
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

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WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

Wheat Exports
Below 1965-66
Record

Total exports of wheat (including flour in terms of wheat) from the <u>four traditional major exporters</u> during the August-February period of the current crop year, amounted to 963.9 million bushels, decreasing by 10 per cent the previous record total of

1,069.6 million exported during the same seven months in 1965-66 but 18 per cent higher than the 816.9 million shipped during the comparable period of 1964-65. In addition, this year's August-February exports of wheat and flour were sharply above the ten-year (1955-56-1964-65) average shipments for the same period of the crop year, of some 644.6 million bushels. Exports from United States and Australia were at higher levels this year than last while those from Canada and Argentina were lower.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Below Previous Year Supplies of wheat held by the <u>four traditional major</u> exporters at March 1, 1967 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,812.8 million bushels compared with 1,852.5 million

at the same time a year ago. Although supplies were larger in Canada and Australia these increases were more than offset by declines in the totals for United States and Argentina. Supplies at March 1, 1967, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 624.8 (879.5); Canada, 793.9 (673.3); Argentina, 92.6 (153.0); and Australia, 301.5 (146.7).

Large Increase in Crop Confirmed

According to March 1967 edition of World Agricultural 1966 World Breadgrain Production and Trade, published by the United States Department of Agriculture, world production of breadgrains in 1966 was one per cent higher than the December estimate

and far surpassed the previous record crop of 1964, according to the third estimate of Foreign Agricultural Service. High harvest yields resulted in upward crop revisions for both wheat and rye. World wheat and rye crops combined are estimated at 307 million metric tons, 26 million more than the 281 million tons produced in 1965. Production was 7 per cent above the previous largest breadgrain crop of 1964, and 17 per cent more than the 1960-64 average. The world wheat crop is estimated at 275 million metric tons (10.1 billion bushels) compared with 247 million tons (9.07 billion bushels) in 1965. The near-record crop of 1964 was 255 million tons (9.4 billion bushels), and average production in 1960-64 was 231 million tons (8.47 billion bushels).

By far the major increase occurred in the USSR, where beneficial crop conditions and increased use of fertilizer and improved farming practices resulted in a pronounced increase in outturn per acre over the preceding season's poor yields. Countries of Eastern Europe increased wheat acreage, and production was slightly larger than the 1965 previous record crop. Output of Communist China was lower due mainly to reduced acreage from lack of rainfall during the planting of winter wheat. World wheat production in other than Communist countries increased only slightly over the two preceding unusually large crops. Their estimated production in 1966-57 per cent of the world crop - totalled 157.1 million tons compared with the previous record of 156.3 million attained both in 1964 and 1965. However, their 1966 harvest was 10 per cent above the average of 142.5 million tons in 1960-64. Sharp increases in the 1966 wheat production of North America and Oceania, as well as a modest gain in South America, were offset by severe production declines in Western Europe and Africa. Also, output in Asia was below the 1965 record crop.

North America's harvest increased nearly 9 per cent over the large 1965 harvest. Revised estimates for the United States show an acreage increase of nearly 300,000 acres over 1965 and crop yields per acre that were the third largest on record. Thus, production was only slightly below the bumper 1965 crop and 7 per cent above the average. Mexico reduced acreage 24 per cent; even with higher yields harvested the crop was sharply below the large 1965 harvest, but at about the 1960-64 average level. Canada's record crop is unrevised at 22.98 million tons, 5.3 million more than in 1965.

Production of Western Europe declined 12 per cent from the 1965 record crop and was only 2 per cent above the average. Adverse weather during planting reduced acreage by about 3 million acres below the record 46 million acres planted in the preceding year. Per acre yields, though higher than the average, were substantially below the 1965 record yields. Principal declines were in France, the United Kingdom, Sweden, Portugal, Belgium, Finland, and Denmark. However, good crops were produced in Italy, Spain, and Austria. South America had another poor year for wheat. Argentina's acreage harvested increased by 15 per cent, according to the first official estimate, and the outlook was for a bumper crop. However, dry weather in September and October affected the crop, which is reported to be considerably below expectations. Smaller acreages in the other South American countries resulted in reduced crops, except in Brazil and Ecuador.

