#### WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

August-September Exports Below Last Year's Level Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the four traditional major exporters during August-September 1967 have amounted to 235.8 million

bushels, a decrease of 26 per cent from the 317.8 million shipped during the comparable first two months of the 1966-67 crop year, but exceeding by 16 per cent the ten-year (1956-65) average shipments for the same two months of some 203.8 million bushels. As indicated in the accompanying table, based on the Canadian crop year, Australia was the only one of the four major exporters with shipments higher this year than last.

Wheat Supplies of
Four Major Exporters
Above a Year Ago

Total supplies of wheat remaining in United States, Canada, Argentina and Australia at October 1, 1967 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years, amounted to 2,181.3 million bushels, 10 per

cent above the 1,980.6 million at the same time a year ago. This increase reflected larger supplies for United States, Argentina and Australia which more than offset a decrease in Canada. Supplies on or about October 1, 1967, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,061.5 (937.0); Canada, 957.9 (976.7); Argentina, 27.2 (18.4); and Australia, 134.7 (48.5).

#### CANADIAN SITUATION

#### Supplies 6 Per Cent Below Previous Year

Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1967-68 (August-July) crop year are placed at 1,170.0 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of

577.1 million and the 1967 crop, estimated on the basis of conditions at October 15, at 592.9 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated represent a decrease of 6 per cent from the previous peak of 1,247.5 million of 1966-67. After making an allowance of 160.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1967-68 amount to 1,010.0 million bushels, 8 per cent less than the 1,093.4 million in 1966-67.

August-September Exports
Sharply Below Previous Year

Exports of wheat and flour, in terms of wheat equivalent, during August-September 1967 amounted to 52.1 million bushels, considerably less than the previous

high of 116.7 million exported during the same two months of 1966. This year's exports consisted of 44.6 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 109 thousand of bagged seed and 7.4 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the August-September period last year these figures were 111.6 million of wheat in bulk, 236 thousand of bagged seed and 4.9 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on October 1, 1967 for export and for carryover amounted to 957.9 million bushels, 2 per cent below the October 1, 1966 total of 976.7 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to October 18 of the current crop year have amounted to 96.8 million bushels compared with

128.5 million marketed during the same period of the previous year. Some 35.1 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the four weeks September 21 to October 18. During the same period of last year the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 25.6 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased from 378.2 million at September 20 to a level of 387.6 million at October 18, 1967.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at October 18 this year represented an increase of 37 per cent over the 1966 comparable total of 282.7 million and was 30 per cent more than the 1965 figure of 299.1 million. Country elevator stocks, amounting to 224.8 million bushels, were 41 per cent above the 1966 comparable total of 159.9 million, and 24 per cent more than the 181.3 million of two years ago. Wheat stocks at interior terminals at October 18, 1967, totalled 12.4 million bushels as against 2.1 million a year ago and 2.9 million two years ago. The 10.0 million bushels "in transit rail" (western division) were below both the 1966 and 1965 totals of 13.5 million and 14.1 million bushels, respectively. Supplies at the Lakehead, totalling some 46.9 million bushels, were substantially above last year's comparable level of 20.3 million and the 1965 figure of 19.1 million. Stocks "in transit lake", amounting to 6.6 million bushels were smaller than both the 1966 level of 11.0 million and the 1965 figure of 8.6 million. The 33.9 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were higher than both the 25.9 million of a year ago and 28.6 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports at October 18, 1967, at 33.6 million bushels, registered a 6 per cent decrease from the comparable 1966 figure of 35.9 million but were 15 per cent more than the 29.3 million of 1965. The 10.3 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were above both the 6.1 million at October 19, 1966, and the 7.0 million at October 20, 1965.

