

WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

August-November Exports
13 Per Cent Above Record

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the <u>four major exporting countries</u> during the August-December period of the current Canadian crop

year amounted to 803.1 million bushels, exceeding by 13 per cent the previous record total of 709.8 million exported during the same five months in 1963 and 24 per cent more than the 650.2 million shipped during the comparable period last year. In addition, this year's August-December exports of wheat and flour were considerably above the ten-year (1954-63) average shipments for the same period of the crop year, of some 433.1 million bushels. Based on the Canadian crop year, wheat shipments from Canada, Argentina and Australia exceeded last season's August-December levels while those from United States declined slightly.

Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August-December 1965 with comparisons appear in the accompanying table.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Continue to Decline Supplies of wheat held by the four traditional major exporters at January 1, 1966 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,173.5 million bushels, 11 per cent below the 2,451.9 million at the same

time a year ago. The newly harvested 1965-66 wheat crops in the Argentine and Australia are taken into consideration in these totals. Although supplies were larger in Canada this increase was more than offset by declines in the totals for United States, Argentina and Australia. Supplies at January 1, 1966, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,078.3 (1,147.9); Canada, 766.6 (717.0); Argentina, 147.3 (308.6); and Australia, 181.3 (278.4).

World Breadgrain Crop at Near-Record Level According to the December 1965 edition of the World Agricultural Production and Trade published by the United States Department of Agriculture near-record world pro-

duction of breadgrains in 1965 is estimated at 278 million metric tons compared with the 1964 record harvest of 285 million tons, according to the second estimate of Foreign Agricultural Service. Harvests of the Northern Hemisphere are completed—over three-fourths of the world wheat and all except 5 per cent of the world rye crops—and harvesting in southern countries is well underway.

The world wheat crop of 1965, estimated at 9,007 million bushels (245 million tons), is 3 per cent below the 1964 record of 9,294 million bushels (253 million tons). Outturn exceeds the previous near-record production of 1962 by 4 per cent. Bumper crops in the continents of the Northern Hemisphere were more than offset by sharp declines in two major producers — the U.S.S.R. and Mainland China — and in several Southern Hemisphere countries, where dry weather generally continued to reduce crops as the season progressed.

Record wheat crops were harvested in North America, Western Europe, Eastern Europe and Asia. These countries account for over 70 per cent of the world output. Although Canada's harvest was reduced mainly by bad weather during harvest, above average yields per acre resulted in a crop 13 per cent more than in 1964, and the third largest on record. U.S. production was the largest since 1960, and also the third largest on record.

Record production in both Western Europe and Eastern Europe resulted in increases of 4 and 13 per cent, respectively over the big crops of 1964. Three countries of the European Economic Community had larger crops than in 1964. France and the Netherlands had record crops, and Italy's near-record harvest was the largest in 7 years. However, prolonged cold, wet weather resulted in comparatively poor crops in West Germany and Belgium.

A pronounced increase in the production of the United Kingdom made that country the largest West European producer outside the EEC. Acreage increased 16 per cent and nearly as high average yields per acre as the 1964 record resulted in a production of 14 per cent more than the previous record crop of 1964. Finland had a record output, and Spain and Portugal had larger crops than in the dry year of 1964. However, production declined in Austria, Sweden, and Switzerland.

Spectacular gains occurred in the yields per acre in a number of countries in East Europe. Although acreage increased only slightly in Rumania and Poland, and declined in Bulgaria, excellent yields harvested resulted in crops 44, 7 and 43 per cent, respectively over 1964. Czechoslovakia, East Germany and Hungary had moderately lower production, but substantially above the 1955-59 average. Acreage of Yugoslavia was reduced sharply by bad weather in the fall of 1964; although good yields were harvested, the crop was 7 per cent below 1964.

The production of a poor spring crop in the U.S.S.R. resulted in a drop in the 1964 wheat harvest of possibly 20 per cent. The winter wheat crop—usually about 40 per cent of the total—was above average, but dry, hot weather seriously reduced growth of the spring crop.

