



WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

World Wheat Exports

Continue at Record Level

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the four traditional major exporters during the August-May period of the current crop year have amounted to 1,757.3 million bushels, 44 percent larger than the 1,219.9 million bushels exported during the same ten months in 1971-72 and 42 percent more than the ten-year (1961-62 - 1970-71) average shipments for the same period of 1,236.1 million. As indicated in the accompanying table, based on the Canadian crop year, exports from Canada, United States and Argentina were higher this year than last, while shipments from Australia were below

at June 1, 1973 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 1,163.0 million bushels, a decrease of 37 per cent from the 1,850.8 million at the same time a year ago. Supplies declined in Canada, Australia and United States from those of the previous year while supplies in Argentina were higher. Supplies at June 1, 1973, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: Canada, 498.7 (694.4); Australia, 70.5 (167.2); United States, 520.7 (939.2); and Argentina, 73.1 (50.0).

August - May Exports

CANADIAN SITUATION

Total estimated supplies of Canadian wheat for the 1972-73 than Previous Year (August — July) crop year are placed at 1,123.0 million bushels consisting of the August 1 carryover of 589.8 million and the 1972 crop, placed at 533.3 million bushels reflecting a 20 per cent decline in carryover stocks which more than offset a small increase in production. Supplies of the size indicated represent a decrease of 11 per cent from the 1971-72 total of 1,263.7 million. After making an allowance of 160.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1972-73 amount to 963.0 million bushels, 12 per cent less than the 1,093.5 million in 1971-72.

Remain at Record Level during the first ten months of the current crop year amounted to 464.3 million bushels, 16 per cent above the August 1971 — May 1972 total of 399.1 million and 38 per cent more than the ten-year (1961-62 — 1970-71) average for the period of 336.2 million bushels. This year's exports consisted of 444.7 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 0.3 million of seed and 19.3 million of flour in terms of wheat. During the comparable period last year these figures were 377.6 million of wheat in bulk, 0.8 million of seed and 20.6 million of flour in wheat equivalent. The balance remaining on June 1, 1973 for export and for carryover amounted to 498.7 million bushels, 28 per cent below the June 1, 1972 total of 694.4 million.

Marketings, Disappearance and Visible Supplies

Total primary deliveries of wheat (both east and west) up to June 6 of the current crop year have amounted to 479.3 million bushels compared with 375.9 million

marketed during the same period of the previous year. Some 20.7 million bushels of this year's total were delivered during the four weeks May 10 to June 6, 1973. During the same period the volume of Canadian wheat entering domestic and export channels amounted to 56.0 million bushels. As a result, the total visible supply of Canadian wheat decreased from 247.1 million at May 9, 1973 to a level of 212.0 million at June 6, 1973.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at June 6 this year represented a decline from both the 255.0 million of the previous year and the 310.0 million of two years ago. Primary elevator stocks, amounting to 106.4 million bushels, were 32 per cent below the 1972 comparable total of 157.6 million and 51 per cent less than the 216.0 million of 1971. Wheat stocks at interior terminals at June 6, 1973 totalled 2.6 million bushels, in contrast to both the 4.9 million of a year ago and the 6.9 of two years ago. The 23.1 million bushels "in transit rail" (western division) this year, were considerably above the 12.2 million of 1972 and 33 per cent more than the 17.4 million in this position in 1971. Supplies at the Lakehead, totalling some 27.9 million bushels, increased by 14 per cent over the 24.6 million of 1972 and 40 per cent higher than the 20.0 million of 1971. The 6.2 million bushels "in transit lake" were 38 per cent lower than the 10.0 million in this position in 1972 and 6 per cent less than the 6.6 million of 1971. The 12.1 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were above the 10.8 million of a year ago but slightly lower than the 12.4 million of two years ago.

Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports at June 6, 1973, at 21.8 million bushels, registered a 7 per cent increase over the comparable 1972 figure of 20.4 million and were 40 per cent more than the 1971 total of 15.6 million. The 5.5 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were lower than both the 9.0 million at the comparable date in 1972 and the 6.8 million in 1971.

