

WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

World Wheat Exports
Lower than Previous Year

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the <u>four traditional major exporters</u> during the August-March period of the current crop year have amounted

to 907.7 million bushels, 16 per cent below the 1,074.2 million bushels exported during the same eight months in 1966-67 but exceeding by a margin of 9 per cent the ten-year (1956-57—1965-66) average shipments for the same period of 829.5 million. As indicated in the accompanying table, based on the Candian crop year the United States and Australia were higher this year than last, while those from Canada and Argentina were down sharply from the previous year.

World Wheat Supplies
Above Previous Year

Supplies of wheat held by the <u>four traditional major exporters</u> at April 1, 1968 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,828.3 million bushels

8 per cent above the 1,685.2 million at the same time a year ago. Although supplies were smaller in Australia this decrease was more than offset by increases in the totals for the United States, Canada and Argentina. Supplies at April 1, 1968, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 702.7 (588.4); Canada, 833.5 (753.2); Argentina, 112.5 (50.0); and Australia, 179.6 (293.6).

CANADIAN SITUATION

Wheat Supplies Below Record Level of Previous Year

Reflecting a sharp drop in production, which more than offset a substantial increase in carryover stocks, the 1967 wheat crop in Canada is placed at 592.9 million bushels, representing a decline of 28 per cent from the

record outturn of 827.3 million in 1966. At the same time, carryover stocks climbed by 37 per cent from 420.1 million at July 31, 1966 to 576.8 million in 1967. After deducting 160.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, estimated supplies available for export and for carryover during 1967-68 amount to 1,009.7 million bushels, 8 per cent less than the 1,092.1 million available in 1966-67.

August-March Exports Decline from Previous Year

Exports of wheat and flour in terms of wheat equivalent amounted to 176.2 million bushels during the August-March period of the current crop year compared with

the previous year's corresponding total of 338.9 million and the ten-year (1956-57—1965-66) average for the period of 240.0 million bushels. This year's exports consisted of 158.9 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 613 thousand of bagged seed and 16.6 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the comparable period last year these figures were 315.2 million of wheat in bulk, 603 thousand of bagged seed and 23.1 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on April 1, 1968 for export and for carryover amounted to 833.5 million bushels, 11 per cent above the April 1, 1967 total of 753.2 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to April 24 of the current crop year have amounted to 325.7 million bushels in contrast to 408.1 million marketed during the same period of the previous year.

Some 28.3 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the five weeks March 21 to April 24, 1968. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 33.5 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat decreased from 454.6 million at March 20, 1968 to a level of 450.1 million at April 24, 1968.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at April 24 this year represented an increase of 45 per cent over the 1967 comparable total of 311.5 million and was 50 per cent more than the 1966 figure of 299.6 million. Country elevator stocks, amounting to 258.8 million bushels, were 61 per cent above the 1967 comparable total of 160.4 million and 40 per cent more than the 185.1 million of two years ago. Wheat stocks at interior terminals at April 24, 1968, totalled 13.4 million bushels as against 13.5 million a year ago and only 1.0 million two years ago. The 20.1 million bushels "in transit rail" (western division) were above both the 1967 figure of 17.1 million and the 11.9 million of 1966. Supplies at the Lakehead, totalling some 64.7 million bushels, were 6 per cent above the 60.8 million at April 26, 1967 and 93 per cent larger than the 33.4 million at April 27, 1966. The 5.3 million bushels "in transit lake" were below both the 7.7 million in this position in 1967 and the 14.7 million at the same date in 1966. The 25.4 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were higher than both the 10.8 million of a year ago and the 8.8 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports at April 24, 1968, at 41.2 million bushels, almost doubled the 21.0 million of 1967 and registered an increase of 59 per cent over the 25.9 million of 1966. The 10.8 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were below the 11.5 million at April 26, 1967 but above the 9.3 million at April 27, 1966.