Despite a significant drop in the production of Mainland China — the principal producer — Asia produced a record crop. Record harvests in India and Pakistan were 22 and 10 per cent, respectively, larger than in 1964.

Even though Japan reduced acreage, higher yields resulted in a 3 per cent increase in production. In Mainland China, unfavourable weather reduced planting of winter wheat to about 5 to 10 per cent below the preceding year. Weather was not favourable for 1965 production, which declined 8 per cent below the 1964 crop.

Countries of southwest Asia had a good season for wheat. Production reached about 470 million bushels (12.8 million tons), compared with 436 million bushels (11.9 million tons) in 1964, and the average of 390 million bushels (10.6 million tons) annually in 1955-59. Bumper crops in Iran and Iraq were the result of increased acreage and generally good weather. Turkey's harvest exceeded the poor crop of 1964, but was below 1963.

The northern countries of Africa had good crops. Egypt planted about the same acreage, and production was almost up to the high 1964 level. Algeria's crop was sharply higher than the poor crop of 1964, but below 1963. Morocco increased acreage by 8 per cent and high yields per acre resulted in a 13 per cent increase in production. Tunisia also had a good crop.

Production in the principal wheat countries of the Southern Hemisphere will be considerably below the good crops of 1964. In Australia, persistent drought in the eastern states continued to reduce yields to the lowest level since the severe drought year of 1957. Production is estimated at 275 million bushels (7.5 million tons) compared with 368 million bushels (10 million tons) in 1964.

Argentina reduced acreage this year, and lack of rain after planting resulted in a production considerably below the excellent crop of 1964. Recent rain, however, may have improved yields. In the Republic of South Africa, continuing drought caused a downward revision in production to 32 per cent below the good crop of 1964 and 3 per cent less than the 1955-59 average.

Total production of the five principal exporting countries—the United States, Canada, Australia, Argentina, and France—is estimated at 3,081 million bushels (83.9 million tons) compared with 3,153 million bushels (85.8 million tons) in 1964. Very good crops in the United States, Canada and France failed to offset reduced harvests in Australia and Argentina. Therefore, total production of the five countries is about 2 million tons below 1964.

World rye production in 1965, estimated at 1,294 million bushels (32.9 million tons), exceeds the 1964 harvest by 39 million bushels (1 million tons). However, output is 150 million bushels (3.8 million tons) below the average of 1955-59. World acreage approximated the 1964 level, but good crops resulted in a 3-per cent increase in production.

Production of North America was 8 per cent more than in 1964 and 36 per cent above the 1955-59 average. The combined acreage of the United States and Canada — the only producers of rye in North America — was below the average. However, higher yields per acre in recent years, have more than offset the reduced acreage in both countries. The harvests of Asia and Africa increased 3 and 13 per cent, respectively, over the preceding year.

The U.S.S.R. had a good rye crop, with production of 570 million bushels (14.5 million tons) compared with 504 million bushels (12.8 million tons) in 1964. Acreage was below the average, but yields were the highest in recent years.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Current Crop Year Supplies Close to Record Level Reflecting increases in both opening stocks and production, total estimated supplies of Canadian wheat for the 1965-66 crop year amount to 1,192.8 million bushels, some 13 per cent above the 1964-65 figure of 1,059.9 million and only 1 per cent

less than the 1963-64 record of 1,210.7 million bushels. The current total consists of a carryover of 514.9 million bushels, as against the previous year's 459.4 million and the 1965 harvest, estimated at 677.9 million and representing a 13 per cent increase over the 1964 outturn of 600.4 million bushels. After making an allowance of 150.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1965-66 amount to 1,042.8 million bushels, 14 per cent above the 1964-65 comparable figure of 914.3 million.

