

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

WORLD WHEAT SITUATION

August Exports Above Last Year's Level Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat from the <u>four traditional major exporters</u> during August 1972 have amounted to 136.5 million bushels, an increase of 16

per cent over the 118.1 million bushels exported during the same month in 1971 and 15 per cent more than the ten-year (1961-70) average shipments for the same month of some 119.2 million bushels. As indicated in the accompanying table based on the Canadian crop year, exports from United States and Argentina were at higher levels this year than last while those from Canada and Australia were lower.

Wheat Supplies of Four Major Exporters Below a Year Ago Total supplies of wheat remaining in Canada, Australia, United States and Argentina at September 1, 1972 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years, amounted to 2,583.3 million bushels, 4 per cent less than

the 2,691.5 million at the same time a year ago. This decrease reflected smaller supplies for Canada and Australia which more than offset increases in United States and Argentina. Supplies on or about September 1, 1972, in millions of bushels, were held as follows, with last year's comparable figures in brackets: Canada, 893.7 (1,042.6); Australia, 130.9 (215.0); United States, 1,518.4 (1,399.4); and Argentina, 40.3 (34.5).

CANADIAN SITUATION

Eupplies Below Previous Year Total estimated supplies of wheat for the 1972-73 (August-July) crop year are placed at 1,096.7 million bushels, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 589.3 million and the 1972 crop, forecast on the basis of conditions at August 15, at 507.5 million bushels. Supplies of the size indicated are some 13 per cent less then the 1971-72 crop year total of 1,263.7 million and represent decreases in both carryover stocks and production. Assuming realization of the August forecast of production and after making an allowance of 160.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, supplies available for export and for carryover during 1972-73 would amount to 936.7 million bushels, 14 per cent smaller than the 1,093.1 million in 1971-72.

Exports Decline
from a Year Ago
August 1972 amounted to some 43.0 million bushels, compared with
the August 1971 figure of 50.5 million. This year's August wheat
exports consisted of 40.4 million bushels of wheat in bulk, 3 thousand of seed and
2.7 million of flour in terms of wheat.

Subject to realization of current production and utilization estimates, the balance remaining on September 1, 1972 for export and for carryover, amounted to 893.7 million bushels, 14 per cent less than the September 1, 1971 total of 1,042.6 million.

The total visible supply of Canadian wheat at September 13 this Visible Supplies year, at 294.6 million bushels, represented a decrease of 7 per cent from the 1971 comparable total of 318.5 million and was 30 per cent less than the 421.4 million of 1970. The bulk of the supplies were in primary elevators, with visible supplies in this position amounting to 139.1 million bushels, 20 per cent less than the 1971 comparable total of 173.1 million, and 46 per cent below the 1970 figure of 256.2 million. Wheat stocks at interior terminals at September 13, 1972 totalled 4.0 million bushels below both the 6.9 million of a year ago and the 11.8 million of two years ago. The 22.7 million bushels "in transit rail" (western division) were above both the 1971 total of 14.9 million and the 1970 total of 20.4 million. Supplies at the Lakehead, totalling some 29.0 million bushels, were higher than last year's comparable level of 25.8 million but lower than the 1970 figure of 35.9 million. Stocks "in transit lake", amounting to 13.0 million bushels were 29 per cent above the 1971 level of 10.1 million and substantially more than the 7.0 million of two years ago. The 33.2 million bushels in Bay, Lake and Upper St. Lawrence ports were 5 per cent above the 31.7 million of a year ago but decreased by 4 per cent from the 34.7 million of two years ago. Supplies in Lower St. Lawrence and Maritime ports at September 13, 1972, at 38.1 million bushels, registered a 9 per cent decrease from the 42.0 million at September 15, 1971 and were slightly lower than the 38.9 million at the corresponding period in 1970. The 8.3 million bushels in West Coast ports (Vancouver-New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Victoria) were little changed from the 8.2 million at the comparable date in 1971 and were 4 per cent above the 8.0 million of two years ago. Wheat supplies at the port of Churchill amounted to 2.7 million bushels substantially more than the 1.5 million of 1971 but 32 per cent over the 1970 supplies of 3.9 million.

August 1972 Exports of Wheat and Flour Total 43.0 Million Bushels

Combined exports of wheat in bulk, seed wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during August 1972 amounted to 43.0 million bushels, 24 per cent below the July 1972 total of 56.3 million and 15 per cent less than

the August 1971 figure of 50.5 million but 14 per cent above the ten-year (1961-70) average exports for the month of August of 37.7 million.