CANADIAN SITUATION

Reflecting the combined effect of a record acreage seeded to wheat as well as the harvesting of record average yields per acre, the 1966 wheat crop in Canada is estimated at an all-time high of 844.4 million bushels. The previous record production was 723.4 million bushels harvested in 1963. The increase of some 195.5 million bushels over the 1965 production of 648.9 million, offset by a wide margin the decline of 92.1 million bushels which occurred in opening stocks and, as a result, total supplies reached a peak level of 1,264.6 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent an increase of 4 per cent above the previous peak of 1,210.7 million of 1963-64 and 9 per cent over the 1965-66 total of 1,161.9 million bushels. After making an allowance of 155.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1966-67 amounted to 1,109.6

million bushels, 10 per cent larger than the 1,005.0 million in 1965-66.

August-February Exports
Lower Than a Year Ago

during the August-February period of the current Canadian crop year, amounted to 315.7 million bushels, 5 per cent below the previous high of 331.8 million exported during the same period a year ago. This year's exports consisted of 293.5 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 844 thousand of bagged seed and 21.3 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the comparable period of last year these figures were 308.2 million of wheat in bulk, 462 thousand of bagged seed and 23.1 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on March 1, 1967 for export and for carryover amounted to 793.9 million bushels, 18 per cent above the March 1, 1966 total of 673.3 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to March 22 of the current crop year have amounted to 370.4 million bushels compared with 295.1

million marketed during the same period of the previous year and the highest marketings for that period since 1939-40. Some 25.3 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the four weeks February 23 to March 22, 1967. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 27.2 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat decreased from 313.1 million at February 22 to a level of 311.2 million at March 22, 1967.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at March 22 this year represented a 4 per cent increase over the 1966 comparable total of 298.0 million bushels but was 8 per cent less than the 1965 figure of 337.1 million. Country elevator stocks, amounting to 155.1 million bushels, were below both the 1966 comparable total of 182.3 million and the 183.1 million of 1965. Wheat stocks at interior terminals, at March 22, 1967 totalled 10.3 million bushels, in contrast to the 0.8 million of the previous year and more than double the 1965 total of 4.8 million. Wheat stocks "in transit rail" (western division) amounted to 9.8 million bushels, 15 per cent below the 11.5 million of a year ago but 19 per cent more than the 8.3 million of two years ago. Supplies at the Canadian Lakehead, totalling some 65.7 million bushels, were above both the 56.3 million at March 23, 1966 and the 64.4 million at March 24, 1965. Stocks in "storage afloat" amounting to 14.5 million bushels, were sharply above the 4.8 million of the previous year and 14 per cent larger than the 12.7 million of two years ago. The 13.3 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports, were higher than the 9.2 million of 1966 but less than the 17.8 million of 1965. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports, at March 22, 1967, at 18.8 million bushels, were above the 14.3 million of 1966 but below the 20.5 million of 1965. The 12.6 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) exceeded by a considerable margin both the 8.7 million of the previous year and the 9.5 million in these positions in 1965.

Wheat and Flour Total
23.0 Million Bushels

Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, amounted to 23.0 million bushels during February 1967. This volume, while below last month's total of 31.1 million

and the 27.5 million of February 1966 was above the ten-year (1956-65) February average of 22.1 million. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during February 1967 totalled 20.1 million bushels, 8 per cent above the ten-year average of 18.6 million, but 27 per cent below the 27.7 million of January 1967 and 14 per cent less than the February 1966 total of 23.5 million. Based on Canadian Customs returns, the equivalent of 2.5 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during February 1967, a decrease of 23 per cent from the previous month's figure of 3.3 million and 36 per cent below the February 1966 adjusted total of 3.9 million.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-February periods of the current crop year amounted to 293.5 million bushels, a decrease of 5 per cent from the record 1965-66 comparable figure of 308.2 million, but sharply above the ten-year average for the period of 172.1 million. This year's shipments of wheat to China Communist totalled some 64.9 million bushels and to the U.S.S.R.(Russia), 63.1 million and each accounted for 22 per cent of the seven-month total exports of wheat in bulk form. Shipments of wheat to Britain amounted to 38.1

million and accounted for 13 per cent of the August-February 1966-67 total. During the same period of 1965-66 shipments to China Communist amounted to 35.3 million and accounted for 11 per cent of the August-February total, while U.S.S.R.(Russia) received shipments of 111.1 million or 36 per cent of the total and Britain, at 42.3 million accounted for 14 per cent of total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first seven months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 34.7 (27.0); India, 17.6 (7.2); Federal Republic of Germany, 12.1 (14.0); Belgium and Luxembourg, 9.8 (7.9); Poland, 7.6 (7.7); Italy, 5.8 (4.6); Cuba, 5.6 (6.4); Bulgaria, 3.8 (nil); Republic of South Africa, 3.5 (nil); and Pakistan, 3.4 (0.5).

Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-February of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 844 thousand bushels compared with last year's corresponding total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 462 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first seven months of the 1966-67 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 21.3 million bushels, a decrease of 8 per cent from the adjusted August 1965-February 1966 total of 23.1 million. The leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during the August-February period of the 1966-67 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Cuba, 8,565 (7,321); Britain, 4,313 (5,473); Jamaica, 1,074 (929); Ceylon, 1,049 (499); Ghana, 862 (576); Trinidad and Tobago, 739 (683); Leeward and Windward Islands, 681 (589); Costa Rica, 645 (567); Sierra Leone, 401 (227); Hong Kong, 337 (405); and United States 330 (578).

Australia increased 1966 acreage 17 per cent, or 3 million acres, and record yields per acre were harvested. Thus, production is officially estimated at 12.2 million metric tons compared with the drought reduced crop of 7,067,000 tons in 1965 and the previous record harvest of 10,037,000 tons in 1964. Total production of the five wheat exporting countries — Argentina, Australia, Canada, France, and the United States — increased 9 per cent. Their combined crops add to nearly 89 million tons compared with 81.5 million in 1965, and the average of 75 million tons in the 5 years ended 1964. Record crops of Canada and Australia were 30 and 73 per cent, respectively, larger than in 1965. U.S. production was more than expected and Argentina's crop exceeded the poor 1965 harvest. Only in France was there a significant drop in production.

World production of <u>rye</u> is revised upward to 32.3 million metric tons, about 4 per cent below the 1965 harvest and approximately at the average level during 1960-64. The crop was larger than expected earlier in the season due chiefly to estimated increases in rye area and yield of the USSR and above-average harvest yields in regions of East Europe. Production increased over the previous estimates in East Germany, Poland, and Romania. Total acreage of East Europe decreased one per cent from 1965 and was 5 per cent below the average, with all countries except Poland sharing in the decline. As the harvest progressed, near-record yields for the Bloc countries as a whole resulted in an upward crop revision of 6 per cent above the December estimate. Therefore, East Europe's rye crop was not much below the record 1965 harvest and as much as 5 per cent above the average. Best crops were in Poland, East Germany, and Yugoslavia.

By April 3, 1967 out of a total of 1,895 shipping points in the

Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 984 points
on a delivery quota of 8 bushels per specified acre and 711 points
on a 6-bushel quota. Of the remainder, 178 points were on a 5-bushel quota and
only 9 points on a 4-bushel quota. Thirteen stations were reported as "closed".

Rail Shipments

Rail shipments of wheat to Maritime ports from Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports during the first seven months of the current crop year totalled 25.3 million bushels compared with the August 1965-February 1966 figure of 28.0 million.

Area Intended Canadian farmers intend to plant 31.1 million acres to all classes of wheat in 1967 according to plans as of March 1. This area is 3 per cent more than the 30.3 million acres seeded in 1965. The oats acreage is expected to remain unchanged at 9.1 million acres. The area seeded to barley is expected to increase by 6 per cent and total 7.6 million acres compared with 7.2 million in 1966. Mixed grain acreage may total 1.6 million slightly less than the previous year and the corn for grain acreage forecast at 818,500 is 6 per cent larger than in 1966. The acreage intended for rapeseed in 1967 at 1,424,000 is some 3 per cent above the 1,388,000 acres planted in 1966. A decrease of 28 per cent is expected in the area seeded to flaxseed as farmers intend to plant 1.5 million acres to this crop in 1967 compared with 2.1 million acres in 1966. Soybean acreage forecast at 265,000 acres is one per cent smaller than the previous year and marks the first down turn in acreage planted to this crop in six years.

The 31.1 million acres to be seeded to all classes of wheat will represent an increase of 3 per cent from the 1966 seedings and 3.5 million acres or 13 per cent above the 1961-65 average. In Manitoba the increase in acreage may be 9 per cent, in Saskatchewan one per cent and in Alberta 3 per cent.

