### PRELIMINARY STATEMENT OF MANUFACTURES IN CANADA, 1949

This report contains preliminary statistics on Canadian Manufactures for the year 1749. In addition to general statistics covering gross value of production, cost of materials and employment and payrolls, it provides for the first time preliminary information on the production of 1,000 important commodity groups.

The estimated value of manufactured products in Canada in 1949 totalled #12,378,731,000 an increase of approximately #500 million over 1948, the previous record year. Approximately 10% of the increase is accounted for by the inclusion for the first time of the statistics of manufacturing plants in Newfoundland.

Employees engaged in manufacturing totalled 1,159,315, slightly higher than in the previous year and salaries and wages paid reached \$2,566,104,000 an increase of \$157 million in 1947. Cost of materials used advanced \$132,000,000 to \$6,764,896,000.

The value of output of the industries in the Foods and Beverages group led the list at \$2,872, 336,000. Iron and Steel products ranked second with a value of \$1,409,000,000. Paper products was third at \$1,091,666,000 and transportation equipment stood fourth at \$1,063,000,000.
