

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WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

August-November Exports
Second Highest on Record

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain from the <u>four major exporting countries</u> during the August-November period of the current Canadian crop year

amounted to 624.7 million bushels, a decrease of 7 per cent from the record total of 671.7 million exported during the same four months in 1965 but sharply above the tenyear (1955-64) average shipments for the same period of the crop year, of some 373.0 million bushels. United States was the only one of the four exporting countries registering an increase over their 1965 comparable totals although Canadian exports of wheat and flour are lower by only a very narrow margin.

Shipments from these same four countries during August-November 1966 with comparisons appear in the accompanying table.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Below a Year Ago Latest available estimates indicate that as at December 1, 1966 supplies of wheat remaining in United States and Canada for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years plus the year-end (November 30)

carryover stocks in both Argentina and Australia, amounted to 1,715.0 million bushels and represented a decrease of about 14 per cent from the 1,992.9 million available a year ago. Supplies at December 1, 1966 in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 797.5 (1,073.4); Canada, 887.6 (765.0); Argentina, 13.4 (130.1); and Australia, 16.5 (24.4). Estimates for both years include on-farm stocks as well as those in commercial positions.

The supply data to appear in the January issue of this publication will include the 1966-67 production estimates for wheat in Argentina and Australia.

World Breadgrain Crop Revised Upward According to the December 30, 1966 issue of World Agricultural Production and Trade, published by the Foreign Agricultural Service, United States Department d production of breadgrains in 1966 is 6 per cent larger

of Agriculture, record world production of breadgrains in 1966 is 6 per cent larger than the previous record crop of 1964 and 9 per cent above 1965, according to the second estimate of Foreign Agricultural Service. Bumper crops in several main producing countries have resulted in upward revisions in world wheat. However, world rye production is the smallest since 1963.

Total wheat and rye crops of 1966 are estimated at 304 million metric tons compared with 280 million in 1965 and the previous record of 287 million tons in 1964. Average production in 1960-64 was 264 million metric tons.

The world wheat crop of 1966 is now estimated at 273.7 million metric tons (10.06 billion bushels) compared with the previous record of 255 million tons (9.4 billion bushels) in 1964. The revised estimate of the 1965 crop is 247 million tons (9.06 billion bushels) and the 1960-64 average was 232 million tons (8.5 billion bushels).

Exceptional crop yields of both winter and spring wheat of the U.S.S.R. are mainly responsible for the upturn in this year's world wheat production. Generally favourable weather plus improved cultivation practices there, resulted in higher yields harvested. Estimates of U.S.S.R. wheat production range from 70 to 75 million metric tons. This is a phenomenal increase over the poor 1965 crop, estimated at 64.5 million tons, and much above the average.

Major world wheat areas have large crops this year except Western Europe and Asia. Also, crops of Africa were reduced sharply by drought.

North America's record wheat harvest is 7 per cent above the large 1965 output. Canada, with a record acreage and record yields per acre, produced 844 million bushels (23 million tons), an increase of 30 per cent over 1965 and 58 per cent above average in 1960-64. The U.S. harvest, though below 1965, was 6 per cent above the average.

Australia increased acreage 15 per cent over the 1964 previous record acreage, and the crop is currently reported at about 415 million bushels (11.3 million tons), or 12 per cent above the previous record of two years before. Volume of Argentina's wheat now being harvested is as yet undetermined. Farmers planted a large acreage, but short rainfall in some areas in the early part of the season reduced yields per acre in various places. Good crop prospects are reporte in the normally high yielding area of south Buenos Aires Province.

In contrast with Western Europe's bumper crops of 1965, weather was generally unfavourable in the northern countries for the planting and growing of both winter and spring wheat. Total acreage declined by about 3 million acres from the 1965 record 46.6 million acres, and was 4 per cent below the 1960-64 average. Though outturn per acre was well above average, the high yields of 1965 were not attained. Therefore, production decreased by about 5 million tons below the preceding year. France, Europe's largest producer of wheat, had the most severe production setback. Acreage is reported at 12 per cent below the 1965 area, and production of 11,272,000 tons is about three-fourths the 1965 record crop, a decline of 3.5 million tons. West Germany's harvest, though better than the poor 1965 crop, was again below average. Good crops were harvested in Italy and Spain, two principal producers in southern Europe.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Record Production
Raises Total Supplies
to New Peak

Reflecting the combined effect of a record acreage seeded to wheat as well as the harvesting of record average yields per acre, the 1966 wheat crop in Canada is estimated at an all-time high of 844.4 million bushels. The previous

record production was 723.4 million bushels harvested in 1963. The increase of some 195.5 million bushels over the 1965 production of 648.9 million, offset by a wide margin the decline which occurred in opening stocks and, as a result, total supplies reached a peak level of 1,266.4 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 5 per cent above the previous peak of 1,210.7 million of 1963-64 and 9 per cent over the 1965-66 total of 1,161.9 million bushels. After making an allowance of 155.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1966-67 amounted to 1,111.4 million bushels, 11 per cent larger than the 1,004.8 million in 1965-66.

