

WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Wheat Exports
Lower than
Previous Year

At the halfway mark of the current Canadian crop year shipments of wheat (including flour in terms of wheat) from the four traditional major exporters amounted to 850.0 million bushels, 8 per cent below the previous record total of 927.6

million exported during the same six months in 1965-66 but still the third highest on record. In addition, this year's August-January exports of wheat and flour were sharply above the ten-year (1955-56-1964-65) average shipments for the same period of the crop year, of some 551.3 million bushels. Exports from United States and Australia were at higher levels this year than last while those from Canada and Argentina were lower.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Below a Year Ago Supplies of wheat held by the four traditional major exporters at February 1, 1967 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,928.4 million bushels, 3 per cent below the 1,994.3

million at the same time a year ago. Although supplies were larger in Canada and Australia these increases were more than offset by declines in the totals for United States and Argentina. Supplies at February 1, 1967, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 688.4 (952.7); Canada, 817.7 (700.8); Argentina, 110.9 (177.4); and Australia, 311.4 (163.4).

CANADIAN SITUATION

1966-67 Supplies Reflecting the combined effect of a record acreage seeded at Record Level to wheat as well as the harvesting of record average yields per acre, the 1966 wheat crop in Canada is estimated at an all-time high of 844.4 million bushels. The previous record production was 723.4 million bushels harvested in 1963. The increase of some 195.5 million bushels over the 1965 production of 648.9 million, offset by a wide margin the decline of 92.1 million bushels which occurred in opening stocks and, as a result, total supplies reached a peak level of 1,264.6 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 4 per cent above the previous peak of 1,210.7 million of 1963-64 and 9 per cent over the 1965-66 total of 1,161.9 million bushels. After making an allowance of 155.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1966-67 amounted to 1,109.6

million bushels, 10 per cent larger than the 1,005.0 million in 1965-66.

Slightly Less than Previous Year

August-January Exports Exports of wheat and flour, in terms of wheat equivalent, during the first half of the current crop year amounted to 291.8 million bushels, 4 per cent below the previous high of 304.3 million exported during the same period a year

ago. This year's exports consisted of 273.4 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 368 thousand of bagged seed and 18.1 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the comparable period of last year these figures were 284.7 million of wheat in bulk, 388 thousand of bagged seed and 19.2 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on February 1, 1967 for export and for carryover amounted to 817.7 million bushels, 17 per cent above the February 1, 1966 total of 700.8 million.

and Visible Supplies

Marketings, Disappearance Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to February 22 of the current crop year have amounted to 345.1 million bushels compared with 265.9 million

marketed during the same period of the previous year and the highest marketings for that period since 1939-40. Some 19.4 million bushels of this year's total were deliveried during the four weeks January 19 to February 22, 1967. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 37.8 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat decreased from 331.7 million at January 18 to a level of 313.1 million at February 22, 1967.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at February 22 this year represented a 4 per cent increase over the 1966 comparable total of 301.7 million bushels but was 8 per cent less than the 1965 figure of 341.3 million. Country elevator stocks, amounting to 149.1 million bushels, were below both the 1966 comparable total of 188.3 million and the 177.6 million of 1965. Wheat stocks at interior terminals, at February 22, 1967 totalled 4.8 million bushels, considerably higher than the 1.2 million of the previous year and also registered a small increase over the 1965 total of 4.3 million. Wheat stocks "in transit rail" (western division) amounted to 14.3 million bushels sharply above the 4.2 million of a year ago and 18 per cent more than the 12.1 million of two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead, totalling some 62.6 million bushels, were 27 per cent larger than the 49.4 million at February 23, 1966 and 3 per cent more than the 60.9 million at February 24, 1965. Stocks in "storage afloat" amounting to 16.6 million bushels, were sharply above the 7.8 million of the previous year but slightly below the 16.7 million of two years ago. The 20.2 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, were higher than the 17.7 million of 1966 but less than the 25.9 million of 1965. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at February 22, 1967, at 21.0 million bushels, were above both the 16.1 million of 1966 and the 20.9 million of 1965. The 12.6 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) exceeded by a considerable margin both the 6.2 million of the previous year and the 7.2 million in these positions in 1965.

December 1966 Exports of Wheat Flour and Bagged Seed Wheat

Customs exports of wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during December 1966 amounted to 4.0 million bushels, representing an increase of 42 per cent over the November figure of 2.8 million but 7 per cent less

than the December 1965 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 4.3 million. Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first five months of the 1966-67 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 15.5 million bushels, only slightly below the adjusted August-December 1965 total of 15.8 million bushels. The leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during the August-December period of the 1966-67 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Cuba, 6,109 (4,883); Britain, 3,599 (4,088); Ghana, 746 (428); Jamaica, 745 (684); Trinidad and Tobago, 594 (547); Leeward and Windward Islands, 529 (412); Ceylon, 442 (499); and Costa Rica, 442 (446).

