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

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WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

August-December Exports

9 per cent Below Last Year

But 64 per cent Above Average

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the <u>four major exporting countries</u> during the <u>August-December period</u> of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 642.1 million bushels,

exceeded only by the record total of 705.9 million exported during the same months last year. In addition, this year's August-December total represents a 64 per cent margin over the average (1953-62) shipments of 390.7 million bushels for the same five months. As indicated in the accompanying table, based on the Canadian crop year, wheat shipments from Argentina exceeded by a large margin last season's August-December level while those from United States are virtually unchanged. Declines were recorded in wheat exports from both Canada and Australia.

Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August-December 1964 with comparisons appear in the accompanying table.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters 5 per cent Below a Year Ago Supplies of wheat held by the four traditional major exporters at January 1, 1965 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,468.8 million bushels compared with 2,609.0 million at the same time a year ago. The newly harvested 1963-64 wheat crops in the Argentine

and Australia are taken into consideration in these totals. Although supplies were larger in Argentina and Australia these increases were more than offset by declines in the totals for United States and Canada. Supplies at January 1, 1965, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,191.8 (1,364.3); Canada, 702.4 (796.0); Argentina, 275.7 (199.7); and Australia, 298.9 (249.0).

CANADIAN SITUATION

1964-65 Wheat Supplies
Decline from Previous
Year's Record Level

Reflecting a 6 per cent decline in carryover stocks combined with a 17 per cent decrease in production, total supplies of wheat for the 1964-65 crop year, at 1,059.9 million bushels, are 12 per cent less than the 1963-64

record total of 1,210.7 million. Supplies of the size indicated are, however, still the fifth largest on record. After making an allowance of 160.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1964-65 amount to 899.9 million bushels, about 15 per cent below the 1963-64 total of 1,054.0 million.

August-December Exports
Decline from Previous Year
But Well Above Average

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat amounted to 197.4 million bushels during the August-December period of the current crop year. This volume, although representing a decline of 23 per cent

from the unusually high level of 258.0 million shipped during the same months a year ago, still surpasses the ten-year (1953-62) August-December average of 129.7 million by a margin of 52 per cent. Of the current total, some 184.2 million bushels were exported as wheat and 13.3 million were flour in terms of wheat equivalent. The balance, remaining on January 1, 1965 for export and for carryover, amounted to 702.4 million bushels, 12 per cent below the January 1, 1964 total of 796.0 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to January 20 of the current crop year have amounted to 239.2 million bushels compared with 262.1 million

marketed during the same period of the previous year. Some 24.9 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the four weeks December 24, 1964 to January 20, 1965. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 23.7 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased only from 334.4 million at December 23 to a level of 336.2 million at January 20, 1965.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at January 20 this year represented a decline of 9 per cent from the 1964 comparable total of 370.0 million and a decrease of 14 per cent below the 1963 figure of 391.5 million. The largest reduction continued in country elevator stocks, with wheat in this position amounting to 170.7 million bushels, 18 per cent less than the 208.4 million of the previous year and 19 per cent below the 209.7 million of two years ago. Wheat stocks at interior terminals, at January 20, 1965, totalled 4.1 million bushels and also recorded declines from the 1964 and 1963 comparable levels of 4.9 million and 5.6 million bushels, respectively. Wheat stocks "in transit rail" (Western Division) amounted to 11.3 million bushels in contrast to 24.1 million a year ago and 19.1 million two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead, totalling some 49.8 million bushels, exceeded by 2 per cent last year's comparable level of 48.8 million and surpassed by 8 per cent the 1963 figure of 45.9 million bushels. Stocks in "Storage Afloat", amounting to 23.5 million bushels were slightly higher than the 1964 level of 22.9 million but below the 1963 total of 26.4 million. The 32.0 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were sharply above the 21.1 million bushels in these same ports a year ago but fractionally below the 32.9 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at January 20, 1965, at 22.6 million bushels, exceeded the 1964 total of 15.3 million by a wide margin but were considerably lower than the 1963 volume of 27.0 million bushels. The 6.7 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) registered decreases from both the 1964 comparable total of 8.6 million and the 1963 figure of 9.8 million.