May 1973 Exports
of Wheat and Flour Total
53.8 Million Bushels

Combined exports of wheat in bulk, seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent, during May 1973 amounted to 53.8 million bushels, 64 per cent greater than the 32.8 million of the previous month, 31 per cent

more than the 41.2 million of May 1972 and 21 per cent above the ten-year (1962-71) average for the month of May of 44.5 million. Exports of wheat in bulk (as reported by the Canadian Grain Commission) during May 1973 totalled 51.9 million bushels, up 66 per cent over the April 1973 total of 31.3 million, and also registered increases of 32 per cent and 24 per cent, respectively, over the 39.3 million of the previous year and the ten-year average of 42.0 million. It is estimated that the equivalent of 1.9 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during May 1973, some 21 per cent above the previous month's figure of 1.5 million. These exports while slightly less than the May 1972 figure were 24 per cent lower than the ten-year average of 2.4 million bushels.

Cumulative exports of wheat in bulk during the August-May period of the current crop year amounted to 444.7 million bushels, 18 per cent above the 377.6 million shipped during the first ten months of 1971-72 and 44 per cent more than the tenyear average for the period of 307.8 million. The People's Republic of China and U.S.S.R. (Russia) were the leading markets for wheat in bulk during the first ten months of the current crop year with shipments amounting to 133.0 million and 123.5 million bushels, respectively, and accounted for 30 per cent and 28 per cent of the August-May 1972-73 total. During the same months of 1971-72 shipments to the People's Republic of China and U.S.S.R. (Russia) were 82.4 million bushels (22 per cent of total) and 87.0 million bushels (23 per cent of total), respectively. Other principal importers of Canadian wheat for the first ten months of the current crop year with figures for the same period of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: Japan, 40.7 (42.5); Britain, 35.4 (38.6); India, 16.2 (23.0); Italy, 11.6 (12.9); Brazil, 8.3 (10.3); Germany West, 7.1 (8.5); Cuba, 6.7 (5.9); Bangladesh, 6.3 (1.1); Philippines, 5.9 (5.8); and Pakistan, 5.6 (2.7)

Cumulative exports of seed wheat during August-May of the current crop year, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 0.3 million bushels as against last year's August-May total(adjusted to remove time lag) of 0.8 million.

Cumulative exports of wheat flour during the first ten months of the 1972-73 crop year, based on Customs returns, were the equivalent of 19.3 million bushels of wheat, 6 per cent less than the adjusted August-May 1971-72 total of 20.6 million and 28 per cent below the 10-year average for the period of 26.8 million.

Exports of wheat flour by countries for August-May 1972-73 based on Customs data, are not available at this time.

Delivery Changes for Special Permit Holders Announced On June 11, 1973, Mr. C.E. Gordon Earl, Executive Director of The Canadian Wheat Board, announced a change in delivery requirements for certain persons holding Special Wheat Board Delivery permits.

There are a number of categories for which The Canadian Wheat Board will issue Special Delivery Permits. Two of these are farm estates and producers who have discontinued farming operations but still own grain for delivery in the future.

With the change in policy Special Permit holders in the two categories specified will not be required to deliver all of their grain under the open quotas that are in effect for the remainder of this crop year. In the past, Special Permits for the balance of the grain being held were renewed only if the person or persons involved had taken full advantage of delivery quotas in the previous crop year.

"We know, however, that quite a number of our Special Permit holders, particularly farmers who are fully retired, use the grain they are carrying over from year to year as a form of income annuity," Mr. Earl said.

"To require producers in this position to deliver all the grain they have left under the open quotas, could impose an undue hardship in many cases, "Mr. Earl said. "For this reason Special Permits will be renewed for persons who fall into this category."

Mr. Earl added, however, that there are other categories of Special Permit holders, including producers still engaged in farming, who have received Special Permits because of reduced delivery opportunities through the sale or cash rental of part of their landholdings. These Special Permit holders will be expected to complete the deliveries authorized by their Special Permits within the current crop year.

General Quotas 1972-73 as at Monday, June 18, 1973

As of this date, all grains in all blocks are on an open quota.

These quotas also apply to the special quotas, but in cases of selected oats and barley a permit for each car to be shipped is still required.

Although the open quota is in effect, the following quotas are still effective pending their cancellation.

