## TREND SUMMARY

Manufacturer's shipments in December were valued at an estimated $\$ 2,473.8 \mathrm{mfl}$ 110 down 3.3 per cent from the revised November estimate of $\$ 2,559.5$ million but 16.0 per cent higher than shipments in December 1962 when they were $\$ 2,132.9 \mathrm{million}$. The preliminary estimate of 1963 shipments is therefore $\$ 28,738.6$ million which is just less than 7 per cent higher than the estimated value of manufacturer's shipments in 1962 of $\$ 26,872.1$ million.

The comparison of December shipments this year with last is indicative of the usually high level of shipments this month and the comparison of the seasonally adjusted estimate for December of $\$ 2,654.8$ million with the November estimate also seasonally adjusted, $\$ 2,456.9$ million shows an increase of 8.1 per cent.

The increase in the seasonally adjusted shipments series in December was exceeded, although only slightly, once this year, in September. In September however the unusual increase reflected the earlier and sharp increase in automobile shipments. In December the maintenance of manufacturer's shipments at an unusually high level reflected general strength throughout almost all industries.

Inventories owned by manufacturers at the end of December were estimated at $\$ 4,713.0$ million, up 1.3 per cent from the revised November estimate of $\$ 4,651.2$ million and up 2.0 per cent from the $\$ 4,620.2$ million estimated a year ago. Inventorles held by manufacturers at the end of December were estimated at $\$ 4,989.2 \mathrm{mil-}$ lion, up 0.9 per cent from the preceeding month's revised estimate of $\$ 4,944.8 \mathrm{mil}-$ lion and 1.5 per cent up from the December 1962 estimate of $\$ 4,915.9$ million.

The changes by components did not reflect the actual decline in manufacturing activity in December as compared with November as raw materials and goods in process inventory were both up slightly from the previous month. The seasonally adjusted series shows an increase in goods in process inventory although a decline in the finished products estimates.

The ratio of finished products inventory to shipments, although rising above the November levels, dropped to the lowest level for December for years. The decline also showed up in the 1963 yearly averages which with two exceptions, the leather goods industries and the non-metallic mineral goods industries, were either lower or equal to the average ratio in the previous year. The ratio of finished products inventories to shipments in the electrical products industries and in the chemical products industries was on the average the same in 1963 as in 1962. Although it
seems apparent that inventories are being in general more tightly controlled the decline in the finished products-shipments ratios also appear to reflect the increase in manufacturer's shipments during the last four months of the year.

The estimated value of new orders in December was $\$ 2.450 .6 \mathrm{mili}$ ion, 4.1 per cent lower than the revised November estimate of $\$ 2,554.6$ million but 15.2 per cent higher than the December 1962 estimate of $\$ 2,126.4$ miliion. The estimated value of unfilled orders in December was $\$ 2,219.4$ million, 1.0 per cent lower than the revised November estimate of $\$ 2,242.6$ million and 9.4 per cent higher than the December 1962 estimate of $\$ 2,029.4$ million.

## CONCEPTS

Shipments - (Tables 1 to 4) - represent an estimated projection, on a monthly basis, of the latest avaflable Census of Manufactures values.

New Orders - (Tables 2 and 3) - This series is deaigned to indicate the rate at which new business is belng received. It is defined as all New Orders Received during the period, at estimated selling values. Thus it covers total new orders, net of cancellations, regardless of whether the orders will be filled from stock or as a result of activity during the same month (and, therefore, will also be reported as shipments in the month received) or whether they will be added to existing backlogs.

Unfilled Orders - (Tables 2 and 3) - are defined at estimated selling value, at the end of the period stated, of orders received but not yet shipped (or treated as a sale), irrespective of work done on them or of stocks from which they can be filled.

Total Inventory Owned - (Tables 2 to 4) - represents the estimated book value of inventory owned by manufacturers in connection with manafacturing operations, whether held at plant or not, at the end of the period stated. It is made up of: raw materials, goods in process, finished goods of own manufacture at plant and warehouse, less value of inventory held but not owned which cannot be asaigned to specific components. Since the seties relates to manfacturing inventory only, value of goods purchased for re-sale is not included.

Inventory Held but Not Owned - (Tables 2 and 3) - represents, as far as possible, the portion of manufacturers' total inventory holdings which are no longer owned by the reporting manufacturers because of payments made on long-term contracts as work on these progresses. This item is applicable only to the relacively few industries where long-term contracts are conmon although, because of the nature of the item, the value per industry is high.

Because of variations in accounting methods there are a few cases where it is not possible to obtain values for this type of inventory. The estimated value shown for this item must therefore be considered to some extent incomplete.

Total Inventory Held - (Tables 2 and 3) - represents the estimated total value of manufacturers inventory holdings in connection with manufacturing operations, regardless of ownership; it differs from inventory owned by the inclusion of amounts held under progress payments arrangements.

Inventory Components - (Tables 2 and 3) - Raw Materials, Goods in Process, and Finished Products are reported and compiled as on the books of each manufacturer, i.e. there has been no attempt to define the components specifically for each industry.

The inventory components are always a breakdown of cotal inventory held, not of total inventory owned. In industries where these two items differ, due to the inclusion of inventory held but not owned (see above), it is not possible to obtain value of imentory owned by components since, where separate progress accounts are maintained, firms concerned can only state that, of total holdings, a certain amount is no longer owned by thern. It is fairly obvious that the bulk of such payments apply to goods in process holdings but due to time lags in shipments and to prepayments some of the total value of inventory held but not awned would be applicable to finished products or raw materials.

Any comparisons of shipments/imentory ratios should be made using total inventory owned, not rotal inventory held, since the latter includes values which have already been whitten off to sales. If shipments/inventory ratios are desired using inventory components, tather than total inventory, a reasonable approximation to total inventory owned by components would be obtained by assuming that all inventory held but not owned had been included with goods in process.

Groupings - The Standard Industrial Classification groupings of industries used in Tables 3 and 4 are defined according to the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. A list of the industries included in the Standard Industrial classification groups will be found on page 40 of the bulletin.

## SOURCES

Monthly (or, in a few cases, quarterly) reports covering value of inventories and shipments are now submitted on s voluntary basis by 3,000 plants in 120 industries; in addition, $3,000 \mathrm{small}$ plants in 100 of these industries report monthly shipments oniy. Of the first group, 1,025 plants in 83 industries also report new and unfilled orders. Four industries are included in the total shipments estimates by using data available from other Bureau series, and two of these are also included in the total inventory estimates.