Exports of wheat in bulk during August 1972 (as reported by the Canadian Grain Commission), amounted to 40.4 million bushels, registering a decrease of 27 per cent from the 54.9 million of July 1972 and was 17 per cent down from the August 1971 figure of 48.5 million but 15 per cent more than the ten-year average for the month of August of 35.0 million. Exports of seed wheat during August 1972, based on Canadian Customs returns, amounted to 3 thousand bushels compared with the August 1971 total (adjusted to remove time lag) of 2 thousand bushels. Customs returns also indicate that the equivalent of 2.7 million bushels of wheat was exported in the form of flour during August 1972, more than double the July 1972 figure of 1.3 million, 34 per cent larger than the August 1971 exports (adjusted for time lag) of 2.0 million and slightly above the ten-year average for the month of August of 2.6 million.

The U.S.S.R. (Russia) was the major market for wheat in bulk in August 1972 with shipments of 14.7 million bushels and accounted for 37 per cent of the total compared with 9.9 million in August 1971 accounting for 20 per cent of the total. Other markets for Canadian wheat in bulk during August 1972 with totals for the same month of the preceding crop year in brackets, were as follows, in millions of bushels: People's Republic of China, 4.2 (13.1); Britain, 3.7 (1.2); Brazil, 3.0 (2.6); Italy, 2.9 (2.8); Bangladesh, 2.6 (nil); Cuba, 1.5 (0.7); and Germany West, 1.3 (0.4).

Exports of wheat flour by countries of consignment for August 1972 based on Customs data, are not available at this time.

August Forecast of Production of Canada's 1972 Grain Crops With the exception of winter wheat, each of the major Canadian grains will be below last year's levels on the basis of yields indicated at August 15. Although crops throughout the Prairie Provinces in general are a week to

two weeks behind normal, hot, dry weather the past two weeks has hastened maturity. During the growing season crop prospects varied with weather conditions. In some districts earlier dry weather threatened yields but lower temperatures at the time followed by rain later on prevented any widespread losses. However to the third week in August rainfall (measured by the unweighted average precipitation since April 1) was somewhat below normal in each province. Harvesting of spring-sown grains is now general in practically all districts of the Prairies.

Warm dry weather this past week has permitted harvesting to progress throughout most of Ontario following a cool summer with excessive moisture. Cool, wet weather has continued in Quebec making harvesting practically impossible. Cool, showery weather is delaying maturity of crops in the Maritimes. Weather conditions have been quite variable in British Columbia.

Canada's 1972 wheat crop, currently forecast at 507.5 million bushels is 4 per cent smaller than last year's crop of 529.6 million. Average yields decreased from 27.3 bushels in 1971 to 23.8 bushels per acre this year.

The 1972 crop of spring wheat, forecast at 492.5 million bushels is being harvested from a seeded area of 21.0 million acres and yielding an indicated 23.5 bushels per acre. The 1971 spring wheat crop of 515.5 million bushels was produced on 19.1 million acres and yielded an average of 27.0 bushels per acre. The 1972 yield for Ontario's winter wheat crop is placed at 41.0 bushels per acre compared with 41.3 bushels in 1971. A 7 per cent increase in harvested acreage raised the production to 15.0 million bushels in 1972 compared with 14.1 million in 1971.

In the Prairie Provinces, the 1972 wheat crop is forecast at 487.0 million bushels, some 5 per cent below last year's crop of 510.0 million. The forecast average yield per seeded acre in the Prairie Provinces, on the basis of conditions at August 15, is 23.4 bushels per acre, with the Manitoba average 26.5; Saskatchewan, 22.2 and Alberta, 25.6 bushels per acre. Production in each of these provinces in millions of bushels, with last year's estimate in brackets, is as follows: Manitoba, 69.0 (74.0); Saskatchewan, 308.0 (345.0); and Alberta, 110.0 (91.0). Relatively small amounts of winter wheat are included in these forecasts for the Prairie Provinces.