August-December Exports
Highest on Record

Exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat equivalent reached the unprecedented total of 276.2 million bushels during the first five months of the current Canadian crop

year. This volume surpasses by some 7 per cent the previous high of 258.0 million exported during the same months of the 1963-64 crop year and exceeds by 40 per cent the 197.4 million shipped during the same period a year ago. This year's August-December total consisted of 261.2 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 326 thousand of seed wheat and 14.7 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the comparable period of last year these figures were 183.8 million of wheat in bulk, 340 thousand of seed wheat and 13.2 million of flour in terms of wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on January 1, 1966 for export and for carryover amounted to 766.6 million bushels, 7 per cent above the January 1, 1965 total of 717.0 million.

NOTE: Official wheat flour export data for December were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The flour export figure for December included in this report represents an unofficial estimate.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to January 19 of the current crop year have amounted to 236.7 million bushels compared with 239.2 million

marketed during the same period of the previous year. Some 29.4 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the four weeks December 23 to January 19. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 23.3 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased from 307.0 million at December 22, 1965 to a level of 313.6 million at January 19, 1966.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at January 19 this year represented a decline of 7 per cent from the 1965 comparable total of 336.3 million and was 15 per cent below the 1964 figure of 370.0 million. Country elevator stocks amounting to 194.6 million bushels, were above the 170.7 million at January 20, 1965 but below the 208.4 million at the same date in 1964. This year's supplies in country elevators at January 19 accounted for 62 per cent of the total visible wheat supply compared with the 1965 and 1964 corresponding percentages of 51 per cent and 56 per cent, respectively. Wheat stocks at interior terminals totalled 1.4 million bushels and recorded declines from the 1965 and 1964 comparable levels of 4.1 million and 4.9 million bushels, respectively. Wheat stocks "in transit rail" (western division) amounted to 9.1 million bushels below both the 11.3 million a year ago and the 24.1 million two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead, totalling some 32.3 million bushels, were 35 per cent less than the 49.8 million at January 20, 1965 and 34 per cent below the 48.8 million at the same date in 1964. Stocks in "storage afloat" amounting to 13.7 million bushels registered decreases from both the 1965 comparable total of 23.5 million and the 1964 figure of 22.9 million. The 26.0 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, were below the 32.0 million a year ago but above the 21.1 million two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at January 19, 1966 at 18.4 million bushels, were 19 per cent below the 1965 total of 22.6 million but 20 per cent above the 1964 volume of 15.3 million bushels. The 6.0 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were lower than both the 6.7 million of the previous year and the total of 8.6 million in these positions in 1964.

November 1965 Exports
of Wheat Flour and
Bagged Seed Wheat

Customs exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during November 1965 amounted to 4.2 million bushels, representing an increase of 85 per cent over the previous month's total of 2.3 million and 66 per

cent more than the November 1964 figure (adjusted to remove time lag) of 2.5 million. Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first four months of the 1965-66 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 11.2 million, 2 per cent above the adjusted August-November 1964 total of 11.0 million bushels. The leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during the August-November period of the 1965-66 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Britain, 3,252 (3,149); Cuba, 3,199 (1,349); Trinidad and Tobago, 500 (511); Jamaica, 472 (491); Lebanon, 381 (16); United States, 360 (315); Costa Rica, 356 (324); U.S.S.R. (Russia), 354 (1,314); Ghana, 321 (813); and Leeward and Windward Islands, 313 (331).

Exports of bagged seed wheat during November 1965, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 38 thousand bushels compared with the November 1964 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 45 thousand. Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during the August-November period of the 1965-66 crop year amounted to 276 thousand bushels compared with the August-November 1964-65 adjusted total of 261 thousand bushels.