Exports of bagged seed wheat during December 1966, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 17 thousand bushels compared with the December 1965 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 64 thousand. Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during the August-December period of the 1966-67 crop year amounted to 343 thousand bushels compared with the August-December 1965-66 adjusted total of 339 thousand bushels.

January 1967 Exports of Wheat Total 27.7 Million Bushels Exports of wheat in bulk, as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners, during January 1967 amounted to 27.7 million bushels, 17 per cent below the 33.5 million of the previous month, but 18 per cent above the 23.5 million

of January 1966 and 49 per cent higher than the ten-year (1956-65) average for the month of January of 18.6 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the first half of the 1966-67 crop year amounted to 273.4 million bushels, representing a 4 per cent decrease from the all-time high of 284.7 million set in the first six months of a year ago but sharply higher than the ten-year average for the period of 153.5 million. This year's shipments of wheat to Communist China totalled 60.1 million bushels and accounted for 22 per cent of the current six-month total exports of wheat in bulk form. Shipments of wheat to the U.S.S.R. (Russia) amounted to 59.3 million and also accounted for 22 per cent of the August-January total. During the same period of 1965-66 shipments to Communist China and U.S.S.R. (Russia) amounted to 30.5 million and 108.1 million, and accounted for 11 per cent and 38 per cent, respectively, of the six-month total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first six months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Britain, 34.0 (38.2); Japan, 30.4 (22.9); India, 16.5 (5.1): Federal Republic of Germany, 12.0 (13.8); Belgium and Luxembourg, 9.8 (7.4); Poland, 7.6 (7.6); Italy, 5.8 (4.6); and Cuba, 5.2 (6.1).

Exports of wheat flour for January, 1967 based on Customs data, are not available.

By February 20, 1967 out of a total of 1,895 shipping points in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 352 points on a delivery quota of 8 bushels per specified acre and 804 points on a 6-bushel quota. Of the remainder, 501 points were on a 5-bushel quota and 225 points on a 4-bushel quota. Only 13 stations were reported as "closed".

Delivery Quota
on Durum Wheat

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade
re Quotas (General) No. 18, under date of February 9, 1967
stated in part that Instructions to the Trade re Quotas
(General) No. 14 issued November 28, 1966, authorized an open quota on Durum Wheat
until February 28, 1967.

The Board announced that this open quota will not be extended beyond February 28 and that on and after March 1, 1967, all deliveries of Durum Wheat must be applied against the specified acreage quota.

All deliveries of Durum Wheat made on and after March 1, 1967, whether for storage or for sale, must be recorded on one of the pages for deliveries under specified acreage quotas in the producer's 1966-67 delivery permit book at time of delivery and must be confined to the delivery point indicated therein.

Wheat Shipments to the United States, either for rethe United States export or retention for domestic use, from August 1, 1966 to February 22, 1967 amounted to 55,000 bushels. No shipments of wheat were reported during the corresponding periods of 1965-66 and 1964-65.

Rail Shipments of Wheat to Maritime Ports Rail shipments of wheat to Maritime ports from Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports during the first six months of the current crop year totalled 17.7 million bushels compared with the August 1965-January 1966 figure of 19.6 million.





Freight-Assisted Shipments Claims filed for payment up to January 31, 1967 represent the movement of 6,796 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-December period of the 1966-67 crop year. During the same months last year claims had been filed for a total of 7,212

thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-December shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 6 per cent below those of 1965. Revised data on the August-December 1965 shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to January 31, 1967 place the five-month total at 7,968 thousand bushels. The bulk of the shipments during the current five months under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, with these two provinces accounting for 48 per cent and 22 per cent of the total, respectively.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 199,579 tons during the August-December period of the current crop year. During the same five months of 1965 claims had been filed for a total of 204,031 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-December shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about 2 per cent below those of 1965. Revised data on the 1965 August-December shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to January 31, 1967 place the five-month total at 233,390 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario.






FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR** (SPECIFIED PERIODS)




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during January 1967 amounted to 3,242,000 hundredweight, indicating an increase of 2 per cent over the December 1966 total of 3,171,000 hundredweight, but 11 per cent lower than the adjusted January 1966 figure of 3,659,000 hundredweight, and 1 per cent less than the ten-year (1957-66) average production for the month of January of 3,285,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during January 1967 had a total rated capacity of 168,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 25-day working period, 77.3 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during January 1967 amounted to 7,263,000 bushels, 2 per cent above the 7,122,000 bushels milled during the preceding month, but 12 per cent below the 8,257,000 bushels milled during January 1966. Of the wheat milled for flour during January 1967 some 6,291,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (573,000 bushels); Durum (268,000 bushels); and all other (131,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during December 1966 amounted to 1,722,000 hundredweight (some 3,960,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) 42 per cent greater than the 2,779,000 bushels exported during the previous month, but 7 per cent below the adjusted December 1965 exports of 4,261,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-seven countries with exports to Cuba amounting to 1,714,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 43 per cent of the December 1966 total. Shipments to Britain amounted to 655,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounted for 17 per cent of the total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: Ceylon, 442; Ghana, 275; Jamaica, 187; and Trinidad and Tobago, 154.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Reflecting the combined effect of smaller opening stocks and Below Previous Year a relatively slight decline in production, total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1966-67 crop year are placed at 1,846.7 million bushels, some 13 per cent less than the previous year's total of 2,133.3 million. The 536.0 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1966 were the lowest stocks in thirteen years and the fifth consecutive decline since July 1, 1961. The 1966 production, estimated at 1,310.6 million bushels, is slightly lower than the 1965 crop of 1,315.6 million. Domestic disappearance during 1966-67 is estimated at about 668.0 million bushels, 8 per cent below the 729.4 million of last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,180.0 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 16 per cent from the 1,404.7 million in 1965-66.

Stocks of Wheat in All Positions January 1, 1967 On January 24, 1967 the United States Department of Agriculture reported that all wheat in storage on January 1 totalled 1,046 million bushels, about one-half the record January 1, 1961 holdings of 2,068 million bushels. The

January 1, 1967 stocks were 22 per cent below a year earlier and the smallest for this date since 1952. Off-farm holdings, at 637 million bushels, were 32 per cent less than a year earlier while farm stocks of 409 million bushels were up 1 per cent. Disappearance from all storage positions during the October-December quarter is indicated at 395 million bushels compared with 368 million bushels for the same period in 1965.

Durum wheat stocks on January 1 in all storage positions were 64 million bushels, 36 per cent below a year earlier and the smallest January 1 holdings since 1962. Farm stocks totalled 40 million bushels, 30 per cent below last year and off-farm holdings of 24 million bushels were 43 per cent less.

Crop and Weather Conditions

The following extract has been taken from the Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin published jointly by the United States Department of Commerce and the United States

Department of Agriculture for the week ending February 27, 1967.

In Kansas, most of the major wheat producing areas remained very dry. Strong winds on several days caused some wheat damage in parts of central and south-central Kansas. Wheat condition in New Mexico and Colorado showed little change from a week earlier. However, Colorado's eastern slope suffered light to moderate wind damage in the northeast and lighter amounts in the southeast. In Nebraska, high winds damaged some wheat acreage because of blowing soils. Moisture was becoming very short over much of the State.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Large Production Results in Record Wheat Supplies Reflecting the effect of a substantial increase in production, which more than offset a relatively small decrease in carry-over stocks, total supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1966-67 crop year are estimated at an all-time high of 446.5

million bushels as against 284.1 million in 1965-66. The current harvest, presently forecast at 430.0 million bushels, is 16 per cent above the previous record of 370.0 million bushels harvested in 1964-65. Carryover stocks recorded a 32 per cent decline from 24.4 million at December 1, 1965 to 16.5 million in 1966. After deducting some 85.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 361.5 million are available for export and for carryover during 1966-67, sharply above the 191.2 million in 1965-66.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1-January 28 of the current Australian crop year amounted to a record 50.1 million bushels, 80 per cent larger than the 27.8 million exported during the corresponding period of the 1965-66 crop year. The balance remaining on January 29, 1967 for export and for carryover, at 311.4 million bushels, exceeded by a wide margin the comparable 1966 total of 163.4 million.

Crop Production

The 1966-67 Australian wheat harvest is almost entirely in and final production figures are now estimated at between 430 million and 448 million bushels, representing up to a 75 per cent increase over last season's output. The leading wheat producing State of New South Wales is expected to have a final crop on the order of 190 million bushels.

Weather during the harvest period has continued to be fine and rain damage reported earlier will certainly not affect more than 4 or 5 per cent of the final total harvest.

The major problem at this point appears to be the lack of bulk storage handling facilities. In the State of New South Wales growers are bringing considerable pressure on the Grain Elevators Board to increase the State's wheat storage facilities by at least 80 million bushels to a total of approximately 200 million bushels as quickly as possible, but even a crash programme of this nature would still be insufficient to handle this year's harvest and it would likely not be completed in time to cope with the 1967-68 harvest.