March 1968 Exports
of Wheat and Flour Total
23.6 Million Bushels

Combined exports of wheat in bulk, bagged seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, during March 1968 amounted to 23.6 million bushels, 12 per cent above the 21.1 million of the previous month, a decrease of 7 per cent from the 25.5 million of March 1967 and 6 per

cent smaller than the ten-year (1957-66) average for the month of March of 25.1 million. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Board of Grain Commissioners) during March 1968 totalled 21.4 million bushels, 13 per cent more than the February 1968 total of 18.9 million, 2 per cent above the ten-year average of 21.0 million but 2 per cent lower than the 21.7 million of a year ago. Based on Canadian Customs returns, the equivalent of 2.0 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during March 1968, some 4 per cent below the previous month's figure of 2.1 million, 45 per cent lower than the adjusted total of 3.7 million of March 1967 and 37 per cent less than the ten-year average of 3.2 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-March period of the current crop year amounted to 158.9 million bushels, 50 per cent lower than the 315.2 million shipped during the first eight months of 1966-67 and 25 per cent less than the ten-year average for the period of 212.5 million. This year's shipment of wheat to Britain totalled some 43.5 million bushels and accounted for 27 per cent of the current eight-month total as compared to 42.2 million the previous year and accounted for 13 per cent of the August-March total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during the first eight months of 1967-68, with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels; Japan, 24.0 (39.4); U.S.S.R. (Russia), 22.2 (66.9); Communist China, 19.8 (70.5); Federal Republic of Germany, 12.2 (12.5); Belgium and Luxembourg, 6.8 (10.6); Italy, 5.5 (5.8); Netherlands, 4.2 (1.7); and Cuba, 3.7 (5.6).

Cumulative exports of bagged seed wheat during August-March of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 613 thousand bushels compared with last year's comparable total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 603 thousand.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during August 1967—March 1968, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 16.6 million bushels of wheat, 28 per cent lower than the adjusted August-March 1966-67 total of 23.1 million bushels. Cuba's purchases, the leading market for Canadian wheat flour during the period under review, amounted to the equivalent of 7.2 million bushels and accounted for 44 per cent of the August 1967 - March 1968 total. During the comparable period of 1966-67 shipments to Cuba amounted to 9.0 million and accounted for 39 per cent of the eight-month total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the August-March period of the 1967-68 crop year, with revised data for the same months of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in thousands of bushels: Britain, 2,208 (4,173); Jamaica, 948 (1,046); Ghana, 931 (857); Ceylon, 860 (1,049); Israel, 544 (nil); and Leeward and Windward Islands, 539 (666).

General Quota Position

By April 29, 1968 out of a total of 1,880 shipping points in the Western division, the Canadian Wheat Board had placed 437 points on a delivery quota of 6 bushels per specified acre, 823 points on a 5-bushel quota and 534 points were on a 4-bushel quota. Of the remainder 56

points were on a 3-bushel quota and 30 stations were reported as "closed".

Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain

Total shipments of the five major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to April 24 this year amounted to 14.0 million bushels, 23 per cent below the 18.0

million shipped during the same period in 1967. In 1968 the season of navigation opened on April 10 while the 1967 season opened on April 13. Shipments of wheat, at 10.5 million were 21 per cent above the 1967 figure of 8.8 million bushels and accounted for 75 per cent of the total.

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, April 24, 1968 Compared with Approximately the Same Date, 1966 and 1967



FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES








EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS*




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES



EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF CANADA'S SIX MAJOR GRAINS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during March 1968 amounted to 3,328,000 hundredweight, representing an increase of 9 per cent over the February 1968 total of 3,056,000 hundredweight, but 13 per cent below the adjusted March 1967 figure of 3,809,000 hundredweight, and 7 per cent less than the ten-year (1958-67) average production for the month of March of 3,576,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during March 1968 had a total rated capacity of 150,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 85.6 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during March 1968 amounted to 7,459,000 bushels, 10 per cent above the 6,809,000 bushels milled during the preceding month, but 12 per cent below the 8,442,000 bushels milled during March 1967. Of the wheat milled for flour during March 1968 some 6,411,000 bushels were Western Canadian spring wheat (other than durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (640,000 bushels); durum (338,000 bushels); and all other (70,000 bushels).