In the event of a cancellation of an open quota in any block, the prior quota is still effective.

Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain

Total shipments of the six major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to June 6 this year amounted to 106.5 million bushels, 7 per cent below the 114.9

million shipped during the same period in 1972. The 1973 season of navigation opened on March 30 while the 1972 season opened on April 14. Shipments of wheat, at 67.0 million were 26 per cent above the 1972 figure of 53.0 million bushels and accounted for 63 per cent of the total.

Visible Supply of Canadian Wheat, June 6,1973 Compared with Approximately the Same Date, 1971 and 1972








FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF WHEAT, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN WHEAT* AND WHEAT FLOUR**




FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF BARLEY, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN BARLEY AND BARLEY PRODUCTS* (SPECIFIED PERIODS)



FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF OATS, PRAIRIE PROVINCES




EXPORTS OF CANADIAN OATS* AND OAT PRODUCTS** (SPECIFIED PERIODS)


FARMERS' MARKETINGS OF CANADA'S SIX MAJOR GRAINS*, PRAIRIE PROVINCES

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during May 1973 amounted to 3,317,000 hundredweight, representing an increase of 15 per cent over the 2,890,000 hundredweight produced in April 1973, one per cent above the ten-year (1963-72) average production for the month of May of 3,277,000 hundredweight, but 5 percent less than the adjusted May 1972 total of 3,485,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during May 1973 had a total rated capacity of 165,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 26-day working period 77.4 per cent of this rated capacity was effective. Wheat milled for flour during May 1973 amounted to 7,500,000 bushels 15 per cent higher than the 6,544,000 bushels milled during the preceding month but 4 per cent less than the 7,840,000 bushels milled during May 1972. Of the wheat milled for flour during May 1973 some 6,026,000 bushels were Western Canadian red spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (664,000 bushels); Durum (544,000 bushels); and all others (266,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during April 1973 amounted to the equivalent of 1,525,000 bushels (some 663,000 hundredweight of flour), 27 per cent lower than the March 1973 exports of 2,099,000 bushels and 17 per cent lower than the adjusted April 1972 exports of 1,840,000 bushels. Flour shipments during April 1973 went to thirty-six countries with exports to Cuba amounting to 582,000 bushels or 38 per cent of the April total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: Sri-Lanka, 467; Haiti, 93; Dominican Republic, 58; Leeward and Windward Islands, 50; and Britain, 34.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supplies Highest in Last Decade With an increase in carryover stocks more than offsetting a decline in production total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1972-73 (July-June) crop year are placed at 2,409.6 million bushels, 3 per cent more than the previous year's total of 2,348.0 million. Carryover stocks at July 1, 1972 estimated at 864.8 million bushels, were 18 per cent above last year's stocks of 730.2 million, while the 1972 production at 1,544.8 million declined by 5 per cent from the 1971 outturn of 1,617.8 million. Domestic disappearance during the 1972-73 crop year is estimated at about 826.0 million bushels, 3 per cent less than the 851.6 million of last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,583.7 million remain available for export and for carryover, slightly more than the 1,496.6 million in 1971-72.

Exports at Exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period July-May 1972-73 amounted to 1,063.0 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the 557.5 million exported during the comparable months last year. The balance remaining on June 1, 1973 for export and for carry-over was estimated at 520.7 million bushels compared with 939.2 million on the same date a year ago.

Summary of the
Wheat Situation
Service, United States Department of Agriculture stated that
record demand in 1972-73 and the elimination of required setaside have encouraged farmers to grow more wheat. Early indications point to a
record 1973 crop of 1,736 million bushels, up 12 per cent from last year.

A larger harvested acreage and the second highest yield on record will likely result in an estimated record 1973 winter wheat crop of 1,282 million bushels, up 8 per cent from a year ago. Favourable moisture improved prospects in the Great Plains and the Hard Red Winter (HRW) wheat crop may total a record 920 million bushels. Other classes won't do so well. Above normal rainfall continued to plague wheat in most States east of the Mississippi. The Soft Red Winter (SRW) crop may be down 20-25 per cent from last year's 227 million bushels. Winterkill hit the White Wheat crop in the Pacific Northwest, especially Washington, and despite reseeding, the crop is likely to slip slightly to around 200 million bushels. Dry weather and an early spring put seeding of spring wheat well ahead of schedule. The indicated 21 per cent increase in acreage and favourable growing conditions would result in crops of around 350 million bushels of Hard Red Spring (HRS) and 90 million bushels of Durum.