An Australian Wheat Board sales mission is presently touring the South American countries of Bolivia, Peru, Chile and Brazil. The first sales success has just been reported from Chile where the Government agricultural agency "Empresa da Comercio Agricola" has undertaken to purchase 150,000 tons (5,600,000 bushels) of Australian F.A.Q. wheat. The value of this order, including freight, is estimated at U.S.\$ 8,920,000 (\$9,616,000 Canadian) and the order will be shipped in four equal lots during the current year. An international trading house located in Melbourne is acting as the middleman on this sale. Part of the agreement calls for Australia to acquire Chilean products to a total value of at least half that of the Chilean purchase. This part of the sale will be handled by the Melbourne trading house. This is the first major wheat sale which Australia has made in South America for some time and there can be little question that it represents a major breakthrough in that market for the Australian Wheat Board.

A second sale of interest during the past month was 200,000 tons of flour (9,200,000 bushels) to Ceylon which for some time has been Australia's major flour export market. A trade agreement was reached in 1958 under which Ceylon agreed to purchase 100,000 tons (4,600,000 bushels) annually of Australian flour and this figure has been reached in every year since 1958. The agreement was recently extended for an additional two years and the announcement of the sale of 200,000 tons (9,200,000 bushels) of flour followed immediately on the extension of the trade agreement. The terms and value of the flour sale to Ceylon were not announced.

General

The Chairman of the Australian Wheat Board, Dr. A.R. Callaghan, during a speech in Perth earlier this month dealt with the changing overseas markets for Australian wheat. The main points of Dr. Callaghan's talks were as follows:

1. Western Europe is now importing less wheat than during the 1930's and this is having a very severe effect on Australian F.A.Q. wheat which has been virtually eliminated from the Common Market owing to freight rate disadvantages, high levies and increased availability of soft wheat from France. There remains a hope of promoting limited sales of hard wheat in some European countries. At the same time, there has been a decline in the relative importance of the British market. Whereas in the 1930's Australia exported

- more than 50 per cent of its wheat to the U.K., this proportion has fallen to 12 per cent at present.
- 2: Asia today is by far the largest net importer in the world and this is of extreme importance to Australia because of the advantage of freight and the suitability of Australian wheat for the very diverse needs of that region. Both hard and soft Australian wheats are being exported to Asia.
- 3. Substantial quantities of Australian wheat are being exported to the Middle East and African markets. The most important being Iran, Iraq, Aden, Lebanon, South Africa, Rhodesia and Zambia. Asia, Africa and East Europe have changed from being net exporters to net importers of wheat and Latin America is barely self-sufficient with demand increasing far more rapidly than local production.
- 4. At present, the Australian Wheat Board offers twelve separate grades of wheat including hard wheats of higher protein content, F.A.Q.'s of medium protein content and soft low protein wheats all of which have identifiable and distinguishing characteristcs. It is felt that the prime hard and hard classes of wheat now being produced in Australia are equal to the qualities of any of the other world producers.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Wheat Supplies
Decrease Sharply
from Previous Year

Reflecting a sharp decline in carryover stocks which more than offset a moderate increase in production total supplies of wheat in Argentina for the 1966-67 (December-November) crop year amount to 261.0 million bushels, some 25 per cent

less than the 350.5 million of the previous year. The 14.9 million bushels carried over at December 1, 1966 were the lowest stocks since 1952 while the 1966-67 production, at 246.2 million bushels represented a 12 per cent increase over the harvest of 1965-66. After making an allowance of 138.2 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 122.9 million are available for export and for carryover as against 220.1 million in 1965-66.

Preliminary exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during December 1966-January 1967 amounted to 12.0 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the 42.7 million exported during the same months in 1965-66. The balance remaining on February 1, 1967 for export and for carryover was estimated at 110.9 million bushels, as against the February 1, 1966 total of 177.4 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture), Buenos Aires, under date of February 24, 1967 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

During the latter part of January, weather conditions through—
out most of the Argentine grain regions were favourable which
resulted in producers nearly completing their harvest of wheat and an improvement
in quality and weight. The improvement in weather resulted in good maturity of
late-sown lots but the total crop still suffered from the poor conditions of earlier
weeks, particularly in the northern wheat belt. The size of Argentina's 1966-67
wheat crop, even though harvesting is almost completed, still remains in doubt.
The second official estimate published by the Secretariat of Agriculture and Livestock is 6.7 million tons (246.2 million bushels) which, while reflecting an
increase of 200,000 tons (7,349,000 bushels) from the first estimate, remains
considerably below the initial trade estimate. With the adverse weather conditions
however, the trade has considerably reduced their estimate and now feel that the
official statistics may even be too high and that the crop will in fact be only
some 6.3 million to 6.4 million tons (231.5 million to 235.2 million bushels).