The indicated production of <u>durum wheat</u>, which is included in the above forecast of spring wheat is 68.0 million bushels compared with last year's estimate of 56.0 million. Forecasts of 1972 production in each of the Prairie Provinces in millions of bushels, with last year's estimates in brackets are: Manitoba, 4.0 (3.8); Saskatchewan, 57.0 (46.3); and Alberta, 7.0 (5.9). The acreage seeded to this crop was 39 per cent larger than in 1971. Yields per acre in 1972 with 1971 figures in brackets are: Manitoba, 25.0 (27.0); Saskatchewan, 21.1 (24.5); Alberta, 23.3 (24.4) and the Prairie Provinces, 21.5 (24.6).

The first forecast of the 1972 wheat crop in Canada, based on conditions at August 15, placed the probable outturn at 507.5 million bushels, of which the Prairie Provinces accounted for 487.0 million. Lake Shipments of Canadian Grain

Total shipments of the six major grains out of Lakehead terminals from the opening of navigation to September 13 this year amounted to 364.3 million bushels, 14 per cent more than the comparable 1971 figure of 320.3 million and 78 per cent larger than the ten-year (1961-70) average for the period of 205.0 million. In 1972 the season of navigation opened on April 14 while the 1971 season opened on April 10. Shipments of wheat, at 201.7 million were 3 per cent above the 195.7 million of 1971.

CANADIAN FLOUR MILLING SITUATION

Production Wheat flour production by Canadian mills during August 1972 amounted to 3,306,000 hundredweight, representing an increase of 8 per cent over the July 1972 output of 3,060,000 hundredweight, and 2 per cent above the tenyear (1962-71) average production for the month of August of 3,253,000 hundredweight and relatively unchanged from the August 1971 total of 3,300,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting operations during August 1972 had a total rated capacity of 161,000 hundredweight per 24-hour day and on the basis of a 27-day working period 75.9 per cent of this rated capacity was effective.

Wheat milled for flour during August 1972 amounted to 7,516,000 bushels, 9 per cent above the 6,910,000 bushels milled during the preceding month and little change from the 7,477,000 bushels milled during August 1971. Of the wheat milled for flour during August 1972 some 6,157,000 bushels were Western Canadian red spring wheat (other than Durum) while the remainder consisted of Ontario winter wheat (657,000 bushels); Durum (500,000 bushels); and all other (203,000 bushels).

According to preliminary Customs returns, exports of Canadian wheat flour during July 1972 amounted to the equivalent of 1,314,000 bushels (some 571,000 hundredweight of flour) 51 per cent less than the June 1972 exports of 2,691,000 bushels and 34 per cent lower than the adjusted July 1971 exports of 1,988,000 bushels. Flour shipments during July 1972 went to thirty-eight countries with exports to Cuba amounting to 568,000 bushels or 43 per cent of the July total. Other leading markets for Canadian wheat flour in terms of wheat during the month with shipments in thousands of bushels were as follows: Lebanon, 228; Britain, 140; Leeward and Windward Islands, 68; and Barbados, 49.

UNITED STATES SITUATION

Supplies Above Previous Year

Total domestic supplies of wheat in the United States for the 1972-73 crop year are currently placed at 2,424.8 million bushels, 2 per cent more than the previous year's total of 2,369.7 million, reflecting an 18 per cent increase in carryover stocks, which more than offset a 5 per cent decrease in production. In addition, current crop year domestic supplies may be supplemented by imports of about 1 million bushels. Domestic disappearance during 1972-73 is estimated at about 767.0 million bushels 12 per cent below the 872.9 million last year. After deducting anticipated domestic requirements for the current United States crop year, some 1,657.9 million remain available for export and for carryover, 11 per cent above the 1,497.0 million in 1971-72.

Exports Higher

during July-August 1972 amounted to 139.5 million bushels, some
43 per cent more than the 97.6 million exported during the same
two months last year. The balance remaining on September 1, 1972 for export and for
carryover was estimated at 1,518.4 million bushels compared with 1,399.4 million on

United States Wheat and Flour Exports

According to the August 1972 issue of the World Agricultural Production and Trade, Foreign Agricultural Service, United States Department of Agriculture, wheat exports were 585 million

bushels, more than 100 million below fiscal year 1971. Shipments to Europe reached only one-half the 1971 total chiefly a result of the record wheat crop in Western Europe. Smaller exports were made to Asia mainly due to the West Coast dock strike and continued progress toward self-sufficiency in India. Western Hemisphere and Africa continued slowly to expand imports. Lower exports were made to Brazil but Mexico which is normally self sufficient, purchased nearly 15 million bushels. Reduced production in Algeria and Iran resulted in larger shipments. Large relief shipments were sent to the new country of Bangladesh. Flour exports declined 12 per cent continuing the trend of recent years. Indonesia, a major flour market, has built several flour mills and is changing from flour to a wheat importer.