December 1964 Exports of Wheat and Flour Total 30.3 Million Bushels Total exports of wheat, including bulk wheat, bagged seed and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent amounted to 30.3 million bushels during December 1964. Although this volume was 10 per cent less than the

November total of 33.5 million and sharply reduced from the exceptionally high level of 48.4 million cleared in December 1963, it still exceeded by a margin of 41 per cent the ten year (1953-62) December average of 21.5 million bushels. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during December 1964 totalled 27.7 million bushels, some 56 per cent more than the ten-year average for December of 17.8 million but substantially below the December 1963 figure of 41.8 million and 5 per cent less than the November 1964 total of 31.0 million bushels. Exports of bagged seed wheat during December 1964, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 65 thousand bushels compared with the December 1963 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 388 thousand. Customs returns also indicate that the equivalent of 2.5 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during December 1964, unchanged from the previous month but considerably less than the unusually high December 1963 adjusted figure of 6.3 million.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the first five months (August-December) of the current crop year amounted to 183.8 million bushels, some 23 per cent less than the comparable 1963 total of 237.8 million, but

sharply above the ten-year average for the period of 112.8 million. The principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first five months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Britain, 32.6 (35.2); China Communist, 30.8 (13.3); Japan, 22.0 (21.3); Czechoslovakia, 18.7 (2.1); Poland, 14.7 (7.3); Federal Republic of Germany, 10.8 (20.3); Democratic Republic of Germany, 7.4 (nil); Belgium and Luxembourg, 7.4 (11.9); Venezuela, 4.5 (2.5); India, 3.2 (nil); and Philippines, 3.2 (2.6). Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-December of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 324 thousand bushels as against last year's comparable total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 924 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first five months of the 1964-65 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 13.3 million bushels. 31 per cent below the adjusted August-December 1963 total of 19.3 million bushels. The leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during the August-December period of the 1964-65 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Britain, 3,934 (5,092); Cuba, 1,717 (2,425); U.S.S.R. (Russia), 1,689 (5,420); Ghana, 909 (525); Jamaica, 587 (653); Trinidad, 553 (681); Ceylon, 438 (586); Leeward and Windward Islands, 423 (456); Costa Rica, 413 (211); United States, 387 (419); and Hong Kong, 349 (468).

Wheat Sales to China on January 25, 1965

The Canadian Wheat Board announced that under the provisions of the Second Long Term Agreement with China a further sales contract has been signed to provide for the export of

700,000 long tons, 5 per cent more or less, of wheat, of which 620,000 tons will be shipped from Pacific Coast ports February through June, and the balance of 80,000 tons shipped from St. Lawrence River or Atlantic ports during the same period. Assuming the full tolerance is taken, this amounts to slightly over 27 million bushels. Including the sales contract covered by this announcement, total sales under the Second Long Term Agreement amount to 2.8 million tons, or approximately 104.5 million bushels. As in the previous sales contracts, payment terms for sales under the Long Term Agreement are 25 per cent cash when each vessel is loaded and the balance of 75 per cent in 18 months, with interest. The deferred payment provision is made possible by a guarantee to The Canadian Wheat Board by the Government of Canada.

On January 27 the Board announced that a sales contract, supplementary to the contract announced on Monday, January 25, has been entered into with China for a further sale of 100,000 long tons, 5 per cent more or less, of wheat, to be shipped from Pacific Coast ports February through June. This amounts to approximately 3.7 million bushels.

Sales of Wheat and Flour to the U.S.S.R. on January 27, 1965

The Canadian Wheat Board announced that it had entered into a contract covering the sale of 200,000 long tons of wheat to the U.S.S.R. Negotiations are also underway for the sale of 40,000 long tons of flour. These sales amount

to the equivalent of approximately 9.4 million bushels of wheat. The wheat and flour has been purchased for cash and will be shipped from St. Lawrence and Atlantic ports commencing in March and continuing through to December. The contract provides for the shipment of the wheat and flour to the U.S.S.R. and/or Cuba similar to a contract entered into earlier in the crop year.