Wheat Of the present wheat crop, the province of Buenos Aires accounts for 64 per cent of total production, followed by Santa Fe with 12 per cent, Cordoba, 10 per cent, La Pampa, 7.6 per cent, and Entre Rios with 5.6 per cent.

At the National Wheat Festival held in Leones, Cordoba, during the second week in February, the Secretary of Agriculture and Livestock, Dr. Lorenzo Raggio, stressed that Argentina must develop its wheat industry. He indicated that the country requires a 13 million ton wheat crop (477.7 million bushels) for 1967-68 which would necessitate at least 8 million hectares (8.0 million acres) being sown. This increase in area can come not only from the major wheat regions now under cultivation but also from the semi-arid western pampas and parts of the northern sub-tropical provinces where experimental work has already been undertaken and indicates a potential for wheat production. If Argentina is to produce the above amount from the area mentioned it would mean yields would also have to increase almost to 800 kilos per hectare (11.9 bushels per acre), a level reached only once in Argentina during 1964-65. Also the area harvested must not be less than 6 per cent of the area sown, whereas normal abandonment ranges from 10 to 20 per cent. It would therefore appear that there is little likelihood of achieving this goal even if good weather conditions, good seed and increased fertilization occurred. which will mean that either total output will be less than the Government's goal or else considerably more land must be used. If sufficient production incentives are provided by the Government, the wheat crop could increase to 10 million to 11 million tons (367.4 million to 404.2 million bushels) this year.

The National Wheat Festival usually provides an opportunity for the Secretary to announce new minimum prices for wheat and other winter grains. However, with recent changes in Government, these prices have not yet been established and are being considered in conjunction with other measures aimed at improving the grain marketing structure.

There was a limited market for wheat during January but prices remained firm. Exporters were out of the market as they did not wish to continue purchasing due to a Grain Board directive that further export sales would not be approved until the size of the crop was known. Millers were active during the month and prices increased as they attempted to cover current requirements. In early January prices reached 1,500 pesos per kilo (\$1.80 per bushel), but at the end of the month this had fallen to 1,370 pesos (\$1.64 per bushel) in Buenos Aires; 1,270 pesos (\$1.52 per bushel) in Bahía Blanca and 1,400 pesos (\$1.68 per bushel) on deferred payment basis. In early January some small lots of bread wheat were sold

to Europe at U\$S 70.35 (\$2.07 per bushel) c.i.f. the Continent January-March shipment and at £27.17.6 (\$2.29 per bushel) for February-March shipment to Britain. the end of the month durums were quoted at 1,370 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.64 per bushel) both in Buenos Aires and Bahia Blanca. Some overseas sales were concluded at USS 75.00 per ton (\$2.20 per bushel) c.i.f. the Continent January-February shipment and at U\$S 77.00 per ton (\$2.26 per bushel) for March-April shipment. During the same period f.o.b. prices averaged U\$S 64.50 (\$1.90 per bushel) in Necochea and Mar del Plata. Prices in the Buenos Aires Futures Market during early January were as follows: for February delivery, 1,390 pesos (\$1.67 per bushel); 1,445 for March (\$1.73 per bushel); 1,505 (\$1.80 per bushel) for April and for May 1,545 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.85 per bushel). By early February prices were: 1.420 pesos (\$1.70 per bushel) for March; 1,488 pesos (\$1.78 per bushel) for April; 1.534 pesos (\$1.84 per bushel) for May and 1,573 pesos (\$1.89 per bushel) for June. At present, the market is quoting March futures at 1,410 pesos (\$1.69 per bushel); April at 1,464 (\$1.76 per bushel); May at 1,421 (\$1.70 per bushel) and June 1,565 (\$1.88 per bushel). The present price in the Buenos Aires Cereal Exchange for hard wheat is 1,380 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.65 per bushel), for semi-hard 1,340 (\$1.61 per bushel) and for durums 1,390 (\$1.67 per bushel). Wheat shipments, primarily from earlier contracts, increased during January to 200,000 metric tons (7,349,000 bushels) from the 125,000 metric tons (4,593,000 bushels) exported in December.

February 9, 1967

The Canadian Wheat Board announced that the open quota on Durum Wheat will not be extended beyond February 28th and that on and after March 1st, all deliveries of Durum Wheat must be applied against the specified acreage quota.