September 1967 Exports of Wheat and Flour Total 24.0 Million Bushels Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, during September 1967 amounted to 24.0 million bushels, 15 per cent below the 28.1 million of the previous

month, 52 per cent less than the 49.6 million of September 1966 and 31 per cent smaller than the ten-year (1956-65) average for the month of September of 34.3 million. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during September 1967 totalled 20.2 million bushels, 17 per cent lower than the August 1967 total of 24.4 million, 57 per cent less than the 47.4 million of a year ago and a decrease of 36 per cent from the ten-year average of 31.5 million. Based on Canadian Customs returns, the equivalent of 3.7 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during September 1967, unchanged from the previous month's figure, 75 per cent larger than the September 1966 adjusted total of 2.1 million and 40 per cent more than the ten-year average of 2.6 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-September period of the current crop year amounted to 44.6 million bushels, sharply below the record 111.6 million shipped during the first two months of 1966-67 and 26 per cent less than the ten-year average for the period of 60.7 million. This year's shipment of wheat to Britain totalled some 12.4 million bushels and accounted for 28 per cent of the current two-month total as compared to 12.7 million the previous year and accounted for 11 per cent of the August-September total. Other principal markets

for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first two months of the current crop year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: U.S.S.R. (Russia), 5.2 (21.7); Japan, 5.0 (8.0); Communist China, 2.7 (24.9); Italy, 2.6 (3.8); Poland, 2.5 (5.1); Belgium and Luxembourg, 2.5 (3.6); Federal Republic of Germany, 2.2 (3.1); Netherlands, 2.1 (0.4); Norway, 1.2 (0.8); and Cuba, 1.0 (2.5). Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-September of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 109 thousand bushels compared with last year's comparable total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 236 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first two months of the 1967-68 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 7.4 million bushels of wheat, 51 per cent more than the adjusted August-September 1966 total of 4.9 million bushels. Cuba's purchases, the leading market for Canadian wheat flour during the period under review, amounted to the equivalent of 4.9 million bushels and accounted for 66 per cent of the August-September 1967 total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-September period of the 1967-68 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Britain, 483 (1,586); Israel, 457 (nil); Ghana, 348 (204); Jamaica, 239 (263); Leeward and Windward Islands, 147 (226); India, 134 (0.2); and Trinidad and Tobago, 126 (221).

Estimated at 592.9 Million Bushels

Canada's 1967 Wheat Crop Based on conditions at October 15 Canada's 1967 wheat crop now estimated at 592.9 million bushels is 28 per cent below last year's record 827.3 million bushels. The decrease in production compared with last year is

due to a 29 per cent decrease in yields although acreage was increased by one per cent. The indicated average yield is 19.7 bushels per acre. This year's all Canada crop of spring wheat, including durum, is estimated at 577.4 million bushels compared with the 1966 crop of 812.1 million. Ontario's winter wheat crop is estimated at 15.5 million bushels, an increase of 2 per cent from last year's crop of 15.2 million.

In the Prairie Provinces the 1967 wheat crop is now placed at 574.0 million bushels, some 233.0 million bushels or 29 per cent below the 1966 crop of 807.0 million bushels. Production in Saskatchewan, accounts for 57 per cent of this year's all Canada wheat crop and is estimated at 339.0 million bushels, some 37 per cent less than last year's 537.0 million bushels. The Alberta crop, estimated at 145.0 million bushels, is down 24 per cent from last year's production of 191.0 million while the Manitoba crop of 90.0 million is 14 per cent larger than the 1966 outturn. The indicated average yield per seeded acre in the Prairie Provinces is 19.4 bushels, with Manitoba averaging 26.5, Saskatchewan, 17.2 and Alberta, 22.7 bushels per acre. Current estimates of production in the Prairie Provinces included relatively small quantities of winter wheat principally in Alberta, and an estimated 20.6 million bushels of durum wheat.

The acreage in durum wheat in the Prairie Provinces in 1967 was 24 per cent larger than that seeded in 1966, but average yields estimated at 15.6 bushels per acre, are 42 per cent below the 1966 outturn of 26.7 bushels. Mid-October indications are for a crop of 20.6 million bushels, compared with the 1966 crop of 28.4 million. Estimated production by province, in millions of bushels, is as follows: Manitoba, 1.1, Saskatchewan, 16.5 and Alberta 3.0.

Delivery Quota on Soft White Spring Wheat The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade re quotas (general) No. 12 under date of October 30 stated that effective immediately the delivery

quota on Soft White Spring Wheat is declared open at all delivery points.