August-November Exports
7 Per Cent Below
Previous Year

Exports of wheat and flour, in terms of wheat equivalent, during August-November 1966 amounted to 223.8 million bushels, slightly less than the previous high of 239.8 million exported during the same four months of 1965. This

year's exports consisted of 212.2 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 325 thousand of bagged seed and 11.3 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the August-November period last year these figures were 228.0 million of wheat in bulk, 275 thousand of bagged seed and 11.5 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on December 1, 1966 for export and for carryover amounted to 887.6 million bushels, 16 per cent above the December 1, 1965 total of 765.0 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to December 21 of the current crop year have amounted to 269.0 million bushels compared with 207.3 million

marketed during the same period of the previous year. Some 84.5 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the five weeks November 17 to December 21. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 58.1 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased from 279.0 million at November 16 to a level of 305.3 million at December 21, 1966.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at December 21 this year represented a relatively small decline from the 1965 comparable total of 307.0 million bushels and was 9 per cent less than the 1964 figure of 334.4 million. Country elevator stocks, amounting to 162.7 million bushels, were 17 per cent below the 1965 comparable total of 195.8 million and 3 per cent less than the 166.9 million of 1964. Wheat stocks at interior terminals, at December 21, 1966, totalled 2.4 million bushels and recorded a 57 per cent increase over the 1965 comparable level of 1.5 million but registered a decrease of 41 per cent from the 1964 total of 4.1 million. Wheat stocks "in transit rail" (western division) amounted to 15.1 million bushels and were considerably above the 10.1 million of a year ago but below the 16.0 million of two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead, totalling some 15.4 million bushels, were 2 per cent more than the 15.1 million at December 22, 1965 but sharply lower than the 33.1 million at December 23, 1964. With the 1966 season of navigation at the Canadian Lakehead not closing until December 20, there were some 29.7 million bushels "in transit lake" positions at December 20. This figure was in contrast to the two previous seasons when there was no wheat listed in this position at this time, but stocks "in storage afloat" amounted to 19.9 million bushels in 1965 and 28.8 million in 1964. The 33.4 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, were above the 30.3 million a year ago but below the 36.4 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at December 21, 1966, at 28.8 million bushels, were above both the 19.3 million of 1965 and the 27.0 million of 1964. The 8.0 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were considerably above the 5.7 million of the previous year and slightly more than the total of 7.8 million in these positions in 1964.

October 1966 Exports
of Wheat Flour and
Bagged Seed Wheat

Customs exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during October 1966 amounted to 3.5 million bushels, representing an increase of 47 per cent over the September figure of 2.4 million but 5 per cent less than

the October 1965 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 3.7 million. Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first three months of the 1966-67 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 8.8 million bushels, only slightly below the adjusted August-October 1965 total of 8.9 million bushels. The leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during the August-October period of the 1966-67 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Cuba, 3,459 (2,737); Britain, 2,085 (2,644); Jamaica, 421 (364); Ghana, 361 (185); Leeward & Windward Islands, 353 (264); Trinidad and Tobago, 316 (326); Costa Rica, 260 (256); and Sierra Leone, 214 (95).

Exports of bagged seed wheat during October 1966, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 39 thousand bushels compared with the October 1965 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 84 thousand. Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during the August-October period of the 1966-67 crop year amounted to 275

thousand bushels compared with the August-October 1965-66 adjusted total of 238 thousand bushels.

November 1966 Exports of Wheat Total 48.9 Million Bushels Exports of wheat in bulk, as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners during November 1966 amounted to 48.9 million bushels, 5 per cent below the 51.7 million of the previous month, 12 per cent less than the

November 1965 figure of 55.7 million but 58 per cent above the ten-year (1955-64) average for the month of November of 31.1 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-November 1966 period amounted to 212.2 million bushels, representing a 7 per cent decrease from the previous high of 228.0 million set in the first four months of a year ago but considerably higher than the ten-year average for the period of 112.9 million. This year's shipments of wheat to Communist China totalled 49.5 million bushels and accounted for 23 per cent of the current four-month total exports of wheat in bulk form. Shipments of wheat to the U.S.S.R. (Russia) amounted to 45.2 million and accounted for 21 per cent of the August-November total. During the same period of 1965 shipments to Communist China and to U.S.S.R. amounted to 19.6 million and 92.2 million, and accounted for 9 per cent and 40 per cent, respectively, of the four-month total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first four months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Britain, 24.7 (27.0); Japan, 18.3 (16.4); India, 11.2 (4.7); Federal Republic of Germany, 10.6 (12.8); Belgium and Luxembourg, 7.8 (6.6); Poland, 7.6 (7.0); and Italy, 5.5 (4.1).

Exports of wheat flour for November 1966, based on Customs data, are not available.

