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THE MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES OF QUEBEC

LES INDUSTRIES MANUFACTURIÈRES DU QUÉBEC

Quebec with about 30 per cent of Canada's total selling value of factory shipments ranks as the second largest industrial province in Canada. Manufacturing establishments reporting in 1955 numbered 12,194. These plants furnished employment to 429,575 persons who received \$1,271,077,953 in salaries and wages. They also shipped goods with a selling value at the factory of \$5,922,367,074 and spent \$3,152,541,331 for materials, leaving the calculated value added by manufacture at \$2,622,333,056.

The manufacturing industries of Quebec, in common with other provinces, made a rapid recovery from the minor recession which occurred during 1954. All groups, with the exception of transportation equipment, reported increased value of shipments. For the province as a whole the increase was 9.8 p.c. as compared with an increase of 11.2 p.c. for Canada. As regards employment, all groups, with the exception of transportation equipment and leather products, reported increases, the over-all for the province being 1.3 p.c. and for Canada 2.4 p.c.

Indexes of physical volume measure changes in production more accurately than any other indicators. Since such indexes are not available for provinces, changes in employment have to be considered as reflecting more or less the growth or decline of the various sectors of the manufacturing field. In comparing the changes in employment between the record high of 1953 with that for 1955 it is found that in spite of an increase of 9.9 p.c. in the value of shipments for the province as a whole, employment declined by 2.7 p.c. during the same period. The greatest decline in employment since 1953 was reported by the transportation equipment group with a drop of 28.7 p.c. This was followed by leather products with a drop of 9.3 p.c., clothing 5.2 p.c., textiles 3.7 p.c., wood products 3.0 p.c., iron and steel products 2.8 p.c., tobacco 1.6 p.c. and knitting mills 0.8 p.c. Nine groups on the other hand had more employees in 1955 than in 1953. Of these, non-metallic mineral products with an increase of 14.0 p.c. reported the greatest expansion in production. This was followed by paper products with an increase of 10.4 p.c., printing, publishing and allied trades 7.7 p.c., rubber goods 7.4 p.c., products of petroleum and coal 3.1 p.c., chemicals and allied products 2.8 p.c., foods and beverages 2.7 p.c., non-ferrous metal products 2.7 p.c., and miscellaneous industries 1.9 p.c. The electrical apparatus and supplies group reported no change.

Quebec has developed its \$5.9 billion manufacturing output with such leading industries as pulp and paper, non-ferrous metal-smelting and refining, petroleum products, slaughtering and meat packing, cotton yarn and cloth, men's and women's clothing, tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, synthetic textiles and silk, railway-rolling stock, leather footwear and miscellaneous electrical apparatus. In common with the rest of Canada, Quebec experienced a great industrial expansion following the second World War. Nor was this

Le Québec, qui figure pour environ 30 p. 100 de la valeur de vente des expéditions des fabriques, est la deuxième province industrielle du Canada. Les établissements manufacturiers qui ont fait rapport en 1955 étaient au nombre de 12,194 et fournissaient du travail à 429,575 personnes, qui ont reçu en traitements et salaires la somme de \$1,271,077,953. Ces établissements ont aussi expédié des marchandises d'une valeur de vente à la fabrique de \$5,922,367,074 et dépensé en matières premières \$3,152,541,331. La valeur ajoutée par la fabrication a été de \$2,622,333,056.

Les industries manufacturières du Québec, comme celles des autres provinces, se sont remises rapidement de la légère récession qui s'est produite en 1954. Tous les groupes, — sauf l'équipement de transport, — ont vu la valeur de leurs expéditions augmenter. L'augmentation a été de 9.8 p. 100 pour la province, tandis qu'elle a été de 11.2 p. 100 pour le Canada. En ce qui concerne l'emploi, tous les groupes, à l'exception de l'équipement de transport et des produits du cuir, ont enregistré une production accrue de 1.3 p. 100 pour la province et de 2.4 p. 100 pour le pays.