1972 Wheat Crop Forecast at 1,560 Million Bushels

A report released on September 12, 1972 by the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture stated that production of all wheat is

forecast at nearly 1,560 million bushels, 16 million bushels more than a month earlier but 5 per cent below 1971. The current forecast is 14 per cent above the 1970 crop. Prospective production of each of the three classes was above a month earlier with the bulk of the increase accounted for by durum and other spring wheat. Changes between the September 1 forecast and final estimates have averaged 15 million bushels — ranging from 3 million to 42 million. Yield of all wheat is forecast at 32.6 bushels, 1.2 bushels below last year's record high but 1.6 bushels above 1970. Grain was expected to be harvested from 47.8 million acres, 1 per cent below 1971.

Production of winter wheat is forecast at 1,198 million bushels, up 2 million bushels from the August 1 forecast. The forecast is 3 per cent above last year's crop of 1,163 million and 8 per cent above the 1970 crop. Yield prospects for Montana increased since August 1 while prospects in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho remain

unchanged. Rains interrupted harvesting during August. Harvest progress ranges from 80 per cent complete in Montana on September 1 to virtually ended in Washington and Oregon. The winter wheat estimating period extends to September 1 in Montana, Idaho, Washington, and Oregon; estimates are carried forward from August 1 for all other States.

Durum wheat production is forecast at 75.1 million bushels, up 3 per cent from a month earlier but 15 per cent below 1971. The current forecast is 49 per cent above the 1970 output. Expected yield per acre, at 30.0 bushels, is 1.9 bushels below last year but 5.0 bushels above 2 years ago. Yield per acre prospects improved during August in Minnesota and North Dakota but declined in South Dakota. Harvest was behind the usual pace in most areas on September 1. Late seeding coupled with showers and hot humidity during August delayed combining. However, some late seedings in the more northern areas filled well as a result of adequate soil moisture and generally cool early August temperatures. North Dakota harvest was 56 per cent completed by September 5, compared with the 10-year average of 66 per cent. Harvest in South Dakota was virtually over by late August, considerably later than normal. Adverse harvest weather reduced prospects somewhat. Harvest progress was also behind schedule in Montana.

Production of spring wheat other than durum is forecast at 286 million bushels. This is up 5 per cent from a month earlier, 26 per cent less than 1971 production, and 37 per cent above the 1970 crop. The increase from a month ago was a result of increased prospects in the major producing area except for South Dakota which had a slight decrease in estimated production.

Harvesting of the later-than-normal crop continued to make progress in August after earlier delays by showers. Cool early August temperatures over much of the area promoted filling of heads in late fields but delayed ripening. Combining in South Dakota was virtually ended, more than 2 weeks later than normal. Minnesota, with 82 per cent of the harvesting completed by September 5 was slightly behind normal. North Dakota harvest was 69 per cent complete by September 5, compared with the average of 81 per cent. Montana growers had 50 per cent of the crop in the bin.

Yield per acre was forecast on September 1 at 28.7 bushels, compared with 27.5 bushels a month earlier. Yields in 1971 and 1970 were 30.7 and 23.7 bushels, respectively. North Dakota's yield increased 2 bushels during August to 29 accounting for most of the gain in the forecast. Minnesota's yield was up 2 bushels to 33 and Montana's was up 1 bushel to 25 from a month earlier. South Dakota's prospects declined 2 bushels.

Outlook and Situation

According to a special supplement dated September 15, 1972

the Economic Research Service, United States Department
of Agriculture stated that the wheat outlook for the 1972-73 marketing year has
changed markedly since the August issue of the Wheat Situation was approved on July 31,
1972. Unprecedented world import demand and tightening exportable wheat supplies
outside the United States have brought about a sharply higher estimate of U.S. wheat
exports — from 800 million to a record 1,125 million bushels. In addition to larger
purchases by regular commercial customers, sales to the USSR, estimated to total
around 400 million bushels for 1972-73, are much larger than had been anticipated.
A recent purchase of 15 million bushels by the People's Republic of China also
accentuates the turn in export events.