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, January 20, 1965 Compared with Approximately the Same Date, 1963 and 1964



By February 1, 1965 out of a total of 1,907 shipping points General Quota Position in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 824 points on a delivery quota of 6 bushels per specified acre, 651 on a 5-bushel quota and 381 on a 4-bushel quota. Of the remainder only 47 points were on a 3-bushel quota. Four stations were reported as "closed".

Wheat Shipments to the United States by Destination

There were no vessel and rail shipments of wheat to the United States, either for re-export or retention for domestic use, from the beginning of the current crop year to January 20, 1965. During the comparable periods of 1962-63 and 1963-64 shipments amounted to 205 thousand and 259 thousand bushels, respectively.

Freight Assistance Shipments

Claims filed for payment up to December 31, 1964 represent the movement of 3,378 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-November period of the 1964-65 crop year. During the same months last year claims had been filed for a total of 5,771 thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 41 per cent below those of 1963. Revised data on the August-November 1963 shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1964 place the

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 135,090 tons during the August-November period of the current crop year. During the same four months of 1963 claims had been filed for a total of 150,047 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 10 per cent below those of 1963. Revised data on the 1963 August-November shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1964 place the four-month total at 186,665 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario.


FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*



FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**



CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during December 1964 amounted to 3,187,000 hundredweight, representing a decrease of 6 per cent from the November 1964 output of 3,385,000 hundredweight, 31 per cent lower than the December 1963 figure of 4,585,000 hundredweight and 3 per cent less than the ten-year (1954-63) average production for the month of December of 3,274,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during December 1964 had a total rated capacity of 166,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 73.7 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during December 1964 amounted to 7,076,000 bushels, 6 per cent below the 7,518,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 31 per cent lower than the 10,234,000 bushels milled during December 1963. Of the wheat milled for flour during December 1964 some 6,296,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (489,000 bushels); Durum (200,000 bushels); and all other (90,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during December 1964 amounted to 1,095,000 hundredweight (some 2,517,000 bushels of wheat equivalent), relatively unchanged from the 2,523,000 bushels exported during the previous month but 60 per cent below the unusually high December 1963 adjusted exports of 6,284,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-eight countries with exports to Britain amounting to 716,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 28 per cent of the December 1964 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent, were as follows: Cuba, 515; Ghana, 340; Jamaica, 126; Leeward and Windward Islands, 103; Trinidad, 97; and Costa Rica, 94.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Position

Domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1964-65 crop year (July-June) are estimated at 2,191.4 million bushels, 6 per cent less than the previous year's total of 2,336.9 million. Supplies of the size indicated reflect a decline in carryover stocks which more than offset a 13 per cent increase in production. Carryover stocks are the smallest since 1958. (In addition, current crop year domestic supplies may be supplemented by imports of about 5 million bushels, composed mostly of wheat for seed and feeding quality wheat.) Imports of wheat from Canada during July-December 1964 have amounted to 0.6 million bushels.

Domestic disappearance during 1964-65 is estimated at about 615.0 million bushels, 4 per cent more than the 589.2 million last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,577.0 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 10 per cent from the 1,749.2 million in 1963-64.

Exports of wheat, wheat flour and other products in terms of grain equivalent during July-December 1964 amounted to 385.2 million bushels, practically unchanged from the 384.9 million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on January 1, 1965 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,191.8 million bushels compared with 1,364.3 million on the same date a year ago.

Crop and Weather Conditions The following extract has been taken from the Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin published jointly by the United States

Department of Commerce and the United States Department of

Agriculture for the week ending February 1, 1965. Light precipitation in the central Great Plains area during the last 2 weeks has improved the outlook for small grains. Winter wheat was greening a little about midweek in Kansas, but colder temperatures late in the week again restricted growth. Winterkill of wheat has been very light, but some winterkill of barley has occurred. Most of the small grainfields in Nebraska remained snow-covered. Recent moisture has helped to improve the outlook for wheat; however, soil moisture is still generally short throughout the State. Moisture late in the week benefited small grains in Wyoming and helped improve the crop outlook in the dry southeastern part of the State. The dry eastern Plains area of Colorado received light precipitation, but considerable more moisture was needed for the drought-plagued small grain seedlings. Winds caused considerable blowing of topsoil in southeast Colorado.