The purpose of opening the quota is to meet mill requirements for Soft White Spring Wheat.

Purchase of Registered or Certified Seed Wheat, Oats, Barley, Rye, Flaxseed, Rapessed and Certified or Commercial Forage Seeds by Producers The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade re quotas (general) No. 13 ammounced in part on November 1 a producer desiring to purchase registered or certified seed wheat, oats, barley, rye, flaxseed, rapeseed and certified or commercial forage seeds (or any combination of these grains) from a bona fide dealer in registered and certified seed or from

a registered seed grower, to be used for seeding purposes on land described in his 1967-68 permit book, may deliver and sell in payment or in part payment for such seed a quantity not exceeding six hundred (600) bushels of any kind of commercial grain in excess of the then prevailing or future delivery quotas in effect at the delivery point designated in the producer's permit book.

- (a) In the case of bulk certified seed, sale is restricted to wheat, oats, barley, rye, flaxseed and rapeseed.
  - (b) In the case of commercial forage seeds, sale is restricted to seed to be used for increasing producers' acreage of the pasture and "soil improving" forage crops under the commercial seed grades Canada No. 1 Seed and Canada No. 2 Seed of the Canada Seeds Act and Regulations, but does not include:

Mustard Seed Buckwheat
Soybeans Potatoes
Field Beans Corn
Field Peas Sunflower Seed
Safflower Sugar Beets
Fruits & Market Garden Crops

- 2. The proceeds of the commercial grain delivered and sold by the producer do not exceed the cost to the producer of the seed purchased.
- On or before delivery of the commercial grain the producer either

(a) signs an order with the elevator agent for the seed required on forms provided for this purpose, or

(b) submits certified copy of invoice covering the purchase, such document to be attached to the producer's 1967-68 permit book.

Where sale of bulk certified seed is involved Plant Products Division form PS 4 - Statement of Sale of Bulk Certified Seed - must be submitted in addition to the other requirements of this paragraph.

4. The cash purchase ticket issued in respect of this delivery is made in favour of the seller of the seed.

- In cases where the seed grain is shipped "Freight Collect" the producer may receive settlement for sufficient grain to pay the freight charges. However, the total quantity of grain delivered may not exceed Six Hundred (600) bushels and the proceeds of the commercial grain so delivered may not exceed the cost to the producer of the seed grain purchased, plus freight charges thereon.
- In all cases proper entries covering the grain delivered by the producer must be made in the producer's delivery permit book in the space provided for supplementary quotas with the notation "Seed Grain Purchase".

Deliveries of grain made under this authorization will not be subject to any deductions where the producer has received a cash advance under "Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act".

This Instruction expires on June 30th, 1968.

Deliveries of wheat from farms in the Prairie Provinces up to October 18 of the current crop year amounted to 90.9 million bushels, 27 per cent less than the comparable 1966 total of 124.2 million but considerably larger than the ten-year (1956-65) average for the period of 62.5 million bushels.

## Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain

Total shipments of the six major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to October 18 this year amounted to 264.8 million bushels,

27 per cent less than the 365.1 million shipped during the comparable period of 1966 but 12 per cent more than the 10-year (1956-65) average for the period of 235.8 million. In 1967 the season of navigation opened on April 13 while the 1966 season opened on April 3. Shipments of wheat, at 174.6 million bushels accounted for 66 per cent of the total six grains.

Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain from the Opening of Mavigation to October 18, 1967 and to Approximately the Same Date, 1956 to 1966










## EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS\*




## FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES





Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during September 1967 amounted to 3,330,000 hundredweight, relatively unchanged from the August 1967 output of 3,323,000 hundredweight, 8 per cent below the September 1966 figure of 3,631,000 hundredweight and 2 per cent less than the ten-year (1957-66) average production for the month of September of 3,386,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during September 1967 had a total rated capacity of 155,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 25-day working period 85.9 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during September 1967 amounted to 7,498,000 bushels compared with the 7,484,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 9 per cent lower than the 8,239,000 bushels milled during September 1966. Of the wheat milled for flour during September 1967, some 6,351,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (750,000 bushels); Durum (319,000 bushels); and all other (78,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during September 1967 amounted to 1,611,000 hundredweight (some 3,705,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) 1 per cent above the 3,661,000 bushels exported during the previous month and considerably greater than the adjusted September 1966 total of 2,122,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-seven countries with exports to Cuba amounting to 2,443,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 66 per cent of the September 1967 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent were as follows: Israel, 457; Britain, 154; India, 134; and Jamaica, 129.

#### UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supply Above

Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1967-68 crop year are currently placed at Previous Year 1,979.4 million bushels, 7 per cent above the previous year's total of 1,845.8 million reflecting an increase in production which more than offset a decrease in carryover stocks. The 425.7 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1967 were the lowest stocks in 15 years, while the current crop, estimated at 1,553.7 million bushels, represents an increase of 19 per cent over last year's outturn of 1,310.6 million. In addition, current crop year domestic supplies may be supplemented by imports of about 1 million bushels. Domestic disappearance during 1967-68 is estimated at about 728.0 million bushels, 7 per cent more than the 679.6 million last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,251.5 million remain available for export and for carryover, an increase of 7 per cent over the 1,167.3 million in 1966-67.

Exports Lower Than Previous Year

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period July-September 1967 amounted to 190.0 million bushels, 17 per cent less than the 230.2

million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on October 1, 1967 for export and for carryover was estimated at 1,061.5 million bushels compared with 937.0 million on the same date a year ago.

1967 Wheat Crop Forecast at 1,554 Million Bushels

In a report released on October 10, the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated that production of all wheat totalled a record 1,554 million bushels, 19 per cent above 1966 and 7 per

cent above the previous high of 1,457 million bushels in 1958. Record production resulted from more acreage harvested, because the yield of 25.9 bushels is 0.4 bushels below last year, and 1.6 bushels below the record high yield in 1958.

The durum wheat crop is estimated at 69 million bushels, 9 per cent above 1966 and 23 per cent above average. Yield per acre of 24.0 bushels is the lowest since 1961 but was offset by sharply increased acreage. Dry weather during much of the season reduced yields but outturns were well above expectations.

Production of other spring wheat is estimated at 252 million bushels, the largest crop since 1958. Yield per acre is 23.4 bushels, 1.8 bushels above 1966 and 2.1 bushels above average. Harvest was completed in early September with almost no interruption from rain. Quality was good.

Wheat Stocks on Farms

Stocks of all wheat on farms October 1 totalled 609 million bushels, 12 per cent above a year earlier and the largest since 1958 when holdings were 644 million

bushels. Durum wheat stocks on farms, at 60 million bushels, were down 3 per cent from October 1 last year.

Changes in Wheat Export Program

USDA Announces Procedural The United States Department of Agriculture under date of October 20, 1967 announced procedural changes of the Wheat Export Program (GR-345) and export regulations as one of the actions being undertaken to improve the

competitive position of United States wheat and speed its movement into export channels. Today's action is in accord with efforts of Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman to give farmers a stronger position in the market place by making full use of authorities already available. In June the Department met with exporters of wheat to discuss changes in the regulations and solicit their views as to steps necessary to maximize United States exports of wheat.

The new regulations which become effective October 30, change the method of contracting with the Commodity Credit Corporation for subsidy payments for all classes of wheat other than Durum wheat and wheat exported under Public Law 480. Previously an exporter could not enter into a contract with the CCC unless he had made a sale to a buyer in a foreign country. The Department has eliminated this requirement, and exporters can make offers to export a quantity and class of wheat from a specified coast during a specified period at the announced subsidy rate After the exporter's offer to export wheat has been accepted, he can then apply sales previously made, or apply sales made after his offer against the contract with Commodity Credit Corporation. The Department also has eliminated the requirement that exporters furnish documentary evidence of their foreign sales.

Export sales of wheat made under Public Law 480 are subject to the same provisions as in the past. The Durum wheat program also is unchanged and exporters will continue to make offers for an export payment on a competitive basis.

### AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

All-time High Production and Supplies

The 1966-67 record wheat harvest in Australia, at 461.9 million bushels, reflected a sharp increase over the 259.7 million harvested in 1965-66 and surpassed by 25 per cent the previous peak of 370.0 million set in 1964-65. Total

supplies of wheat for the current crop year are placed at a new high of 478.5 million bushels representing a substantial increase over the 284.1 million the previous year. Carryover stocks declined from 24.4 million bushels at December 1, 1965 to 16.5 million at the same date in 1966. After making an allowance of some 85.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, a total of 393.5 million are available for export and for carryover in contrast to 191.2 million bushels in 1965-66.

Exports at Record Level

During the period December 1 - September 23 of the current Australian crop year, combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent amounted to a record 258.8 million bushels, 81 per cent larger than the 142.7 million exported during the corresponding period of 1965-66. On September 24, 1967, the balance remaining for export and for carryover at 134.7 million bushels exceeded by a wide margin the comparable 1966 total of 48.5 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. F.P. Weiser, Commercial Counsellor for Canada, Canberra, under date of October 12, 1967 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

The major development in the current period is a considerable Crop Prospects deterioration in crop prospects which set in early in September as a result of unseasonably hot weather and lack of rain. In a press statement

dated September 29, the Australian Wheat Board estimated that delivery of wheat to the Board would be 257 million bushels out of a total crop of about 280 million bushels. Comparative figures for the previous crop year are 438 million bushels delivered to the Australian Wheat Board and a total crop of 462 million bushels.

The press statement points out that only three times before the 1966-67 crop year had deliveries to the Board exceeded 257 million bushels, namely in 1962-63, 1963-64 and 1965-66.

The Board's press statement goes on to say that while good rains within the next few weeks could improve the situation, a continuation of hot, dry conditions could lead to returns below the above estimates.

There have been no further comprehensive reports on this subject since the statement was released almost two weeks ago. The information which comes to hand indicates, however, that despite some rain last week and again this week the situation has not improved except in very few growing areas. In the others, there has not been enough rain to make a real impact.

News media carry stories about wheat lands having already been put to grazing in some parts, especially in the western portion of the wheat belt. One reason for this is that feed crops have also been affected by the drought. It is difficult at this moment to assess the extent of the damage which has already been done. There is no doubt, however, that unless a good rainfall comes very soon the crop will be hard hit and in any event the rain would come too late to do much good in some parts.

Wheat Exports

The Australian Wheat Board announced that exports of wheat from Australia for the crop year 1966-67 have already broken the previous record established in 1964-65. The Board anticipates that by the end of the crop year on November 30, 1967, total exports will reach about 8.5 million tons (317,333,000 bushels), exceeding the previous record by at least 1.3 million tons, that is by about 50 million bushels.

It will be noted from the attached statistical tables that total exports of Australian wheat in the period December 1, 1966 to September 23, 1967 amounted to 6,547,518 long tons (244,440,000 bushels).

Results of Wheat
Board Mission

According to press reports, the overseas wheat sales mission,
which was led by Dr. A.R. Callaghan, Chairman of the Australian
Wheat Board, has created increased interest in Australian wheat
among buyers in the countries which it visited.

It has been reported that one reason for this is the new transshipment policy to which we referred in our Monthly Wheat Review for September 1967 since it enables the Board to offer Australian wheat at more competitive prices. Another reason is the Australian Wheat Board's policy of selling wheat overseas in grades, not just as f.a.q. wheat.

The mission took along supplies of the Board's new sample cards which display the various types and grades of wheat produced in Australia. Apparently many overseas wheat buyers had not realized that Australia was able to supply prime hard wheat in addition to soft f.a.q. wheat until they were given the sample cards. Apparently for this reason buyers in such countries as Rhodesia and Zambia "had changed to buying all Australian grain instead of also buying from the United States and Canada". As a result of a visit to Taiwan, that country would be doubling its purchases of Australian wheat. This apparently relates to Taiwan's policy of increasing wheat consumption in place of rice, with the objective of exporting more rice.