Exports According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during March 1968 amounted to 881,000 hundredweight (some 2,026,000 bushels of wheat equivalent) 4 per cent less than the 2,111,000 bushels exported during the previous month, and 45 per cent below the adjusted March 1967 exports of 3,663,000 bushels. Flour shipments during the month went to forty-five countries, with exports to Cuba amounting to 1,244,000 bushels of wheat equivalent and accounting for 61 per cent of the March 1968 total. Other principal markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month, with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: Britain, 200; Jamaica, 111; Leeward and Windward Islands, 92; Algeria, 53; and United States, 42.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

1967-68 Wheat Supplies 6 Per Cent Above Previous Year Although carryover stocks declined this decrease was more than offset by an increase in production and, as a result, total domestic wheat supplies in the United States for the current crop year are placed at 1,949.4

million bushels compared with the 1966-67 total of 1,846.9 million. The 425.0 million bushels carried over at July 1, 1967 were the lowest stocks in 15 years, while the 1967 crop, estimated at 1,524.3 million bushels, represented an increase of 16 per cent over the previous year's outturn of 1,311.7 million. Domestic disappearance during 1967-68 estimated at about 655.0 million bushels, is 4 per cent less than the 681.4 million the year before. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,295.0 million remain available for export and for carryover, an increase of 11 per cent over the 1,167.0 million in 1966-67.

Exports Higher than Previous Year

Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period July 1967 - March 1968 amounted to 592.3 million bushels, an increase of 2 per cent over

the 578.6 million exported during the same months last year. The balance remaining on April 1, 1968 for export and for carryover was estimated at 702.7 million bushels compared with 588.4 million on the same date a year ago.

United States Department of Agriculture stated that winter wheat generally wintered well. Rain and snow in March and early April improved moisture in many dry areas, and above normal temperatures over the country got the crop off to a favourable start. Winter wheat production is now estimated at 1,219 million bushels, 1 per cent above the December forecast, fractionally above the 1967 crop, and 26 per cent above average. In the past decade, the average change in estimates of U.S. production from April 1 to harvest has been 66 million bushels, ranging from 10 to 210 million bushels in individual years.

As of April 1 crop conditions pointed to a yield of 24.5 bushels per seeded acre, compared with 22.3 bushels in 1967. The 5-year average is of 22.7 bushels per acre. Acreage for harvest is estimated at 43.6 million acres. This would be 87.6 per cent of the seeded acreage, compared with 84.0 per cent in 1967 and the average of 86.0 per cent.

Seeding went into the winter in good condition in most areas of the country, and winter loss was generally light. Late season snows over the Southern Great Plains maintained the good moisture supplies of the past 3 months. Condition of the wheat crop in Kansas varies greatly. Moisture supplies are low over much of western Kansas. Most of Oklahoma has adequate soil moisture with early April rains particularly helpful. The crop in Nebraska wintered well. Winds and dryness in March were detrimental, but early April rains improved prospects. Wheat condition was good in Texas, growth was excellent, but the northern High Plains will need rain soon for continued crop development. East of the Mississippi River the crop in the Northern areas generally wintered well, despite the light snow cover and exposure to deep frost and extreme cold. In the Central and Southeastern States, seedings overwintered in fair to good condition. In the Northern Great Plains, except South Dakota, winter loss was light; and the crop got off to a fair start, although moisture will be needed shortly. In South Dakota, the crop was in poor condition on April 1 reflecting late seedings on dry soil with little fall growth. In Montana, the crop overwintered with little damage. Snow cover was adequate in December and January, when temperatures were lowest. Above normal temperatures in March greened up seedings early but reduced topsoil moisture. Subsoil moisture generally was adequate over the State. In the Pacific Northwest, condition of the crop varied. Idaho seedings were in good condition with a favourable moisture situation. Washington crop prospects were good although plant growth was uneven due to late fall emergence. In Oregon the crop is in good condition, despite lack of winter moisture in some areas. February rains improved stands, but additional moisture is needed.