Prospective plantings of spring wheat, including durum, at 30.6 million acres, are up 2 per cent from the 1966 acreage and 13 per cent above the 1961-65 average. Durum wheat acreage is expected to increase by 25 per cent and if the acreage intentions are carried out, Prairie farmers will plant 1,420,000 acres to this crop compared with 1,135,000 grown in 1966 and the 1961-65 average of 2,035,800 acres. Spring wheat acreage excluding durum may total 29.2 million in 1967 compared with 28.8 million planted in 1966 and the 1961-65 average of 25.0 million. The 455,000 acres seeded to winter wheat last fall is 13 per cent greater than the 403,000 acres seeded in the fall of the previous year. The area harvested in 1966 was estimated at 370,000 acres.





Freight-Assisted Shipments Claims filed for payment up to February 28, 1967 represent the movement of 9,201 thousand bushels of wheat from the Prairie Provinces to Eastern Canada and British Columbia under the freight assistance policy during the August-January period of the 1966-67 crop year. During the same months last year claims had been filed for a total of 8,643

thousand bushels, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-January shipments of wheat under the policy were running about 6 per cent above those of 1965-66. Revised data on the August-January 1965-66 shipments of wheat based on claims submitted up to February 28, 1967 place the six-month total at 9,233 thousant bushels. The bulk of the shipments during the current six months under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, with these two provinces accounting for 51 per cent and 20 per cent of the total, respectively.

Preliminary data on millfeed shipments under the freight assistance policy indicate shipments of 254,418 tons during the August-January period of the current crop year. During the same six months of 1965-66 claims had been filed for a total of 253,667 tons, indicating on the assumption of approximately the same rate of submission of claims during both the current and preceding crop years that the August-January shipments of millfeeds under the policy were running about slightly above those of 1965-66. Revised data on the 1965-66 August-January shipments of millfeeds based on claims submitted up to February 28, 1967 place the six-month total at 277,376 tons. As with freight-assisted shipments of wheat, the greater portion of the millfeed shipments during the period under review went to destinations in Quebec and Ontario.





FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR** (SPECIFIED PERIODS)






FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES



EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF CANADA'S SIX MAJOR GRAINS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during February 1967 amounted to 3,016,000 hundredweight indicating a decrease of 7 per cent from the January 1967 total of 3,242,000 hundredweight, 19 per cent lower than the adjusted February 1966 figure of 3,729,000 hundredweight, and 8 per cent less than the ten-year (1957-66) average production for the month of February of 3,269,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during February 1967 had a total rated capacity of 168,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 24-day working period 74.9 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during February 1967 amounted to 6,793,000 bushels, 6 per cent less than the 7,263,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 19 per cent below the 8,365,000 bushels milled during February 1966. Of the wheat milled for flour during February 1967 some 5,736,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (622,000 bushels); durum (335,000 bushels); and all other (100,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during February 1967 amounted to 1,092,000 hundredweight (some 2,512,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) 23 per cent lower than the 3,276,000 bushels exported during the previous month and 36 per cent less than the adjusted February 1966 exports of 3,924,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-five countries with exports to Cuba amounting to 1,284,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 51 per cent of the February total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: Algeria, 318; Britain, 279; Jamaica, 125; Costa Rica, 91; Leeward and Windward Islands, 65; Trinidad and Tobago, 60; Hong Kong, 42; and United States, 39.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Total Supplies
Decline From
Previous Year

Reflecting the combined effect of smaller opening stocks and a relatively slight decline in production, total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1966-67 crop year are placed at 1,846.7 million bushels, some 13 per cent

less than the previous year's total of 2,133.3 million. The 536.0 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1966 were the lowest stocks in thirteen years and the fifth consecutive decline since July 1, 1961. The 1966 production, estimated at 1,310.6 million bushels, is slightly lower than the 1965 crop of 1,315.6 million. Domestic disappearance during 1966-67 is estimated at about 688.0 million bushels, 6 per cent below the 729.4 million of last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,160.4 million remain available for export and for carryover, a decrease of 17 per cent from the 1,404.8 million in 1965-66.

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period July 1966-February 1967 amounted to 535.6 million bushels, an increase of 2 per cent over the 525.3 million exported during the same months last year. The

balance remaining on March 1, 1967 for export and for carryover was estimated at 624.8 million bushels compared with 879.5 million on the same date a year ago.

United States Wheat Situation - Summary

According to the March 3, 1967 issue of the Wheat Situation published by the Economics Research Service, United States Department of Agriculture the above-average 1966 crop, coupled with the smallest carryover since 1952, provided the United States with a supply

of only a little over 1.8 billion bushels, the smallest since 1953-54.