AUSTRALIAN SITUATION

Wheat Supplies Down from Last Year

Total supplies of wheat in Australia for the 1971-72 (December-November) crop year amounted to 427.9 million bushels, compared with 555.0 million in 1970-71, reflecting a decrease in

carryover stocks which more than offset an increase in production. The 1971 crop estimated at 303.0 million bushels was 5 per cent above the 289.9 million bushels harvested in 1970-71, but carryover stocks, at December 1, 1971, at 124.9 million bushels, were 53 per cent lower than the 265.1 million at the same time a year ago. After deducting some 85.5 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 342.1 million are available for export and for carryover during 1971-72, some 25 per cent below the 458.1 million in 1970-71.

Exports Decrease from a Year Ago

Combined exports of wheat as grain and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the period December 1 — August 19 of the current Australian crop year amounted to 211.2 million bushels, e 243.1 million exported during the corresponding nine months of

13 per cent below the 243.1 million exported during the corresponding nine months of the 1970-71 crop year. The balance remaining on August 20, 1972, for export and for carryover, at 130.9 million bushels, was 39 per cent smaller than the comparable 1971 total of 215.0 million.

The following information relative to the Australian situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. C.V. Hiltz, Third Secretary (Agriculture), for Canada, Canberra, under date of September 13, 1972 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce.

Wheat situation in Australia for 1972-73 crop. — The drought situation in Australia has stabilized in most growing districts over the past month with recent light scattered showers. However, good rains are still wanted to ensure that the latest estimated receivals will be available for the current crop year.

In New South Wales wheat crop prospects have improved in most parts of the wheat belt with the notable exception of Tamworth and some south-western parts. Tamworth was one of the first districts to go dry and one of the last to get any rain. Good rains are still badly needed in these areas.

Planting in Queensland is finished due to the lack of rain. Usual wheat acreage for the State would be approximately 1.5 million acres and this crop year it is expected that total acreage will be approximately 1.1 million acres. If there are no further adverse weather conditions, it is expected that total production will be approximately 20 million bushels, of which 50 per cent could be of prime hard quality.

In South Australia the 30 million bushel crop is still regarded as a good estimate and if favourable weather prevails from now until harvest, this could be slightly low. In Western Australia, satisfactory conditions continue and providing good finishing rains are forthcoming, a normal crop is expected.

Marketing prospects for the 1972-73 wheat crop. — With the recent 1 million metric ton (36,743,000 bushels) wheat sale to Russia and the 250,000 ton (9,186,000 bushels) sale to Chile, it now appears that the Australian Wheat Board will sell approximately 290 million bushels of wheat and flour on export markets for shipment in the 1971-72 crop year. This would leave approximately 45 million bushels for carryover at December 1, 1972.

If current estimates for the 1972-73 wheat crop prove correct, presently 255 million bushels, then there will be approximately 300 million bushels available to the Australian Wheat Board for sale during the 1972-73 crop year. At the present time the Board is looking at possible export sales during the coming crop year of approximately 280 million bushels. If these sales are realized, then it is possible that the Australian Wheat Board may have to purchase wheat from abroad to meet some of its commitments during 1972-73.

Wheat sales to the U.S.S.R. and Chile. — A sale of 1 million metric tons (36,743,000 bushels) of wheat to the U.S.S.R., worth about A\$50 million (\$58.7 million Cdn.), was finalized last month by the Australian Wheat Board. The sale was for cash and provided for the shipment of f.a.q. wheat between September 1972 and May 1973, with freight to be provided by the buyers. This follows a sale of 500,000 tons (18,372,000 bushels) to Russia in August 1971, shipment of which was completed early this year. The Australian Wheat Board has sold a further 250,000 tons (9,186,000 bushels) of wheat to Chile, The contract called for the shipment of f.a.q. wheat between August and December 1972 and was on short term credit. The Chairman of the Board, Mr. J.P. Cass, said that as a result of the sale, shipments of Australian wheat to Chile during the crop year ending November 30, 1972 would reach a record total of about 600,000 tons (22,046,000 bushels). In 1970-71, Australian wheat shipments to Chile amounted to 198,000 tons (7,275,000 bushels).

New Perth wheat terminal. — Work began September 4 on a \$40 million project in Cockburn Sound, near Perth, to provide a big international grain handling terminal. The work has been commissioned by Co-operative Bulk Handling Ltd., who called tenders for the main structure at the terminal September 9. The contract is expected to be completed by January 1973. The terminal will take 3 years to complete and it is said that it will be one of the best equipped of this type in the world.

