## TREND SUMMARY

SHIPMENTS: Manufacturers' shipments in February, valued at an estimated $\$ 1,906.8$ million, were 1.3 per cent below the revised January value of $\$ 1,931.3$ million and 9.6 percent above the February 1961 value of $\$ 1,739.2$ million. Shipments for the two months of 1962 of $\$ 3,838.1$ million were 10.5 per cent above the comparable 1961 total of $\$ 3,474.4$ m111ion and 7.2 per cent above the 1960 total of $\$ 3,580.7$ million.

Seven groups of the Standard Industrial Classification declined from January but half of the decline of $\$ 42.6$ million of the seven groups was concentrated in just two groups. Foods and beverages was down in February by $\$ 12.3$ million reflecting the lower shipments in the slaughtering and meat packing industry; non ferrous metal products was $\$ 10.9$ million lower. An increase of $\$ 8.8$ million in the knitting mills and clothing group and other increases totaling $\$ 9.3$ million left a net decline of $\$ 24.5$ million in February. The Economic Use Classification shows declines in the perishable consumers' goods group, the construction goods group and in all the miscellaneous groups. This February, all the miscellaneous groups show declines whereas in the last ten years at least one of the miscellaneous groups has shown an increase from January to February. The motor vehicles and related industries group and the industries producing largely for export group often show increases in February as compared with January while the intermediate goods and supplies group and the unclassifiable industries have recorded slightly more declines in February than increases.

The decline in February as compared with January is the third in the past ten years but perhaps more interesting is the fact that this February is the third month of consecutively lower shipments. The adjusted data show very clearly that shipments have levelled off, perhaps temporarily, after the considerable expansion during the last eight months of 1961. Despite this, the level of shipments remains high and the adjusted data show $\$ 2,109.6$ million for February, higher than any preceding value excepting that for December 1961 of $\$ 2,126.0$ million. The adjusted value for January of $\$ 2,066.7$ million is just below the August 1961 value of $\$ 2,072.2$ million leaving January and February respectively the fourth and second highest adjusted shipments values recorded for any month to date.

Durable goods shipments after a lengthy period of gradual decline recovered considerably in the latter months of 1961. In 1962, shipments have eased to a level which is moderately high for the early months of the year although February, which records a slight decline more usually shows a slight increase. Year over year comparisons show that durable goods in the two months of 1962 show an advance of 13.8 per cent over the comparable 1961 total while non-durable goods show an advance of only 8.2 per cent over the 1961 total. However, durable shipments for the two months of 1962 represent 42.0 per cent of the total shipments. For the like months of 1961 , durable shipments were 40.8 per cent and for the same comparison were 43.1 in 1960. The gradual decline in durable shipments appears to date from late $19>9$ through 1960 to the early months of 1961 . The per cent strength in durable shipments, although levelling off, has reversed the downward trend.

INVENTORIES: Inventories owned by manufacturers at the end of February of $\$ 4,484.8$ million were 0.7 per cent above the January estimate of $\$ 4,451.6$ million and 3.5 per cent above the February 1961 estimate of $\$ 4,332.2$ million. Total inventory held by manufactures at the end of February of $\$ 4,715.3$ million was up 1.0 per cent from the January value of $\$ 4,669.9$ million and up 3.2 per cent from the February 1961 value of $\$ 4,570.2$ million. The value of inventory held under long-term contracts (progress payments) of $\$ 230.5$ million at the end of February was up 5.6 per cent from $\$ 218.3$ million in January and down 3.2 per cent from $\$ 238.0$ million a year ago. Components showed the following changes between January and February this year: goods in process up 1.6 per cent, goods in process less progress payments up 0.6 per cent, finished products up 2.1 per cent and raw materials virtually unchanged.

The ratio of total inventory owned to shipments was 2.35 in February, 2.33 in January and 2.49 in February 1961. The ratio of finished products to shipments was 0.77 in February, 0.7 in January and 0.82 in February 1961.