Oklahoma's winter wheat crop remained in good to excellent condition and was making some growth. Early seeding of spring oats was underway -- less than 10 per cent has been seeded. The continued lack of precipitation along with cool weather limited the growth of winter wheat in the Plains areas of Texas. Severe duststorms in the Plains area of the State caused some damage to wheat; however, the wheat cover generally helped protect the soil from blowing. Oats throughout the principal growing areas of Texas were in good condition.

Adequate snow cover on most small grainfields in Montana was providing needed protection from the winter cold. Winter wheat prospects in Utah were good. In the Northwest, heavy rains caused some losses of fall-seeded acreage. Damage was heaviest in Oregon, especially in the Columbia Basin grainfields of eastern Oregon where considerable washing and soil erosion occurred. Winter wheat in Washington appears to be in good condition where snow cover has melted, but some reseeding of winter barley will be necessary. Cool weather along with fog slowed the growth of small grains in the Central Valley of California and resulted in some yellowing. Early-planted small grains in Arizona were making good growth.

Well below-normal temperatures prevailed over most of the Corn Belt area; however, adequate snow cover over most small grainfields provided needed protection from the cold. In the Gulf coast and south Atlantic areas, crops were in mostly fair to good condition. Plants made some growth early in the week but low temperatures late in the week slowed development.

Stocks of Wheat in All Positions January 1, 1965 On January 25, 1965 the United States Department of Agriculture reported that all wheat in storage on January 1 totalled 1,443 million bushels — 11 per cent less than a year earlier and the smallest January 1 holdings since 1958. The decline from last

year occurred in off-farm stocks. Off-farm holdings of 1,052 million bushels were 19 per cent smaller than a year earlier while farm stocks at 390 million bushels were 26 per cent above January 1, 1964. About 63 per cent of the total stocks were either owned by the Government or under Government loan compared with 70 per cent a year earlier. Disappearance during the October-December quarter was 369 million bushels, the largest for this period of record started in 1934.

Durum wheat stored in all positions on January 1 totalled 92.4 million bushels compared with 79.2 million bushels a year earlier. Stocks were about equally divided between farm and off-farm facilities with farm holdings totalling 46.5 million bushels and off-farm storages accounting for 45.9 million bushels. Current stocks indicate a disappearance during the first half (July-December) of the marketing year of 14.3 million bushels compared with 18.0 million bushels for the same period a year earlier.

The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce estimated wheat flour production in the United States in December 1964, at 21,104,000 hundredweight, an average of 959,000 hundredweight per working day. This compared with an average output per working day of 1,120,000 hundredweight in November 1964 and 1,019,000 hundredweight in December 1963. Wheat flour mills in December operated at 85.7 per cent of capacity compared with 100.4 per cent and 91.8 per cent, respectively, for the previous month and the same month a year ago. Flour mills in December ground 47,910,000 bushels of wheat compared with the November total of 50,765,000 bushels. Wheat offal output during December amounted to 395,916 tons.

United States Exports
of Wheat and Flour
Slightly Higher

United States exports of wheat and flour (grain equivalent) between July 1 and November 30, 1964 were slightly higher than for the same period last year, but are by no means following the same sharp curve upward which has been