December 1965 Exports
of Wheat Total
33.2 Million Bushels

Exports of wheat in bulk, as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners, during December 1965 amounted to 33.2 million bushels. This year's December total, while below the 55.7 million shipped during the previous month was 20

per cent above the December 1964 figure of 27.7 million and 60 per cent more than the ten-year (1954-63) average for the month of December of 20.8 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-December 1965 period amounted to an all-time high of 261.2 million bushels, representing an increase of 10 per cent over the comparable 1963 record total cf 237.8 million and more than twice the ten-year average for the period of 126.4 million. This year's shipments of wheat to the U.S.S.R. (Russia) totalled some 103.4 million bushels and accounted for 40 per cent of the five-month total exports of wheat in bulk form. Shipments of wheat to Britain amounted to 33.5 million and accounted for 13 per cent of the August-December total. During the same period of 1964 shipments to Britain amounted to 32.5 million and accounted for 18 per cent of the August-December total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first five months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels:
Communist China, 25.4 (30.8); Japan, 18.5 (22.0); Federal Republic of Germany, 13.8 (10.9); Czechoslovakia, 7.5 (18.7); Belgium and Luxembourg, 7.3 (7.5); Poland, 7.0 (14.7); Cuba, 5.2 (2.9); and East Germany, 5.0 (7.4).

Advance Quota Delivery
Privileges for
High Moisture Wheat,
Oats, Barley and Rye

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade Re Quotas (General) No. 23, under date of January 7, 1966 stated in part that effective immediately producers may deliver wheat, oats, barley and rye having a moisture content of 15.7 per cent and over at their regular delivery

points up to four (4) bushels per specified acre in excess of established quotas, provided that such deliveries, when added to deliveries already made under authorized specified acreage quotas, do not exceed eight (8) bushels per specified acre. Proper entries must be made in the producer's permit book covering such advance quota deliveries with a notation "High Moisture Grain".

Formation of Pacific Grain
Transportation Committee

On January 26, 1966 the Honourable Mitchell Sharp, Minister of Finance announced in part that "On behalf of the Minister of Transport and myself, I wish to

inform the House that the grain terminal companies at the Pacific Coast, both rail—ways and the Canadian Wheat Board have agreed to form a Pacific Grain Transportation Committee. The Committee's objective will be to co-ordinate grain movement to the Pacific ports with a view to ensuring maximum possible grain exports through these important ports. The export program at the Pacific Coast is high - but attainable - given a maximum effort and improved weather conditions. Although the railways have recently increased the number of boxcars allocated to the Pacific grain movement, there remain serious problems as my colleague the Minister of Agriculture has pointed out recently, among them the switching of cars, and the allocation of grain and grades of grain to elevators to meet ocean vessels.

The Committee met yesterday in Vancouver for the first time and has agreed to conduct their meetings under the chairmanship of Mr. William Riddel who retired recently as Assistant Chief Commissioner of the Canadian Wheat Board. We are indeed fortunate that a man of Mr. Riddel's long experience in the grain industry and in grain movement is available to devote his full time and on the spot efforts to the co-ordination of this grain movement. Mr. Riddel has been closely associated with the elevator companies, grain exporters, the railways and, of course, the Canadian Wheat Board for over 35 years".

General Quota

Position

By January 24, 1966 out of a total of 1,908 shipping points in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 487 points on a delivery quota of 6 bushels per specified acre, 351 points on a 5-bushel quota and 482 points on a 4-bushel quota. Of the remainder, 394 points were on a 3-bushel quota, 181 points on a 2-bushel quota and 3 points on a one-bushel quota. Only 10 stations were reported as "closed".

Rail Shipments of Wheat to Maritime Ports

Rail shipments of wheat to Maritime Ports from Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence Ports during August-December 1965 amounted to 10.2 million bushels compared with the August-December 1964 figure of 6.8 million.

Rail Shipments of Wheat to Maritime Ports from Bay Lake and Upper St. Lawrence Ports



Freight Assisted Shipments

Claims filed for payment up to December 31, 1965 represent the movement of 5,692 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-November period of the 1965-66 crop year. During the same months last year claims had been filed for a total of 3,378 thousand

bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 69 per cent above those of 1964. Revised data on the August-November 1964 shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1965 place the four-month total at 3,981 thousand bushels. The bulk of the shipments during the current four months under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, with these two provinces accounting for 44 per cent and 27 per cent of the total, respectively.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 162,255 tons during the August-November period of the current crop year. During the same four months of 1964 claims had been filed for a total of 135,090 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-November shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 20 per cent above those of 1964. Revised data on the 1964 August-November shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to December 31, 1965 place the four-month total at 167,690 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario.






FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES



EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES





EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**



CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during December 1965 amounted to 3,787,000 hundredweight, representing a decrease of 3 per cent from the November 1965 total of 3,902,000 hundredweight but 19 per cent higher than the December 1964 figure of 3,191,000 hundredweight and 16 per cent above the ten-year (1955-64) average production for the month of December of 3,266,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during December 1965 had a total rated capacity of 167,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 25-day working period 90.9 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during December 1965 amounted to 8,529,000 bushels, 3 per cent less than the 8,758,000 bushels milled during the preceding month but 20 per cent greater than the 7,084,000 bushels milled during December 1964. Of the wheat milled for flour during December 1965 some 7,535,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (609,000 bushels); Durum (293,000 bushels); and all other (92,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during November 1965 amounted to 1,827,000 hundredweight (some 4,202,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) in sharp contrast to the 2,273,000 bushels exported during the previous month and the adjusted November 1964 exports of 2,534,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty-five countries with exports to Cuba at 1,859,000 bushels and to Britain at 697,000 bushels, accounting for 44 per cent and 17 per cent of the total, respectively. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: U.S.S.R. (Russia), 354; Ghana, 210; Trinidad and Tobago, 142; United States, 124; and Leeward and Windward Islands, 106.

NOTE: Official wheat flour export data for December were not available at the time of preparation of this report. The flour export figure for December included in this report represents an unofficial estimate.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Total Supplies
Slightly Less Than
Previous Year

Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1965-66 crop year are estimated at 2,145.7 million bushels, 2 per cent below the previous year's total of 2,191.8 million, with a decline in carryover stocks more than offsetting an

increase in production. The 818.9 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1965 were the lowest stocks in twelve years and the fourth consecutive decline since July 1, 1961. The 1965 production, estimated at 1,326.7 million bushels, is 3 per cent more than the 1964 crop and 12 per cent larger than the 1959-63 average of 1,189.8 million. In addition, current crop year domestic supplies may be supplemented by imports of about 2 million bushels.

Domestic disappearance during 1965-66 is estimated at about 675.0 million bushels, 3 per cent above the 655.6 million last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,471.3 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 4 per cent from the 1,536.8 million in 1964-65.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period July-December 1965 amounted to 393.0 million bushels, one per cent more than the 389.0 million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on January 1, 1966 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,078.3 million bushels compared with 1,147.9 million on the same date a year ago.

1965 Wheat Crop Million Bushels

In a report released December 20, 1965 the Crop Reporting Estimated at 1,327 Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated in part that production of all wheat in 1965 was 1,327 million bushels, 3 per cent above 1964 and 12 per cent above average.

Yield per harvested acre was 26.9 bushels, 0.6 bushels above last year and the second highest of record. Land seeded to wheat for the 1965 crop totalled 56.9 million acres, 3 per cent more than was seeded for the 1964 crop. Acreage harvested in 1965 was 49.3 million acres, compared with 49.1 in 1964.

Production of winter wheat in 1965 was 1,024 million bushels, about the same as 1964 but 6 per cent above the 1958-63 average. The yield per harvested acre was 27.3 bushels, the third highest of record. The 1965 crop was seeded on 44.8 million acres, 4 per cent more than a year earlier and the largest since 1953. Acreage harvested for grain in 1965 totalled 37.5 million acres, one per cent below 1964 and representing 83.5 per cent of the acreage seeded.

