

WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

August-December Exports

Above Average
from the four major exporting countries during the August-December period of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 563.8 million bushels, a decrease of 23 per cent from the total of 728.3 million exported during the same five months in 1966 but 8 per cent above the ten-year (1956-65) average shipments for the same period of the crop year, of some 519.8 million bushels. Based on the Canadian crop year, Australia was the only one of the four exporting countries registering an increase over their 1966 comparable

Shipments from the four traditional major wheat exporters during August-December 1967 with comparisons appear in the accompanying table.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Above a Year Ago Supplies of wheat held by the four traditional major exporters at January 1, 1968 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,154.6 million bushels, 6 per cent above the 2,031.2

million at the same time a year ago. The newly harvested 1967-68 wheat crops in the Argentine and Australia are taken into consideration in these totals. Supplies in United States, Canada and Argentina were larger than those of the previous year while Australia registered a decrease. Supplies at January 1, 1968, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 867.9 (736.4); Canada, 899.5 (831.2); Argentina, 163.3 (90.9); and Australia, 223.9 (372.7).

CANADIAN SITUATION

Wheat Supplies Below Record 1966-67 Level

Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1967-68 crop year are placed at 1,169.7 million bushels representing a 6 per cent decrease from the 1966-67 total of 1,247.5

million. This decline reflected a sharp reduction in the 1967 wheat crop which more than offset an increase in carryover stocks. The 1967 harvest, has been estimated at 592.9 million bushels, some 28 per cent less than the 827.3 million of the previous year while carryover stocks increased from 420.1 million bushels in 1966 to 576.8 million in 1967. After making an allowance of 160.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1967-68 amount to 1,009.7 million bushels, 8 per cent less than the 1,092.1 million in 1966-67.

August-December Exports
Sharply Below Previous Year

Ient, during August-December 1967 amounted to 110.2

million bushels, in contrast to the previous year's comparable total of 260.8 million. This year's exports consisted of 99.4 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 302 thousand of bagged seed and 10.5 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the August-December period last year these figures were 245.7 million of wheat in bulk, 375 thousand of bagged seed and 14.8 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on January 1, 1968 for export and for carryover amounted to 899.5 million bushels, 8 per cent above the January 1, 1967 total of 831.2 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to January 24 of the current crop year have amounted to 235.4 million bushels in contrast to 329.2 million

marketed during the same period of the previous year. Some 43.2 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the five weeks December 21, 1967 to January 24, 1968. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 26.9 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat increased from 428.2 million at December 20, 1967 to a level of 444.6 million at January 24, 1968.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at January 24 this year represented an increase of 36 per cent over the 1967 comparable total of 326.6 million and was 43 per cent more than the 1966 figure of 310.3 million. Country elevator stocks, amounting to 244.4 million bushels, were 54 per cent above the 1967 comparable total of 158.3 million and 27 per cent more than the 192.3 million of two years ago. Wheat stocks at interior terminals at January 24, 1968, totalled 13.1 million bushels as against 3.0 million a year ago and 1.4 million two years ago. The 16.6 million bushels "in transit rail" (western division) were below the 1967 figure of 19.8 million but above the 8.9 million of 1966. Supplies at the Lakehead, totalling some 58.6 million bushels, were 12 per cent above the 52.2 million at January 25, 1967 and 65 per cent larger than the 35.6 million at January 26, 1966. The 25.6 million bushels "in storage afloat" were above both the 22.4 million in this position in 1967 and the 11.3 million at the same date in 1966. The 31.4 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were higher than both the 25.3 million of a year ago and 25.1 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports at January 24, 1968, at 35.1 million bushels, registered a 55 per cent increase over the comparable 1967 figure of 22.7 million and were more than double the 17.1 million of 1966. The 8.3 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were above the 11.0 million at January 25, 1967 but below the 6.6 million at January 26, 1966.

