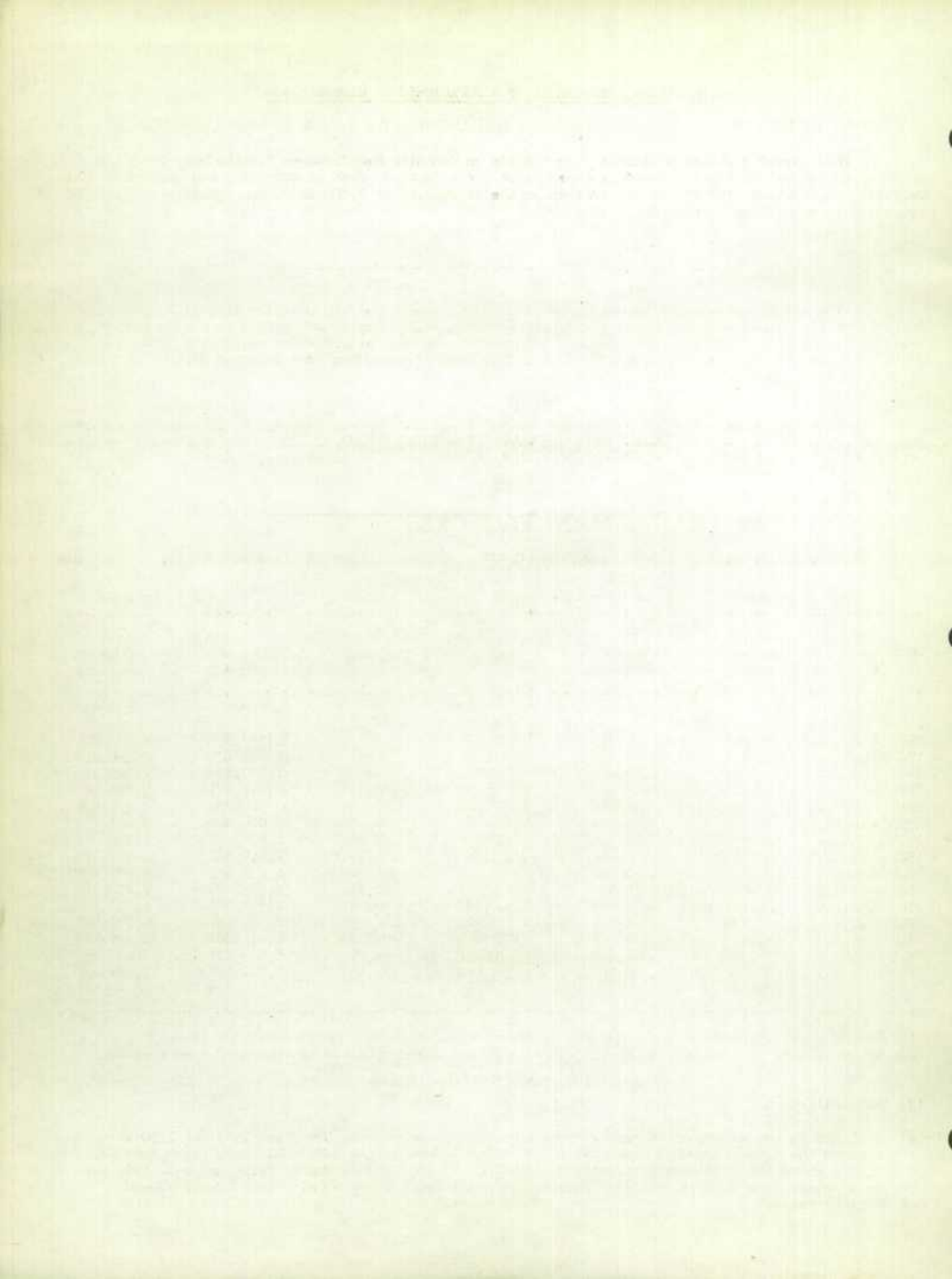

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT OF MANUFACTURES IN CANADA, 1950

This report contains preliminary statistics on Canadian Manufactures for the year 1950. In addition to general statistics covering gross value of production, cost of materials and employment and payrolls, it provides preliminary information on the production of 1,000 important commodities, grouped according to significant production fields.

The estimated value of manufactured products in Canada in 1950 totalled \$13,781,220,000, an increase of \$1,301,617,000 over 1949, the previous record year. Employees engaged in manufacturing totalled 1,186,280, slightly higher than in the previous year and salaries and wages paid reached \$2,762,258,000, an increase of \$170,367,000 in 1950. Cost of materials used advanced from \$6,843,231,000 to \$7,510,999,000.

The value of output of the industries in the Foods and Beverages group led the list at \$3,018,804,000. Iron and Steel products ranked second with a value of \$1,499,927,000. Transportation equipment was third at \$1,252,860,000, and paper products stood fourth at \$1,248,484,000.