The 1965 production of spring wheat other than durum totalled 234 million bushels, the highest since 1958. Production was 17 per cent more than last year and 27 per cent above the 5-year average. Wisconsin, Montana, Idaho, and Nevada were the only States showing less production than a year earlier. North Dakota accounted for slightly over half the total U.S. production. This year's crop averaged 24.3 bushels per acre, second only to the record yield of 26.7 bushels in 1962. It is well above the 22.0 bushel yield last year and the average of 20.0 bushels. Harvested acreage of spring wheat other than durum totalled 9,625,000 acres this year - 6 per cent more than a year earlier and 3 per cent above average. Acreage planted in 1965 totalled 9,815,000 acres, an increase of 5 per cent over last year. Abandonment, at 1.9 per cent, is well below the 3.2 per cent in 1964 and the average of 6.0 per cent.

Production of 1965 durum wheat totalled 68.9 million bushels, 3 per cent more than the 1964 crop and 75 per cent above average. North Dakota, the leading State and South Dakota increased production over a year earlier. Production declined in Minnesota, Montana, and California. Wet fields delayed planting operations in the main durum area. The growing season was generally favourable for good yields, although harvest was prolonged due to wet weather. Average yield per harvested acre for all producing States was 30.8 bushels, 2.8 bushels above last year and 9.4 bushels above average. The yield per harvested acre in each of the producing States was higher than in 1964. Acreage harvested this year totalled 2,234,000 acres compared with 2,382,000 acres in 1964 and the average of 1,749,000 acres. Seeded acreage of 2,296,000 declined from last year's 2,432,000 acres, but was well above the average of 1,827,000 acres. Abandonment of the 1965 planted acreage was 2.7 per cent, compared with 2.1 per cent abandoned in 1964.

The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce estimated Flour Production wheat flour production in the United States in November 1965, at 21,000,000 hundredweight, an average of 1,012,000 hundredweight per working day. This compared with an average output per working day of 1,114,000 hundredweight in October 1965 and 1,120,000 hundredweight in November 1964. Wheat flour mills in November operated at 92.8 per cent of capacity compared with 102.1 per cent and 101.0 per cent, respectively, for the previous month and the same month a year ago. Flour mills in November ground 48,000,000 bushels of wheat compared with 53,000,000 bushels the previous month. Wheat offal output during November amounted to 387,000 tons.

United States Exports of Wheat and Flour Show 15 Per Cent Gain United States wheat and wheat flour (grain equivalent) exported between July 1 and September 30, 1965, showed an over-all gain of 15 per cent as compared with the same three months of 1964. Exports during the current period

totalled 206 million bushels, of which over 63 million bushels or 31 per cent was destined for India. India, still in short supply, is currently the largest single market for U.S. wheat and flour.

Shipments of wheat grain increased during the first quarter of the 1965-66 fiscal year as exports to all destinations totalled 187 million bushels compared with 157 million bushels for the same quarter the previous year. Approximately one-third of the 1965 July-September quarter was destined for India. Shipments of U.S. flour (grain equivalent) for July-September 1965 were approximately 18 per cent less than those for July-September 1964. Out of 19 million bushels, 26 per cent was destined for the United Arab Republic, 11 per cent for Bolivia, and 5 per cent for Korea.

Inspections for export indicate the total shipments of U.S. wheat and flour should reach 275 million bushels by the end of October 1965. July-October 1964 exports of these commodities amounted to 241 million bushels.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

CORRECTION

In the September 1965 issue of the Wheat Review, page twenty-eight, under the heading "Research" the paragraph should read as follows:

"The rate of tax on wheat delivered to the Australian Wheat Board has been increased from 1/4d. to 3/10d. (Canadian 1/4 to 3/10 of a cent) to provide additional funds for wheat research". In the September issue these figures were incorrectly converted to 12 and 46 cents, respectively.