December 1967 Exports
of Wheat and Flour Total
15.1 Million Bushels

Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, during December 1967 amounted to 15.1 million bushels, 37 per cent below the 23.9 million of the previous month, and sharply below

the 37.4 million of December 1966 and 46 per cent smaller than the ten-year (1956-65) average for the month of December of 28.0 million. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during December 1967 totalled 12.9 million bushels, 41 per cent less than the November 1967 total of 22.0 million, considerably less than the 33.5 million of a year ago and a decrease of 47 per cent from the ten-year average of 24.2 million. Based on Canadian Customs returns, the equivalent of 2.2 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during December 1967, 16 per cent above the previous month's figure of 1.9 million, but 44 per cent smaller than the adjusted total of 3.9 million of December 1966 and 36 per cent less than the ten-year average of 3.4 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-December period of the current crop year amounted to 99.4 million bushels, sharply below the 245.7 million shipped during the first five months of 1966 and 35 per cent less than the ten-year average for the period of 153.2 million. This year's shipment of wheat to Britain totalled some 29.3 million bushels and accounted for 29 per cent of the current five-month total as compared to 28.8 million the previous year and accounted for 12 per cent of the August-December total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first five months of the current crop

year, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: U.S.S.R. (Russia), 14.6 (54.5); Japan, 12.5 (23.8); Federal Republic of Germany, 11.2 (11.9); Belgium and Luxembourg, 5.9 (9.3); Italy, 5.5 (5.8); Netherlands, 3.2 (1.6); Communist China, 3.0 (53.6); and Poland, 2.5 (7.6).

Comulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-December of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 302 thousand bushels compared with last year's comparable total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 375 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first five months of the 1967-68 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 10.5 million bushels of wheat, 29 per cent less than the adjusted August-December 1966 total of 14.8 million bushels. Cuba's purchases, the leading market for Canadian wheat flour during the period under review, amounted to the equivalent of 3.8 million bushels and accounted for 36 per cent of the August-December 1967 total. During the comparable period of 1966 shipments to Cuba amounted to 6.1 million and accounted for 41 per cent of the five-month total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-December period of the 1967-68 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Britain, 1,289 (3,448); Ghana, 908 (703); Ceylon, 860 (442); Jamaica, 590 (641); Israel, 544 (nil); Leeward and Windward Islands, 331 (457); and Trinidad and Tobago, 212 (521).

General Quota Position

By January 29, 1968 out of a total of 1,880 shipping points in the Western Division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 1,034 points on a delivery quota of 4 bushels per specified acre and 758 points on a 3-bushel quota. Some 63 points remained on a 2-bushel quote while 25 stations were reported as "closed".

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, January 24, 1968 Compared with Approximately the Same Date, 1966 and 1967










EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES



EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF CANADA'S SIX MAJOR GRAINS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during December 1967 amounted to 2,842,000 hundredweight, 11 per cent lower than the November 1967 output of 3,188,000 hundredweight, 10 per cent less than the December 1966 figure of 3,170,000 hundredweight and 15 per cent below the ten-year (1957-66) average production for the month of December of 3,326,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during December 1967 had a total rated capacity of 155,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 25-day working period 73.5 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during December 1967 amounted to 6,371,000 bushels, 11 per cent less than the 7,165,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and 10 per cent below the 7,118,000 bushels milled during December 1966. Of the wheat milled for flour during December 1967, some 5,373,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (598,000 bushels); Durum (335,000 bushels) and all other (65,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during December 1967 amounted to 942,000 hundredweight (some 2,166,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) 16 per cent greater than the 1,874,000 bushels exported during the previous month but 44 per cent lower than the adjusted December 1966 total of 3,889,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-nine countries with exports to Cuba amounting to 1,226,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 57 per cent of the December 1967 total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels of wheat equivalent were as follows: Ghana, 249; Britain, 166; Jamaica, 85; Leeward and Windward Islands, 50; United States, 45; Morocco, 36; Trinidad and Tobago, 30; Hong Kong, 27; and Liberia, 26.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supplies Above 1966-67 Level

Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1967-68 crop year are placed at 1,950.6 million bushels, 6 per cent above the previous year's total of

1,846.9 million due to an increase in production which more than offset a decrease in carryover stocks. The 426.3 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1967 were the lowest stocks in 15 years, while the 1967 crop, estimated at 1,524.3 million bushels, represented an increase of 16 per cent over the previous year's outturn of 1,311.7 million. Domestic disappearance during 1967-68 is estimated at about 700.0 million bushels, 3 per cent more than the 680.1 million the year before. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,250.9 million remain available for export and for carryover, an increase of 7 per cent over the 1,168.1 million in 1966-67.