# ARGENTINE SITUATION

# Total Wheat Supplies Below Previous Year

Reflecting a substantial reduction in opening stocks, which more than offset an increase in production, total supplies of wheat in Argentina

for the 1966-67 crop year are estimated at 248.2 million bushels, some 29 per cent less than the 1965-66 level of 350.5 million. Opening stocks declined from 130.1 million bushels at December 1, 1965 to only 13.8 million at the same date in 1966, while production increased from 220.5 million in 1965-66 to 234.4 million in 1966-67. After allowing some 139.4 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 108.8 million remain available for export and carryover in the current crop year as against 219.0 million the previous year.

During the period December 1966-September 1967, exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat, based on preliminary data, amounted to 81.6 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the 200.6 million exported during the same months in 1965-66. The balance remaining for export and for carryover on October 1, 1967, amounted to 27.2 million bushels compared with 18.4 million a year ago.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture), Buenos Aires, under date of October 31, 1967 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

During the period under review there was ample rainfall throughout the whole of the Republic. While this caused floods in certain areas, particularly near the city of Buenos Aires, it was not sufficient to hurt grain stands which had previously suffered from drought. In the province of La Pampa, which was the most seriously affected drought area, there was also substantial rain. In recent days, there has been further rainfall and some flooding in Santa Fe and Buenos Aires but due to their local nature these have not seriously affected the crop.

Wheat

Due to the timeliness of the rain, Argentina can now likely expect to have a sizeable wheat crop well above the tonnage of last crop. With the larger area sown in Chaco and northern Santa Fe, where harvesting is now beginning, it is expected that at least a further 100,000 metric tons (3.7 million bushels) will be added. This is a marginal wheat growing area which was exploited to a greater extent this year.

There was a sharp decline in the price of bread wheat during the first week of September to 1,700 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.43 per bushel) f.o.r. Buenos Aires. During the second half of the month, prices increased by 50 pesos (4 cents per bushel) in Buenos Aires and in Bahia Blanca were quoted at 1,650 pesos (\$1.39 per bushel). During October, prices have tended to stabilize at a level of 1,650 pesos (\$1.39 per bushel) in all ports.

Some futures trading has occurred for the new crop. The Buenos Aires Futures Market has quoted 1,670 pesos (\$1.41 per bushel) for November delivery; 1,530 pesos (\$1.29 per bushel) for December and 1,500 pesos (\$1.26 per bushel) - the support level for 1967-68 crop - for January. More recently prices decreased for November futures to 1,651 pesos (\$1.39 per bushel) but increased for December and January to 1,545 and 1,511 pesos (\$1.30 and \$1.27 per bushel), respectively. February futures by mid-month were quoted at 1,510 pesos (\$1.27 per bushel). At present the November quotation has strengthened to 1,690 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.42 per bushel) f.o.r. Buenos Aires.

No export sales of old crop or new crop wheat took place during the period under review. However, recently the Government has cancelled the prohibition established on exports of bread wheat and contracts are once more allowed to be negotiated. Prior to the lifting of this prohibition the Government has authorized the exportation of 13,000 tons (478,000 bushels) to Paraguay which may in fact have to come from imported wheat from Spain. The lots now being harvested in El Chaco will also assist in fulfilling this Paraguayan contract.

Durums values dropped during December to 1,610 pesos (\$1.36 per bushel) both in Buenos Aires and Bahia Blanca. Futures for the coming durums crop are trading at 1,690 pesos (\$1.42 per bushel) delivered to southern ports. At the time of writing, spot prices for durums have declined to 1,560 pesos (\$1.31 per bushel) in all ports.

Some export of durums to Italy occurred at the beginning of the month with U\$S 69.75 (\$2.04 per bushel) paid f.o.b. Necochea for February shipment. The market weakened however and recently U\$S 66.50 (\$1.94 per bushel) was being offered for the same destination.

Exports during September totalled 18,196 tons (669,000 bushels), the lowest for many years and went towards filling commitments to Italy, Portugal, Paraguay and Brazil. Total exports to-date this crop year now stand at 2,208,132 metric tons (81,134,000 bushels).

### GRAIN SITUATION IN BRITAIN

The following account of the current grain situation in Britain has been extracted from a report by Mr. F.G. Beaudette, Assistant Commercial Secretary, London, under date of September 28, 1967, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Weather and Crops

Weather during September has been changeable with a
fair amount of rain and temperatures about average.