An increase in inventory owned by manufacturers from January to February has, in the past, been a fairly stable movement reflecting as it does the seasonal accumulation peculiar to tobacco products, wood products, paper products and textiles. The increase which is shown this year is particularly interesting for the seasonally adjusted data shows a decline, which indicates that the increase is less than the usual seasonal increase during a period when a fairly substantial cyclical accumulation would be more expected. Among the groups of the SIC that are dominated by seasonal movement only two depart appreciably from past years. Foods and beverages, showing a current decline of $\$ 8$ million, more usually show a decline of about $\$ 2 y$ million. Tobacco and tobacco products
currently showing a $\$ 2$ million increase usually shows an increase of $\$ 15$ million. These large variations from usual thus largely negate each other and, in fact, the $\$ 33$ million increase this February compares with the $\$ 31$ million increase that is the average of the last four years.

Frow the low point in July 1961 in both the adjusted and unadjusted series, inventories owned have advanced $\$ 242.8$ million in the unadjusted data and $\$ 167.0$ million in the adjusted data. This suggests that the difference of $\$ 75.8$ million is due to purely seasonal forces and most of it can be reasonably allocated among the groups which exhibit easily identifiable seasonality. They are: foods and beverages, tobacco and tobacco products, textiles (groups 5 and 6), wood products, paper products, electrical apparatus, non-metallic mineral products and chemical products. Three groups, iron and steel, transportation, and non-ferrous metals have since July increased a total of $\$ 83.0$ million and these groups may be fairly considered as holding the bulk of the non-seasonal accumulation although all groups hold varying shares of the non-seasonal accumulation.

Tracing the non-seasonal accumulation through the ratios of inventories owned to shipments shows that from the low of 2.43 in August 1961 the ratios of the iron and steel group have advanced steadily to 3.17 in February. The low of 2.43 is the lowest value since the same value was recorded in September 1959. Non-ferrous metals has also started a steady increase with the value of the ratio rising from a low of 2.04 in September 1961 to 2.56 in February. The ratios of the transportation group have moved differently. From a high of 2.82 in August 1961 the ratios for this group moved downard to 1.45 in December before climbing to 1.53 in January and 1.50 in February.

The ratio of total inventories owned to shipments for all manufacturing industries, using adjusted data for both series, was driven down sharply during the middle months of 1961 . From the low of 2.07 in August 1961, the ratios have shown a distinct rise, although remaining at low to moderate values, which is the result both of rising inventory levels and moderating shipments values. For January the ratio was 2.16 and in February, 2.11 .

ORDERS: The value of unfilled orders held by manufacturers at the end of February of $\$ 2,032.5$ million was up 0.6 per cent from $\$ 2,020.5$ willion at the end of January and up 7.2 per cent from $\$ 1,896.0$ million at the end of February 1961.

New orders received by manufacturers during February of $\$ 1,918.7$ willion were down 4.9 per cent from $\$ 2,016.9$ million in January and up 10.3 per cent from $\$ 1,738.9$ million in February 1961. New orders received for the two months of 1962 of $\$ 3,935.6$ million have a 2.5 per cent lead over shipments of $\$ 3,838.1$ million in the same period. In 1961, the same comparison shows a 2.0 per cent lead.

Changes in unfilled orders from January to February were greatest in percentage terms in semi-durable consuners' goods, and intermediate goods and supplies of minus and plus 4.0 per cent respectively. Nearly all groups of the Economic Use classification showed increases over the year in unfilled orders. The largest in percentage terms were: motor vehicles and related industries 22.9 , other capital goods 18.0 , intermediate goods and supplies 17.7 , construction goods 13.3 , and industries producing largely for export 12.9 .

TRADING OUTLETS: Sales through manufacturers' trading outlets of $\$ 222.4$ million in February were down 1.2 per cent from $\$ 225.0$ million in January and up 1.7 per cent from $\$ 218.6$ million in February 1961.

Inventories held at manufacturers' trading outlets of $\$ 265.8$ million were down 4.6 per cent from $\$ 278.6$ million in January and down 7.0 per cent from $\$ 28.9$ million in February 1961.

## CONCEPTS

Shipments - (Tables 1 to 5) - represent an estimated projection, on a monthly basia, of the latest avalable Census of Industry values.