evidenced for the past year. By July-November 1963, U.S. exports were already 43 per cent higher than the previous year or the highest since World War II. Total exports for the current July-November period amount to 315 million bushels, or less than 2 per cent over July-November 1963. Much of this is due, of course, to the decreasing need in Western Europe for importing wheat. A near record harvest of wheat was reported in all countries of Western Europe except Portugal and Spain, with particular gains in France, Greece, the United Kingdom, and Italy. Consequently exports of wheat and flour to this area which amounted to 45 million bushels in the first five months of 1964 fiscal year only reached a total of 17 million bushels during the first five months of this fiscal year. Exports to countries in Eastern Europe, however, doubled during this period with almost all of the 13 million bushels going to Yugoslavia. No influx of the large shipments to the USSR were evidenced until January 1964. Over 56 per cent of all wheat and flour shipments, 177 million bushels, went to the Asiatic countries. This was 9 per cent more than was shipped to this area in the July-November 1963 period. Exports of wheat and flour to India alone totalled 97 million bushels or 31 per cent of all U.S. exports for the period. Another 15 per cent went to Pakistan and Japan. Approximately 72 per cent of the shipments to African countries went to the United Arab Republic. Thirty million bushels was destined for this country out of 41 million bushels to the African continent.

Grain shipments to date in this fiscal year dropped almost 2 per cent under those for the same period last year. Out of 274 million bushels exported, 35 per cent was destined for India, 13 per cent to Brazil, and 11 per cent to Pakistan. Shipments to Brazil also denoted an increase of almost 100 per cent over those to that country during July-November 1963. A poor crop has made wheat a major deficit food item in Brazil which is reflected in the huge grain exports to that country from the United States. Flour exports, on the other hand, increased 13 per cent during July-November 1964 as compared with July-November 1963. Out of 40 million bushels, 33 per cent or 13 million bushels were exported to the United Arab Republic.

Table A shows exports of wheat and flour by country of destination comparing the July-November 1964 period with July-November 1963. Shipments of wheat to Canada are predominantly for transshipment to other destinations. Table B shows the quantities and destination of wheat inspected for export from Canadian ports and exports from Table A adjusted to a new total which reflects transshipments during July-November 1964 compared with the same period a year earlier. These inspections amounted to less than one-third of those reported in the first five months of the 1963-64 fiscal year. Exports of U.S. wheat and flour are expected to reach 386 million bushels by December 31, 1964, as compared with 384 million bushels in the first six months of the 1963-64 fiscal year.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supplies Set Record for Third Consecutive Year Reflecting the effect of another record crop, which offset by a wide margin a decline in carryover stocks, supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1964-65 crop year are placed at an all-time high of 388.3 million bushels, 11 per cent greater

than the previous year's peak total of 348.5 million. The current production, of 368.0 million bushels, represented a substantial increase over the 1963-64 level of 325.0 million and was the third consecutive year in which a record outturn was harvested. Carryover stocks recorded only a moderate decline, from 23.5 million at December 1, 1963 to 20.3 million at the same date in 1964.

After deducting 76.5 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 311.8 million are available for export and for carryover in 1964-65, an increase of 14 per cent over the 273.7 million the previous year.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1-January 2 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 12.9 million bushels in contrast to 24.7 million exported during the corresponding period of 1963-64. The balance remaining on January 3, 1965 for export and for carryover, at 298.9 million bushels, exceeded by 20 per cent the comparable 1964 total of 249.0 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. D.I. Campbell, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, under date of January 18, 1965 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Crop Position

Australia's harvest is progressing satisfactorily. There are indications however, that the estimated New South Wales crop of 165 million bushels may not be met due to late rains. As a result of these revised estimates the total Australian crop may not reach the previously forecasted crop total of 380-390 million bushels.

New South Wales is the principal wheat growing state in Australia. For the ten years up to 1962 the states average crop was 56 million bushels and the average Australian crop in the same decade was 192 million bushels. In 1962-63 the N.S.W. crop topped the 100 million bushel mark for the first time and last season it was 122 million bushels. Experts forecast that expansion beyond this year's probable 160 million bushels is unlikely. The big factor in increased wheat production in recent years has been greater yields. For the 30 years to 1962 average yield per acre was 14.8 bushels. In 1961-62 it was 17.8, 1962-63 it reached 24.7 and this year 27.6 bushels per acre is expected.