However, overall good conditions have prevailed and the harvest has been viturally completed. The quality of cereals has been generally satisfactory. Wheat crops have ripened well but have been affected by yellow rust, 'take-all' and 'eye-spot'. Barley crops have not been seriously effected by disease and quality has been average to good. Oats in general have been healthy and of good quality. In general, the current harvest has been one of the easiest for some years due to the protracted spell of fine weather and the consequent comparatively low moisture content of some grains has reduced drying problems.

Production Forecast

Yields generally are likely to be up on 1966 although decreases are reported in some spring barley yields and the yields of spring wheat appears rather variable. The Ministry of Agriculture has given preliminary estimates of yields of England and Wales of 32.2 long cwts (60 bushels) per acre for wheat, 29.9 (70 bushels) for barley and 28.7 (95 bushels) for oats.

These compare favourably with the 1966-67 mid-November estimates of 31.2, 29.1 and 27.6 long cwts (58, 68 and 91 bushels) per acre, for wheat, barley and oats respectively. Applying these preliminary assessments to the provisional June acreage figures, the estimated production for the United Kingdom is wheat, 3.7 million long tons (138.1 million bushels); barley, 9.0 million long tons (42.0 million bushels); and oats, 1.4 million long tons (92.2 million bushels).

The Minister of Agriculture has recently reiterated the Government's conclusion that increased wheat production rather than barley is desirable and has welcomed the current increase in the national wheat acreage. The Minister has also expressed the Governments hope that autumn sowings will also reflect the trend toward increased wheat production.

Cereals Deficiency Payments The total cost of deficiency payments for 1966-67 is approximately £45.2 million (\$136.1 million) compared with £43.35 million (\$130.5 million) in 1965-66. The deficiency payments are distributed as follows: wheat £9.1 million (\$27.4 million), barley £29.96 million (\$90.2 million) and oats £6.1 million (\$18.4 million).

The total tonnage of wheat certified for deficiency payment was 3.2 million long tons (119.5 million bushels) and the average market price for the cereal year was 22s 6.3d per long cwt (\$1.82 per bushel) as compared with the quaranteed price of 25s 5d per long cwt (\$2.06 per bushel). After allowing for the operation of the standard quantity adjustment, in this case taking into account a deduction of 0.6d per long cwt (0.3¢ per bushel) because production exceeded the standard quantity, the average rate of deficiency payment is 2s 10.1d per long cwt (23.1¢ per bushel). A deduction of 2.7d per long cwt (1.8¢ per bushel) and a supplementary levy of 0.5d per long cwt (0.3¢ per bushel), is deductable in respect of levy payable to the Home Grown Cereals Authority.


A total of 8,081 long tons (323,000 bushels) of rye were certified in the cereal year but as the average market price of 22s 10.56d per long cwt (\$1.72 per bushel) exceeded the guaranteed price of 21s 7d per long cwt (\$1.63 per bushel), no deficiency payment is payable.


Grain Markets
Grain markets were generally quiet with domestic wheats holding steady. Soft wheat of milling quality made 22s 0d per long cwt (\$1.78 per bushel) for immediate delivery with forward prices for October of 22s 6d (\$1.82 per bushel) and 22s 9d (\$1.84 per bushel) for November-December delivery.


The Home Grown Cereals Authority ex-farm guide prices for millable wheat and feeding barley are £20 10 0d per long ton (\$1.65 per bushel) and £19 10 0d per long ton (\$1.26 per bushel), respectively for September-October delivery.

#### CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- October 10 According to a report published by the Crop Reporting Board U.S.D.A. production of all wheat in the United States in 1967 based on conditions at October 1, was estimated at a record 1,554 million bushels.
  - 19 The 1967 season of navigation closed at the port of Churchill.
  - U.S.D.A. announced procedural changes of the wheat Export Program (GR-345) and export regulations as one of the actions being undertaken to improve the competitive position of United States wheat and speed its novement into export channels.
- November 3 Based on conditions at October 15, Canada's 1967 wheat crop was estimated at 592.9 million bushels, 28 per cent below last year's record 827.3 million bushels.
