Shipments of manufacturing industries in May advanced 2.1 per cent to $\$ 2,808.4$ million from $\$ 2,751.6$ million in April; after seasonal adjustment, shipments dropped slightly for the second time in 1965 by 1.1 per cent. However, at the rate of 9.3 per cent in May, seasonally adjusted shipments had increased for the fifth consecutive month as compared with the corresponding months in 1964. Cumulative shipments in the January - May period in 1965 were estimated at $\$ 13,302.6$ million, higher by 4.9 per cent than the value of shipments in the same period a year earlier of $\$ 12$, 685.6 million.

The preliminary estimate of $\$ 1,325.7$ million of shipments in the durable goods industry group in May showed a rise of 2.5 per cent over the previous month's estimated value of shipments of $\$ 1,293.5$ million and 12.7 per cent above those in May 1964; the highest rate of increase was 16.4 per cent which was shown by the nonmetallic mineral products industries; 0.2 to 7.3 per cent increases were recorded by the remaining industries of the group. Within the non-durable industry group which showed an increase in shipments of only 1.7 per cent in May as compared with April increases ranging from 0.4 per cent to 8.4 per cent were offset by decreases in shipments in the clothing industries ( -15.9 ), the leather industries ( -11.8 ), and the tobacco industries ( -1.3 ).

New orders of manufacturers during May showed only a fractional increase of 0.2 per cent at $\$ 2,791.5$ milion as compared with $\$ 2,786.6$ million in April; this is 6.7 per cent higher than new orders of $\$ 2,615.0$ million for the same month in 1964 . Seasonally adjusted, new orders in May had in fact dropped by 3.7 per cent. New orders of durable goods industries in May were down by 2.2 per cent, whereas the non-durable goods producers reported an increase of 2.3 per cent.

At the end of May, unfilled orders were estimated at $\$ 3,040.6$ million, slightly lower than the previous month, by 0.6 per cent, while the seasonally adjusted estimate showed practically no change. In value terms, the 1.9 per cent increase of unfilled orders in the non-durable goods industries was more than offset by the 1.0 per cent decrease in the durable goods industries. Compared with the level of 1964, manufacturers' unfilled orders at the end of May were 18.1 per cent higher, seasonally adjusted.

Inventorles owned by manufacturers at the end of May amounted to $\$ 5,341.1$ milion, only slightly higher, by 0.2 per cent than last month, but 7.2 per cent higher than the $\$ 4,984.6$ million of May 1964. Manufacturers' total inventories held in May were up by 0.3 per cent to $\$ 5,636.9$ miliion, and were also up by 0.7 per cent in the seasonally adjusted estimate of $\$ 5,617.4$ million. The small increase of inventories in May occurred mostly in goods in process and raw materials. Inventories owned by non-durable goods producers declined 0.8 per cent from $\$ 2,755.4$ million to $\$ 2,734$. 1 million in May, while the durable goods producers showed a rise of 1.2 per cent to $\$ 2,607.0$ million from $\$ 2,576.0$ million a month ago. The highest increase of 3.3 per cent in inventories owned was reported by the primary metal industries, and the biggest decrease of 3.7 per cent by the chemical and chemical products industries. Small to moderate increases in some major industry groups were substantially offset by decreases in other major industry groups.

Both the ratio of total inventories owned to shipments, and the ratio of finished products inventories to shipments in May showed small decreases from 1.94 and 0.69 last month to 1.90 and 0.67 respectively this month.

## CONCEPTS

Shipments - (Tables 1 to 4) - represent an estimated projection, on monthly basis, of the latest available Centus of Manufactures values.

New ordezs - (Tables 2 and 3) - This series is designed to indicate the rate at which new business is being received. It is defined as all New Orders Received during the period, at estimated selling values. Thus it covers total new orders, net of cancellations, regardless of whether the orders will be filled from scock or as a result of activity during the same month (and, therefore, will also be reported as shipments in the month received) or whether they will be added to existing backlogs.

Unfilled Orders - (Tables 2 and 3) - are defined as orders on books at the end of the period stated. That is, they cover orders received but not yet shipped (or treated as a sale), irrespective of work done on them or of stocks from which they can be filled.

Total Inventory Owned - (Tables 2 to 4) - represents the estimsted book value of inventory owned by manufacturers in connection with the manufacturing operations of the establishment covered whether held at plant or elsewhere, at the end of the period stated. It is made up of: raw materials, goods in process, finished goods of own manufacture less the value of inventory held but not owned which cannot be assigned to specific components. Since the series relates to manufacturing inventory only, value of goods purchased for re-sale is not included.

Inventory Held but Not Owned - (Tables 2 and 3) - represents, as far as possible, the portion of manufacturers' total inventory holdings which are no longer owned by the reporting manufacturers because of payments made on long-rerm contracts as work on these progresses. This item is applicable only to the relatively few industries where long-term contracts are common although, because of the nature of the item, the value per industry is high.

Because of variations in accounting methods there are a few cases where it is not possible to obtain values for this cype of inventory. The estimated value shown for this item must thexefore be considered to some extent incomplete.

Total Inventory Held - (Tables 2 and 3) - represents the estimated total value of manufacturers' inventory holdings in connection with manufacturing operations, regardless of ownership; it differs from inventory owned by the inclusion of inventories held under progress payments arrangements.

Inventory Components - (Tables 2 and 3) - Raw Materials, Goods in Process, and Finished Products are reported and complled as on the books of each manufacturer, i.e. there has been no attempt to define the components specifically for each industry.

The inventory components are always a breakdown of cotal inventory held, not of total inventory owned. In industries where these two items differ, due to the inclusion of inventory held but not owned (see above), it is not possible to obtain value of inventory owned by components since, where separate progress accounts are maintained, firms concerned can only state that, of total holdings, a certain amonnt is not longer owned by them. It is fairly obvious that the bulk of such payments apply to goods in process holdinga but due to time lags in shipments and to prepayments some of the cotal value of inventory held but not owned would be applicable to finished products or raw materials.

Any comparisons of shipments/Inventory ratios should be made using total inventory owned, not total inventory held, since the latter includes values which have already been written off to sales. If shipments/inventory ratios are desired using inventory components, rather than total inventary, a reasonable approximation to total inventory owned by components would be obtained by assuming that all inventory held but not owned had been included with goods in process

Groupings - The Standard Industrial Classification groupings of industries used in Tables 3 and 4 are defined according to the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. A list of the industries included in the Standard Industrial Classification grouns wlll be found on page 40 of the bulletin.

Monthly (or, in a few cases, quarterly) reports covering value of inventories and shipments are now submicted on a voluntary basis by 3,000 plants in 120 industries; in addition, 3,000 small plants in 100 of these industries report monthly shipments only. Of the first group, 1,025 plants in 83 industries also report new and unfilied orders. Four industries are included in the total shipments estimates by using data available from other Bureau series, and two of these are also included in the total inventory estimates.