Final Payment 1965-66 Wheat Pool On January 13, 1967, the Honourable Robert Winters, Minister of Trade and Commerce, made the following statement in the House of Commons: Mr. Speaker, I beg

leave to table a statement issued today in Winnipeg by the Canadian Wheat Board regarding the final payment on wheat delivered to the Board during the 1965-66 crop year. I would suggest, if Honourable Members wish, that the statement be included as an appendix to today's hansard. Producers delivered a total of 559,790,073 bushels of wheat to the Board in the 1965-66 crop year, which included 18,932,369 bushels of Durum wheat.

The amount of the final payment to be distributed to producers is \$270,028,575 - which is \$70 million higher than last year's payment and is exceeded only slightly by the record payment of \$272 million made on the 1963-64 pool account, when a larger volume of wheat was marketed. Of this amount, \$9,948,861 will be distributed to producers who delivered Durum wheat. These sums are not a final payment by the Government of Canada, but represent the net returns of the Canadian Wheat Board in the marketing of Western Canadian wheat for the 1965-66 crop year.

The average final payment for wheat other than Durum is 48.087 cents per bushel. The average final payment for Durum wheat is 52.549 cents per bushel. The overall average of 48.237 cents a bushel is the largest average final payment in the history of the Canadian Wheat Board. The Board will commence issuing final payment cheques to producers on January 17, 1967. This is the earliest date on which final payments have been made in the last fourteen years.

I wish to inform the House of the total prices realized by producers, prior to the deduction of the one per cent Prairie Farm Assistance Act levy, on their deliveries of some of the more important grades of wheat. The farmers will receive a total - basis in store the Lakehead or Vancouver - of

The accounting for the oats and barley pools for the 1965-66 crop year is under way, and distribution of the cheques will follow the distribution of the wheat payments. It is expected that the total of the payments for wheat, oats and barley will be at a record level.

Grain Shipments was extracted from the Weekly Bulletin

"Canadian Grain Position" published by the Statistics

Division of the Board of Grain Commissioners for Canada, for the week ending December

21, 1966.

<u>Direct Overseas</u> Shipments of the principal Canadian grains to overseas destinations direct from the Canadian Lakehead elevators totalled 22.7 million bushels during the season just concluded - substantially less than the 1965 record volume of 31.6 million bushels. There were 80 individual overseas cargoes that cleared port during 1966 - compared to 97 in 1965 - with only 7 of these topping off at St. Lawrence ports compared to 18 in 1965.

Direct Vessel to Maritimes The volume of the principal grains moved on an all water basis to Maritime ports amounted to 7.4 million bushels during the past season - only slightly higher than the 7.3 millions recorded in the previous year.

Direct to St. Lawrence Ports Vessel shipments to these lower river ports - 340.1 million bushels - represents some 70 per cent of the principal grains moved from Lakehead terminals and is substantially greater than in 1965 (247.9 millions).

Ocean Type Vessels in Coasting Trade A further decline occurred in this facet of Seaway operations during 1966. Four vessels made six trips carrying 1.1 million bushels as compared to 3 vessels, 11 cargoes and 4.3 million bushels in the previous year.

To United States Ports Shipments of Canadian grain by vessel to United States lake ports of 7.8 million bushels indicate a slight increase over the prior season's total (7.0 millions). Barley at 4.9 millions was again the principal grain involved in this movement.

United States Grain Movement The receipts of United States grain at licensed eastern elevators - 103.8 million bushels - reflected a decline of 21.4 millions from the 1965 season. Transhipments for export amounted to 83.7 million bushels (down 27.6 millions) while the Canadian domestic market absorbed 12.2 million bushels (up 2.8 millions). United States corn remained the largest single grain involved in this movement with receipts totalling 55.4 millions, exports of 37.0 millions and a domestic usage of 10.3 million bushels.

General Quota Position

By January 9, 1967 out of a total of 1,895 shipping points in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat
Board had placed 525 points on a quota of six bushels per specified acre, 543 points on a 5-bushel quota and 481 points on a 4-bushel quota. Of the remainder, 248 points were on a 3-bushel quota and 88 on a 2-bushel quota. Only 10 stations were reported as "closed".


Mainland China's wheat crop was reduced sharply by dry weather during the planting season. India and Pakistan report smaller crops than the bumper harvests of the preceding year, and Japan reduced acreage with a consequent decline of 20 per cent in production. In southwest Asia, record harvests in Turkey and Iran offset sharply reduced crops in Syria, Iraq, Jordan and Israel because of drought. Lack of rain in Algeria, Morocco and Tunisia decreased crops 55, 65, and 73 per cent, respectively, below the good 1965 harvests. South Africa's wheat crop was greatly reduced by drought for the second successive year.

World <u>rye</u> production in 1966 is estimated at 30.6 million metric tons (1.2 billion bushels), a decline of 9 per cent below 33.7 million tons (1.33 billion bushels) in 1965. Production is 5 per cent below the average of 1960-64 due chiefly to continued acreage declines in world areas.