Wheat disappearance in 1972-73, buoyed by record exports, is estimated to reach an all-time high of 1,976 million bushels. This exceeds the 1972 crop of 1,545 million bushels, reducing wheat stocks to around 435 million bushels by summer, the smallest since 1967. CCC stocks are virtually all committed and loans on all wheat are maturing, so most of this summer's wheat stocks will be in private hands.

Wheat supplies will be down a tenth in 1973-74, to 2.2 billion bushels, because of sharply reduced stocks.

Demand for wheat also will likely be smaller next season. Higher prices will limit early season feeding and total domestic use. A bigger world wheat crop will probably slow our export pace.

The small carryover in prospect is making farm wheat prices extremely sensitive to trade and crop developments. Recent month-to-month swings have been as wide as 41 cents per bushel. Mid-April farm prices averaged \$2.15 per bushel, 58 per cent higher than a year ago. Prices will likely ease from this level during the rest of 1972-73 as the record crop is harvested and farmer-owned stocks flow out of loan.

Acreage enrolled in the 1973 Wheat Program accounted for 94 per cent of the eligible national domestic allotment of 18.5 million acres. Although required set-aside was eliminated last January, 7.2 million acres were still signed up for set-aside, including 3.4 million required and 3.8 million voluntary. Participation was heaviest in the Northern Plains States.

Early indications point to a record world wheat crop in 1973-74, up 5 to 10 per cent from a year ago. The increase is mainly attributed to anticipated larger crops in Australia, Canada, the Soviet Union, and the United States. Assuming normal crop conditions in importing countries, world trade is likely to drop from this year's estimated record of 69 million metric tons. USSR imports will probably be the most important factor.

In the absence of enacted legislation to follow the Agricultural Act of 1970, a marketing quota of 1,692 million bushels and a national allotment of 58.0 million acres have been announced for the 1974 wheat crop.

Wheat Prospects

According to a release on June 8, 1973 by the Crop Reporting
Board of the United States Department of Agriculture the 1973

winter wheat production is forecast at 1,316 million bushels, 11 per cent above a
year earlier and 15 per cent above the 1971 crop. The June 1 forecast is 3 per cent
above a month earlier as normal to below normal temperatures in the Great Plains
slowed maturity but provided favourable conditions for filling. Soil moisture
supplies were adequate in the Plains but short in the Pacific Northwest.

Changes in the production forecasts between June 1 and harvest have averaged 38 million bushels for the past decade, ranging from negligible to 96 million bushels. In 4 of the 10 years, the June forecast was above the final by an average of 23 million and 6 times it was below by an average of 49 million. Indicated yield per harvested acre is 35.2 bushels, compared with the 34.0 bushels in 1972 and the record high yield of 35.4 bushels in 1971.

Prospects for the Kansas wheat crop improved during May. Although rainfall during the month was below normal over most of the western two-thirds of the State, a plentiful top and subsoil moisture supply at the beginning of the month was favorable for continued good to excellent growth. High winds on May 27, especially in the western third, caused a minimum of lodging. Development is later than last year with only 7 per cent turning colour about June 1, compared with 20 per cent about the same date a year earlier. Harvest should begin about mid-June.

Only a few Oklahoma fields were harvested by June 1, somewhat later than the year before. High winds on May 27 caused some shattering. The Texas wheat harvest was only 5 per cent complete, compared with 25 per cent a year earlier. Prospects on the High Plains are excellent. The Nebraska crop is mostly headed. Above normal precipitation in May was favourable for continued good development of the crop. Damage from rust and mosaic is evident in some fields. Prospects improved in Colorado, although crop development is slightly behind last year and normal. Soil moisture supplies are generally sufficient for continued favourable development except for a few local areas. Soil moisture supplies are adequate to surplus in the winter wheat areas of South Dakota. Maturity during May was slowed by occasional frost and cool temperatures. Slightly over half of the crop had advanced to the boot, somewhat behind normal progress.

