## REVISION TO PREVIOUSLY PUBLISHED SERIES

This publication contains monthly data on shipments, inventories and orders for manufacturers classified according to the new standard industrial classification from January 1958 to December 1962. The change in the total annual estimates for 1958 and 1959 (the values are $0.4 \%$ lower in each year from the previously published values) is the result of transferring the salt industry and the gas absorption plants from manufacturing to the mining industry and the deletion of non-commercial periodicals from the publishing industry. The change in the 1960 total partly reflects the adjustment to the actual census of manufactures value for this year, (as the census figures become available each year the values projected from the previous census base year are replaced by the census values) and partly the inclusion in the census estimate for 1960 for two new industries: poultry processors and dental laboratories; and the addition of two groups of establishments, electro-plating and book publishers, as manufacturers. The cotal value of shipments for these new additions in 1960 was $\$ 162$ million out of the estimated change of $\$ 381$ million; thus the estimated total for 1960 excluding these new additions was only some $\$ 219$ million lower than the census values, a difference of 0.5 percent. The changes in 1961 and 1962 from the previously published values reflect the shift to the higher base with the new additions included.

Since it has been decided to re-run 1960 values excluding these new additions in order to bring these changes into the series in 1961 in combination with the changes resulting from the re-definition of the manufacturing establishment the values included for 1960 in this publication will differ from the revised 1960 values which will be published by the census of manufactures later this year. To some extent also the estimates shown anticipate the changes which will take place in manufacturing statistics when the new establishment definition is implemented in the census for 1961. The manufacturing establishment is now defined as the smallest manufacturing unit in a company which is a separate accounting entity capable of reporting the full range of principle statistics. The former definition also required a full range of statistics but the essential consideration was the attempt to break out manufacturing activity separate from other activity and to obtain separate reports if major groups of commodities produced in the same plant were classifiable to different industries. In changing the emphasis many companies which formerly prepared two or more census reports for the same manufacturing location will now prepare only one and in many cases the value of shipments will reflect final sales rather than values at the manufacturing level as in the past. The firms participating in the monthly survey have fairly generally adjusted their monthly reporting to the new definition during 1962 as the 1961 census reports came in or were revised on the new basis. It should be added that as the new definition of the establishment is designed to obtain the most meaningful values from firms on the basis in which their records are set up many firms were already reporting monthly on this basis as the detailed adjustments required to report on the old definition were often only possible for the annual report. Thus, while the use of data from different reporting units is not a new problem the adjustment and calculation of trends from reports which were changing during the year has certainly resulted in less reliable estimates.

The change in the standard industrial classification not only changed the definition and content of the individual industries but also the grouping of industries into major groups. These changes will be outlined here, although in this publication, data for the major groups only are being published; individual industry values will be added to the regular monthly bulletin as soon as possible. No grouping of industries according to economic use is included at this time; the economic use groups will be revised and published when the monthly series is revised to the 1961 census base as this will complete the Census of Manufactures revision to the new establishment concept.

In revising the classification of manufacturing industries, twenty groups were set up to replace the former seventeen; a list of these groups and the component industries is included in the appendix. Basically the revision shifts the emphasis from grouping by raw material content to grouping by the similarity of the end product and the similarity of the process being carried on. Thus in the foods and beverages industries in addition to adding poultry processing to manufacturing, (it had formerly been considered wholesaling, ) the only adjustment was to bring in vegetable oil mills from the chemical industry.

In textiles the former basis of separation by cotton, wool and synthetic fibres has been revised to consider all fibre preparing mills as a separate industry, also felt mills and thread mills as separate industries without regard to the raw material. The cloth mills however remain separated according to the material, cotton, wool, or synthetic fibres. The clothing industries, already classified by end product, remain unchanged.

A new group was set up called the furniture and fixtures industries including wooden furniture, formerly in the wood industries, and those establishments manufacturing furniture formerly included in the metal and the miscellaneous industries group. It is divided into separate industries for household
furniture, office furniture, other furniture and the electric lamp and shade industry.
The printing and publishing industries group has been adjusted to exclude non-comercial periodicals and to include the book publishers.