New Orders - (Tables 2 to 5 ) $=$ This series is designed to indicate the rate at which new business is being received. It is defined as all New Orders Received during the period, at estimated selling values. Thus it covers total new orders, net of cancellations, regardless of whether the orders will be filled from stock or as a result of activity during the same month (and, cherefore, will also be reported as shipments in the month received) or whether they will be added to existing backlogs.

Unfilled Orders - (Tables 2 co 5) - are defined at escimated selling value, at the end of the period atated, of orders recelved but not yet shipped (or treated as a sale), irrespective of work done on them or of stocks from which they can be filled.

Total Inventory Owned - (Tables 2 to 5) - represents the estimated book value of inventory owned by manufacturers in connection with manufacturing operations, whether held at plant or not, at the end of the period stated. It is made up of raw materials, goods in process, finished goods of own manufacture at plant and warehouse, less value of inventory held but not owned which cannot be assigned to specific components. Since the series relates to manufacturing inventory only, value of goods purchased for re-sale is not included.

Inventory Held but Not Owned - (Tables 2 to 5) - represents, as far as possible, the portion of manufacturers' total inventory holdings which are no longer owned by the reporting manufacturers because of payments made on long-term contracts as work on these progresses. This item is applicable only to the relacively few industries where long-texm contracts are comon although, because of the nature of the item, the value per industry is high.

Because of variations in accounting merhods there are a few cases where it is not possible to obtain values for this type of inventory. The estimeted value shown for this item must therefore be considered to sone extent incomplete.

Total Inventory Heid - (Tables 2 to 5) - represents the estimated total value of manufacturers' inventory holdings in connection with minfacturing operations, regardless of ownership; it differs from inventory owned by the inclusion of amounts heid under progress payments arrangements.

Inventory Components - (Tables 2 to 5) = (Raw Materials, Goods in Process, and Finished Products) are reported and compiled as on the books of each manufacturex, l. e. there has been no attempt to define the components specificaliy for each industry.

The inventory components are always a breakdown of total inventory held, not of total inventory owned. In industries where these two items differ, due to the inclusion of inventory held but not owned (see above), it is not possible to obtain value of inventory owned by components since, where separate progress accounts are malntained, firms concerned can only state that, of total holdings, a certain amount is no longer owned by them. It is falrly obvious that the bulk of such payments apply to goods in process holdings but due to time lags in shipments and to prepayments some of the total value of inventory held but not owned would be applicable to finished products or raw materials.

Any comparisons of shipments/inventory ratios should be made using total inventory owned, not total inventory held, since the latter includes values which have already been witten off to sales. If shipments inventory ratios are desired using inventory components, rather than total inventory, a reasonable spproximation to total inventory owned by components would be obtained by assuming that all inventory held but not owned had been included with goods in process.

Trading Outlets - (Table 7) - are defined as any establishments (other than retail atores) operated by conufacturers, apart from their plants or plant-warehouses, which carry stocks and make sales direct to customers. Sales offices which merely arrange salea but do not carry stock, or which carry small quantitles only for demonstration purpobes, are not included. Sales for this series represent direct sales from the outlet of gonds manufactured by the owning or associated manufacturing company, with sales arranged by outlets but shipped direct from plant excluded wherever possible; goods purchased for re-sale from sources other than the owning or associated manufacturing company are also excluded except for the Petroleum producta industry group where a separation of purchased products is not feasible. Inventories for this series represents owned inventories held at Trading Outlets or in warehouses serving the trading outlets; again, goods purchased for re-sale are excluded except for the Petroleum Products industry.

Industries and Groupings - All individual industries (Table 5) and the Standard Industrial Clasaification groupings of industries used in Tables 3, 6 and 7 , are defined according to the Standard Industrial Classificacion Manual. A list of the industries included in the Standard Industrial Classification groups and in the Economic-Use groupings of industries (Iables 4 , and 6) will be found on page 53 of the bulletin.

## SOURCES

Monthiy (or, in a few cases, quarterly) reports covering value of inventories and shipments are now submitted on a voluntary basis by 3,000 plants in 120 industries; in addition, 3,000 small plants in 100 of these industries report monthly shipments only. Of the first group, 1,025 plants in 83 industries also report new and unfilled orders. Four industries are included in the total shipments estimstes by using data available from other Buresu series, and two of these are also included in the total inventory estimates.