Rye acreage of the U.S.S.R. and Eastern Europe, which together cultivate over nine-tenths of world rye, is again less than the average. Per acre yields are reported below the high yields of 1965. Acreage of Western Europe is estimated at 6 million acres, about 10 per cent below 1965, and 18 per cent less than the average of 7.3 million acres in rye in 1960-64. Even though crop conditions were better for rye than in 1965, production declined by 8 per cent. The United States and Canada planted smaller rye acreages. Therefore, even with high yields harvested per acre, their crops were 18 and 9 per cent, respectively, below 1965.

Protein Survey of Western Canada's 1966 Hard Red Spring Wheat According to Crop Bulletin No. 97 "Canadian Wheat 1966", published by the Grain Research Laboratory, Board of Grain Commissioners, for Canada, the mean protein content of the 1966 spring wheat crop is estimated to be 13.2 per cent, 0.3 percentage units lower than last year's crop. The new crop

of spring wheat is only fractionally lower in protein content than the long-term average value which for all wheat crops from 1927 to 1965 is 13.6 per cent. The Laboratory's survey of the protein content of the 1966 crop of hard red spring wheat was confined to samples graded No. 1 Hard, No. 1 Manitoba Northern through No. 4 Manitoba Northern together with samples of No. 4 Special and Garnet wheats. This is in keeping with the practice of previous years.



The above map shows the geographic distribution of the protein content of the 1966 spring wheat in terms of five levels or ranges of protein. There are only four very small, rather isolated areas in central and southern Saskatchewan of high average protein (over 14.9 per cent). Relatively large areas of western and central Manitoba, the central portion of Saskatchewan, and north easterly areas of Alberta are about the crop average in protein content. The western areas of Alberta, areas of south western Saskatchewan, and of southern Manitoba together with the northern areas of Alberta and Saskatchewan are below the crop average in protein.





1966 Season of Navigation Sets New Records

The 1966 season of navigation at the Canadian Lakehead opened on April 3 and closed on December 20. Preliminary reports for the 1966 season place the lake shipping total for the six major grains at a record 494.4 million bushels, 21 per cent more than

the 409.9 million shipped during the 1965 season and 2 per cent greater than the previous peak of 483.7 million bushels shipped in 1945. Shipments of wheat, at 392.2 million bushels, was also at a new high, surpassing the previous record of 344.4 million set in 1945. Rye, flaxseed and rapeseed moved in larger volumes in 1966 than a year previous while shipments of oats and barley were smaller.

Freight-Assisted Shipments Claims filed for payment up to November 30, 1966 represent the movement of 4,103 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during August-October 1966. During the same three months

last year claims had been filed for a total of 4,338 thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years, that the August-October shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 5 per cent below those of 1965. Revised data on the August-October 1965 shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to November 30, 1966 place the three-month total at 5,009 thousand bushels. The bulk of the shipments during the current three months under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, with these two provinces accounting for 49 per cent and 21 per cent of the total, respectively.


Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 113,952 tons during the first three months of the current crop year. During August-October 1965 claims had been filed for a total of 116,945 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both periods, that this year's shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 3 per cent below those of 1965. Revised data on the August-October 1965 shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to November 30, 1966 place the three-month total at 137,840 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario.


Provincial Distribution of Millfeed Shipments under the Freight Assistance Policy August-October 1966 and 1965






FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES



EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS AND OAT PRODUCTS **




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF CANADA'S SIX MAJOR GRAINS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during November 1966 amounted to 3,896,000 hundredweight and represented an increase of 5 per cent over the October 1966 total of 3,694,000 hundredweight, and 4 per cent above the ten-year (1956-65) average production for the month of November of 3,750,000 hundredweight, but relatively unchanged from the November 1965 total of 3,906,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during November 1966 had a total rated capacity of 164,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 91.5 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during November 1966 amounted to 8,810,000 bushels, 5 per cent over the 8,366,000 bushels milled during the preceding month, but relatively unchanged from the 8,768,000 bushels milled during November 1965. Of the wheat milled for flour during November 1966 some 7,717,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (686,000 bushels); Durum (308,000 bushels); and all other (99,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during October 1966 amounted to 1,514,000 hundredweight (some 3,482,000 bushels of wheat equivalent), and represented an increase of 47 per cent over the 2,368,000 bushels exported during the previous month, but 5 per cent lower than the adjusted October 1965 exports of 3,674,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to fifty-four countries. Exports to Cuba, at 2,116,000 bushels accounted for 61 per cent of the total, while those to Britain at 671,000 bushels accounted for 19 per cent of the October exports of wheat flour. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: Leeward and Windward Islands, 102; Jamaica, 81; Hong Kong, 78; United States, 64; and Trinidad and Tobago, 60.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Total Supplies
13 Per Cent Below
Previous Year

Reflecting the combined effect of smaller opening stocks and a decline in production, total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1966-67 crop year are placed at 1,846.7 million bushels, some 13 per cent less than the

previous year's total of 2,133.3 million. The 536.0 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1966 were the lowest stocks in thirteen years and the fifth consecutive decline since July 1, 1961. The revised 1966 production, estimated at 1,310.6 million bushels, is slightly lower than the 1965 crop of 1,315.6 million. Domestic disappearance during 1966-67 is estimated at about 668.0 million bushels, 8 per cent below the 729.4 million of last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,179.9 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 16 per cent from the 1,404.5 million in 1965-66.

exported during the same month's last year. The balance remaining on December 1, 1966 for export and for carryover was estimated at 797.5 million bushels compared with 1,073.4 million on the same date a year ago.