Exports Below Previous Year

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period July-December 1967 amounted to 383.1 million bushels, 11 per cent less than the 431.7

million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on January 1, 1968 for export and for carryover was estimated at 867.9 million bushels compared with 736.4 million on the same date a year ago.

Stocks of Wheat in All Positions January 1, 1968 On January 24, 1968 the United States Department of Agriculture reported that all wheat in storage on January 1 totalled 1,208 million bushels, 15 per cent more than last year but otherwise the smallest January 1 holdings since 1953. Off-farm stocks,

at 704 million bushels, were up 10 per cent from January 1 last year and farm holdings, at 505 million bushels, were up 23 per cent. Disappearance from all storage positions during the 1967 October-December quarter is indicated at 348 million bushels compared with 387 million bushels a year earlier.

Durum wheat stocks in all positions on January 1 totalled 60.2 million bushels, 6 per cent below a year earlier, and the smallest for the date since estimates began in 1962. Farm holdings of 46.4 million bushels were up 17 per cent from a year earlier, but off-farm stocks at 13.8 million bushels, were down 47 per cent. Disappearance during the 1967 October-December quarter is indicated at 14.5 million bushels compared with 31.6 million bushels a year earlier.

According to the Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, wheat flour production in the United States in December 1967 was 20,338,000 hundredweight compared with 20,453,000 hundredweight the previous month and 20,463,000 hundredweight for December 1966.

Flour mills in December ground 46,507,000 bushels of wheat compared with 46,957,000 bushels in the previous month. Wheat offal output was 376,000 tons.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

1967-68 Wheat Supplies Lower Than Previous Year

Estimated total supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1967-68 (December-November) crop year amount to 340.1 million bushels, consisting of the December 1,

1967 carryover of 80.1 million and the new crop, placed at an estimated 260.0 million. Indicated supplies for the current Australian crop year, reflecting a relatively sharp decline in production, are about 30 per cent less than the 1966-67 total of 483.2 million. After making an allowance of 96.6 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 243.5 million are available for export and for carryover as against 393.4 million in 1966-67.

Exports Slightly Less Than Last Year

Preliminary exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during December 1967 amounted to 19.6 million bushels, only 5 per cent lower than the

20.7 million exported during the same month in 1966. The balance remaining on December 31, 1967 for export and for carryover was estimated at 223.9 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the January 1, 1966 total of 372.7 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. J.E.G. Gibson, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, under date of January 12, 1968, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Crop Production

Although rainfall was ideal during the first week of January it was too late to be of any particular assistance to the current wheat crop. The estimated Australian wheat harvest for 1967-68 remains at about 260 million bushels.

The largest producer state last year was New South Wales, but there is some doubt that it will hold this position in the current year. New South Wales total harvest is estimated at 100 million bushels, just over half of last year's total. The harvest is nearly completed at this point. One favourable factor this season is the high protein content of northern wheat which has fetched prime prices to fortunate growers. On the other hand, a good deal of northern grain has been pinched from lack of moisture and will, therefore, be subject to dockage charges. In southern New South Wales only those crops which had been grown under irrigation have survived to be harvested and some high yields are reported.

At seeding time, 8.2 million acres were sown to wheat in the State of New South Wales. Drought conditions, however, have been so severe that 25 per cent of this acreage will not be harvested this year.

In Western Australia, it appears certain that the state wheat crop will be just in excess of 100 million bushels. Western Australia has managed to escape the drought which so badly affected the eastern half of the country. Reports from Western Australia indicate that wheat crops are yielding much better than their appearance formerly indicated.

