

# INVENTORIES, SHIPMENTS AND ORDERS IN MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES 

SEPTEMBER 1965

Manufacturers' shipments and new orders rose in September from the revised August estimates of $\$ 2,725.5$ million and $\$ 2,802.8$ million by 6.4 per cent and 3.4 per cent to $\$ 2,899.7$ million and $\$ 2,898.8$ million respectively. Unfilled orders were fractionally lower in September than last month according to the preliminary estimates. After allowances are made for seasonal variation, however, the value of September shipments showed a decline of 1.7 per cent from the previous month and new orders dropped 3.0 per cent. Seasonally adjusted unfilled orders of $\$ 3,113.6$ million at the end of September showed a 2.1 per cent increase from the previous month. Manufacturers' inventories owned and inventories held at the end of September were up by 0.9 per cent and 0.7 per cent respectively, and by 1.0 per cent and 0.6 per cent after seasonal adjustment. As in August, the build-up in September inventories was mostly in goods in process and raw materials. Finished products inventories rose very slightly. The ratio of the estimates of inventories owned-to-shipments, not adjusted for seasonal variation showed a decline in September. Inventories were 1.89 times shipments, as compared with 1.99 in August. The ratio of finished products-to-shipments at 0.67 at the end of September was the lowest since June.

In comparison with the corresponding month a year earlier, shipments in September were 3.9 percent higher, the smallest relative increase since March 1965. During the first nine months of the year total shipments amounted to $\$ 24,912.3$ million, 6.5 per cent above the comparable value of $\$ 23,395.0 \mathrm{million}$ in 1964 . Durable goods producers' shipments advanced 11.5 per cent to $\$ 1,296.6$ miliion in September after two months of declines from the record high in June. Shipments of non-durable goods manufacturers increased 2.6 per cent from August to a new high of $\$ 1,603.1$ million.

With the exception of three non-durable goods industry groups - the foods and beverages industries, the paper and allied products industries, and the clothing industries all of which showed fractional decreases, all major industry groups registered increased shipments in September, mostly seasonal. More than two-fifths of the gain in September came from the 45.6 per cent seasonal increase in the transportation equipment industries which, however, for the first time since February fell below the corresponding monthly level of shipments in 1964. The next largest increase in absolute terms in September shipments as compared with August was in the electrical products industries which rose 18.0 per cent from the revised estimate of last month and 2.2 per cent compared with that of September 1964 to a record high of $\$ 173.3$ million. It must be noted however that the preliminary estimates for this major group have frequently not been reliable during the past year as many respondents to the survey have been filing the monthly returns late. A comparison of the August revised estimate with the preliminary estimate for this month shows a revision of nearly 10 per cent in the shipments value. The estimated value of $\$ 43.1 \mathrm{mili} i o n$ in September shipments in the rubber industries was 26.3 per cent higher than during the preceding month but slightly lower than the comparable level for last year. The major factor in this rise appears to be a normal autumn increase in manufacturing activity.

Manufacturers' inventories owned in September were valued at $\$ 5,477.5 \mathrm{mili}$ ion compared with the revised $\$ 5,430.1 \mathrm{mili}$ ion in August. The average month-end level of inventories owned during the January - September period was 7.0 per cent above the comparable level in 1964. The advance of inventories in September as usual was largely concentrated in the durable goods industries. The greatest contributor to the gain of September inventories was the transportation equipment industries reflecting a seasonal high level of goods in process inventory in the motor vehicles
industry. The foods and beverages industry group showed the largest August to September decline in shipments and reported a substantial increase in inventories, almost entirely in the form of finished products. The largest relative decine in inventories owned in September was recorded in the tobacco industries which dropped 3.3 per cent from the level in August. Nearly all major industry groups indicated higher inventories in September this year than in September 1964, except for the foods and beverages industries and the petroleum and coal products industries; the largest increases were in the metal fabricating industries, the machinery industries, the electrical products industries, and the primary metal industries.

