Mmufacturers' Jamary sinpments, estimated at 33,016 million were 4.1 per cent seasonally down from $\$ 3,146$ million in December, but 6.4 per cent up from the estimate for January 1967. New orders received during January dropped 1.7 per cent, while unfilled orders at the end of the month rose 2.3 per cent from the previous month. Seasonally adjusted, January manufacturing shipments rose 1.1 per cent, a noticeable increase for the third consecutive month. Seasonally adjusted new orders and unfilled orders for January, however, showed declines of 3.0 per cent and 1.5 per cent respectively. Total inventory held at the end of January decreased slightly by 0.2 per cent from the end of December, and was fractionally off after seasonal adjustment with the small increases in raw materials and goods in process more than offset by a 0.8 per cent drop in finished products.

January shipments of durable and non-durable goods were lower than December by 6.1 per cent and 2.4 per cent but higher than January of last year by 7.9 per cent and 5.2 per cent respectively. Most major industry groups reported decreases in January shipments from December, mainly seasonal in nature. About 43 per cent of the overall decrease in manufacturers' shipments was attributable to the transportation equipment industry group which showed a drop of $\$ 56 \mathrm{million}$, mainly seasonal, from its record high in December. Relatively speaking, the largest decline in January shipments was reported by the tobacco industries ( -23.4 per cent). The clothing industries, on the other hand, reported a significant seasonal increase of 15.2 per cent from the year's low in December. Compared with the same month in 1967 , more substantial gains in January shipments by major industry groups were recorded in knitting mills (25.6 per cent), clothing ( 11.0 per cent), primary metal ( 12.5 per cent), transportation equipment (17.3 per cent) and petroleum and coal products (16.7 per cent).

New orders received by durable goods producers during January remained at about the same level as in December, while new orders for non-durable goods decreased by 3.0 per cent. The backlog of unfilled orders for durable goods manufacturers reached $\$ 3.304$ million at the end of January, 2.5 per cent higher than a month earlier, but 1.1 per cent below the level at the end of January 1967.

Total inventory owned by manufacturing industries in January was 0.3 per cent lower than in December. The larger portion of the decrease occurred in non-durable goods industries. More prominent declines were registered in the foods and beverages industries ( -2.3 per cent) and the primary metal industries ( -3.7 per cent), and a marked increase was shown in the tobacco industries ( 7.6 per cent). The changes largely reflected seasonal variations in raw materials.

In January, the ratios of manufacturers' owned inventories to shipments and finished products to shipments were seasonally up to 2.22 and 0.81 from 2.13 and 0.77 respectively in December, but lower than the ratios in January last year. Both ratios, based on the seasonally adjusted estimates, decreased for the third consecuGive wonch 3incs Isst Novenber to 2.04 and 0.33 .

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 monthly shipments and inventories and unfilled orders on the books at the end of the month estimated on the basis of the latest census of manufactures by monthly returns from representative establishments in each industry. The December 1966 bulletin is the first issue in which the census base of 1964 is used. Values for 1962,1963 and 1964 are derived directly from each annual census; values for 1965 and 1966 are projected from the 1964 census. The aggregate monthly shipments for each year which is based directly on a census should equal published census values. The year end inventory values published here are for December and thus will differ from the year end census values to the extent which establishments have reported to the census on a fiscal year ending at a date other than December 31. Unfilled orders on books are published for industries where orders are part of the accounting record.

The monthly survey covers approximately 6,500 establishments. The survey accepts combinations of establishments within companies on a monthly basis to accommodate monthly accounting records and also accepts estimates of inventories and orders values if actual records are not avaliable. Many establishments in several industries take inventory only annually and keep no record of orders as orders. The number of firms reporting actual inventory values is approximately two-thirds of the total reporting shipments; approximately one third report unfilled orders.

The monthly sample of establishments in the survey is revised annually in accordance with the census base and the list is kept constant between revisions. The identity of an establishment is also retained between revisions. This is done because, simply stated, the estimates are calculated by multiplying the sum of monthly reported values for each industry in each province by the ratio of the establishments in the sample to the census total for the same unit. Separate ratios are calculated for shipments, inventories and unfilled orders. If a report is not received in time for the monthly compilation an estimated value is written in. Since each month is published first as a preliminary value monthly returns are accepted up to the time the machine compilation is begun and late returns for the month will be used one month later in the revised estimate. Returns recelved after beginning the compilation for the next month (i.e. January returns received after the February compllation is begun) are not used in the estimates until the following annual revision.

Thus changes in the monthly series will arise from changes in the identity of establishments between censuses, and from the substitution of reported for estimated values.

The inventory values published are shown both for total inventory owned and total inventory held by an establishment. The difference between these values is the amount of inventory financed by progress payments as the work proceeds on goods being produced. Since some goods manufactured are held as in-progress inventory for a considerable time the book value of manufacturers' inventory may build up and, to the extent that this has been covered by the payment received, is higher than the manufacturers' investment in inventory. Both the amount of the manufacturers' investment in inventories and the amount of inventory held by manufacturers is of economic interest. It is also interesting to distinguish between inventory held by the degree of fabrication which has taken place. Consequently firms are asked to report their stocks by level of fabrication: raw materials and components; work in progress and finished products.

Unfilled orders cover orders recelved but not yet shipped, or treated as a sale, irrespective of work done on them or stocks from which they can be filled. Establishments in many industries do not maintain order books but fill orders as they are received from stocks. Most establishments which do maintain order books strike a value of unfilled orders on their books at the end of each accounting period. New orders received, although an estimate of considerable interest to economists as an indication of the rate at which new business is being received, is not often available from accounting records. Consequently the estimate for new orders published here is derived by industry, by province from the relationship between unfilled orders and shipments.

The definitions, classifications and groupings are taken from the census of manufactures.

(2) The value of inventory held but not owned in this group is very small, and sample coverage is not adequate to provide separate data.