In South Australia, it is estimated that only 28 million bushels of wheat will be harvested this year. This is a very severe decline from previous performances and is due to the drought which has hit most growing areas in the state. The acreage sown to cereals this season was the highest in recent years, but the average yield is likely to be the second lowest in twenty years. It is expected that five million bushels of wheat will be retained on farms to alleviate the severe feed shortage.

Similar conditions have prevailed in the State of Victoria whose crop is expected to be nearly equal to that of South Australia. In many areas, stock have been turned on to the crops and farmers have had to apply for Government drought assistance.

In Queensland, the wheat harvest is well advanced and production is estimated at 30 million bushels, down 16 per cent from last year. The average yield for the State has been estimated at 19.3 bushels per acre.

Perspective of
Australia's Wheat
Markets

Dr. Allan R. Callaghan, Chairman of the Australian Wheat Board in a recent speech, outlined several aspects of world markets which are likely to have an effect on future overseas sales of Australian wheat. The following are excerpts from his remarks.

'One of the most notable developments has been the shrinkage of the market in Western Europe and the United Kingdom. Within the European Economic Community, which was formerly a large market, we suffered virtual elimination because of high levies, increased local availability of soft wheat, particularly French, on top of the disadvantages of freight. In the 1950's, about 14 per cent of our wheat went to the Continent. In 1965-66 this had shrunk to 1.76 per cent of our exportable surplus. This year, there has been some recovery, and exports to the Continent

(including Norway) should reach about three per cent - 270,000 tons or 10.1 million bushels.

'Traditionally, a high proportion of Australian wheat has been exported to the United Kingdom, in the 1930's this being between 50 per cent and 60 per cent. But this year, the estimated percentage is less than seven per cent. This percentage figure somewhat exaggerates the position because of the magnitude of the crop and record exports for 1966-67. Total sales to the U.K. this year were just over half a million tons (18.85 million bushels), a not inconsequential market by any means.

'The Australian Wheat Board realized that, by using larger sized vessels and adopting transhipment arrangements, it was possible to reduce freight costs to the Continent and the U.K. These arrangements combined with the promotion of our stronger wheats of the Prime Hard and Hard classes, served, this year, to prevent further drift, by opening up prospects of re-establishing markets on the Continent and giving greater flexibility for sales to the U.K.

'To Australia, the growing demand in Asia is of extreme importance because of the advantage of freight and because of the suitability of our wheat for the very diverse needs in these regions. It is estimated that nearly 70 per cent of our exports this year will be for Asian destinations. This includes over three million tons (112 million bushels) to the People's Republic of China representing 35.2 per cent of our total shipments for the year, and substantial increased sales to Japan, India, Pakistan, Hong Kong, Singapore and Malaya. To these Asian markets we offer Prime Hard and Hard wheats for bread making, F.A.Q.'s as blending wheats and for steamed bread, noodles and chapatti, and Soft wheats for biscuit and cake flours.

'The Japanese market is expanding at the rate of five per cent per annum because of the progressive increase in consumption of wheat products, and the discouragement of domestic wheat production. This year, as a result of continuing efforts, the Australian Wheat Board succeeded in selling for the Japanese Staple Food Programme, Queensland Prime Hard and New South Wales Southern-Western F.A.Q.

'We are exporting fairly substantial quantities of wheat to the Middle East and African markets, the most important being Iran, Iraq, Aden, Lebanon, South Africa, Rhodesia and Zambia. All wheat imported by Rhodesia and Zambia this year was from Australia. In these regions, the demand is for wheat carrying the traditional characteristics of dryness, cleanliness, ease of milling and good bread making qualities. The tendency of these markets is to identify their requirements more specifically with the quality wheats we are able to offer, and our better quality wheats, including our higher protein F.A.Q.'s, are building up a high reputation in these markets. This augurs well for the future provided we maintain our quality standards and continuity in supplies.

