ASBESTOS PRODUCTION IN CANADA, APRIL, 1933.

Canadian producers shipped 8,168 tons of asbestos in April as compared with shipments of 5,455 tons in March and 9,561 tons in April, 1932, according to the latest report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. During the first four months of 1933 the Canadian production of asbestos amounted to 25,056 tons, in the corresponding period of the previous year, 36,967 tons were produced.

In April Canada exported 4,995 tons of asbestos valued at \$175,199; during the preceding month 6,559 tons worth \$207,515 were exported. The United States provided a market for 69.7 per cent of the April exports.

Imports of asbestos products into Canada in April were appraised at 27,213, a 22.2 per cent decline from the March valuation of \$35,000. Asbestos brake and clutch lining imports were valued at \$13,143 as against \$15,809 in the previous month. Receipts of asbestos packing reached a total of 14,581 pounds worth 44,491; Great Britain supplied 85.9 per cent of this material and the United States, the remainder. Importations of other asbestos manufactures declined 40.8 per cent to a value of \$9,579 in April these imports were obtained from the following countries: the United States, 83.9 per cent, and Great Britain, 16.1 per cent.

Asbestos, raw and fibre, and waste, including asbestic, imports into Great Britain in April amounted to 1,764 tons, consisting of 1,045 tons from Rhodesia, 323 tons from the Union of South Africa and South West Africa, and 396 tons from other countries. In March, Great Britain imported 1,724 tons.

According to the United States customs' records 3,957 tons of asbestos were cleared through United States ports during April. These imports were drawn from the following sources: Canada, 97.0 per cent; Italy, 2.8 per cent, and Great Britain, the remainder.
