## TREND SUMMARY

Manufacturing shipments in August rose 6.0 per cent to $\$ 3,073$ million from $\$ 2,898$ million in July, and 1.2 per cent after seasonal adjustment. New orders received by manufacturers for August were up 4.2 per cent from the previous month, While the backlog of orders at the end of the month recorded a fractional increase. On a seasonally adjusted basis, however, both new orders and unfilled orders in August were down 3.9 per cent and 1.2 per cent respectively from July. Manufacturers' stocks held at the end of August rose 1.2 per cent from July and 0.2 per cent seasonally adjusted; increases in raw materials and goods in process were partly offset by a drop in finished products.

At the total estimate of $\$ 24,463$ million, manufacturing shipments from January to August were $\$ 514$ milion, or 2.1 per cent higher than the comparable estimate of last year. Non-durable goods industries as a whole accounted for a much larger portion of the gain during the period. More than two-thirds of the shipments increase in August was also attributed to non-durable goods.

All major industry groups of non-durable goods reported advances in August shipments with the largest absolute gain of $\$ 30$ million recorded in the paper and allied products industries. Shipments in the leather and the clothing industries, estimated at $\$ 38$ million and $\$ 106$ million respectively in August, showed substantial seasonal increases of 38.6 per cent and 27.7 per cent over July, but were lower than the August estimate of last year. Textile industries also reported a sizable increase of 15.4 per cent in August from July, chiefly the result of seasonal influence. In durable goods industries, increases in many industry groups, ranging from 3.4 per cent to 15.4 per cent, were partly offset by decreases in the machinery industries whi the transportation equipment industries. Although transportation equipment manuEscturers' shipments in August were down 9.6 per cent to $\$ 273$ million from July, Shey were up 38.4 per cent from August a year earlier, reflecting mainly a less than geasonal drop in August shipments in the motor vehicle and the parts and accessories industries.

The increase in manufacturers' new orders from $\$ 2,952$ million in July to $\$ 3,077$ million in August occurred largely in non-durable goods industries where a rise of 6.6 per cent was reported. New orders received by durable goods producers in August reached $\$ 1,314$ million, 1.2 per cent above the preceding month but 4.8 per cent behind the estimate in August 1966. Durable goods industries also reported a small increase in backlog of orders to $\$ 3,377$ million at the end of August which was also 6.5 per cent higher than the level of last year.

Manufacturers' owned inventories were up again in August, rising 1.0 per cent to $\$ 6,741$ million from $\$ 6,672$ million with the increase evenly distributed between durable and non-durable goods industries. Seasonally adjusted, total inventory owned in August increased slightly by 0.3 per cent, continuing the upward trend started in March.

The increase in durable goods inventory holdings in August was due primarily to a large seasonal build-up of goods in process inventory in the motor vehicle industries, which was also reflected in the transportation equipment industry group. Substantial rises in the stocks of raw materials and finished goods of the food and beverage industries and the paper and allied products industries accounted for an ovezell increase in the stocks of non-durable goods manufacturers.

In August, ratios of manufacturers' owned inventories to shipments and finished perbuicts to shipments were down to 2.19 and 0.80 respectively from the seasonal high of 2.30 and 0.85 in July. Seasonally adjusted, the ratios for August showed only slight decreases at 2.15 and 0.79 from 2.17 and 0.80 of the month earlier.

 monthly shipments and inventories and unfilled orders on the books at the end of the month estimated on the basis of the latest census of manufactures by monthly returns from representative establishments in each industry. The December 1966 bulletin is the first issue in which the census base of 1964 is used. Values for 1962 , 1963 and 1964 are derived directly from each annual census; values for 1965 and 1966 are projected from the 1964 census. The aggregate monthly shipments for each year which is based directly on a census should equal published census values. The year end inventory values published here are for December and thus will differ from the year end census values to the extent which establishments have reported to the census on a fiscal year ending at a date other than December 31. Unfilled orders on books are published for industries where orders are part of the accounting record.

The monthly survey covers approximately 6,500 establishnents. The survey accepts combinations of establishments within companies on a monthly basis to accommodate monthly accounting records and also accepts estimates of inventories and orders values if actual records are not available. Many establishments in several industries take inventory only annually and keep no record of orders as orders. The number of firms reporting actual inventory values is approximately two-thirds of the total reporting shipments; approximately one third report unfllled orders.

The monthly sample of establishments in the survey is revised annually in accordance with the census base and the list is kept constant between revisions. The identity of an establishment is also retained between revisions. This is done because, simply stated, the estimates are calculated by multiplying the sum of monthly reported values for each industry in each province by the ratio of the establishments in the sample to the census total for the same unit. Separate ratios are calculated for shipments, inventories and unfilled orders. If a report is not received in time for the monthly compilation an estimated value is written in. Since each month is published first as a preliminary value monthly returns are accepted up to the time the machine compilation is begun and late returns for the month will be used one month later in the revised estimate. Returns received after beginniag the compllation for the next month (i.e. January returns received after tie Paignaty zomp: intion: is begun) are not used in the estimates until the following annual revision.

Thus changes in the monthly series will arise from changes in tis iden-tey sf attitlishantacs between censuses, and from the substitution of reported for estimated values.

The inventory values published are shown both for total inventory owned and total inventory held by an establishment. The difference between these values is the amount of inventory financed by progress payments as the work proceeds on goods being produced. Since some goods manufactured are held as in-progress inventory for a considerable time the book value of manufacturers' inventory may build up and, to the extent that this has been covered by the payment received, is higher than the manufacturers' investment in inventory. Both the amount of the manufacturers' investment in inventorles and the amount of inventory held by manufacturers is of economic interest. It is also interesting to distinguish between inventory held by the degree of fabrication which has taken place. Consequently firms are asked to report their stocks by level of fabrication: raw materials and components; work in progress and finished products.

Unfilled orders cover orders received but not yet shipped, or treated as a sale, irrespective of work done on them or stocks from which they can be filled. Establishments in many industries do not maintain order books but flll orders as they are received from stocks. Most establishments which do maintain order books strike a value of unfilled orders on their books at the end of each accounting period. New orders received, although an estimate of considerable interest to economists as an indication of the rate at which new business is being received, is not often available from accounting records. Consequently the estimate for new orders published here is derived by industry, by province from the relationship between unfilled orders and shipments.

The definitions, classifications and groupings are taken from the census of manufactures.