Wheat Stocks on Farms

April 1 stocks of all wheat on farms totalled 360 million

bushels, about 50 per cent more than last year, and about

two-thirds more than average. April 1 wheat stocks were 23.6 per cent of total 1967

production. Disappearance of wheat from farms during January-March totalled 145

million bushels, down 15 per cent from a year earlier, but 3 per cent above the 5
year average.

<u>Durum Wheat</u> stocks on farms in Minnesota, the Dakotas, and Montana totalled 31 million bushels on April 1—9 per cent above a year earlier and 5 per cent above the average. Most of the stocks were in North Dakota. Disappearance from farms during January-March totalled 15 million bushels compared with 11 million bushels last year. This is second largest disappearance for the April quarter in 7 years of records.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Wheat Supplies
Decline from
Previous Year

Reflecting the effect of a sharp decline in production, which more than offset a substantial increase in carry-over stocks, total supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1967-68 crop year are estimated at 357.8 million

bushels as against 483.2 million in 1966-67. The current harvest, presently estimated at 277.4 million bushels, is 41 per cent below the previous record of 466.6 million bushels harvested in 1966-67. Carryover stocks, at a record 80.4 million bushels, exceeded by a wide margin the 16.6 million at December 1, 1966. After deducting some 108.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 249.8 million are available for export and for carryover during 1967-68, some 37 per cent below the 393.7 million in 1966-67.

Exports Lower
Than Previous Year

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1—March 23 of the current Australian crop year amounted to

70.2 million bushels, considerably lower than the 100.1 million exported during the corresponding four months of the 1966-67 crop year. The balance remaining on March 24, 1968 for export and for carryover, at 179.6 million bushels, was in sharp contrast to the comparable 1967 total of 293.6 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. J.E.G. Gibson, Assistant Commercial Secretary for Canada, Canberra, under date of April 11, 1968 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.E. Ryan, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture) Buenos Aires, under date of April 24, 1968 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce. Where possible conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

Weather Weather conditions during the month of March were favourable throughout the grain belt. Rain fell when it was needed in most regions, and the temperature remained at seasonal levels. The soil was therefore in good condition and the sowing of winter grains to be used as dual purpose lots has become widespread.

Wheat There has been no further official estimate of the 1967-68 crop from that of February which quoted 7.4 million metric tons (271.9 million bushels). There is still considerable conjecture among trade, as to what the size of the crop will be, but many feel that there will have to be a downward adjustment in the official forecast.

The first contract with Brazil under the recently negotiated million ton (36,743,000 bushels) agreement for 1968 was finalized during early April. The first contract calls for a supply of 350,000 metric tons (12,860,000 bushels) to be shipped during April-June at a price of U\$S 57.52 per metric ton (\$1.69 per bushel) FOB Buenos Aires. Of the total it is expected that 120,000 tons (4,409,000 bushels) will be shipped during April and 115,000 (4,225,000 bushels) in each of May and June.