Wheat Supplies Decline One-third from Previous Year

Reflecting the effect of a sharp decline in production, which more than offset a relatively small increase in carryover stocks, total supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1965-66 crop year are estimated at some 274.3

million bushels as against 390.5 million in 1964-65. The current harvest, presently forecast at 250.0 million bushels, represents a decline of about 32 per cent from the record 370.0 million bushel outturn of 1964-65. Carryover stocks recorded a moderate increase, from 20.5 million at December 1, 1964 to 24.3 million in 1965. After deducting some 80.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 194.3 million are available for export and for carryover during 1965-66, 33 per cent less than the 291.3 million in 1964-65.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during December amounted to 13.0 million bushels practically unchanged from the 12.9 million exported during the corresponding period of the 1964-65 crop year. The balance remaining on January 1, 1966 for export and for carryover, at 181.3 million bushels, was in sharp contrast to the comparable 1965 total of 278.4 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. D. I. Campbell, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, under date of January 13, 1966 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Crop Position
In Queensland the State Wheat Board announced on December 14, that deliveries had reached 12.5 million bushels. Additional deliveries were dependent on the release of wheat held in growers' storage and the amount harvested late. Rains at the time had eased pressure of stock-feed orders.

The Chairman of the New South Wales Grain Elevators Board announced in early January that 25 million bushels of wheat had been received. While more wheat is yet to be delivered, the total wheat harvest in the State is not expected to exceed 39 million bushels. Deliveries last year were 125 million bushels.

In Western Australia harvesting of record crop is practically finished.

Marketing

A member of the Australian Wheat Board has said that all Australian wheat for export from the current harvest has now been committed for export. South Africa recently purchased 50,000 tons (1,867,000 bushels) of semi-hard guaranteed protein wheat for shipment from South Australia. This will be the first Australian wheat sold to South Africa in three years.

1966-67 Crop

The cereals specialist for the New South Wales Department of Agriculture has forecast record wheat acreage in that State if sowing conditions are suitable. Rains in December had proved of great value to farmers preparing their land for the next crop.

Queensland The Queensland State Wheat Board will proceed with construction of new storage capacity in five locations with total capacity of 2.22 million bushels.

Weights and
Measures Change as measures on February 14 when Australian currency changes to the decimal system from sterling. Bushels and long tons will no longer be used. However, the Australian Wheat Board has no plans at present to go along with the change as its legislation specifies bushels.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

1965-66 Wheat Supplies
Lower Than Previous Year

Estimated total supplies of wheat in the Argentine for the 1965-66 (December-November) crop year amount to 302.3 million bushels, consisting of the December 1,

1965 carryover of 92.9 million and the new crop, placed at 209.4 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting a relatively sharp decline in production, are about 34 per cent less than the 1964-65 total of 459.3 million. After making an allowance of 135.2 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 167.1 million are available for export and for carryover as against 324.4 million in 1964-65.

Preliminary exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during December 1965 amounted to 19.8 million bushels, 25 per cent larger than the 15.8 million exported during the same month in 1964. The balance remaining on January 1, 1966 for export and for carryover was estimated at 147.3 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the January 1, 1965 total of 308.6 million.


Eastern Europe had a bumper rye crop, with better yields than anticipated early in the season. Acreage increased over the preceding year, and per acre yields were among the highest on record. Western Europe, however, had a decrease of 15 per cent in rye production. The crop was reduced sharply in West Germany, the principal producer. Acreage declined and the outturn was the lowest yielding in five years. Of the 17 countries of Western Europe that produce rye, only Finland, Norway, Portugal and Sweden had larger crops than in 1964.


CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- January 12 According to Broomhall's Corn Trade News seasonal temperatures are reported from Argentina, with light rains in the central and southern part of the grain belt. Threshing returns confirm a very small wheat harvest, with private estimates running from 5.5 million to 6 million tons (202.1 million to 220.5 million bushels) as against 10.1 million tons (371.1 million bushels) a year ago.
 - According to a report from Mr. D. I. Campbell, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, the 1965-66 wheat crop in Australia is estimated at 250.0 million bushels.
 - The Honourable Mitchell Sharp, Minister of Finance, announced that the grain terminal companies at the Pacific Coast, both railways and the Canadian Wheat Board have agreed to form a Pacific Grain Transportation Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. William Riddel.