'The entry of many developing countries into flour milling, and extreme competition from the subsidized export flour of the E.E.C., has reduced our prospects for flour sales. On the other hand, our types of wheat are meeting the special quality needs of new mills in Singapore, Hong Kong and Malaya where we already have wheat markets greatly in excess of our former wheat equivalent of flour. At present we supply about 90 per cent of the wheat needs to these mills which are geared, not only for local needs, but also for the sale of export flour. For the latter, the Indonesian flour market offers considerable scope.

'We have a long-standing trade in flour with Ceylon which has been tenuously maintained against severe competition from subsidized F.E.C. flour. Here again, plans are well forward for the erection of a flour mill. Because of the long traditional association with our flour, it is likely that any replacement of flour by wheat will favour Australian.

'In recent years Latin America as a whole has passed from being a net exporter of wheat to being a net importer. Brazil is by far the largest market, importing about three million tons per annum. The Argentine has exported an average of about four million tons annually over the last five years, a large proportion of which being for destinations in Latin America - Brazil in particular. Furthermore there is a potential for increased production.

'Last year the Australian Wheat Board explored market possibilities in Brazil, Peru and Chile with very encouraging results. Over 15 million bushels of wheat (400,000 tons) have been sold this season to these markets, and these countries have become acquainted with the qualities and characteristics of the wheat we are able to offer. Whether we can continue to offer these at competitive prices will depend a good deal on marketing developments and future shipping prospects. We have a serious freight disability to contend with and a shortage of reciprocal trade to meet required shipping services'.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Reflecting the combined effect of a small increase in carryover stocks as well as a larger production, total supplies of wheat in Argentina for the 1967-68 (December-November) crop year are estimated at 302.2 million bushels, 22 per cent more than the 1966-67 figure of 248.2 million. Current crop year supplies consist of the December 1 carryover of 15.6 million compared with 13.8 million the year before, while the 1967 production of 286.6 million, is about a fifth larger than the 234.4 million in 1966. After making an allowance of 137.4 million for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 164.8 million are available for export and for carryover in 1967-68, some 67 per cent greater than the 98.4 million the previous year.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. A.G. Glade, Agricultural Assistant, Euenos Aires, under date of January 24, 1968 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

Weather The dry weather conditions which prevailed during the latter part of 1967 continued during the first few weeks of the new year. There is now a lack of moisture throughout all the grain belts, and while this has not affected the wheat crop due to its arrival at time of moisture, it has affected several of the summer crops, particularly corn. A few scattered showers occurred during the past week; and while it has been a benefit, there is still need for much more moisture during the next few weeks.

Wheat By the last week of 1967, the wheat harvest in the northern grain belt was near to completion and harvesting was general throughout the rest of the country. Adverse weather conditions and some disease and pest infestations affected both yield and quality in Fntre Rios, Santa Fe, Cordoba and the northern part of the Province of Buenos Aires. In spite of this however, there is expected to be a somewhat higher output in these regions than in the previous year. In the southern grain belt, the harvest is well under way and again yields appear to be somewhat affected by disease.

The Secretariat of Agriculture has to date published only a first official estimate of 7.8 million tons (286.6 million bushels). The trade continues

to estimate a crop of closer to 7.5 million tons (275.6 million bushels) and even possibly slightly below this figure.

Due to the low hectolitric weight of wheat harvested in many parts of the northern grain belt, the National Grain Board has approved the use of an extra grade, grade No. 4. For the 1967-68 crop, wheat between 67 and 72 kgs. per hectolitre (54 and 58 pounds per bushel) harvested in the Rosafé and Entre Rios areas, will be classified as grade 4 with all other specifications similar to that of grade 3 wheat.

Due to the weakened international prices on wheat, the Argentine Government has reduced its FOB index value from U\$S 59 per metric ton to U\$S 55 (\$1.74 to \$1.62 per bushel). This was also stated to be the result of influences in the grain market caused by certain suppliers who subsidized sales. Besides the reduction in the index, the Government is also contemplating reduction in export prices, including that of wheat, in order to improve the position of Argentine wheat in international markets. To date, Argentina has not been able to conclude its negotiations with Brazil for the annual million ton supply of wheat, and discussions are continuing. However, 150,000 tons (5,511,000 bushels) were sold to Chile under a Government to Government agreement. Up to mid January the National Grain Board has purchased 900,000 tons (33,069,000 bushels) of wheat with a further 240,000 tons (8,818,000 bushels) being offered to the Board.