Disappearance of wheat during the first half of the 1966-67 marketing year totalled 800 million bushels with exports setting a record of 439 million for that period. Commercial exports accounted for about half of the record total against a third a year earlier. The level of total disappearance during the first half of the current marketing year was the same as that of a year earlier. However, in contrast to last year, January-June disappearance is expected to decline by some 150 million bushels, or 20 per cent below the first half, with most of the decline taking place in exports. Increased exportable supplies in Canada and Australia are contributing to a drop in commercial exports in the second half. Commercial exports totalled 225 million bushels during July-December.

Wheat prices during the July-December 1966 period were the highest in several years. For the entire year they are likely to average 35 to 40 cents over the price support loan rate. Prices in the second half of the year were generally declining until the announcement in February of increased shipments to India, which strengthened prices. The level of prices during the remainder of the year depends on the amount and timing of exports, as well as the development of the 1967 crop. With prospects for a further reduction in carryover, the condition of the new crop assumes added significance. Coupled with possibly stronger feed grain prices, wheat feeding may be further stimulated. It totalled 40 million bushels in the first half of the marketing year. During the first half of 1965-66, wheat feeding totalled 86 million bushels and reached 144 million for the entire year. Based on the current estimate of total disappearance for the entire 1966-67 year, the carryover on June 30, 1967 is now placed at around 400 million bushels.

The winter wheat crop, seeded in the fall of 1966, was estimated, as of December 1, at nearly 1.3 billion bushels. During the season to date, there has been continued dryness and occasional soil blowing in the Southern Great Plains. Thus, the 1967 hard winter wheat crop would appear to be starting the season under rather adverse conditions compared with the very good conditions surrounding the 1966 crop in the early stages of its growth.

If the 1967 winter wheat crop materializes at around the December estimate and spring wheat farmers expand seedings as did the winter wheat producers, a record crop is probable. The record crop to date of 1,457 million bushels was established in 1958. Based on the December estimate, a near-record soft red wheat crop is indicated.

Flour Production The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, estimated wheat flour production in February at 19,000,000 hundredweight, averaging 967,000 hundredweight per working day. This compared with an average output per working day of 984,000 hundredweight last month and 980,000 hundredweight in February 1966. Wheat flour mills during February operated at 86.8 per cent of capacity compared with 88.3 and 73.7 per cent, respectively, for the previous month and the same month a year ago.

Flour mills in February ground 43,000,000 bushels of wheat, compared with 46,000,000 bushels in the previous month. Wheat offal output was 350,000 tons.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Record Production Results in Highest Wheat Supplies Reflecting the effect of a substantial increase in production, which more than offset a relatively small decrease in carry-over stocks, total supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1966-67 crop year are estimated at an all-time high of 465.0

million bushels as against 284.1 million in 1965-66. The current harvest, now estimated at 448.5 million bushels, is 21 per cent above the previous record of 370.0 million bushels harvested in 1964-65. Carryover stocks recorded a 32 per cent decline from 24.4 million at December 1, 1965 to 16.5 million in 1966. After deducting some 85.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 379.4 million are available for export and for carryover during 1966-67, sharply above the 191.2 million in 1965-66.

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1 - February 25 of the current Australian crop year amounted to a record 77.9 million bushels, 75 per cent larger than the 44.5 million exported during the corresponding period of the 1965-66 crop year. The balance remaining on February 26, 1967 for export and for carryover, at 301.5 million bushels, considerably above the comparable 1966 total of 146.7 million.

Crop Production

The current official preliminary estimate for this year's
Australian wheat crop is 448.5 million bushels which is 189
million bushels greater than last season and about 80 million bushels above the
previous record year of 1964-65.

The following table shows the anticipated wheat production and deliveries in each Australian State for the current year together with quantities expected to be retained on farms for feed and seed:-

This year's crop has very nearly doubled the output of the 1930-31 season when 213,594,000 bushels were harvested from 18,165,000 acres. Until this year the 1930-31 acreage had been a record. However, this season's acreage was up 13 per cent to 20,517,000 acres.

Where in 1930-31 the average yield per acre was 11.7 bushels this season's expected average yield is on the order of 21.8 bushels per acre.