The electrical products industries are now broken down into eight industries instead of the five former ones by separating the household radio and television receivers industries from communcations equipment manufacturers and by adding telephone equipment manufacturers to this latter group, a transfer from the miscellaneous electrical products industry. The former electrical appliances industry has been divided into two groups: major appliances (electric and non-electric) and small electric appliances; washing machines, sewing machines and stoves are included in the major appliances group. Electric wire and cable has been set up as a separate industry. Battery manufacture and the electrical industrial equipment industry are essentially unchanged.

The non-metallic mineral products industries have been adjusted by the transfer of the salt industry to mining. The petroleum and coal products industries have been adjusted by the abolition of the coke and gas industry. The coke plants which were mainly operated as divisions of the integrated steel mills are now included with these mills. The gas plants have been transferred to the electric power, gas and water utilities group.

The two former groups, iron and steel products and non-ferrous metal products, have been replaced by three, in effect splitting up a combination of the two groups into three divisions: primary metals, metal fabricating industries and machinery industries. Under the primary metals group separate industries have been set up by type of activity and end product so that in this group there are iron and steel mills, steel pipe and tube mills and iron foundries as well as smelting and refining mills and a separate industry for rolling, casting and extruding mills for each of aluminium, copper and its alloys, and other metals.

In the metal fabricating industries boiler and plate works have been defined to cover manufacturing where the products are completed in the plant; the fabricated structural metal industry covers the former structural steel industries plus tanks and such products which are erected on site.

The architectural metal industry has been largely taken out of the former miscellaneous metal groups to include such things as metal doors and windows which has become increasingly important during the past ten years. Plants largely producing metal fasteners have been transferred from the hardware industry to the wire and wire products industry.

In the machinery industries the major change is the removal of all household machines to the appliances industries and separating commercial refrigeration and air-conditioning equipment manufactures as a separate industry.

Considerable revision was made in the separate industries comprising the chemical industries group but the only change outside the group was the transfer of vegetable oil mills to the food and beverage industries group. The new industry manufactures of industrial chemicals includes all plants manufacturing basic chemicals such as synthetic rubber, fertilizer materials such as ammonium nitrate and ammonium phosphate and compressed gases. The fertilizer industry will cover mixed fertilizer manufactures including the manufacture of superphosphates. Printing inks and explosives are now to be covered in separate industries. The formerly separate industries covering coal tar distillation, adhesives and polishes and dressings will now be included in other chemical industries which will also include the manufacture of writing inks.


## TREND SUMMARY

The publication of five years data in the monthly series of manufacturing statistics of shipments, inventories and orders and the omission in the first bulletin of any data later than December 1962, makes it possible to look at these five years again without the usual preoccupation with the current values.

The shipments series, in total, shows very clearly the inertia in the economy from the spring of 1959 to the fall of 1961. Separating industries into the durable and non-durable groups, even without the benefit of a seasonally adjusted series, shows up the differences between them. There was a steady but very slow upward movement in shipments in the non-durable goods industries in the three years 1958 to 1960 with an acceleration of the upward trend in 1961 and 1962. Shipments in the durable goods industries show a definite downward trend from the fourth quarter of 1959 to the end of the second quarter of 1961. The movement from May 1961 to the end of December 1962 was strongly upward.

Total inventories owned rose steadily and sharply from the middle of 1958 to March 1959 when they fell off for four months to rise again, first slowly from August to November 1959 and sharply from December to March of 1960. Liquidation set in in May of 1960 and stocks fell from then until the end of the year. The rise during the winter of 1960-61 was not spectacular and stocks were allowed to run down again in the second quarter of 1961. From October 1961 to the end of March 1962 the accumulation was very large; the subsequent decilne in the second quarter of 1962 was small and during the second half of 1962 stocks were again accumulated.

The decline in inventories which began in 1959 set in first in January of that year in the non-durable group; the seasonal decline in these industries doesn't usually show up mtil April and although the decline in these industries in the first three months was not large the decline was unusual. Durable goods inventories continued to be accumulated until May of that year and the heavy decline did not set in until June of 1960 . The decline in durable goods inventories was very sharp from June 1960 through to January 1961 and although stocks rose from October 1961 until the end of 1962 , with the exception of June and July last year, the rise has been less rapid than the rise in the non-durable industries. In fact, ignoring seasonal swings the basic trend in the non-durable industries stocks was steadily upward from July 1959 to the end of last year. The underlying trend in the durable goods industries appears to have been an upward swing from October 1958 to May 1960 and a downward movement from June 1960 to September 1961 with an upward movement again, but at a lower rate, from October 1961 until the end of 1962.