Prospects for normal growth of the winter wheat crop remain favourable in eastern and south central Montana where rain was received during May. In the central portions of the State, soil moisture supplies were short. General rains the last week of May were favourable for the Idaho wheat crop, particularly north Idaho where spring rains have been below normal. Most of the crop was in the boot stage about June 1 and heads were showing in about 20 per cent of the fields. The extremely dry situation in Washington was relieved somewhat by rains the latter part of May. Although beneficial, the moisture was inadequate to offset the accumulative moisture shortage. Prospects for the Willamette Valley crop in Oregon remain very favourable. However, the continued lack of moisture in the Columbia Basin area is adversely affecting the outlook for the State. Harvest is underway in the San Joaquin Valley of California and excellent yields are being obtained.

Prospective production on June 1 in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, was unchanged from a month earlier. In Indiana crop progress is about normal with 75 per cent of the fields headed and some southern fields beginning to ripen. In Illinois nearly all fields are headed and early fields in the south are turning colour. Prospects improved slightly in Michigan, although excessive water was unfavourable for growth in low areas. Wheat prospects declined in Missouri and the crop remains in fair condition. Maturity advanced during May with about one-fourth turning colour by the end of the month, compared with nearly one-half a year earlier. Prospective production declined slightly in New York and Arkansas from a month earlier and remained unchanged in Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Arizona. Prospects improved in Kentucky.

Seeding of 1973 spring wheat was generally completed at earlier than normal dates and well ahead of last year. However, the advantage of an early start was partially offset by soil moisture shortages in most areas. Additional precipitation is needed if present prospects are to be maintained.

Planting of spring wheat in Minnesota made rapid progress and was completed by mid-May, a week to 10 days ahead of normal. Nearly all seeded acreage had emerged by June 1 and the crop was generally in satisfactory condition. Rains in late May replenished topsoil moisture. Seeding in North Dakota was about a week ahead of normal during the entire planting season and by June 1 virtually all spring wheat was in the ground. Dry, cool weather was not favourable for early growth but by June 1 early fields were jointing. Topsoil moisture was short in one-fourth of the counties, mainly in the north central area. Dryness during the month was most serious in central and eastern areas of the State. Rain received in late May and early June relieved the situation temporarily. Wild oats have been a problem this year in both North Dakota and Minnesota and application of herbicides has been common.

South Dakota's spring wheat was near the normal stage of development around June 1. Most major growing areas had enough moisture to bring the crop along but moisture reserves are low. Spring wheat in Montana was in good condition in most areas with recent rains aiding growth. However, the crop in the central areas was in only fair condition where moisture was in short supply. Seeding was completed by the end of May, about the normal date. Spring wheat conditions in Idaho were variable as of June 1. At lower elevations, spring wheat was headed while in some higher altitude areas, planting was still continuing. Soil moisture was short in northern areas but in ample supply in nonirrigated counties of eastern Idaho.

Heavier than normal abandonment of winter wheat acreage in Washington resulted in considerable replanting to spring wheat. Lack of moisture early in the season adversely affected the development of the crop. Rain in late May increased prospects considerably but additional rain is badly needed. A dry spring allowed Oregon farmers to get their spring wheat planted early. The dry weather, however, retarded growth and yields will be below average if rain does not come soon. The exception to these conditions is the area along the eastern mountains where farmers report good prospects.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Wheat Supplies
Below Previous Year

Reflecting the effect of a decrease in both carryover stocks and production, total estimated supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1972-73 (December-November) crop year are

placed at 284.5 million bushels, 34 per cent les than the 433.4 million in 1971-72. Carryover stocks at December 1, 1972, at 50.1 million bushels were sharply below the 127.2 million at the same date a year ago, while the 1972 production, at 234.4 million registered a decline of 23 per cent from the comparable figure in 1971. After deducting some 115.3 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 169.2 million are available for export and for carryover during 1972-73, about half the 335.2 million in 1971-72.