In a report released on December 20, 1966 the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated in part that production of all wheat was 1,311 million bushels, 0.4 per cent below 1965 but 7 per cent above average. The 1966 crop

was harvested from 49.8 million acres, 1 per cent above a year earlier and 3 per cent above average. The yield per acre averaged 26.3 bushels, compared with 26.5 bushels in 1965 and the 5-year average of 25.2 bushels. Land seeded to wheat for 1966 harvest totalled 54.5 million acres, 5 per cent less than for the previous crop.

Production of winter wheat in 1966 was 1,057 million bushels, 4 per cent above last year and 7 per cent above average. The yield per harvested acre was 27.4 bushels, the third highest of record. The 1965 yield was 27.1 bushels and the average is 26.3 bushels. The 1966 crop was seeded on 42.9 million acres, 5 per cent less than a year earlier but 2 per cent above average. Acreage harvested for grain in 1966 totalled 38.6 million acres, up 3 per cent from both the 37.6 million acres in 1965 and the average of 37.5 million acres.

The 1966 production of spring wheat other than durum totalled 191 million bushels, 17 per cent below 1965 but 4 per cent above average. Only Wisconsin had higher production than a year earlier. North Dakota, again, accounted for more than half the U.S. production.

This year's crop averaged 21.6 bushels per acre compared with 23.6 a year earlier and the 5-year average of 20.7 bushels. Harvested acreage of spring wheat other than durum totalled 8,804,000, some 9 per cent less than a year earlier and 2 per cent below average. Acreage planted in 1966 totalled 9,106,000, a decrease of 8 per cent from last year. Abandonment, at 3.3 per cent, compared with 1.8 per cent in 1965 and the average of 5.3 per cent.

Production of 1966 durum wheat totalled 63.2 million bushels, 9 per cent less than the 1965 crop but 29 per cent above average. Production in North Dakota, the leading State, was 10 per cent below a year earlier. Minnesota's production also dropped while output in South Dakota, Montana, and California increased over a year earlier. Acreage was larger than in 1965, but the growing season was not as favourable. The average yield per harvested acre was 25.9 bushels, 4.5 bushels below 1965 but 2.5 bushels above average. The yield per harvested acre was lower than last year except in California. Acreage harvested totalled 2,443,000 acres compared with 2,296,000 acres in 1965 and the average of 2,021,000 acres. Seeded acreage of 2,511,000 increased from last year's 2,361,000 acres and was well above the average of 2,095,000 acres. Abandonment of the 1966 planted acreage was 2.7 per cent compared with 2.8 per cent in 1965.

Acreage and Production of

According to a report on "Winter Wheat and Rye", released by the Crop Reporting Board on December 22, 1966, acreage seeded to Winter Wheat and Rye winter wheat this fall for harvest in 1967 totalled 54.1 million acres, the largest since the 57.1 fall-seeded acres in 1952 -

the last crop seeded without acreage allotments. The 1967 all wheat acreage allotment was increased to 68.2 million acres, 32 per cent greater than for 1966 with no acreage diversion provisions. This action offered farmers the opportunity to plant more wheat. And they did - increasing their winter wheat acreage by 26 per cent. All States seeded sharply more acreage than a year earlier. Several spring wheat producing States - Montana, Washington, Idaho, South Dakota, and Nevada - planted the most winter wheat acreage in history. Arkansas, Mississippi, and Louisiana also seeded record high acreages. The five States leading in winter wheat acreage - Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Nebraska, and Colorado - seeded the largest acreage since the early 1950's.

A 1967 winter wheat crop of 1,283 million bushels is indicated, based on conditions as of December 1. This would be the largest winter wheat crop in history, 9 per cent more than the record high in 1958. Condition of the crop on December 1 was good to excellent across much of the Nation, except in the important Central and Southern Great Plains. There a dry fall restricted root development and plant growth, although most stands are intact. In the past 10 years the average change in U.S. production estimates from December 1 to harvest has been 94 million bushels ranging from 2 million to 267 million bushels in individual years. The yield per seeded acre of 23.7 bushels is 0.9 bushel below 1966 but 1.0 bushel above average. December 1 conditions indicate that 85.8 per cent of the acreage seeded will be harvested for grain compared with 90.0 per cent in 1966 and the average of 86.7 per cent.