The working house will be 258 ft. high and contain 10 elevators, each with a capacity of 1,250 tons of grain an hour. The structure will have 144 vertical cells and with existing grain handling facilities at Fremantle, will have a total storage capacity of nearly 32 million bushels, which is almost one-third of Western Australia's wheat crop.

FRENCH SITUATION

Supplies Higher than a Year Ago France for the crop year (August-July) 1971-72, consisting of the August 1 carryover of 97.8 million bushels and anticipated marketings of 437.2 million amount to some 535.1 million, 22 per cent more than the 1970-71 total of 437.9 million, reflecting increases in both carryover stocks and anticipated deliveries. Imports during the August-June period of the current crop year, including durum and both hard and soft wheat have amounted to 6.6 million bushels in sharp contrast to the 12.9 million imported during the same months last year. After deducting 226.3 million bushels for estimated domestic use, including normal feed wheat requirements, the surplus available for export and for carryover is about 315.3 million bushels, 43 per cent above the 221.2 million the previous year.

Combined exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain equivalent during the first eleven months of the 1971-72 crop year amounted to 202.0 million bushels, 72 per cent larger than the comparable August 1970-June 1971 total of 117.6 million. The balance of commercial supplies remaining on July 1, 1972 for export and for carryover amounted to 113.3 million, a 9 per cent increase, compared with the July 1, 1971 total of 103.6 million bushels.

The following account of the wheat situation in France has been extracted from a report from Mr. G.W. Doucet, Agricultural Secretary, Canadian Embassy, Paris, under date of August 25, 1972 and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce. Where possible, conversions to Canadian measures have been made for the convenience of our readers.

Supply-disposition. — Soft wheat farm marketings for May and June continue to decrease, with only 73,400 metric tons (2,697,000 bushels) for June. The August 1971 to July 1972 accumulated farm marketing now reached 9,903,200 tons (363,876,000 bushels) and the 1971-72 total crop deliveries was brought to 12,181,400 tons (447,585,000 bushels) just one month before the end of the current crop year. This also confirms that the estimate for total deliveries from the 1971 crop will be surpassed. Utilizations in May and June were higher than in April 964,500 metric tons (35,439,000 bushels), with respectively 1,077,200 tons (39,580,000 bushels) and 1,092,300 tons (40,135,000 bushels). Sales to millers were particularly strong with about 500,000 tons (18,372,000 bushels) each month, compared to 400,000 tons (14,697,000 bushels) in April. Exports were around 420,000 tons (15,432,000 bushels) each month. Stocks at July 1, 1972 amount to 2,075,100 tons (76,246,000 bushels).

Durum wheat producers delivered 3,600 metric tons (132,000 bushels) during May and 700 tons (26,000 bushels) during June, to bring the total since August 1971 to 337,300 tons (12,394,000 bushels) and the 1971-72 crop deliveries to 461,900 tons (16,972,000 bushels).

Sales to semolina millers remained weak during May and June with around 29,000 tons (1,066,000 bushels) each month, compared to 39,100 tons (1,437,000 bushels) last April. Exports decreased from 2,300 tons (85,000 bushels) last April to 1,600 tons (59,000 bushels) for May and 1,500 tons (55,000 bushels) for June. Stocks at July 1 increased to 27,800 tons (1,021,000 bushels).

External trade. — Total wheat imports for June were placed at 3,772 metric tons (139,000 bushels). This compares with 7,832 tons (288,000 bushels) of June last year, and with 1,710 tons (62,800 bushels) imported during May 1972. There were 1,100 tons (40,000 bushels) of durum imported from the U.S. and 2,671 tons (98,000 bushels) milling wheat imported from the U.S., Canada and U.S.S.R.

The August-June total imports now reached 178,429 tons (6,556,000 bushels) of which 93,220 tons (3,425,000 bushels) were durum wheat against 352,182 tons (12,940,000 bushels) of which 219,150 tons (8,052,000 bushels) were durum wheat in August-June 1970-71. Key reduction continue to affect durum wheat with 125,930 tons (4,627,000 bushels) less, while it attains 47,823 tons (1,757,000 bushels) less for both hard and soft wheats. Therefore, the total decrease of imports between August-June 1970-71 and August-June 1971-72 amounted to 173,753 tons (6,384,000 bushels).

Exports. — Total wheat exports from France amounted to 420,089 metric tons (15,435,000 bushels) in June 1972, reflecting a 211,565 tons (7,774,000 bushels) increase over the 208,524 tons (7,662,000 bushels) in June of 1971.