The ratio of inventories to shipments brings out the contrast in the slower moving inventory series with the shipments series; for manufactures in total, the average ratio in 1962 of 2.03 was the lowest in the five years with the lowest estimate in the entire period, 1.86 , occurring three times during this year - in May, June and October 1962.

The foods and beverages industries, which account for approximately 20 percent of total shipments and 15 percent of inventories show very little change during the period. The ratio of inventories to shipments varies considerably during the year as the seasonal influence in these industries is great but the annual average varied from 1.57 in 1960, the lowest in the five year period, to 1.65 in 1962.

Most of the other non-durable industries show ratios low in 1961 or 1962 as compared with the previous years but with little variation from year to year.

The textile industries and knitting mills show steadily lower ratios each year, with the exception of textiles in 1960, with the lowest ratios in 1962 in any of the previous five years.

The clothing industries, on the other hand, reached a peak in 1960 and have been higher in 1961 and 1962 than in the earlier years, 1958 and 1959.

The decline in total shipments in the durable goods industries between 1959 and 1961 is somewhat misleading since shipments in most of the durable goods industries were slightly higher in these years than in 1958 although they remained fairly stable during the following three years. The rise which shows up in 1962 actually began in the summer of 1961 but moving up from a low first quarter, annual totals were very little higher than the previous years. The decline which shows up in the total reflects the decline in the transportation equipment industries in this period and it appears as if the sharp rise in shipments in 1962 was led by the sharp and continued advance in the automobile industry. All the durable goods industries has higher shipments in 1962 however.

Although inventories were declining in the durable goods industries through 1960 and 1961, the ratio of inventories to shipments stayed fairly level during these years and although inventories also began to rise at the end of 1961 the upturn in shipments brought the 1962 ratios, with the exception of the electrical products industries group to very low levels. The transportation equipment industries showed a ratio of 1.48 in 1962 as compared with the year before of 1.74 and with 1958 of 1.61. The electrical products industries show up in contrast to the other durable goods industries here as the ratio of 3.18 was higher than in 1961 and very comparable with 1959 and 1960 ratios.

\section*{CONCEPTS, METHODS AND LDMITATIONS}

\section*{CONCEPTS}

SHIPMENTS, ORDERS AND INVENTORIES (Tables 1, 2, 3 and 4):

Shipments - represent an estimated projection, on monthly basis, of the latest available Gross Value of Factory Shipments from the annual Census of Manufactures. In the majority of cases, Census of Manufactures values include (a) sales from manufacturing plant of producte made at the plant, (b) amounts received for repairs or custom work, (c) shipments of goods manufactured in the plant for further processing in another unit of the same company, and (d) shipments of finished products to manufacturers' sales branches for sale, for each establishment included. The value level used is defined as "factory selling value". Goods purchased for re-sale without further processing are not included.(1)

New Orders - This series is designed to indicate the rate at which new business is being received. It is defined as all Hew Orders Received during the period at estimated selling values. Thus it covers total new orders, net of cancellations, regardless of whether the orders will be filled from stock or as a result of activity during the same month (and, therefore, will also be reported as shipments in the month received) or whether they will be added to existing backlogs.

Unfilled Orders - are defined as estimated selling value, at the end of the period stated, of orders received but not yet shipped (or treated \(a_{s}\) a ale), irrespective of work done on them or of stocks from which they can be filled. (Since progress payments are treated for this survey as sales in the month received, total unfilled orders reported each month by firms operating on a progress payments basis are reduced by the total of progress accounts for these firms.) This definition of Unfilled Orders is therefore an expression in terms of future shipments values.

Total Inventory owned - represents the estimated book value of inventory owned by manufacturers in connection with manufacturing operations, whecher held at plant or not, at the end of the period stated. It is made up of:
(a) raw materials;
(b) goods in process;
(c) fintahed goods of own manufacture at plant and warehouse;
less (d) value of inventory held but not owned. This item cannot be assigned to specific components.
Since the series relates to manufacturing inventory only, the value of inventory of goods purchased for re-sale without further processing is not included.

Inventory Held but Not Owned - represents, as far as possible, the portion of manufacturers' total inventory holdings which are no longer owned by the reporting manufacturers because of payments made on long-terw contracts as work on these progresses. This item is applicable only to the relatively few industries where long-term contracts are common although, because of the nature of the item, the value per industry is high.