Conditions favoured seeding in the Great Plains from northern Kansas and Colorado northward. Emergence was rapid and stands uniform. Dry weather in October-November slowed plant development and the crop is entering winter with less than usual top growth. However, December 1 prospects generally were considered good to excellent. In the Great Plains, from central Kansas southward, because of early season moisture, farmers generally completed seeding ahead of usual. There has been little moisture since planting, and the dry weather has retarded root and plant growth. The crop supplied only limited pasture feed this fall. Wheat continues to "hold on" but a large acreage is exposed to possible wind erosion and freeze damage because of the lack of moisture.

Seeding of the Montana acreage was completed at about the usual time. A few farmers delayed planting until late September because of dry soils. However, late September and October rains had relieved the dry conditions. In the Pacific Northwest, soils were dry when seeding for winter wheat began - much of the acreage was planted under less than ideal conditions. But, late October and November rains relieved dryness enough for the crop to enter winter in good to excellent condition. Wet soils delayed completion of seeding a bit more than usual in the Central and Eastern Corn Belt States. Germination and growth has been good. Weather favoured planting and germination in the North Atlantic States, where the crop is entering winter in excellent shape. In the Southeast, weather for seeding was generally good, although wet soils delayed some planting. Stands are uniform and conditions have favoured growth. Moisture supplies as of December 1 were somewhat short in South Carolina but adequate to abundant elsewhere.

The acreage of rye sown for all purposes in the fall of 1966 is estimated at 3.6 million acres, down 9 per cent from a year earlier and 19 per cent below average. Seedings were below a year ago in the North Central, South Central, and Western regions but larger acreages were recorded for most Atlantic States. North Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas seeded nearly one-third less acreage than last year. Michigan and South Dakota had larger seedings than a year earlier. Most of the decline in the major producing North Central area is attributed to increased wheat seedings for the 1967 crop.

Seeding of the 1967 rye crop in the central and southern Great Plains was delayed because of dry soils in early September but seeding proceeded rapidly after mid-September rains. In the eastern Corn Belt and most South Atlantic States, wet soils caused some delay in planting. Pennsylvania is the only North Atlantic State with a larger acreage of rye this fall than last year. New York and New Jersey show slight declines. The South Atlantic States recorded slight increases in seedings except in Delaware, where there was a 6 per cent decline.

Total acreage of rye seeded in the Western States, at 269,000 acres, is 30 per cent less than last year. Most of the decline occurred in Colorado and Washington, where seedings were reduced nearly one-half. Most other western States had lesser declines. Oregon seedings were equal to last year. Reported condition of rye on December 1 was 86 per cent, 4 points below a year earlier and 2 points below average. Condition was below last year in most major rye States, but above average in the important Dakota-Nebraska producing area. Condition is well below average in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, where a shortage of moisture has limited development. The first production forecast for the 1967 crop will be made in July 1967.

Exports up for July-September 1966

U.S. Wheat and Flour United States exports of wheat and flour (grain equivalent) totalled 229 million bushels during July-September 1966, compared with 206 million for July-September 1965. This represents an increase of 11 per cent over the same 3 month period of 1965,

and 27 per cent over the 181 million bushels exported during July-September 1964. Shipments of wheat as grain increased 22.6 million bushels, or 12 per cent over the 187 million bushels shipped during July-September 1965. India and Japan continue to be the major markets and accounted for 37 per cent of the total wheat exports. Shipments to Japan amounted to 24 million bushels compared with 20 million bushels for a comparable period last year. In contrast exports to India totalled 54 million bushels which were considerably less than the 64 million bushels shipped during the same three month period last year. Substantial increases also occurred in shipments to Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Algeria, Morocco and the Republic of South Africa. However, reductions were quite noticeable in shipments to Turkey and Pakistan.

Flour shipments of 19 million bushels during July-September 1966 increased 4 per cent over the same period of 1965, but were 12 per cent less than the exports of July-September 1964. The major markets are South Vietnam and Ceylon which showed substantial increases in shipments over those of a similar period last year. However, there was a significant decline of 37 per cent in exports of flour to the United Arab Republic, the major market during the past several years. Total wheat and flour exports for July-October 1966 are estimated to be approximately 15 per cent more than the 244 million bushels shipped during the same months of 1965.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Supply Position

Disposition of Australian wheat supplies during the crop years (December-November) 1964-65 and 1965-66 is set out in the accompanying table. Total estimated supplies in the crop year recently completed, reflecting a decrease in production which more than offset a small increase in carryover stocks, amounted to 284.1 million bushels, 27 per cent less than the previous year's high total of 390.5 million. After deducting 92.9 million for domestic requirements, some 191.2 million were available for export and for carryover during 1965-66, 34 per cent below the 1964-65 total of 291.4 million.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the 1965-66 crop year amounted to 174.7 million bushels, 35 per cent less than the record 267.0 million exported during 1964-65. The preliminary estimate places carryover stocks at December 1, 1966, at 16.5 million bushels compared with 24.4 million at the same date a year ago.

Production

Harvesting of the 1966-67 wheat crop is well under way in most areas and it is now clear that Australia will, this year, hit a new record high in wheat production. Favourable weather conditions have continued to prevail throughout most regions although in recent weeks there has been a very considerable amount of rainfall, particularly in New South Wales, causing some mild concern over possible crop damage.