During late December, exporters were offered 1,400 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.17 per bushel) for wheat FOR Buenos Aires, with 1,390 pesos (\$1.16 per bushel) quoted in Bahia Blanca. Millers on the other hand were offered 1,380 pesos (\$1.15 per bushel) for cash payment or 1,400 pesos (\$1.17 per bushel) on 30-day terms. Exporters were offered, £30 per ton (\$2.13 per bushel) for wheat destined CIF United Kingdom, January-March shipment, and U\$S 68.70 (\$2.02 per bushel) CIF the Netherlands. However, little business was negotiated. Some shipments from up river ports have been made, but these were of small volume going mainly to Paraguay.

Little change occurred in the durum market, by the end of December 1,570 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.31 per bushel) were being paid in Buenos Aires, with 10 pesos (one cent per bushel) more offered in Bahia Blanca. By the beginning of December, durums were sold at U\$S 62.50 per ton FOB (\$1.84 per bushel) Necochea for shipment to Italy. By the end of the year U\$S 75.25 (\$2.22 per bushel) were being paid by exporters per ton CIF Italy, January-February loading.

By the end of December the Buenos Aires Futures Market quoted hard wheat grade 1 at 1,411 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.18 per bushel) for January delivery, 1,446 (\$1.21 per bushel) for February, 1,495 (\$1.25 per bushel) for March and 1,520 (\$1.27 per bushel) for April. By mid January the futures prices had risen to 1,527 pesos (\$1.27 per bushel) for February delivery, 1,551 (\$1.29 per bushel) for March, 1,584 (\$1.32 per bushel) for April and 1,629 (\$1.36 per bushel) for May. At present, prices in the Futures Market are 1,515 pesos (\$1.26 per bushel) for February, 1,540 (\$1.29 per bushel) for March, 1,585 (\$1.32 per bushel) for April, and 1,635 (\$1.36 per bushel) for May. The present price in the Buenos Aires Cereal Exchange for grade 1 hard type is 1,480 pesos (\$1.24 per bushel) and 1,460 (\$1.22 per bushel) in Bahia Blanca. Durums are quoted at 1,615 pesos (\$1.35 per bushel) in Buenos Aires and 1,625 (\$1.36 per bushel) in Bahia Blanca.

CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

January 1

A report released by the United States Department of Agriculture indicated that <u>all wheat</u> in storage on January 1 totalled 1,208 million bushels, 15 per cent more than last year but otherwise the smallest January 1 holdings since 1953. Off-farm stocks, at 704 million bushels, were 10 per cent above January 1 last year and farm holdings, at 505 million bushels, were up 23 per cent.


According to a report from Mr. J.E.C. Gibson, Assistant Commercial Secretary, Canberra, rainfall was ideal during the first week of January but it was too late to be of any particular assistance to the current wheat crop. The estimated Australian wheat harvest for 1967-68 remains at about 260 million bushels.



According to a report from Mr. A.G. Glade, Agricultural Assistant, Buenos Aires, dry weather conditions which prevailed during the latter part of 1967 continued during the first few weeks of the new year. The Secretariat of Agriculture has to date published only a first official estimate of 7.8 million tons (286.6 million bushels). The trade continues to estimate a crop of closer to 7.5 million tons (275.6 million bushels) and even possibly slightly below this figure.

February 2

The Canadian Wheat Board in its Instructions to the Trade re Quotas (General) No. 18 stated in part that effective immediately at all delivery points within the designated area as a supplementary quota of five (5) bushels per seeded acre to rye as shown in the individual producer's delivery permit book, or two hundred and fifty (250) bushels, whichever quantity is the larger, is hereby authorized.