Becsuse of variations in accounting methods there are a few cases where it is not possible co obtain values for this type of inventory - some firms treat progress receipts as sales and reduce book value of inventory as payments are received; in some of these cases they no longer have records of actual holdings above the book value level. Wherever estimates are available, these have been included, but the estimated value of inventory under this heading must be considered, to some extent, incomplete.

Total Inventory Held - represents the estimaced total book value of manufacturers inventory holdinge in connection with manufacturing operations, regardless of ownership; it differs from total Inventory owned because of the inclusion of inventory held under progress payments arrangementa. It includes items (a) to (c) as show above under total inventory owned.

Inventory Components: Raw Materials, Goods in Process, and Finished Products, are reported and compiled as on the books of each manufacturer, i.e. there has been no attempt to make definitions of components appropriate to each industry.
(1) There are a few exceptions to the defindtion of Census of Manufactures values given above:
(1) In two industries, Samills, and Slaughtering and Meat Packing, custom work is valued at the estimated selling value of the product rather than by the anounts received for such work.
(ii) In four industries, Fabricated Structural Metal, Aircrsft, Railroad Rolling Stock and Shipbuilding, the Census of Manufactures value is for "work done during the year", i.e. production of finished goods plus change in goods-in-process inventory during the year, rather than shipmenta. Por these industrles, the Census of Manufactures values are also adjusted by change in finished products inventory before projection for the monthly series.

There are three industries apart from those listed under (ii) above, for which adjustments co Census of Manufactures values are made before projection for the monthly series. In the Flour Mills, Breweries and Fruit and Vegetable Canners and Preservers industries, all of which are characterized by large seasonal variations, many large firms operate on fiscal year periods (which are used in Census of Manufactures complations) differing from the calendar year. In unusual years the projection of Census of Manufactures values for these industries, as if they represent calendar year values, could cause considerable distortion in the estimates. To avoid this, the census of Manufactures values have been adjusted to estimated calendar year values before projection. This adjustment is based on values reported to the monthly survey.

Firms operating on long-term contracts represent a special problem for the monthly series. The value levels projected are those of the Census of Manufactures as described in the first paragraph (except for che four industries described under (ii) above). However, for the monthly series, all progress receipts on long-term contracts are included as sales in the month received, instead of the cotal sale being included in the month the sale is finalized. It is felt that this treatment gives a becter indication of monthly activity but it does dllow possible distortion of value levels in that, for the Census of Manufactures value which is being projected, any final sale will be recorded in one specific year, while the monthiy series may have spread this gale over more than one calendar year. Since the bulk of the value of long-term contract work falls in the four industries noted (in (ii) above), for which adjustments for work done are made in compiling the Census of Manufactures value, this inconsistency does not affect the all-industry or group totals to any great extent.

The inventory components are always a breakdown of total inventory held, not of total inventory owned. In industries where these two items differ, due to the inclusion of inventory held but not owned (see above), it is not possible co obtain value of inventory owned by componenta since, where separate progress accounta are maintained, firms concerned can only state that, of total holdings, a certain amount is no longer owned by them. It is fairly obvious that the bulk of such payments apply to goods in process holdings but due to time lags in shipments and to prepayments some of the total value of inventory held but nor owned would be applicable to finished products or raw materials.

Any comparisons of shipments/inventory ratios should be made using total inventory owned, not total inventory held, since the latter includes vslues which have already been written off to sales. If shipments/inventory ratios are desired using inventory components, rather than total inventory, a reasonable approximation to total inventory owned by components would be obtained by assuming that all inventory held but not owned had been included with goods in process.

Groupings - The standard Industrial Classification groupings of industries used in Table 3 , are defined according to the Standard Industrial Classification Manual.

\section*{METHODS}

\section*{(a) Current Estimates -}

For six series (plant shipments, raw materials, goods in process, plant finished products, inventory held but not oumed and unfilled ordersi) current value estimates for each industry covered are made by applying the monthly percentage changes shown by the unwelghted group of reporting firms in each industry to the latest avallable benchmark values for the same industries. Industries not covered are carried at the latest available benchmark levels.
(The above is aubject to few exceptions. In one industry, reporting firms are trested as atratum sample, rather than as an unwighted group. In three industries, available physical data on stocks and shipments are valued using price indexes. In three industries, shipments estimates are based on employment data and price indexes.)

