



This report contains preliminary statistics on Canadian Manufactures for the year 1951. In addition to general statistics covering gross value of production, cost of materials and employment and payrolls, it provides preliminary information on the production of 1,000 important commodities, grouped according to significant production fields.

It also presents for the first time, estimated shipments data for the first half of the current year, i. e., January-June, 1952.

The estimated value of manufactured products in Canada in 1951 totalled \$16,270,931,000, an increase of \$2,453,411,000 over 1950, the previous record year. Employees engaged in manufacturing totalled 1,247,529, slightly higher than in the previous year and salaries and wages paid reached \$3,253,002,000 an increase of \$481,817,000 in 1951. Cost of materials used advanced from \$7,538,531,000 to \$8,973,200,000.

The value of output of the industries in the Foods and Beverages group led the list at \$3,405,-114,000. Iron and Steel products ranked second with a value of \$1,903,727,000. Paper products stood third at \$1,588,857,000 and Transportation equipment was fourth at \$1,535,718,000.

Preliminary estimates of manufacturers' shipments, January-June, 1952, show a level of \$8,260,-211,000 as against #8,095,014,000 for the same period in 1951. For further details, see table 4.