Marketing Position

Australian wheat is moving overseas at a satisfactory rate with Japan, the United Kingdom and Iran in the market. Shipping of the China contract has now commenced. The strong U.K. enquiry is pleasing as officials had feared reduction in purchases due to its own excellent harvest. The latest sale by the Australian Wheat Board is 125,000 metric tons (4,593,000 bushels) to India for delivery before the end of May. This order was the balance of a quota of 200,000 tons (7,349,000 bushels) which India was required to purchase on a commercial basis to qualify for concessional imports from the United States. Terms were 10 per cent cash on shipment, 20 per cent in six months, 20 per cent in nine months and the balance in twelve months.

not available in elevators for all the deliveries. Australian wheat growers normally deliver all of their wheat at harvest time. The Grain Elevator Board is now planning temporary storage facilities at selected stations. As well, some growers have been forced to construct their own storage bins.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

1964-65 Wheat Supplies at Near Record Level

Reflecting the combined effect of substantially larger carryover stocks as well as an increase in production, total supplies of wheat in Argentina for the 1964-65 (Dec-

ember-November) crop year are estimated at some 415.0 million bushels, 23 per cent greater than the 1963-64 figure of 338.2 million and the largest total since 1938-39

when a record production combined with stocks resulted in a supply of close to 450 million bushels. Current crop year supplies consist of the December 1 carryover of 78.8 million, in contrast to only 25.9 million the year before, and the 1964-65 production of 336.2 million, the third largest wheat crop ever harvested in Argentina. After making an allowance of 128.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 286.4 million are available for export and for carryover in 1964-65, 39 per cent greater than the 206.6 million the previous year.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December 1964 amounted to 10.8 million bushels, considerably greater than the 6.9 million exported during the same month in 1963. The balance remaining on January 1, 1965 for export and for carryover was estimated at 275.7 million bushels, some 38 per cent larger than the January 1, 1964 total of 199.7 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H. E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture), Buenos Aires, under date of January 18, 1965 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

Weather and Crops
Weather conditions, during the month of December, were just about perfect for harvesting the new wheat crop, although somewhat on the dry side for the summer crops which are being seeded at present. These dry conditions contributed to a better conditioning of the wheat, with kernels maturing well and the grain having a very high hectolitric weight.

The dry spell was broken during the second half of December, when, from the 20th onwards, rains were widespread in almost the whole of Argentina. This moisture not only helped the wheat areas of the southern belt, where it was already fairly dry, but also the corn, sunflowerseed and sorghum areas, i.e. the summer coarse grains and oilseed crops. It is reported that these rains were also beneficial for the flax crop being harvested at present.

The present crop is exceeding all expectations, and is now officially estimated at 9,150,000 metric tons (336.2 million bushels), the third highest in Argentine history, exceeded only by that of crop year 1928-29 with some 9,499,716 metric tons (349.1 million bushels) and that of 1938-39 with 10,318,660 metric tons (379.1 million bushels). It is to be noted at the same time the marked increase unitary yield per hectare. Whereas the 1928-29 crop was harvested from 9,219,000 hectares (22.8 million acres) and the crop of 1938-39 from 8,620,970 (21.3 million acres), the present crop had been sown on only 5,880,900 hectares (14.5 million acres). The present average yield per hectare, for the Provinces of Buenos Aires, Santa Fe and Cordoba, at 1,743, 1,876 and 1,723 kilos (26, 28 and 26 bushels per acre), represents the highest in all Argentine wheat history.

Up to the end of last September, weather conditions had been, in general, unfavourable, especially in southern Cordoba and Buenos Aires, Entre Rios and La Pampa where very dry conditions persisted. During October and November, adequate and timely rains maintained a proper level of soil moisture, and lower than normal temperatures allowed for a slow and perfect maturing of the grain. There was another spell of dry weather at the beginning of December, and this contributed to a full development of the grain.

Movement of new wheat has been slow, as in the domestic market the Government decree compelling millers to incorporate old wheat in their flour has reduced interest in purchasing the new crop; and with respect to the export market, current official minimum prices are such that the trade is finding it increasingly difficult to move wheat out of the country.