Les indices du volume physique mesurent les variations de la production avec plus de précision que tout autre indicateur. Comme ces indices ne sont pas connus pour les provinces, on juge que les fluctuations de l'emploi reflètent plus ou moins celles des divers secteurs de l'industrie manufacturière. Si l'on observe le mouvement de l'emploi entre le sommet de 1953 et celui de 1955, on constate que durant ces deux années, en dépit d'une hausse de 9.9 p. 100 de la valeur des expéditions dans la province entière, l'emploi a fléchi de 2.7 p. 100. La réduction (28.7 p. 100) la plus importante depuis 1953 a été marquée par le groupe de l'équipement de transport. Suivent les diminutions des produits du cuir (9.3 p. 100), des vêtements (5.2 p. 100), des textiles (3.7 p. 100), des produits du bois (3 p. 100), des produits du fer et de l'acier (2.8 p. 100), du tabac (1.6 p. 100) et de la bonneterie (0.8 p. 100). D'autre part, neuf groupes avaient plus d'employés en 1955 qu'en 1953. Les produits minéraux non métalliques tenaient la vedette de l'expansion industrielle (augmentation de 14 p. 100). Veniaient ensuite les produits du papier (10.4 p. 100), l'imprimerie, l'édition et les industries connexes (7.7 p. 100), les articles en caoutchouc (7.4 p. 100), les dérivés du pétrole et du charbon (3.1 p. 100), les produits chimiques et parachimiques (2.8 p. 100), les aliments et boissons (2.7 p. 100), les produits métalliques non ferreux (2.7 p. 100), et les industries diverses (1.9 p. 100). Le groupe des fournitures et appareils électriques est demeuré stable.

Grâce à des industries telles la pâte de bois et la papier, la réduction et l'affinage des métaux non ferreux, les dérivés du pétrole, les abattoirs et conserveries de viande, les filés et tissus de coton, les vêtements d'hommes et de femmes, le tabac, les cigares et les cigarettes, les textiles et soies synthétiques le matériel roulant de chemin de fer, les chaussures en cuir et divers appareils électriques, le Québec a porté sa production manufacturière à 5.9 milliards de dollars. Comme le reste du pays, le Québec a été témoin d'une forte expansion indus-

expansion confined to the existing industrial areas, but spread to many towns and villages in the accessible areas of the province.

Quebec's leading industry is pulp and paper with an output of approximately \$561 million in 1955. Quebec is a principal world centre for the production of newsprint with 55 major pulp and paper plants concentrated in the Trois Rivieres and Shawinigan Falls districts as well as along the Saguenay, Ottawa, and St. Lawrence rivers. The production of non-ferrous metals has expanded considerably during the past decade. The output of aluminum has made impressive strides during the past years and reached a record total of 612,543 tons in 1955. After the end of the war, with the disappearance of the demands for defense, surplus productive capacity appeared. New civilian uses were found to take up the slack, so that by 1948 the industry was producing 75 p.c. of its peak wartime output. To this has been added the defense demands created by the Korean war and in 1952 the peak level of production attained in 1943 has again been reached. Quebec, with its new furniture factories, its new titanium smelter and its expanded aluminum-making facilities, is challenging Ontario's long established lead in a number of the wood and non-ferrous metal products industries.

There are several important factors which contributed to the great industrial development of the Province. To begin with, the geographic situation of the Province is extremely favourable, with an excellent large harbour 800 miles inland where seagoing vessels of heavy tonnage can dock. There is also an extensive highway system linking the small rural areas to the big industrial centres. Other significant factors include abundant forest resources, water power, minerals, agricultural lands and, of even more importance, an industrious and stable population.

Quebec ranks highest in available water-power resources, having more than 40 p.c. of the total recorded for all Canada. Its power development has been remarkable and its installation of 8,031,422 h.p. at the end of 1955 represents about 45 p.c. of the total for Canada. The St. Lawrence River Beauharnois development of 1,408,000 h.p. and the Saguenay River Shipshaw development of 1,200,000 h.p. were the two largest in the country up to 1955.

The completion of the *Sir Adam Beck-Niagara* Generating Station No. 2 on the Niagara River which raised the combined capacity of Stations Nos. 1 and 2 to 1,820,000 h.p. makes it the largest single installation in Canada.

Two of the most important industrial developments in Quebec today are the Ungava iron ore project and the new titanium industry. With the exploitation of the Ungava iron deposits on which it is believed, the future of the great steel industries of this Continent rests, Quebec's industrial base is being expanded to the point where the future industrial development of this Province is well assured.