Exports Less
Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1 — May 26 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 98.7 million bushels, 41 per cent below the 168.0 million exported during the corresponding period of the 1971-72 crop year. The balance remaining on May 27, 1973 for export and for carryover, at 70.5 million bushels, was 58 per cent lower than the 167.2 million at the same date a year ago and the smallest carryover at that date since 1957-58.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.V. Hiltz, Third Secretary (Agriculture) for Canada, Canberra, under date of June 6, 1973 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce.

Prospects for 1973-74 wheat sowings .— It is almost certain that Australia will not reach its quota of 514 million bushels and will probably fall short by at least 100 million bushels. Although an official estimate of likely wheat acreage has not been released as yet, indications are that acreage could reach about 24 million acres. Taking an average yield of 18 bushels per acre the crop could reach 432 million bushels. However, most people, including the Wheat Board, feel that providing growing conditions are suitable the crop will most likely be in the area of 400 million bushels.

In general sowing conditions are very good in South Australia, Victoria and New South Wales except the north western area. These States received above average rainfall in May and consequently soil moisture is excellent. Conditions looked good in north western New South Wales about a month ago but since then it has dried up considerably. This area produces most of the N.S.W. prime hard and so good planting conditions are important. Long-range weather forecasts indicate above normal rainfall for July and August in Victoria and average to above average in South Australia and most of New South Wales. In Western Australia, rains have been patchy and more rain is needed before planting can become general. Queensland is at present the worst-off of the States and rain is needed urgently if planting intentions are to be reached. June is the ideal time for sowing in many of the wheat areas of Queensland and so the need for rain is becoming critical.

New wheat stabilization scheme .— As indicated in last month's "Wheat Report" the Government attempted to set a fixed maximum sum as a guarantee for wheat stabilization in the new stabilization plan which was due to commence with the 1973-74 crop. The fixed sum was 15 million dollars. The plan had met with Cabinet approval but when it came before the Labor Caucus, it was rejected and instead Caucus voted to extend the present practice of having no upper limit on Government contribution made to hold wheat to the guaranteed price for another year.

In addition to going along with extending the present plan for another year, Caucus also agreed to raise the guaranteed price to A \$1.60 per bushel on 200 million bushels. The Wheatgrowers' Federation had asked also that the home consumption price be raised to A \$1.93 per bushel. However the Government did not take a decision on this issue but it is felt the home consumption price may be raised to A \$1.90 per bushel. The Wheatgrowers' Federation has accepted the Government's proposals.

In the meantime, the Department of Primary Industry has established a Wheat Stabilization Review Group and has drawn up a work program. Specific research tasks have been allocated among officers of the Department and letters have been sent to State Directors of Agriculture, academics and other experts seeking their submissions on wheat stabilization. An October deadline has been set for the final long-term Government plan.

Wheat Board makes second payment on 1969-70 Pool.— The Government has approved a second payment to growers who delivered wheat to the 1969-70 Wheat Pool. The payment will be five (5) cents per bushel. To date growers had received no payment beyond the A \$1.10 per bushel (less freight) first advance paid shortly after the wheat was delivered. Sales overseas on long term credit had been a major factor holding up the second payment.

The interesting point is that not enough money exists in the 1969-70 Pool to make a payment of five (5) cents per bushel. To make the payment, the Wheat Board will loan to the 1969-70 Pool, part of the receipts that have accured to the 1970-71 and 1971-72 Pools. This is the first time this has been done in Australia and will set a precedent in transferring funds from one pool to another.

The reasoning behind the move is that it will further encourage wheat producers to planta large wheat acreage in 1973-74. Many wheatgrowers urgently need this money to finance the planting of this year's crop. These growers have been hit by drought over the past two seasons and an allocation of cash through a second payment on the 1969-70 Pool would boost their acreage.

FRENCH SITUATION

Supplies Above Previous Year Total estimated commercial domestic supplies of soft wheat in France for the crop year (August-July) 1972-73, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 90.8 million bushels and anticipated marketings of 543.3 million amount to some 634.1 million, 16 per cent more than the 1971-72 total of 545.9 million. Imports of wheat during August 1972 — March 1973 including durum wheat and both hard and soft wheat have amounted to 10.7 million bushels, more than double the 5.3 million imported during the same months of 1971-72. After deducting 242.5 million bushels for estimated domestic use, including normal feed wheat requirements, the surplus available for export and for carryover is about 402.3 million bushels 31 per cent above the 308.2 million the previous year.