The increase of new orders received in September was almost equally shared by the durables and the non-durables groups. New orders, seasonally adjusted, were 4.7 per cent higher than in the same month a year ago.

Unfilled orders of durable goods producers at the end of September showed a fractional increase of 0.1 per cent from last month. Unfilled orders in the January - September period ranged from 12.7 per cent to 20.0 per cent ahead of the comparable months in 1964, with the greatest increases shown by the metal fabricating industries and the machinery industries.

## CONCEPTS

Shipments - (Tables 1 to 4) - represent an estimated projection, on a monthly basis, of the latest available Census of Manufactures values.

New orders - (Tables 2 and 3) - This series is designed to indicate the rate at which new business is being received. It 15 defined as all New Orders Received during the period, at estimated selling values. Thus it covers total new orders, net of canceliations, regardless of whether the orders will be filled from stock or as a result of activity during the same month (and, therefore, will also be reported as shipments in the month received) or whether they will be added to existing backlogs.

Unfilled Orders - (Tables 2 and 3) - are defined as orders on books at the end of the period stated. That is, they cover orders received but not yet shipped (or treated as a sale), irrespective of work done on them or of stocks from which they can be filled.

Total Inventory Owned - (Tables 2 to 4) - represents the estimated book value of inventory owned by manufacturers in connection with the manufacturing operations of the establishment covered whether held at plant or elsewhere, at the end of the period stated. It is made up of: raw materials, goods in process, finished goods of own manufacture less the value of inventory held but not owned which cannot be assigned to specific components. Since the series relates to manufacturing inventory only, value of goods purchased for re-sale is not included.

Inventory Held but Not Owned - (Tables 2 and 3) - represents, as far as possible, the portion of manufacturers' total inventory holdings which are no longer owned by the reporting manufacturers because of payments made on long-term contracts as work on these progresses. This item is applicable only to the relatively few industries where long-term contracts are common although, because of the nature of the item, the value per industry is high.

Because of variations in accounting methods there are a few cases where it is not possible to obtain values for this type of inventory. The estimated value shown for this item must therefore be considered to some extent incomplete.

Total Inventory Held - (Tables 2 and 3) - represents the estimated total value of manufacturers' inventory holdings in connection with manufacturing operations, regardless of ownership; it differs from inventory owned by the inclusion of inventories held under progress payments arrangements.

Inventory Components - (Tables 2 and 3) - Raw Materials, Goods in Process, and Finished Products are reported and compiled as on the books of each manufacturer, 1.e. there has been no attempt co define the components specifically for each industry.

The inventory components are always a breakdown of total inventory held, not of total inventory owned. In industries where these two items differ, due to the inclusion of inventory held but not owned (see above), it is not possible to obrain value of inventory owned by componencs since, where separate progress accounts are maintained, firms concerned can only state that, of total holdings, a certain amount is not longer owned by them. It is fairly obvious that the bulk of such payments apply to goods in process holdings but due to time lags in shipments and to prepayments some of the total value of inventory held but not owned would be applicable to finished products or raw materials.

Any comparisons of shipments/inventory ratios should be made using total inventory owned, not total inventory held, since the latter tncludes values which have already been written off to sales. If shipments/inventory ratios are desired using inventory components, rather than total inventory, a reasonable approximation to total inventory owned by components would be obtained by assuming that all inventory held but not owned had been included with goods in process.

Groupings - The Standard Industrial Classification groupings of industries used in Tables 3 and 4 are defined according to the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. A list of the industries included in the Standard Industrial Classification groups will be found on page 40 of the bulletin.

## SOURCES

Monthly (or, in a few cases, quarterly) reports covering value of inventories and shipments are now subnitted on a voluntary basis by 3,000 plants in 120 industries; in addition, 3,000 small plants fn 100 of these industries report monthly shipments only. Of the first group, 1,025 plants in 83 industries also report new and unfilled orders. Two industries are included in the total shipments estimates by using data available from other Bureau series, and they are also included in the rotal inventory escimates.