Quebec's industries are not as diversified as those of Ontario, although a number have an output

trielle à la suite de la seconde guerre mondiale. Cette expansion ne s'est pas limitée aux seules régions industrielles existantes, mais s'est étendue à nombre de villes et de villages des régions accessibles de la province.

La principale industrie de la province de Québec est celle de la pulpe et du papier, dont la production a été d'environ 561 millions de dollars en 1955. Principal centre mondial de production de papier-journal, le Québec possède 55 grandes pulperies-papeteries, qui se concentrent dans les régions de Trois-Rivières et de Shawinigan-Falls ou s'échelonnent le long du Saguenay, de l'Ottawa et du Saint-Laurent. La production de métaux non-ferreux a sensiblement augmenté depuis dix ans. Celle d'aluminium a fait des bonds impressionnantes depuis quelques années et a atteint le chiffre sans précédent de 612,543 tonnes en 1955. La guerre terminée et, partant, la disparition de la demande de défense, la province disposait d'une productivité excédentaire, qui a été absorbée par de nouveaux usages, de sorte qu'en 1948, l'industrie atteignait 75 p. 100 de sa production maximum de temps de guerre. A cela est venue s'ajouter la demande créée par la guerre de Corée, et, en 1952, la production réatteignait son niveau maximum de 1943. Le Québec, avec ses nouvelles manufactures de meubles, son nouveau smelter de titane et ses installations agrandies pour la production d'aluminium, menace de ravir à l'Ontario la prédominance qu'on lui reconnaissait depuis longtemps dans un certain nombre d'industries des produits du bois et des métaux non ferreux.

Divers facteurs importants ont contribué à la grande expansion industrielle de la province: sa situation géographique particulièrement favorable, son excellent port de mer à 800 milles à l'intérieur, où les océaniques de gros tonnage peuvent mouiller; un vaste réseau routier, qui relie les petites régions rurales aux grands centres industriels et, facteurs non moins importants, ses abondantes ressources forestières, ses sources d'énergie hydraulique, ses minéraux, ses terres agricoles et, ce qui compte le plus, sa population industrielle et stable.

Le Québec occupe le premier rang au point de vue des ressources d'hydro-électricité disponibles, dont il possède plus de 40 p. 100 du total. Ses progrès dans ce domaine ont été remarquables et ses installations actuelles de 8,031,422 h.p., à la fin de 1955, représentent près de 45 p. 100 du total national. Les entreprises Saint-Laurent-Beauharnois (1,408,000 h.p.) et Saguenay-Schipshaw (1,200,000 h.p.) étaient les deux plus importantes du pays jusqu'en 1955.

L'achèvement de la seconde centrale de la *Sir Adam Beck-Niagara*, sur la rivière Niagara, a porté la capacité globale de cette usine à 1,820,000 h.p. et en fait la plus vaste installation du genre au Canada.

Deux des développements industriels les plus importants du Québec sont les exploitations de minerai de fer dans l'Ungava et la nouvelle industrie de titane. Grâce à la mise en valeur des gisements de fer de l'Ungava, dont dépend, croit-on, l'avenir des grandes industries de l'acier du continent, les assises industrielles de la province de Québec sont étendues au point où l'avenir de la province dans ce domaine est assuré pour longtemps.

Les industries du Québec ne sont pas aussi diversifiées que celles de l'Ontario bien que cer-

approximately half or more of the total Canadian production. The manufacture of pulp and paper occupies the premier position. Fifty years ago this industry had hardly come into existence in the Province and in the mid-1920's the annual gross value of production had not yet reached \$100,000,000. By the end of 1955 it accounted for about 9 p.c. of the gross value of Quebec's manufactures and for about 42 p.c. of the Canadian total for this industry. Other large Canadian industries in which Quebec predominates are tobacco, cigars and cigarettes 94.0 p.c. of the Canadian total; women's factory clothing 69.5 p.c.; cotton yarn and cloth 67.6 p.c., men's factory clothing 56.2 p.c., synthetic textiles and silk 53.0 p.c., miscellaneous electrical apparatus and supplies 48.6 p.c., miscellaneous chemical products 44.2 p.c., non-ferrous metal smelting and refining 43.6 p.c., pulp and paper 42.3 p.c., railway rolling stock 42.0 p.c., acids, alkalies and salts 39.3 p.c., brass and copper products 37.6 p.c., and petroleum products 35.0 p.c. Two medium-sized industries with Canada shipments of over \$100,000,000 also predominated in Quebec. These were: leather footwear with 58.2 p.c. and medicinal and pharmaceutical preparations 48.7 p.c.