The June shipments brought the August-June 1971-72 total exports to 4,518,294 metric tons (166,017,000 bushels) compared with 2,175,024 tons (79,918,000 bushels) in 1970-71. Wheat shipments to the EEC in June 1972 were 241,177 metric tons (8,862,000 bushels) in contrast to 164,612 tons (6,048,000 bushels) in June 1971. For August-June 1971-72 shipments were placed at 2,775,899 tons (101,996,000 bushels), compared with 1,715,107 tons (63,019,000 bushels) for the same period last year. This reflects an increase of 1,060,792 tons (38,977,000 bushels). The exports to the EEC account for 61.43 per cent of the total French wheat now exported.

In June 1972, purchases by the next EEC members (U.K., Ireland and Norway) were placed at 106,364 tons (3,908,000 bushels) compared with a total lack of any purchase in June 1971. Total French sales to these countries were 639,936 tons (23,513,000 bushels) for the first eleven months of 1971-72, representing 14.16 per cent of the total French wheat sales, compared with 72,678 tons (2,670,000 bushels) representing 3.34 per cent during the same period of 1970-71.

Flour shipments with 61,718 metric tons for June 1972 registered an important reduction compared with the 79,884 ton sales last May. With 652,779 tons for the first eleven months, total wheat flour exports remain below the 661,044 ton level reached last year for August-June 1970-71. French sales increased for only four groups of countries: other Europe, other Africa, Near East Asia and other Asia. For this last group, where the French sales had the best development, total exports for the first eleven months amounted to 192,782 tons compared with only 65,283 tons last year.

Prices and market. - During the end of July, soft wheat out of the 1971 crop was priced at 53 to 53.50 francs per 100 kilos (\$2.84 to \$2.87 Cdn. per bushel).

For the beginning of August, soft wheat out of the 1972 crop was around 1 to 1.50 francs per 100 kilos (5 to 8 cents per bushel) above the support price. Good varieties, such as REX, were sold at 59.50 francs (\$3.19 per bushel). Denatured soft wheat passed from 0.25 to 0.50 francs above the support price to 0.25 to 0.50 francs (1 to 3 cents per bushel) beneath on August 16, 1972. Exports prices were 1.25 francs (7 cents per bushel) above the support price for FOB Rouen, and around 59 francs per 100 kilos (\$3.16 per bushel) for FOB Bale, specific weight: 75 kilograms per hectolitre (60 pounds per bushel).

Due to the particularly rainy weather during recent weeks, the harvest is far from completed. In Champagne, wheat with 15 per cent sprouted grains was priced 52.25 to 52.50 francs per 100 kilos (\$2.80 to \$2.81 per bushel), and could be sold 1.50 francs (8 cents per bushel) beneath the support price. For FOB Rouen, wheat with 15 to 20 per cent sprouted grains, 16 per cent moisture, 72 specific weight (58 pounds per bushel) was 0.75 francs (4 cents per bushel) beneath the support price.

ONIC held the meeting of its Central Council on July 26, 1972. Concerning the 1971-72 crop year, the general feeling appears good as there was a very important development of wheat sales to the EEC. Stock to be reported would be less than it was previously estimated: 1,580,000 metric tons (58,054,000 bushels) instead of 1,800,000 tons (66,138,000 bushels). Graded wheat amounted up to 40 per cent of total deliveries, and this policy of quality will be carried on next crop year.

ONIC pointed out firmness of wheat market prices during last month's meeting in pursuance of the high level of sales to European countries and the contracts to be fulfilled during the next crop year with Third Countries, such as the UK and Egypt. There was no intervention since last May. Moreover, a contract for supplying 500,000 metric tons (18,372,000 bushels) of wheat to the USSR was announced at the beginning of August. Shipments which will continue for eight months, would begin on September. Price was not yet fixed but the Commission recently decided to increase the restitution for Baltic harbours from 208.25 to 299,93 francs per ton (\$1.12 to \$1.61 per bushel). At lenght, producers, co-operatives, traders and millers established some contracts at 2.5 per cent above the support price.

Covering next crop year, ONIC estimated total delivery between 12,500,000 and 13,000,000 metric tons (459,291,000 and 477,663,000 bushels) of which 6,200,000 to 6,700,000 tons (227,808,000 to 246,180,000 bushels) could be exported, compared to 5,800,000 tons (213,111,000 bushels) for 1971-72. The 1972-73 crop year regulations were released on August 12, 1972. At the same time, millers were authorized to increase flour price by 40 francs per metric ton and bakers by 0.05 francs for breads.