Excellent weather conditions have continued over most of Australia and within the past two weeks extremely heavy rains have fallen in certain areas which until recently have continued to be affected by the drought. All of this good weather is having a considerable effect on optimism about next year's wheat crop and it seems fair to assume at this point that there will be a further considerable acreage increase for the 1967-68 wheat crop which is to be sown within the next few months.

Exports

Further details have come to light about the wheat sale to
Chile announced last month. As a result of an Australian
Wheat Board Mission to South America the "Empresa da Comercio Agricola" in Chile
has agreed to purchase up to 150,000 tons (5,600,000 bushels) of Australian F.A.Q.
wheat. A firm order has already been placed for one-quarter of this total and
deliveries will commence soon. However, the balance of the order is dependent
on Chilean export successes in Australia. The agreement calls for Australia to
purchase Chilean products of any nature to a total value of one-half of that of the
wheat purchased from Australia by the "Empresa da Comercio Agricola". It is hoped
by this means that a new and larger trading pattern will emerge between Australia
and Chile. The Australian Wheat Board is not involved in the purchases from
Chile and is only acting in this instance as the supplier of Australian wheat.

No other large contracts have been concluded during the last month. But it may be assumed that within the next two or three months a further substantial sale to China will be consummated. The current contract will be completed by June 30 and it is expected that China will be in the market for approximately 50 million bushels of Australian wheat covering the remainder of 1967.

To date over 140 million bushels of the current wheat crop have been exported or committed for export. The Board expects to receive overall some 340 million bushels of this year's wheat crop for export.

In a new wheat transportation development Dr. A.R. Callaghan, Chairman of the Australian Wheat Board, recently announced that the first consignment of wheat exported under transhipment arrangements will be shipped during the latter half of March. A bulk carrier has been chartered to load 33,000 tons (1,232,000 bushels) of wheat and to discharge the full cargo at either Amsterdam or Rotterdam for transhipment to small coastal vessels servicing United Kingdom, Irish and West German ports. This is the first time that shipping arrangements of this nature have been made but it may be expected that transhipment will become a regular fact of life for Australian wheat exports. Of course it is hoped that by using this method it might be possible to increase spot sales in some of Australia's overseas markets.

Special Note As this report was being prepared there occurred in Melbourne a rather disastrous fire in a seven-storey high silo belonging to the flour-milling complex of W.S. Kimpton and Sons. At least 100,000 bushels of wheat owned by the Australian Wheat Board was destroyed in the blaze.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Wheat Supplies
Decrease Sharply
From Previous Year

Reflecting a sharp decline in carryover stocks which more than offset a moderate increase in production total supplies of wheat in Argentina for the 1966-67 (December-November) crop year amount to 261.0 million bushels, some 26 per cent less

than the 350.5 million of the previous year. The 14.9 million bushels carried over at December 1, 1966 were the lowest stocks since 1952 while the 1966-67 production estimated at 246.2 million bushels, represents a 12 per cent increase over the harvest of 1965-66. After making an allowance of 138.2 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, some 122.9 million are available for export and for carryover as against 220.1 million in 1965-66.

Preliminary exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat during December 1966-February 1967 amounted to 30.2 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the 67.1 million exported during the same months in 1965-66. The balance remaining on March 1, 1967 for export and for carryover was estimated at 92.6 million bushels, as against the March 1, 1966 total of 153.0 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture), Buenos Aires, under date of March 23, 1967 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

By now the last lots of flax have been harvested, while early double purpose lots of wheat are being sown to be used for grazing. The condition of the soil is good, but it is too early to say whether this will continue until the bulk of the wheat crop is sown, usually in late May to late July.

Wheat

The official estimate for the 1966-67 wheat production remains at 6.7 million metric tons (246.2 million bushels) and there now seems to be a consensus of opinion concurring with this figure. There was a slow export market during the period under review for bread wheat as exporters tended to concentrate on marketing corn from the new harvest. By the end of February, exporters had practically withdrawn from the wheat market and millers had also satisfied most of their requirements. Prices tended to lag and closed at the end of the month at 1,335 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.12 per bushel) f.o.r. Buenos Aires, and 1,290 pesos (\$1.09 per bushel) in Bahia Blanca. Millers were offering only 1,360 pesos (\$1.15 per bushel) for delivery after mid-March and with deferred payment terms.