Outside of the Brazilian contract, there has been very little wheat sold for export during the period under review. The price at which the National Grain Board is releasing stocks to the trade is said to be of about U\$S 2.00 per ton (6 cents per bushel) over world prices, and this has effectively hindered future sales. In fact, because of the lack of movement during recent weeks there is now discussion as to the size of surplus which Argentina may have by the end of the crop year. The National Grain Board as of April 4 had purchased 2,118,623 million tons (77,845,000 bushels) of wheat from producers. Availabilities for export as of December 1, 1967 are calculated at 3.4 million tons (124,927,000 bushels). If from this the Brazilian contract is deducted as well as the lesser sales to Chile and Peru, and allowing for a possible reserve of 500,000 metric tons (18,372,000 bushels), there would appear to be from between 500,000 to one million tons, (18,372,000 bushels to 36,743,000 bushels) of wheat available for placing in export markets. It is reported that negotiations continue with China in the hopes of placing a further quantity in that market, and that a trade mission may shortly visit Argentina to discuss future sales. There was some decline in price during March; by mid month 1,540 pesos per 160 kilos (\$1.30 per bushel) were being paid in the Buenos Aires Futures market for April delivery; 1,590 (\$1.34 per bushel) for May, 1,650 (\$1.39 per bushel) for June and 1,689 pesos (\$1.43 per bushel), was quoted for July delivery. By the end of the month, prices had further declined, with 1,562 pesos (\$1.32 per bushel) quoted for May, 1,609 (\$1.36 per bushel) for June and 1,649 (\$1.39 per bushel) for July. At present the Futures market is quoting 1,620 pesos (\$1.37 per bushel) for May delivery, 1,660 (\$1.40 per bushel) for June, 1,690 (\$1.43 per bushel) for July and 1,740 (\$1.47 per bushel) for August. The average price paid by the Grain Board for purchases of present crop wheat has been 1,579 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.33 per bushel), slightly above the 1,500 pesos (\$1.27 per bushel) support level. New minimum and support prices for wheat and other grains are expected to be announced shortly for the coming crop year.

Present prices in the Cereals Exchange are: for hard wheat Grade 1, FOR Buenos Aires 1,600 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.35 per bushel); for semi-hard 1,560 (\$1.32 per bushel); and for durums, 1,820 pesos (\$1.54 per bushel). Prices at Bahia Blanca for similar grades are quoted at 1,480 pesos, 1,440 and 1,700 pesos per 100 kilos (\$1.25, \$1.22 and \$1.43 per bushel) for the respective grades.

Now that data is available on the regional production, it is interesting to note what is happening to the wheat industry in the province of El Chaco. In 1962-63 some 1,600 metric tons (59,000 bushels) of wheat were harvested in the entire province. Last year, notwithstanding the fact that nearly 50 per cent of seeded area was abandoned due to unfavourable weather conditions, total production reached 70,000 metric tons (2,572,000 bushels). The increased importance of El Chaco as a wheat producing region reflects the joint efforts of both the provincial Government and the National Grain Board in diversifying the basically one crop cotton economy of the province. With the results obtained to date it would appear that wheat will continue to grow in importance and that the area sown will again increase in 1968-09. The Argentine Government, among other reasons, is interested in promoting production in Chaco because of the early harvest. Production in this area is ready for combining by mid October, whereas in the traditional northern grain belt the harvest begins a month to six weeks later. Thus, the Chaco production could help compensate for any shortages which might occur, as was the case near the end of the 1966-67 crop year.

GRAIN SITUATION IN BRITAIN

The following account of the current crop situation in Britain has been extracted from a report by Mr. F.G. Beaudette, Assistant Commercial Secretary, London, under date of April 18, 1968, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Trade and Commerce.

Weather and Crops

March was very windy throughout the country with the first half of the month rather dry, but followed by unsettled weather. Central and Southern England was again dry and warm by late March and early April. Autumn-sown crops have wintered well and look promising. Spring cultivations have progressed faster than usual with drilling of spring cereals almost completed in some areas. Germination was slow due to low soil temperatures, and the severe blowing in fenland and light soil areas had necessitated some redrilling in the eastern counties.

Requirements and Supplies

The Home-Crown Cereals Authority has reduced its estimate for home-grown "other coarse grains" by 50,000 long tons for 1967-68. This is due to a change in Scotland's oats production estimate.

Other changes in supply/requirements estimates for 1967-68 have been made as follows:

- a further reduction of 50,000 long tons (2,333,000 bushels) in estimated human consumption of barley. This reflects the latest maltster/distiller position in which barley intake in the crop year to the end of February is 105,000 tons, (4,900,000 bushels) below last year's. This reduction in barley consumption offsets the Scottish oats production decrease, leaving the estimated coarse grains stock build-up at the end of the crop year unchanged at 350,000 long tons.