This sluggishness has reflected back upon producers who are experiencing difficulty in selling new wheat and are becoming worried at future prospects. It is true that farmers can sell at the minimum price to the National Grain Board, but the Board at the moment is only paying approximately 70 per cent cash within 10 days of delivery, with the remainder coming after 90 days. There are producer complaints that the percentage paid in cash is actually lower than the above level, and producers are actively searching for other means of disposing of their wheat.

Sales during the period under review included 60,000 metric tons (2,205,000 bushels) for Brazil, shipment in January, at U\$S 67.47 per ton (\$1.97 per bushel) fob; a further 190,000 tons (6,981,000 bushels) is also contracted for February-March shipment, at U\$S 65.50 (\$1.92 per bushel) fob. Some Continental sales occurred at U\$S 66.50 (\$1.94 per bushel) cif, shipments February-March, and to Britain at £25.12.6 (\$2.09 per bushel) cif, January-March shipment. Sales of durums occurred at U\$S 68.00 per metric ton (\$1.99 per bushel) cif Continental ports, January-February shipment. During December, exports approximated 290,000 tons (10,656,000 bushels) primarily to Mainland China 116,000 tons (4,262,000 bushels) and Brazil 73,000 tons (2,682,000 bushels). This compares with November shipments of 339,508 metric tons (12,475,000 bushels).

Prices, at both the Cereal Exchange and the Futures Market, remained at levels of the previous month, that is, at the minimum official level. Recently, after many years of discussion, the Cereal Exchange and the Futures Market signed an agreement to join together. Formerly, the Futures Market formed part of the Bolsa, the Argentine Stock Exchange.

The Government has announced a rather large change in the Argentine taxation system including measures affecting wheat. As of January 1, 1965 a five per cent tax is to be levied upon producers delivering grains, oilseeds, and wool. The method to be used is as follows: Five per cent on those commodities having a minimum official support price; for those commodities not having a minimum price there will be ten per cent deducted from the index export value (fob), and to this value will be applied the five per cent tax; in other cases the tax will be applied to the actual sales price.


On February 1 the Board announced a further sale of wheat to the U.S.S.R., amounting to 120,000 long tons, approximately 4.5 million bushels. This wheat is for shipment from St. Lawrence ports during the period from May to September, with the possibility of some preshipment of August and September quantities. All of the wheat is for shipment to the U.S.S.R., and is for payment in cash.

The above is the third sale entered into between the U.S.S.R. and the Canadian Wheat Board during this crop year and brings the aggregate to 570,000 tons of wheat and 80,000 tons of flour, equivalent to over 25 million bushels of wheat.

CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- January 18 According to a report received from the office of the Commercial Counsellor, Buenos Aires, the present wheat crop in Argentina is exceeding all expectations and is now officially estimated at 9,150,000 metric tons, (336.2 million bushels) and exceeded only by the 1928-29 harvest of 9,499,716 tons (349.1 million bushels) and the record 1938-39 outturn of 10,318,660 tons (379.1 million bushels).
 - According to a report received from Mr. D. I. Campbell, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, the 1964-65 wheat crop in Australia is estimated at 368.0 million bushels.
 - The Crop Reporting Board, United States Department of Agriculture, reported that wheat stocks in all positions in the United States at January 1, 1965 were estimated at 1,443 million bushels, 11 per cent less than a year earlier and the smallest January 1 total since 1958.
 - The Canadian Wheat Board announced that under the provisions of the Second Long Term Agreement with China, a further sales contract had been signed to provide for the export of 700,000 long tons, 5 per cent more or less, of wheat. Assuming the full tolerance is taken, this amounts to slightly over 27 million bushels.
 - The C.W.B. announced that a sales contract, supplementary to the contract announced on Monday, January 25, had been entered into with China for a further sale of 100,000 long tons, 5 per cent more or less, of wheat. This amounts to approximately 3.7 million bushels.
 - The C.W.B. announced that it had entered into a contract covering the sale of 200,000 long tons of wheat to the U.S.S.R. Negotiations are also underway for the sale of 40,000 long tons of flour. These sales amount to the equivalent of approximately 9.4 million bushels of wheat.