Exports Higher Combined exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equitation a Year Ago valent during the August—March period of the current crop year, at 206.8 million bushels, represented a 44 per cent increase over the comparable August — March 1971-72 total of 144.0 million. The balance of commercial supplies remaining on April 1, 1973 for export and for carryover amounted to 195.5 million compared with the April 1, 1972 total of 164.2 million bushels.

The following account of the wheat situation in France has been extracted from a report from Mr. G.W. Doucet, Commercial Secretary (Agriculture) Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of June 15, 1973 and is reproduced with permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers.

Imports .— With the 26,095 metric tons (959,000 bushels) imported last March, imports amounted to 290,824 tons (10,686,000 bushels) at the beginning of April, as against 143,114 tons (5,258,000 bushels) a year earlier. For the eight months under review total French wheat purchases have now doubled those of the previous crop year. The total USA exports to France were placed at 238,330 tons (8,757,000 bushels) in contrast to 95,469 tons (3,508,000 bushels) last year. Canada's shipments to France increased from 30,465 tons (1,119,000 bushels) to 36,093 tons (1,326,000 bushels) on April 1.

Exports .— Total wheat shipments from France amounted to 535,664 metric tons (19,682,000 bushels) during March 1973, compared with 445,435 tons (16,367,000 bushels) in March 1972. Exports during August—March totalled 4,755,873 tons (174,746,000 bushels) while exports stood at 3,242,934 tons (119,156,000 bushels) at the same date in 1972. The August — March 1972-73 figures for denatured wheat were 765,146 tons (28,114,000 bushels); durum 26,719 tons (982,000 bushels); and milling wheat 3,964,008 tons (145,651,000 bushels); while for 1971-72 they were respectively, 389,687 tons (14,318,000 bushels); 29,159 tons (1,071,000 bushels); and 2,824,088 tons (103,766,000 bushels).

For the fifth consecutive month, wheat flour shipments increased, with 89,628 metric tons exported in March 1973, in contrast to 54,557 tons in March 1972. Since August 1972, 581,830 tons have already been exported, surpassing by 130,830 tons the comparable total last year. More than 50 per cent of March export was for North Korea (46,508 tons) which had already purchased 131,521 tons on April 1, 1973.

Prices and market .— Between May 15 and June 15, wheat prices went up around 56.25 to 56.75 francs per 100 kilos, (\$3.36 to \$3.39 per bushel) above the intervention price level by around 2 to 3 francs (12 to 18 cents per bushel). Good varieties such as Rex were priced less than previously, between 59 and 60 francs (\$3.53 and \$3.59 per bushel). Denatured wheat was offered at 54 and 54.50 francs (\$3.23 and \$3.26 per bushel), while forage wheats were sold between 56.50 and 57.25 francs (\$3.38 and \$3.42 per bushel).

Export prices averaged 58.25 to 58.85 francs (\$3.48 to \$3.52 per bushel) for FOB Rouen. Forage wheats were priced 57.50 to 58 francs (\$3.44 to \$3.47 per bushel) FOB Rouen and 60.25 to 61.50 francs (\$3.60 to \$3.68 per bushel) FOB Basel.

During the April 25 meeting, the ONIC Permanent Committee noted that on April 1, 1973 total delivery reached 14 million metric tons (514.4 million bushels) close to the total estimate of 14.7 to 14.8 million tons (540.1 to 543.8 million bushels) for this crop year. Wheat sold for animal feeding was 1.5 million tons(55.1 million bushels) while the total estimate averaged 2.1 to 2.2 million tons (77.2 million to 80.8 million bushels). New estimates for sales to the members of the original EEC increased from 3.2 to 3.5 million tons (117.6 to 128.6 million bushels) and from 3.9 to 4.1 million tons (143.3 million to 150.6 million bushels) for total sales to the enlarged EEC. The forecasted carry-over decreased from 1.6 to 1.4 million tons (58.8 million to 51.4 million bushels).