The financial aid granted to durum wheat producers next crop year will increase to 204,78 francs per metric ton (\$1.10 per bushel). There was no change for activity level in semolina sector.

Next crop. — Hereunder, are listed the last estimates (July 1, 1972) of the French Ministry of Agriculture for the next crop, in comparison with the provisional figure for 1971 established last November.

Weather conditions were not favourable to all grain crops last June, with abnormally low temperatures, lack of sun light (40 per cent less compared with the average), frequent rains, as a result, all grain crops registered an eight to twenty days delay in growing. Such climatic conditions were unfavourable to crops lodged by the storms at the end of July, especially as there was no change for weather at the beginning of August. As a result, grains harvest were delayed by about fifteen days. Nevertheless, the wheat crop appeared promising both for quality and quantity. For soft wheat, cultivated areas increased in North and Center areas of France. Yields equal to or better than last year were anticipated and a new record production, around 20 per cent higher than in 1971 was expected. Joss and Hardi varieties developed well, at the expense of Capitole and Champlein which are declining. Despite a decrease in cultivated areas of durum wheat, production was expected to reach the 1971 level, due to higher yields.

ARGENTINE SITUATION

Supplies Above Previous Year (December-November) crop year amounted to 224.7 million bushels, consisting of the December 1, 1971 carryover of 24.8 million bushels and the crop placed at 199.9 million. Indicated supplies for the current Argentine crop year, reflecting an increase in production which more than offset a 13 per cent decrease in carryover stocks, are about 7 per cent more than the 1970-71 total of 209.4 million bushels. After making an allowance of 135.0 million bushels for anticipated domestic requirements, an estimated 89.7 million are available for export and for carryover compared with 61.1 million in 1970-71.

Exports Sharply
Above Year Ago

Preliminary exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of wheat equivalent during December 1971 — August 1972 amounted to 49.3 million bushels, considerably higher than the 26.6 million exported during the same months in 1970-71. The balance remaining on September 1, 1972 for export and for carryover was estimated at only 40.3 million bushels, 17 per cent more than the September 1, 1971 total of 34.5 million.

The following account of the Argentine situation has been extracted from a report from Mr. H.G. Fairfield, Assistant Commercial Secretary (Agriculture) Buenos Aires, under date of September 11, 1972, and is reproduced with the permission of the Trade Commissioner Service, Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce. Where possible conversions to Canadian measures and currency have been made for the convenience of our readers.

The Grain Exporters Centre has approached the government requesting assistance in order to facilitate wheat exports as their estimate of the outlook of 1972-73 wheat crop at 7.5 million tons (275.6 million bushels) would leave 3.5 million tons (128,602,000 bushels) for export. This estimate is based on a seeded area much in excess of the government's estimate of 5,460,000 hectares (13,486,000 acres).

This compares with the latest price paid to Argentina by Brazil under the wheat agreement. For the fourth quarter wheat shipment Brazil will pay U.S. \$71.40 per ton (\$1.91 per bushel), the highest price for Argentine wheat in 1972.

Exports of bread wheat for the first eight months of 1972 amounted to 835,603 metric tons (30,703,000 bushels) and Durums to 293,978 tons (10,802,000 bushels). The main buyer of Argentine bread wheat is Brazil with 674,410 tons (24,780,000 bushels) and Italy is the main buyer of Durums with 240,056 tons (8,820,000 bushels).

In contrast to exports, the estimate of domestic use has dropped from 805 to 767 million bushels. Wheat feeding is expected to be lower because of rising wheat prices relative to feed grain prices.

Total disappearance is now estimated at 1,892 million bushels, nearly a fifth above the previous record in 1965-66 and well above the indicated 1972 crop of 1,560 million bushels. Prospective utilization suggests a carryover of 534 million bushels at the end of the 1972-73 season. This would be nearly 300 million below the estimate published in August and would be the least since 1967.

Hard Red Winter (HRW) wheat is expected to account for a larger share of exports than usual. Even with a large supply on hand in 1972-73, a record disappearance is expected to result in the lowest HRW carryout since 1951-52, and could place HRW in a relatively tight supply position prior to the start of the new crop harvest next May.
