PRELIMINARY STATEMENT OF MANUFACTURES IN CANADA, 1955

This report contains preliminary statistics on Canadian Manufactures for the year 1955. In addition to general statistics covering value of factory shipments, cost of materials, employment and payrolls, it provides preliminary information on the production of about 1,000 important commodities, grouped according to significant production fields.

The estimated value of manufactured products shipped by manufacturers in 1955 totalled \$19,469,013,000 an increase of \$1,914,486,000 over 1954. Employees engaged in manufacturing totalled 1,289,978 slightly higher than in the previous year and salaries and wages paid reached \$4,110,720,000 an increase of \$214,033,000 in 1955. Cost of materials used advanced from \$9,241,857,000 to \$10,298,186,000.

In value of shipments the industries in the Foods and Beverages group led the list with \$3,610,360,000. Iron and steel products ranked second with a value of \$2,235,924,000. Transportation equipment stood third at \$1,946,-332,000 and Paper Products was fourth at \$1,752,038,000.