Total inventory heid in each industry is the sum of the estimated values for raw materials, goods in process, and finished products. Total inventory owned in each industry is calculated by deducting the estimated value for inventory held but not owned from estimated total inventory held. Value of new orders in each industry is derived from estimated shipments sid unfilled orders using the formula "Unfilled Orders at end of previous month plus Net New Orders during month less Shipments during month equals Unfilled Orders at end of Current month".
(b) Benchmark Revisions =

As new benchmarks become avallable, estimates for the year to which the benchmarks apply are revised as follows:
For the plant shipments series, the Census of Manufactures value for the year for each industry is spread by months according to the trend shown by reporting forms in the original estimate for chat year.

For the four basic inventory series (raw materials, goods in process, plant finished products and inventory held but not owned) and the unfilled orders series, where the benchmark values apply to the Year-End rather than to the entire year as in the shipments series, the error in the original estimate for the year-end for each industry is assumed to have accumalated equally over all twelve months of the year (1.e., one-twelfth of the amount of the error is added to the original estimate for January; two-twelfths ls added to the original estimate for February; three-twelfths to March and so on).

The three derived series (total dnventory held, cotal inventory owned, and new orders) are re-calculated on the basis of the revised data for the other six series.

\section*{LIMITATIONS TO THE USES OF THE DATA IN THIS REPORI}
(L) Data for individual industries should not be interpreted as commodity data, since very few industries produce only one commodity or only one class of commodities.
(2) Since the series are in terms of current values, changes over time may be the result of both price and volume changes. Some indication of the extent to which changes in value are due to price changes, thus isolating the physical change which has taken place, can be obtained by reference to the wholeasle price index. This procedure is, however, inadequate for anything more than general indication of trends. The main problem is that the wholesale price index is a comodity price index, while the shipments, orders, and inventory series are industry series with the possibility of changes in conmodity content over time. Theae changes in comodity content could seriously affect the weighting pattern to be applied to price indexes considered applicable for any specific industry. In considering inventory values turnover rates and valuation methods are other important varlables which should be caken into consideration but for which adequate data are aeldom available.
(3) Shipments data do not necessarily represent market sales for the manufacturing undverse. (a) Apart from the few exceptions as noted under (b) below they are defined (see page 28 ) to include total movement of goods out of manufacturing plants (or, in some cases, divisions of plants); shipments of goods for further processing by other plants of mitiple-unit companies are, therefore, included as well as shipments for sale. (b) In a few special cases, the Census of Manufactures values include goods in-process change, and for these cases progress receipts on long-term contracta are included as shipments as they occur, rather than the thme sales are finalized. (c) Many manufacturers re-sell purchased goods, in addition to sales of their own products and these re-sale items are not included.
(4) The component breskdown for inventories is on an establishment, not a comodity, basis. Since each manufacturer reports inventories as on his own books, both for the monthly and amual surveys, and since a number of industries contaln plants at various stages of processing, the finished products for one plant might represent coumodities which would be considered raw materials or goods in process for another plant in the same industry. The composition of each industry mat be studied before attempting to use the component breakdown as applicable to the industry as such, rather than to the firms in the industry.
(5) For Unfilled Orders, the following reservations apply:
(a) The series, by definition, excludes plants producing entirely for stock. Since approximately \(40 \%\) of manufacturing is done by such plants the trends shown are not necessarily applicable to manufacturing in general.
(b) Since the series is defined as "unshipped" orders, rather than "unproduced" orders, there is always the probability that some of the Unfilled Orders are accounted for in inventory holdings. The reduction of unfilled orders by progress receipts eliminates to a considerable extent the effect of large goods-in-process holdings in connection with long-term contracts, but the amount of the remaining inventory, either goods-in-process or finished products, which is held in connection with existing unfilled orders would be difficult to evaluate.
(c) The series includes total orders, not just those considered as "binding", so estimates of future shipments trends based on these may be overstated due to the possibility of cancellations.
(d) Unfilled Orders for all industries include to some extent a duplication due to the fact that orders for final products in one industry may result in orders to firms at secondary or primary stages of processing. Since the total gross value of shipments will contain the same duplication, this does not invalidate the series for purposes of analysis. However, the total iopact of any one order on future shipurents levels will not necessarily be shown in the Unfilled Orders serfes since at any stage an order may be filled from stack rather than added to existing backlogs.