Nonetheless, this year's production will exceed the previous high of 370 million bushels. Present estimates place an overall harvest at between 400 and 425 million bushels. Based on official and unofficial estimates and predictions, it is likely that the final harvest total will be on the order of 408 million bushels. A production breakdown in bushels by States follows:

One small surprise is the greatly increased production of premium wheat this year as it is expected that approximately 15 million bushels of this high protein wheat will be produced. Virtually all of it comes from the State of New South Wales and in past years owing to the small production all of the production of premium wheat was taken up by Australian millers. However, it appears that this year approximately 12 million bushels of premium wheat will be available for export. The Wheat Board is undertaking a survey of the quantity and quality of premium wheat available for export this season and will then try to develop new overseas markets. In this respect the Board will be faced with the problem of persuading the millers that Australian premium wheat is better and cheaper than other hard wheats.

On November 30 the Minister for Primary Industry announced that the guaranteed price for fair average quality wheat of the 1966-67 harvest will be \$A.1.55 (\$1.88 Canadian) per bushel bulk basis free on rails at ports of export. This new price represents an increase of 3 1/3 cents (4 cents) per bushel over the guaranteed price paid for wheat of the 1965-66 season. This guaranteed price will cover 150 million bushels of exports from the 1966-67 wheat crop. The home consumption price for wholesale sales of bulk wheat of fair average quality is to be \$A1.56 1/2 (\$1.89) per bushel. It is predicted that with this year's expected bumper harvest Australian wheatgrowers will contribute to the Wheat Stabilization Fund for the first time since the 1958-59 crop year.

Export Sales

Two very substantial wheat sales highlight Australia's export marketing of wheat during the past month. The first of these was the sale of 9.33 million bushels of fair average quality wheat to Pakistan. This wheat which is to be shipped during December and January was made on standard "China terms" and it represents the largest single sale of wheat which Australia has ever made to Pakistan. In 1965-66 sales to Pakistan totalled 2.02 million bushels. The previous high was recorded during 1957 when shipments totalled 8.34 million bushels.

In early December the Australian Wheat Board announced the sale of 5.6 million bushels of wheat to India. Like the Pakistan sale this quantity is to be delivered during December and early January and the payment terms are identical to those of the Pakistan sale, i.e., 10 per cent on shipment, 20 per cent in six months, 20 per cent in nine months and the balance of 50 per cent in twelve months with an interest charge on deferred payments. It seems likely that due to the reported crop failures in India further substantial wheat deliveries will be made to that country from Australia.

Generally speaking, the export picture for Australian wheat is bright. The carryover from the 1965-66 stocks amounts to only 16.5 million bushels and the recent sales to India and Pakistan coupled with the very large sale to Red China, reported last month, plus a 7.75 million bushel sale to South Africa, represent an auspicious beginning to the new marketing year. Certainly there does not seem to be any pessimism in Canberra about the marketing of this year's harvest.

New Wheat Classifications The nomenclature for Australian wheat has been changed, according to a recent announcement by the Australian Wheat Board. It has been felt for some time that the classifications under which

Australian wheat has been marketed do not properly reflect the regional differences of the various grades. Accordingly, certain classifications have been renamed to enable buyers to identify these differences. The following table shows the old and new descriptions for Australian wheat:

ARGENTINE SITUATION

1965-66 Wheat Supplies Sharply Lower Than Previous Year Disposition of Argentine wheat for the crop years (December-November) 1964-65 and 1965-66 appears in the accompanying table. Reflecting a sharp decline in production which more than offset an increase in carryover stocks, total supplies

of wheat in Argentina for the 1965-66 crop year were estimated at some 350.5 million bushels, 30 per cent less than the previous year's level of 502.4 million. December 1 carryover stocks increased from 88.6 million in 1964 to 130.1 million in 1965 while production dropped from 413.7 million in 1964-65 to only 220.5 million in 1965-66. After making an allowance of 131.9 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 218.7 million were available for export and for carryover as against 361.7 million in 1964-65.

Exports Decrease from Record Level

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during the 1965-66 crop year amounted to 205.2 million bushels, 11 per cent less than the previous high of 231.6

million exported in the 1964-65 crop year. The preliminary estimate places carryover stocks at December 1, 1966 at some 13.4 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the December 1, 1965 figure of 130.1 million and the lowest stocks since 1952 when only 1.8 million bushels were carried forward.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture), Buenos Aires, under date of December 23, 1966 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

Weather and Crops

During November weather conditions throughout the Argentine grain belt were favourable. Widespread rains occurred which in fact led to somewhat excessive moisture at the beginning of harvest. At the time of writing rain again occurred, coupled with hail and strong winds, which may result in some damage to stands in southern Buenos Aires. Dry weather is now needed for a few weeks in order that harvesting may be completed.