By mid-February, prices in the Buenos Aires Futures Market For March delivery, 1,382 pesos (\$1.66 per bushel); for April, per 100 kilos were: 1,436 (\$1.72 per bushel); for May, 1,483 (\$1.78 per bushel) and for June, 1,530 (\$1.83 per bushel). By the end of the month, these prices had dropped slightly to 1,337 pesos (\$1.60 per bushel) for March delivery; 1,398 (\$1.68 per bushel) for April; 1,463 (\$1.75 per bushel) for May; and 1,505 (\$1.80 per bushel) for June. From the 3rd to the 15th of March, there were no transactions in the Futures Market, following the Government decision to suspend all foreign exchange operations as a prior step to the devaluation of the Argentine peso from 227 to 323 pesos per Canadian dollar. This change was announced March 14, and when trade resumed, 1,365 pesos (\$1.15 per bushel) were offered for April delivery; 1,435 (\$1.21 per bushel) for May; 1,485 (\$1.25 per bushel) for June; and 1,514 (\$1.28 per bushel) for July. At present, prices for April delivery are per 100 kilos: 1,365 pesos (\$1.15 per bushel); for May, 1,411 (\$1.19 per bushel); for June, 1,463 (\$1.23 per bushel); and for July, 1,505 (\$1.27 per bushel). In the Cereals Exchange at present, bread wheat, hard, grade 1 is quoted at 1,340 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.13 per bushel); and for semi-hard, 1,300 pesos (\$1.10 per bushel). In Bahia Blanca, the respective prices are: 1,280 and 1,240 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.08 and \$1.04 per bushel).

During the second half of February, there was a steady demand for durum, and prices rose to 1,400 pesos (\$1.68 per bushel) both at Buenos Aires and Bahia Blanca. There was little export business concluded, as sellers were asking U\$S 62.50 per ton (\$1.84 per bushel, Canadian) f.o.b. Necochea for March shipment, but Italian buyers appeared to prefer later quotations. Purchases by the National Grain Board so far this year totalled only 184,947 metric tons (6,796,000 bushels).

During the month of February, approximately 250,000 tons (9,186,000 bushels) of wheat were exported as compared to 663,234 tons (24,369,000 bushels) during the same month last year. Brazil was the main recipient.

At the same time that the Government announced devaluation of the peso, sweeping changes were announced in import duties and export taxes. The export retentions previously in effect have been cancelled and a system of export taxes established in lieu of retentions. These taxes are levied on a basic f.o.b. export index also set out by the Government. With respect to wheat, there was no export retention previously applied, as the 5 per cent retention of 1965 was cancelled in October 1966. There has been a 25 per cent export tax now levied on wheat,

the official index being U\$S 59 per metric ton (\$1.73 per bushel) for grain in bulk (up to 15 per cent bagged), and U\$S 61.30 per metric ton (\$1.80 per bushel) for wheat shipped with a greater percentage of bagged. As for durum, the index has been set at U\$S 63 per ton (\$1.85 per bushel) with the same increase if the percentage of bagged wheat exceeds 15 per cent. The purpose of the imposed taxes is to prevent excessive profit being made by exporters due to the devaluation. The values established above are to be adjusted periodically as market conditions change.


CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- March 14 According to a report received from Mr. J.E.G. Gibson, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, the current official preliminary estimate of this year's Australian wheat crop is a record 448.5 million bushels.
 - 17 Based on farmers' intentions at March 1, the acreage seeded to all classes of wheat in Canada in 1967 will be 31.1 million acres, an increase of 3 per cent over the 1966 seedings and 3.5 million acres or 13 per cent above the 1961-65 average.
 - According to World Agricultural Production and Trade, published by the U.S.D.A. Foreign Agricultural Service, world production of breadgrains in 1966 was one per cent higher than the December estimate and far surpassed the previous record crop of 1964.
- April 6 The International Wheat Council had an extensive discussion on action to be taken with regard to the future of the 1962 International Wheat Agreement as extended by 1966 protocol expiring on July 31. Council recognized unanimously that it was essential to maintain international co-operation on wheat matters. After considering carefully various alternatives, the council by majority decided to recommend to member governments that the agreement be further extended by protocol for a period not exceeding one year in respect of its administration provision. Protocol will be opened for signature in Washington from May 15 to June 1.
 - According to a report published by the United States Department of Agriculture, the April 1 forecast of winter wheat production in the United States is 1,162 million bushels, 10 per cent more than last year, and 20 per cent above average. The indicated yield per seeded acre is 21.5 bushels compared with 24.6 in 1966 and the average of 22.7 bushels.









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