Quebec also predominates in a large number of the smaller industries. The candle industry contributed 95.6 p.c. of the Canadian total; men's clothing contractors 94.4 p.c.; cotton thread 82.5 p.c.; women's clothing contractors 81.9 p.c.; children's clothing 79.5 p.c.; embroidery, hemstitching, etc. 77.7 p.c.; dyeing and finishing of textiles 77.6 p.c.; oilcloth, linoleum, etc. 73.5 p.c.; fur dressing and dyeing 71.9 p.c.; process cheese 71.2 p.c.; lasts, trees and shoe findings 70.4 p.c.; oiled and waterproofed clothing 70.4 p.c.; miscellaneous clothing 69.3 p.c.; narrow fabrics 69.1 p.c.; boot and shoe findings, leather 67.2 p.c.; artificial flowers and feathers 64.8 p.c.; corsets 58.4 p.c.; fur goods 58.0 p.c.; miscellaneous textiles 55.1 p.c.; asbestos products 51.4 p.c.; buttons 48.7 p.c. woollen cloth 47.4 p.c.; musical instruments 38.4 p.c.; etc.

Taines d'entre elles aient une production d'environ la moitié ou plus de la production nationale du Canada. L'industrie de la pulpe et du papier vient en tête. Elle naissait à peine il y a cinquante ans et vers 1925 la valeur brute de sa production annuelle n'atteignait pas encore \$100,000,000. A la fin de 1955, elle est d'environ 9 p. 100 de la valeur brute de la production manufacturière de la province et d'environ 42 p. 100 de la valeur totale de la production de cette industrie au Canada. D'autres grandes industries canadiennes où la province de Québec occupe une place prépondérante sont: tabac, cigares et cigarettes 94 p. 100 du total national; confection pour femmes 69.5 p. 100; filés et tissus de coton 67.6 p. 100; confection pour hommes 56.2 p. 100; textiles et soies synthétiques 53 p. 100; fournitures et appareils électriques divers 48.6 p. 100; produits chimiques divers 44.2 p. 100; réduction et affinage de métaux non ferreux 43.6 p. 100; pulpe et papier 42.3 p. 100; matériel roulant de chemin de fer 42 p. 100; acide, alcali et sel 39.3 p. 100; articles de laiton et de cuivre 37.6 p. 100; et dérivés du pétrole 35 p. 100. Deux industries de moyenne importance, dont les expéditons se chiffrent au Canada par \$100,000,000, prédominent au Québec; ce sont l'industrie des chaussures en cuir 58.2 p. 100 et les préparations médicinales et pharmaceutiques 48.7 p. 100.

Le Québec tient aussi le premier rang dans nombre de petites industries dont la chandellerie, qui répond de 95.6 p. 100 de la production nationale; les entrepreneurs en confection pour hommes 94.4 p. 100; le fil de coton 82.5 p. 100; les entrepreneurs en confection pour femmes 81.9 p. 100; les vêtements d'enfants 79.5 p. 100; les broderies et ourlets à jour etc. 77.7 p. 100; la teinture et le finissage des textiles 77.6 p. 100; le linoleum et autres tissus enduits 73.5 p. 100; l'apprettage et la teinture des fourrures 71.9 p. 100; le fromage refait 71.2 p. 100; les formes, embauchoirs et crêpins 70.4 p. 100; les vêtements huilés et imperméabilisés, 70.4 p. 100, les vêtements divers 69.3 p. 100; la rubannerie 69.1 p. 100; les crêpins en cuir 67.2 p. 100; les fleurs et plumes artificielles 64.8 p. 100; les corsets 58.4 p. 100; les articles en fourrure 58 p. 100; les textiles divers 55.1 p. 100; les produits d'aminante 51.4 p. 100; les boutons 48.7 p. 100; les lainages 47.4 p. 100; les instruments de musique 38.4 p. 100; etc.