By the end of November harvesting was underway in northern and central Santa Fe and in some regions of Cordoba and Entre Rios. By mid-December harvesting was widespread and it is now becoming evident that yields both in the provinces of Cordoba and Santa Fe will be slightly lower due to the lack of rainfall early in the year. In the province of Buenos Aires harvesting has begun and the crop in general appears to be satisfactory although some areas suffered from the early drought and grain aphid outbreaks. In many areas of La Pampa and southern regions including eastern and southern Buenos Aires, the outlook appears most promising although drier weather conditions will be needed.

There has been no official production estimate released so far other than that of 6.5 million tons (238.8 million bushels) stated in early November. Some trade circles consider this to be rather low with grain companies estimating between 7.2 and 7.5 million tons (264.6 million and 275.6 million bushels). usual there has been no estimate for durums but reports indicate that the stands located primarily in southeastern and central Buenos Aires are in excellent condition and therefore a crop of 650,000 to 750,000 tons (23.9 million to 27.6 million bushels) might be harvested.

Wheat Markets The market for wheat declined at the end of November when millers withdrew from the market and exporters shifted interest to new crop grain. Some lots of the old harvest were purchased by exporters at 1,280 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.53 per bushel) f.o.r. Buenos Aires and 1,200 pesos (\$1.44 per bushel) at Bahia Blanca. Millers were paying 1,250 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.50 per bushel) for delivery mid-December. The new crop by early December was being quoted at 1,250 pesos (\$1.50 per bushel) for January delivery and 10 pesos (one cent per bushel) more for each successive month.

During November small lots of wheat were sold to Europe with Italy paying U\$S 59 per ton (\$1.74 per bushel) f.o.b. January-March shipment. Norway purchased for January-February shipment at U\$S 59.50 (\$1.75 per bushel). Prices for December-January shipment to Italy were quoted at c.i.f. U\$S 71.60 per ton (\$2.11 per bushel) and for other Continental ports at U\$S 69.45 (\$2.05 per bushel) for January-March shipment. Britain was buying at £26.7.6 per ton (\$2.17 per bushel).

Lots of new durums were sold at about 1,380 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.65 per bushel) January delivery with the price increasing by 20 pesos (2 cents per bushel) for each successive month. During the first half of November, the Italian demand for durums was keen with prices being offered at up to U\$S 81.40 per ton (\$2.40 per bushel) c.i.f. Italy. Later in the month prices declined to U\$S 77 per ton (\$2.27 per bushel) December-January shipment.

Prices in the Buenos Aires Futures Market were by mid-November: for December, 1.360 pesos (\$1.63 per bushel); for January, 1,357 (\$1.63 per bushel); for February, 1,375 (\$1.65 per bushel); and for March 1,410 (\$1.69 per bushel). By early December prices decreased slightly and January was quoted at 1,238 pesos (\$1.48 per bushel); February, 1,257 (\$1.51 per bushel); March 1,299 (\$1.56 per bushel); and for April futures 1,353 pesos (\$1.62 per bushel). At present, February futures are quoted on the Exchange at 1,320 (\$1.58 per bushel); March 1,375 (\$1.65 per bushel); and April 1,418 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.70 per bushel) f.o.r. Buenos Aires. The present price in the Buenos Aires Cereal Exchange for hard wheat, Grade 1, 80 kilos-hectolitre (64 pounds per bushel) is 1,300 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.56 per bushel) and for durums, 1,340 (\$1.61 per bushel). The prices at Bahia Blanca, same basis, are 1,270 and 1,340 (\$1.52 and \$1.61 per bushel).

CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

December 14, 1966

According to a report received from Mr. J.E.G. Gibson, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, harvesting of the 1966-67 wheat crop was well under way in most areas and it was clear that Australia will, this year, hit a new record high in wheat production. Present estimates place the current harvest at about 408 million bushels.

The 1966 season of navigation closed at the Canadian Lakehead. Preliminary reports for the 1966 season place the lake shipping total for the six major grains at a record 494.4 million bushels. Shipments of wheat were also at a new high at 392.2 million.

According to a report received from Mr. H.E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture), Buenos Aires, official estimates placed the 1966-67 wheat crop at about 6.5 million metric tons (238.8 million bushels). However, some trade circles consider this to be rather low with grain companies estimating between 7.2 million to 7.5 million tons (265 million to 276 million bushels), respectively.

January 4, 1967

According to the Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, wheat flour production in the United States in November 1966 was 22,000,000 hundredweight, an average of 1,028,000 hundredweight per working day compared with 1,092,000 hundredweight last month and 1,014,000 hundredweight in November 1965.

The Canadian Wheat Board announced the final payment on wheat delivered to the Board during the Crop Year 1965-66. Producers delivered a total of 559,790,073 bushels of wheat to the Board in the 1965-66 Crop Year which included 18,932,369 bushels of Durum wheat. The amount of the final payment to be distributed to producers is \$270,028,575 of which \$9,948,861 will be distributed to producers who delivered Durum wheat. The average final payment for all wheat was 48.237 cents per bushel.



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