- the wheat import estimates have been raised by 50,000 long tons (1,867,000 ushels) giving a stock build-up of the same amount by the end of the cereal year. hese figures have to be viewed in the context of low-priced continental wheats currently affecting UK price levels.

Other comments on utilization in this crop year to end of February compared o last year can be summarized as follows:

- barley fed on farms down 95,000 tons (4,433,000 bushels)
- barley taken by compounder up 215,000 tons (10,033,000 bushels)
- wheat taken by compounder up 80,000 tons (2,987,000 bushels)
- domestic wheat taken by millers up 40,000 tons (1,493,000 bushels)-it sexpected that millers may use 100,000 tons (3,733,000 bushels) more UK wheat this crop year over 1966-67.
- total disappearance of domestic grain only 20,000 tons more in February .968 than in February 1967.
- growing fears that the apparent stock build-up may affect the market at the 1968 harvest.

According to MAFF, stocks of grain on farms at the end of February were estimated at 4.68 million long tons, comprising wheat 1.47 million tons (54.9 million bushels), barley 2.75 (128.3 million bushels) and oats 460,000 (30,306,000 bushels) as compared with 1.19 million (44.4 million bushels), 2.37 million (110.6 million bushels) and 350,000 long tons (23,059,000 bushels), respectively, for the previous February.

MAFF has announced that the advance deficiency payment on wheat for the third accounting period (December 1, 1967 to January 31, 1968) for the 1967-68 cereal year will be 3s 4d per long cwt. (23 cents per bushel). Payment will be made on about 560,000 long tons (20,907,000 bushels) of millable wheat qualifying during the period and in addition on the mational millable content of about 1,000 long tons (37,000 bushels) of wheat not millable solely by reason of excess moisture. An amount of 2.7d per long cwt. (1.5¢ per bushel) will be deducted in respect of levy payable to the Home-Grown Cereals Authority.

English wheats have continued in quiet demand and prices were again barely held at recent levels. In London prompt and May delivery soft milling traded down to 21/9 per long cwt. (\$1.52 per bushel) and June delivery sold at 22/6 (\$1.57); hard wheats were valued at 22/3 (\$1.56) to 22/9 (\$1.59), with feeding neglected and nominally quoted at 21/9 to 22/3 per long cwt. (\$1.52 to \$1.56 per bushel). Prices from 23/0 to 24/4 1/2 (\$1.25 to \$1.33 per bushel) were paid in London for malting barleys for forward deliveries, with feed barley bought for prompt and May delivery at 21/6 per long cwt. (\$1.17 per bushel). Feed barley for export was quoted at £21 5 Od per long ton (\$1.18 per bushel) f.o.b. East Coast for April delivery and £21 12 6d per long ton (\$1.20 per bushel) for May and June delivery.

The H.G.C.A.'s ex-farm guide prices remain the same at £21 10 Od per long ton for millable wheat and £21 O Od for feeding barley (\$1.50 and \$1.17 per bushel, respectively) for April-May delivery.

CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

March 20

A release from the United States Department of Agriculture re: Preliminary Final Report Issued on 1968 Wheat Program Signup: On the basis of State preliminary estimates of final signup returns for the 1968 wheat program, 837,057 farms plan to participate, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced. The signed farms have 50.4 million acres in wheat allotments, representing 85 per cent of the national allotment of 59.3 million acres. The portion of the national allotment acreage on the signed farms is a new record percentage. The previous record of 84.5 per cent of the national allotment on signed farms was established in 1967.

April 10

The 1968 season of navigation opened at the Canadian Lakehead.

According to a report published by the Crop Reporting Board, U.S.D.A. the 1968 winter wheat crop in the United States is estimated at 1,219 million bushels, one per cent above the December forecast, fractionally above the 1967 crop, and 26 per cent above average.

May 8

According to a telegraphic crop report, published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, seeding is well advanced in southern areas of the Prairie Provinces and is expected to be general in most districts this week. Recent rains have improved moisture conditions in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Northern Alberta. Pasture growth, which is fair in Manitoba, has been restricted in the other two provinces by low temperatures.