It has to be noted that March exports have been slackened by the establishment of the monetary compensatory levels designed to restore competition within EEC between states with strong currency and states with weak currency: taxed export for devaluated currency and premium granted to export for reevaluated currency. Things have been complicated for a few months because of the establishment of daily compensatory levels to the new members, resulting in such a complicated system that it discourages exporters. An emergency action was asked to the EEC Commission to simplify this system.

If the April level of exports is estimated excellent, May and June trade might be jeopardized by the French strike of riverfleet which occured just after the Belgian strike. In the beginning of June, shipment of 1 million metric tons of grain was crippled by the strike.

ONIC held its Central Council Meeting on May 29 and will be now empowered to provide certificates of quality grading for wheats to be exported. It was also decided to put back on the market the 100,000 metric tons (3.7 million bushels) intervention wheat from the 1971 crops.

The estimated figures of wheat acreage on May 1, 1973 compared with the previous April 1 situation, increased by 31,700 hectares (78,000 acres) of which 28,400 hectares (70,000 acres) were soft wheats and 3,300 hectares (8,000 acres) durum wheats in contrast to the May 1, 1972 figure. A 21 per cent increase was registered for spring soft wheat seedings.

Relating to the 1972-73 trade of durum wheat, the ash content and the ergot were lower than the average. Trade was good, except for Northern France, where prices were often close to the Intervention price. Farmers considered that as irregular, since durum wheat should be sold at the level of threshold price, as its production is unsufficient, and were also asking for a premium at the end of the crop year.

Regarding the new crop, the same amount of seeding has been forecast for winter durum wheat, i.e. around 65,000 hectares (161,000 acres). Buyers were investigating a new variety, DURTAL, with good yield and short straw with especially good quality for semolina. New varieties are from the States: Rolette and Ward, and from Canada: Wascona. The French aim for 1980 is to produce 1,000,000 metric tons (36.7 million bushels) with several new varieties, i.e. about twice the current harvest.

Total estimated domestic supplies of wheat in Argentina for the
1972-73 (December-November) crop year are placed at some 315.5
million bushels, 41 per cent over the comparable 1971-72 total of
223.5 million reflecting an increase in production which more than offset lower
carryover stocks. The 1972 production estimated at 297.6 million bushels was 43 per
cent above the 208.7 million produced in 1971 while the December 1, 1972 carryover
stocks, at 17.9 million, are 28 per cent less than the 24.8 million at the same date
a year ago. After making an allowance of 150.0 million bushels for anticipated
domestic requirements, an estimated 165.5 million are available for export and for
carryover in 1972-73, in sharp contrast to the 81.6 million the previous year.

Exports Increase over Previous Year Preliminary exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during December 1972 — May 1973 amounted to 92.4 million bushels, in sharp contrast to the 31.7 million

shipped during the same six months in 1971-72. The balance remaining on June 1, 1973 for export and for carryover was estimated at 73.1 million bushels, 46 per cent larger than the June 1, 1972 total of 50.0 million.



CALENDAR OF WHEAT EVENTS

- May 15 According to the Wheat Situation published by the Economic Research Service, United States Department of Agriculture, record demand in 1972-73 and the elimination of required set-aside have encouraged farmers in the United States to grow more wheat. Early indications point to a record 1973 crop of 1,736 million bushels, up 12 per cent from last year.
- June 6 According to a report from Mr. C.V. Hiltz, Third Secretary (Agriculture) for Canada, Canberra, it is almost certain that Australia will not reach its quota of 514 million bushels and will probably fall short by at least 100 million bushels.
 - The Canadian Wheat Board announced a change in delivery requirements for certain persons holding Special Wheat Board Delivery Permits. For details see pages 8 and 9 of this publication.

According to the Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce, wheat flour production in the United States in April 1973 amounted to 19,310,000 hundredweight, averaging 919,000 hundredweight per working day. This compared with an average output per working day of 956,000 hundredweight last month and 983,000 hundredweight in April 1972. Wheat flour mills during April 1973 operated at 89.6 per cent of capacity, below both the 93.3 per cent of the previous month and the 99.7 per cent of the same month a year ago. Flour mills in April 1973 ground 42,792,000 bushels of wheat compared with 46,777,000 bushels the previous month and 43,772,000 bushels in April 1972.
