\$85 million) and provides for all shipments to be completed by the end of June. Terms of sale were similar to those of the previous contract providing for final payment twelve months from the date of shipment.

Total sales to China since December, 1960, have now reached 190 million bushels of which about 45 million were sold for cash, the balance on terms. The total value of these sales amounted to £130 million (\$315 million) approximately.

The recent sale included 1.2 million bushels of old-crop wheat, the balance being wheat from the current season. A portion of the sale - about four million bushels - will be Queensland premium wheat and the remainder fair, average quality to be shipped from all other States.

Since the beginning of the grain year further sales have been made to regular markets including 40,000 tons (1,493,000 bushels) to Britain and 14,000 tons (523,000 bushels) to Japan. In addition 50,000 tons of flour (2,300,000 bushel equivalent) have been sold to Ceylon for shipment during the first quarter of 1963.

The Australian-Ceylon agreement whereby the latter country agrees to purchase 100,000 tons of Australian flour (4,600,000 bushel equivalent) on a "fair commercial basis" has been extended to include 1963 and 1964. Ceylon, which was a traditional market for Australian flour ceased to buy any for some years prior to 1958 due to competition from heavily subsidised European flour. However, since that year Ceylon has bought at least 100,000 tons of flour (4,600,000 bushel equivalent) from Australia each year.

Miscellaneous Payments of First Advances for the current season have been expedited with the aid of electronic equipment in the States of New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia. As at January 5, 1963, cheques posted by the Wheat Board's offices to growers in all States in respect of First Advances on about 85 million bushels of the wheat delivered by them to the Board at that date totalled about £40 million (\$97 million). It is interesting to note also, that the Wheat Board effects its own ship chartering arrangements in respect of c.i.f. sales, while in the case of f.o.b. sales the arrangements for freight are the responsibility of the overseas buyers. In general, there has been little change in the chartering rates over the past few months.

# FRENCH SITUATION

The following account of the current crop situation in France has been extracted from a report by Mr. R.G. Woolham, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of January 28, 1963, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Weather The exceptionally cold weather experienced throughout Europe has and Crops also held France to below-freezing temperatures during the month of January. Much of the winter cereal acreage lacks snow cover and it is likely that some losses will result. The extent of this damage will not be known until plant growth commences again, and will also depend on whether moderating temperatures return slowly or suddenly.

Latest reports indicate that this year's acreage is slightly smaller than that of last year. Estimates for cereals as at January 1, 1963 were reported as follows:

In general, the market has been quiet during the month of January. Cold weather has caused transportation problems and some delays, especially where water transport is concerned. For the current crop year to January 11 the French cereals office has issued export and import certificates for cereals as follows:

Small quantities of seed wheat are also being purchased in view of the likelihood that reseeding to spring cereals will be necessary because of winter damage. With regard to French exports, France has recently obtained EEC approval to provide exporters with a supplementary subsidy for cereals destined for distant markets. A cargo of Canadian Durum, Extra No. 4, was recently purchased by France and French needs of Durum wheat are now believed covered until the end of April. Algeria has recently purchased about 40,000 tons (1,470,000 bushels) of Argentine Durum wheat and it is understood that this market is anticipating additional purchases to cover substantial Durum wheat requirements.

# CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS



According to a report from Mr. H.A. Gilbert, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Melbourne, the Australian Wheat Board has announced that the 1962-63 Australian wheat crop is officially estimated at 290 million bushels.

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade re Quotas, General, No. 19 announced that effective immediately and subject to a number of provisions, a producer desiring to purchase high grade wheat from a country elevator to be used for seeding purposes on lands described in his 1962-63 delivery permit book may deliver and sell to the Board in payment for such wheat a quantity not exceeding three hundred (300) bushels of wheat in excess of the then prevailing or future delivery quotas in effect at the delivery point designated in the producer's delivery permit book. Details of these provisions may be found by referring to the already-mentioned Instruction.

- According to a report received from Mr. C.O.R. Rousseau, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Buenos Aires, latest official production estimates place the 1962-63 wheat crop in Argentina at 4.8 million metric tons (176.4 million bushels).
- The Crop Reporting Board, United States Department of Agriculture, reported that wheat stocks in all positions in the United States, at January 1, 1963 were estimated at 1,813 million bushels, 9 per cent below a year earlier and 5 per cent greater than the 1957-61 average.
- According to the Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, wheat flour production in the United States in December 1962 amounted to 20,584,000 hundredweight, an average of 1,029,000 hundredweight per working day.

According to Broomhall: Variable weather conditions have prevailed over Europe during the past week with a number of countries again subjected to very low temperatures and some heavy snows while others experienced somewhat milder conditions. Reports from a number of countries continued to note concern over effects of the severe winter upon grain crops but it may be sometime before these can be ascertained.
